

Three E-Z Pieces

Powerful data base

(Editor's note:This is the last in a three-part series) So far, we have covered the word processing and spreadsheet portions of the program. In this final part we will cover the data base and the integration of different files. If you're not familiar with/// E-Z Pieces, read the first two parts before reading this part.

A data base is nothing more than a logical, flexible, highly organized filing system. Businesses use data bases for inventory, order processing, customer lists, billing, and personnel information. Hobbyists find data bases to be helpful in storing information about stamp, record, book and recipe collections. Homeowners can keep track of bills, taxes, addresses and phone numbers.

There are two types of data bases: relational and non-relational. A relational data base, like Omnis ///, uses a sophisticated hierarchical filing structure and is very powerful, but it can be difficult to use. A non-relational data base, like the one found in /// E-Z Pieces, uses a simpler *flat* filing structure and is very easy to use.

The data base

The /// E-Z Pieces data base displays entries in a single or multiple record format (up to 15 records at a time). You can toggle between seeing a single record or multiple records by pressing Z. The manual lists the maximum file size for a 256K Apple /// as being 2300 records, assuming an average record size of 75 characters. There are up to 30

user-definable categories (or fields) per record, and records can be up to 1024 characters long. You can define a calculated category, and designate a formula for its calculations. You can also produce group totals.

When choosing to create a new data base, /// E-Z Pieces automatically puts you into the *insert new records* section. You then type a name for each category, and can begin to type all the information you want in each record. The records will be displayed one at a time with all the categories and data displayed (single record format). After typing several records, you can zoom

out to see all the records on your screen (multiple record format). The records will each be displayed on one line, with 15 records shown at any one time. By using the arrow keys, you can scroll through the records or move through the file by using the *ruler* (\$\mathbb{C}\$1 through 9).

These records can be arranged by any category either alphabetically, numerically, or chronologically. Chances are that unless you have very small records all the categories will not show on the screen. Unlike a spreadsheet, you cannot scroll right to see these categories. By using the layout function (CL) you can remove unnecessary records from

view, or reduce the size of some categories until they all fit on the screen.

Entering data

Data entry can be done in the multiple record format, but it is much easier to do in the single record format, therefore, /// E-Z Pieces' insert mode is always a single record format. From the Review/Add/Change portion of the program, a user can choose the place to insert new records with the cursor and press G I (insert mode). Press ES-CAPE to leave this mode.

The editing features available include deleting an entry (CONTROL Y), deleting one or more records (CD) deleting a single character (delete), making multiple copies of a record (CC), moving a record to or from the clipboard (CM) and moving past existing information without changing it (left and right arrows). When an entry is satisfactory, add it to the data base by pressing RETURN or ENTER. You can do this even if the cursor is in the middle of an entry without truncating the entry. As with every other part of /// E-Z Pieces, both the insert and overstrike cursors are available.

Three E-Z Pieces allows you to create Standard Values for each category. If you are making a data base full of names and address, for example, and almost everyone on the list is from Boston, you can use V to make Boston a standard value. Once this is done, /// E-Z Pieces will automatically insert Boston into the Town category

for each entry. For those people who do not live in Boston, you would simply type in another town name.

In a multiple record layout, one can *ditto* entries so that the information in one record will be duplicated in the entry directly below it by pressing ".

One particularly nice touch is /// E-Z Pieces' ability to standardize the format of all time and date entries. Type in September 17, 1987 or 9/17/87 or Sept. 17, 1987 and /// E-Z Pieces will automatically convert them to Sep 17 87 as soon as you press RETURN or ENTER. The same rule applies for time entries. They will all be converted into a "7:00 AM" format. The data base will even convert 24-hour time to the AM/ PM format automatically. (If you don't want date/time conversion, simply don't use date or time in your category name).

Finding data

Imagine that you're a business person who wants a list of Texan clients who've done more than \$1,000 worth of business with you in the past year. Or perhaps you need the phone number of someone named Marvin, but you can't remember his last name. The /// E-Z Pieces data base can provide this information quickly and easily.

There are two methods of displaying certain records from the /// E-Z Pieces data base. The simplest way is to use F, which invokes the *find* feature. The program will ask you to type in comparison information. If you type in *Marvin*, it will list every record in your data base that contains *Marvin*. There you will find Marvin Jones, whose last name you couldn't remember, and his phone number but you may also find Jim Marvin, Mary Allen, who lives on Marvin Court or Sid Samuels of

Marvin Industries. The slightly more complicated, but much more powerful, method, is to use R.

OPEN-APPLE R allows rules to be set



for record selection. This is done quickly and easily by selecting a category, and a comparison (such as "is greater than" or "contains" or "does not begin with") from those listed on the screen. The data base also allows one to use one or two *connectors* (like "and" or "or") between categories. Thus selecting *State* as a category, the business person would choose *Equals* as a comparison, type in *Texas*, select the

connector "and", choose the category *Net Sales*, the comparison "Is Greater Than", and type in *1000*. By pressing ESCAPE, /// E-Z Pieces begins to sort. In a few seconds, one can see all the customers in Texas who had done more than \$1,000 worth of business.

Arranging records

Three E-Z Pieces allows you to arrange records in many different ways. You can arrange by any category you wish. Simply move the cursor to that category and press A. The program will then display the different ways you can arrange the records. They could be alphabetical, reverse alphabetical, highest to lowest numerical, lowest to highest numerical, chronological, or reverse chronological, depending on what is contained in that category.

Creating reports

Much like a spreadsheet, a data base shown on your Apple ///'s screen is a worksheet. In order to print out the records you want, you must create a report. Three E-Z Pieces allows you to create either a table or label style report. A table style report shows records across the page with the various categories shown in vertical columns, like the multiple record screen layout. A label

The program allows up to eight different report formats for each data base.

style reports shows each record grouped individually in a single vertical column. Each report format can include different categories or records from your data base. This program saves each as part of the data base, and each report format is available to the user whenever that data base is on the desktop. The program allows up to eight different report formats for each

data base.

Pressing (for Print a Report) brings you to the report menu. You can choose to get an existing format, create a new table or labels format, duplicate an existing format, erase a format, or keep working with a format already in use. Three E-Z Pieces allows for flexibility in deciding what to include in your report, and its appearance. Using **CR**, can change the record selection rules to include all or any part of your data base. You can delete categories (they will remain unchanged in the database file), switch the positions of categories, make the categories wider or thinner, arrange records, and right justify categories for a professional look. If you change your mind, simply switch things back to the way they were. You can even insert a previously deleted category. Unlike the worksheet, you can scroll right to see all the categories in the Report Format.

In your data base report, /// E-Z Pieces allows one to create a calculated category. Use this to determine the total value of an inventory, for example. By placing the cursor at the appropriate category and pressing K, you define which category will be calculated. Then type in the formula for calculation. Using T, /// E-Z Pieces allows one to see group totals or subtotals printed in your report.

Pressing O shows the printer options. The data base allows a full compliment of printer options, and calculates the report's width in characters. A user can print a report on any of the printers designated (up to three). One can also print to the screen, the clipboard (for moving your report into a word processor file), or to a text (ASCII) or DIF file on disk.

One final note: An article in the May 10, 1985 issue of the /// Newsletter re-

ported a bug in the /// E-Z Pieces data base program. According to the article, the bug occurs only in data bases that have more than 25 categories, and only when a sort is attempted on one of the last five categories. The bug reportedly causes garbage to appear on the screen, and the only safe way out is to press ESCAPE and leave the sort routine. I have never encountered this bug.

In summary, the /// E-Z Pieces data base is a simple, easy way to organize, file and report on fairly large amounts of data. Considering its many features, and integration into the rest of /// E-Z Pieces, this data base is a top choice for the home user or the small business user with modest filing needs.

Program integration

What I've tried to show in this series is that any of the three parts of /// E-Z Pieces would make a nice stand-alone program by itself. With /// E-Z Pieces, however, you get all three applications, all using the same commands, with the ability to switch between them instantly. Further, you get the ability to cut information out of one application (like a spreadsheet file) and paste it into a different application (like a word processor file).

The way that /// E-Z Pieces does this is with a special portion of your Apple ///'s memory called the clipboard. The clipboard is meant only as temporary memory. Whenever you put new information on the clipboard, the old information is lost. If you do not move clipboard data into a file and save it to

disk, it will be lost when you quit the program. The clipboard can hold about 250 lines of information at one time. In Figure 1 is a summary of how you can transfer data using the /// E-Z Pieces clipboard.

As you can see, there are limits to the integration of /// E-Z Pieces, but even within these limits, the program can do some pretty impressive things.

Overall evaluation

Since /// E-Z Pieces is the only integrated program available for the Apple ///, there's no sense in calling it the "best." For many Apple /// users, though, it may very well be the best program they can own. It combines ease of use with several important advantages:

File integration capability

No rebooting to run different applications

Easy to remember commands that are similar or identical in all applications.

Fiddlin' with System Demonstration

At the start, let me admit to all my Apple /// friends and users that I am not a programming whiz. Nor do I have that analytical ability to look at a problem in such a way that it can be boiled down to a 1000 line Business Basic program and work the first time (or even the second!).

What I do enjoy doing from time to time is fiddling. Fiddling with programs that are already out there to see if I can't adapt them to be more useful for my own specific purposes. Frankly, I find it to be kind of fun on occasion, although the frustration factor can be very high at times (there's always that single little bug that causes everything to hang like a wet noodle...).

One program I've found to be particularly interesting is the Apple /// System Demonstration program. If you haven't run it lately, you might want to fire it up to refresh your memory a bit. It's a great little program designed to show off some of the things the /// can do.

When booted, you are presented with a *marquis border* (in color if you have a color monitor) within which is scrolling a choice of five different demonstrations. Among them is a program allowing you to reset the date and time, a graphics demonstration, and a demonstration of the type-ahead buffer.

After you have chosen one of the programs, it will run and then allow you to return to the main menu to try something else. My demo disk, by the way, was for the Apple /// plus and is listed as being version 2.2. I can't tell you what earlier versions looked like, but suspect there is little difference.

If you load the program into Business Basic and then list it, you will find a fairly compact program the provides decent documentation through the REM statements. The program is basically broken down into a number of easily identifiable sections (which is what made it easy for me to tear it apart).

Basically, the screen is set up, data for the demos is read in and then the *marquis border* is printed one space at a time. The program uses the 40 column, 16 color mode. The scroll subroutine is next followed by the subroutine that allows you to choose the demonstration you'd like to see run. At that point, the program is instructed to run the particular demonstration you have chosen (the demos themselves are separate programs on the disk). Once the demonstration is run, you are given a choice of returning to the main menu or quitting.

There are two pieces within this program that intrigued me enough to do a little fiddling - the *marquis border* program and the scroll program. Each can be included as subroutines in other programs, perhaps as part of a "Hello" program, message board or other use.

In any case, let's examine the *Marquis Border* program as shown in Figure 1.

The subroutine at line 200 in Figure 1 is actually used to print each colored square, beginning at screen location 2,2 and then moving right, down, left and up. The actual window within the border is set at line 75 and

the heading is read in at line 80. The program sets the 40 column, 16 color mode at line 30 while the screen is initialized at line 20. Since I only have a Monitor ///, I cannot attest to what the border actually looks like in color. But I suspect it is *mahvalous*.

The second program taken from the demonstration (see Figure 2) is a simple scroller which I have adapted to let you insert any message you might want and have it move from bottom to top within an inversed window on the screen.

The size of the window in this program is set at line 50. The program will scroll five times (it counts <<END>> five times to do that) and then print the message located at line 300. The message is held with a simple countdown subroutine at line 305 before returning to Business Basic (I added that part). You can set the speed of the scroll at lines 120 and 140. The original program set time = 1 to 460, which was a little slow for this demonstration.

I think the best part of *fiddling* is that you can learn a bit about how a program is put together. That helps me understand Business Basic a little better. And sometimes the end result is something that is even useful!

Super Disk No. 2

Is Super Disk 2 for you?

This article is a review of the Super Disk #2 Accessory disk for the Desktop Manager developed by ON THREE. The modules were developed by Earl Brelje who reviewed the first Super Accessory Disk in a previous edition of ON THREE magazine. The modules are a little rough in spots but, as a recent convert to Desktop Manager from Power Keys, I feel privileged to comment on them. Let's get right to work!

Show Time +

Show Time + is Earl Brelje's version of a SOS clock utility. It pops up a window with the current SOS date, time and day of the week and offers the ability to set them, to activate an clever "stopwatch" type feature and to move the window around on the screen.

The access to time/date and the ability to set them is certainly a handy addition to any application, but this feature is available already via the Calendar function. The elapsed time feature works very handily with Time Zero established each time the user presses E. I found the elapsed time feature handy for timing phone calls, but due to the fact that it resets elapsed time whenever the user pops back out to the application, its utility is limited to engaging your /// as a rather large stopwatch.

Earl might consider implementing a version wherein a snapshot of the clock is stored as the module is departed so it can be used to calculate the total elapsed time when the user returns to the Show Time + function.

One minor annoyance is the window position established by the M command and cursor keys is not saved when the module is exited as it is in the Calculator Module, for example.

File Type Changer

Super Disk #2 also includes an extremely handy utility for Xmodem protocol users or anyone who finds it necessary to change a file type. When downloading an Xmodem protocol file, as opposed to a Binary II format file, the new file will be stored simply as a Binary filetype (Hex 06). This filetype is almost always unusable on a /// unless it is used as a data file by a program that doesn't even check filetype. For example, if you download a nifty font via xmodem, the filetype should be changed to Hex 07 prior to using. Not doing so will often generate an error by the application you are using.

This module, or any such module, will not allow violation of Apple/// Pascal conventions, I'm afraid. Converting a Pascal program that you download from a BBS or CompuServe as an Ascii file (Hex 04) to a Pascal Text File (Hex 03) would result in two blocks of text being chopped off of the from of the file. The reason for this is that Pascal

textfiles reserve the first two blocks of the file for markers, compiler errors and other "Set Environment" type things. Allowing this particuler change by either pasting in the two leading blocks when going from ascii-totextfile, or chopping of the two leading blocks when going the other way would move this from a very good module to a great one.

The function displays a fairly comprehensive list of commonly and not-socommonly used filetypes as a reference. The user is prompted for a pathname for a file and then shown the current filetype. Filetype changes are then entered as a two digit Hex code.....the most widely used convention it seems for the various manuals covering such topics. Very quick and effective. The module is somewhat more conservative in its user interface than the filetype function imbedded in the Communications Manager's F function, but compensates with the comprehensive reference of codes.

Print Screen

Super Disk #2 continues the arduous journey toward the ideal screen dump utility. Earl includes two excellent additions in this rendering: Form Feed and Line Feed. This allows a screen dump on a new page without grinding through a Printer Setup entry first. Line Feed rounds out the finer level of page positioning of the dump.

My frustration centers around the fact that no screen dump I have seen yet allows me to define the upper left and

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lower right corner of a segment of the screen. This is the *only* bastion of superiority left for the once widely used Power Keys from Daryl Anderson and ironically the best Power Keys Screen Dump was written by *ON THREE*'s own Tim Harrington!

In all fairness, TDM permits this via Clipboard commands. I just find that it takes too many keystrokes to get what I want that way.

Warning!

Earl's Warning Module is a light secu-

rity module for preventing passerby keyboard ticklers from messing with your machine. It works simply and nicely and even pops up a challenging message to those foolhearty souls that decide to take it on. The reason for the expression, "light", above is that rebooting the machine will remove the obstacle. This is reminiscent of locking cash bags. It will stop the casual tamperer, but won't stop anyone from taking the whole bag!

Great for an office environment or at home for keeping the kids from trashing Chapter 4 of the novel you haven't saved yet.

PKASO/U Commands

As a PKASO/U owner, I was delighted to see this addition to the Desktop Manager family of modules. I can never seem to find that yellow card that

comes with the manual. Earl also did us the courtesy of converting the lead-in character on the command references to the default Apple /// value of "~" (Hex 7E), instead of the Apple II CONTROL-I as appears on that yellow card I can never find.

Since one of the big discriminators behind using a PKASO/U is its graphics capability, I was disappointed that Earl had not included a more complete listing of commands beyond the text/font commands. I'll still have to fumble for the card or the manual to cover those functions.

Change Fonts

Earl has finally made a font changer out of me. For five years now I have been very content with the good, ole Standard font. I never messed around much with fonts before because of the awkward and inconvenient means available to do the change. This module changes all of that. Simply enter the pathname of the new font andPOW, you're looking at it. A four-character command to the PKASO/U printer board via Printer Setup and you're printing it, too!

Now I'll have to go look for fonts other than those on the AppleWriter/// disks! There is a real dilly in the Data Library for the /// Subtopic 7 on CompuServe, entitled "Wierd". Boy is it ever! I found that when writing articles such as this one that Gothic font puts me in the mood without sacrificing legibility.

Print File

This module permits printing of Ascii Files, but is most notable in that it also permits appropriate printing of Pascal Textfiles without scrambling in the first two blocks of header information and /// E-Z Pieces Word Processor files.

The module also offers a modest degree of control by permitting left, top and bottom margin control. There is no word wrap feature. A minor annoyance is that the settings must be entered each time the module is invoked, rather than providing the option of changing the default settings. I really like its use for Pascal Textfiles!

Simply enter the pathname of the new font andPOW you're looking at it.

File View

Earl's File View is the best of this type of function I've seen. As with File Print above, it works appropriately with Pascal Texfiles and /// E-Z Pieces Word Processing files. The really great feature is the ability to reposition within the file. Power Keys for example would allow you to do a file view, but it was one-way only. You could start and stop, but if something went by, you had to go all the way back to pathname entry to see it again.

An example of use that I value is when getting an error in the midst of a Pascal compilation, I can view the text file to decide if this is an isolated minor error (in which case I continue the compilation) or if it's a dummy like forgetting to declare a variable that's used 20 times (in which case I kill it). Hey, this is almost Engineering Workstation kind of stuff! (Don't worry Sun Microsystems! The /// is only getting a facelift!)

Computers in the same boat

Maybe you have not noticed, but Apple has been giving the Apple /// a lot of company lately. They have introduced more new products in the past year than they have in any year previous in the entire history of the company. Along with the introduction of new and exciting products there is an aging process with the products that are already in the field. What they did to the Macintosh was to take the top of the line and, in just six months' time, turn it into the bottom of the line. On the day before Apple-World 1987, Mac Plus was the most powerful Macintosh that money could buy; on the next day, it was the least powerful. It didn't change, but in the year after its introduction, the world passed it by. It is possible to upgrade a Mac Plus, but money and upgrades will never turn it into an Mac II, nor even a Mac SE. By introducing the new Macintoshes, Apple put a cap on the upward evolution of the Mac Plus.

Over the years the same thing has happened many times in every technological field. New ideas replace older ones, and new products push out those based on the old ideas. Perhaps it is more noticeable in computers, but we have seen countless instances of new replacing old. Color replaced black and white in television; jets replaced propellers in airplanes. Refrigerators replaced ice boxes. Most people today have never started a car with a crank, but it has not been too many years since the electric starter was introduced. The acceptance of change is built into our society so there is no movement to fight fuelinjected automobiles, but with microcomputers it is different. Part of the reason may be the speed at which technological changes are coming.

It is almost overwhelming. When we got our first ///, it had the power of the largest commercial mainframe computers of the prior decade. It was awesome to walk past our *computer room* and see that little box that did what was difficult for rooms full of machinery. The time line between the IBM 1460 and the

Apple /// was about as long as the time necessary for a child to go from kindergarten through junior college. Not long, when compared to the time between the early airplanes and the first commercial jets, or the time between the first ice box and the electric refrigerator.

We don't know how much longer the pace of technological change in computing can continue to increase, but it is still speeding up. That pace is one of the things that hurt the /// in its early days. The golden opportunity of being first with new technology was bungled when the machine came out with design problems. Those of you who had an early ///, know all about the problems. The machine was released much later than expected, and when it was, the

first year and more was fraught with problems. Apple had to take the clock out of the machine because the batteries kept melting onto the boards. Chips wouldn't stay seated and there were several more normal, little problems. While Apple valiantly worked at correcting problems, technology was continuing to push forward. By the time the /// was working as planned, there should have been a /// Plus. When one company looked at the /// and saw an eight bit chip, when IBM had a microcomputer with a 16 bit chip, the automatic, knee-jerking, reaction concluded that the /// was already on its way to becoming obsolete as there wasn't any indication of when a faster chip would be available. Unfortunately, they were right. A ///+ did come out, but the changes were minor. Most /// users can't tell which /// they have until told to check the positioning of the arrow keys. There just wasn't much to the product change.

If you get depressed when thinking about your /// and its obsolescence, we suggest you think how it must be for the buvers of the first Macintoshes. There were more of them than there were /// purchasers and their machines, too, faced early retirement. The big difference was that they did have an official upgrade path if they wanted to spend the money. It has been nearly four years since \$3,000 has been the price tag for a 128K Mac with an unreliable operating system, and almost no software. If this sounds like a familiar scenario it is because it should. They bought a machine that went through

three expensive upgrades to make it a Mac Plus, which in our opinion was the first Mac that was an effective business machine. Many followed that route and now have reached the end of the Apple upgrade path for the original Mac. They spent \$500, or more, per year upgrading their Macs and still they are now out of date. There is no Apple upgrade to an SE or MAC II.

All of those who did not upgrade from the original Mac cannot use any of the

In reality, the announcement of the IIGS was the death knell for the //e.

new MAC software, not even the last few releases of the operating system. The newest Apple system software requires a minimum of 1 meg of memory to function and ROMS that are available only by upgrading. If they don't buy a very expensive upgrade, those who own 128K Macs are in the same position as Apple /// owners. They do not have access to new technology and cannot run most of the MAC software currently for sale. The Mac Plus owners will someday be in the same spot, you can feel it coming. They, like the /// owners, will be in a position where they will not have the option of buying an upgrade at any price, unless a third party develops and markets one.

The same type of process is happening in the Apple II family. The IIGs raised the standards for the Apple II. Most new software now being written for the Apple II family is being written for the IIGs. It was marketed as a 256K machine, but most are being sold with a memory upgrade. The standard is quickly moving up to at least 1 meg.

Most of the new software requires

512K and the new operating system (ProDOS 16). This fact alone is making the new software unworkable for people running //e's. Whether they recognize the fact or not the Apple IIe has reached the end of its product cycle. Apple may still sell it for a couple more years, but they probably will not make any more upgrades for the machine.

In reality, the announcement of the IIGS was the death knell for the //e. Apple hedged its bet against people not accepting the IIGs, by announcing a new //e in the platinum box and with a 10 key pad, but now the IIGs is obviously entrenched as the direction of the Apple II line. The million or so Apple IIe owners can no longer use the newest software. Apple gave them an upgrade path by making the old software run on the new machine, but the upgrade is only available for //e owners. People that did not upgrade their II+'s cannot move up without starting with an entirely new computer.

What has this to do with the Apple ///? Nothing directly other than to show that we are not alone. Apple ///'ers aren't different from Apple II+ and Mac 128 owners whose machines have become obsolete. It would actually be cheaper for us to keep our ///'s and buy a new MAC or IIGs, than it would have been to buy a II+ or a MAC 128K and all the upgrades to get to the newest machines, and be faced with the fact that upgrades to MACSE or MACII are not available. There is one difference - they can use their old software. The difference is to some degree a pleasant illusion. We have a IIGs that runs AppleWriter and Word Juggler and we have those packages just like we do on the ///. When it comes down to it, we don't use them because they are obsolete. We use newer software written to use the newer capabilities of the machine. It may be comforting to know you can use your old software, but new software is the major reason for buying a new machine. Why else would we want a Mac II or a IIGs except for what it can do, and it is the software that controls that? What software we have may be familiar, comforting, even useful, but the new machine will have something better. If you are happy with the software available for your ///, keep it and don't waste your money on a new machine.

Our data is the only thing of value that we need to take with us into a new computer. As Apple /// owners we have a lot invested in the product of our computing over the past many years. The programs we use are only means to working with our data, they are tools. With a new system there are new and generally better tools. Fortunately, conversion of data is not difficult. An Apple /// owner can move data to a IIGs or a Mac and lose very little.

We cannot stop progress and probably wouldn't want to. In a few years the Mac II will join the Apple ///, Apple II and Lisa. We must realize that if we want to keep up with the changes we must commit ourselves and our money to doing what is necessary to keep up.

Our one meg Mac SE, that isn't even a year old, is showing signs of being obsolete. The newest programs and multi-tasking operating environment will work in 1 meg, technically, but they really require two meg or more. To stay current, the SE owner will have to

Data Base ///

What can a base do?

Apple /// computer literacy came as quite a shock and not by learning some new way to manipulate data on my Apple ///. Nor was it the discovery of some deep, dark secret about SOS. Computer literacy came when I realized that I could not survive without my trusty /// by my side.

I had accepted a new position as director of engineering for MetroNews, a statewide radio network in West Virginia. The new job was about 250 miles from home. When I started the job, I

left my wife, two children, dog and Apple /// behind. Minutes after sitting down at my new desk, I found files to organize, budgets to prepare, inventories to track and reports to type.

Engineering data is frequently updated. When was the multi-track tape recorder in production studio A last adjusted to specification? What was its performance at the time? What work is scheduled for the talk show studio? With nine studios in two cities, maintenance records can become confusing very quickly. It boggles the mind just to keep everything straight. These are conditions that challenge the sanity of an engineer and call for the power of a personal computer with a good data base.

I'll admit that I did try to avoid transporting my /// from home. I kept maintenance records on 3" x 5" file cards. Each card represented an item of studio equipment such as a tape deck, control board, compact disk player, and so on. Given the sheer volume of equipment and the frequent preventive maintenance done, file cards were not nearly versatile enough. Changes and updates soon made the cards impossible to read. I found myself wondering how they did it in the dark ages before personal computers. There is just something about being computer literate that makes even a Selectric typewriter seem akin to carving letters in stone!

Three months later when my family was still 250 miles away. But my trusty Apple /// was sitting right in front of me, processing away! Computer literacy had come in full force!

Purpose of a data base

Data bases are used for record filing, information management and reports. They offer the ability to view the same information from several different angles. It is said that no two witnesses view the same event in the same way. Each is perceiving the event through his own filter based on experience, prejudice and perception. In the same manner, a data base enables the user to view the event (information) with different filters. The difference is that while witnesses can confuse facts, data base software clarifies information. In a sense, data base programs allow multidimensional views of the same information.

To better understand how this works, let's consider a fictional radio station, KRUM, with the following staff:

Slim pickin's indeed!

What we are really doing with our data base is looking at the same information from different viewpoints using "selection criteria". We have organized the information (alphabetized, numerical order) in different ways. All of this makes information more clearly understood. This is really the fun and power of using a data base.

Types of data bases

There are two basic types of data base programs, electronic filers and data base managers. When most people refer to a "data base" they generally mean an electronic filer, like an electronic Rolodex. Information is easily stored, easily retrieved, but not very detailed. As a general rule, Electronic Filers are quicker to learn, easier to use and much less expensive than their bigger electronic brother - the data base manager.

Data base managers are descendants from powerful programs written for mainframe computers. They are better suited for more complex applications. Many data base managers are relational, which means that they can use data from other related files. They also have more powerful report generators. Which type is best? The answer largely depends on the task. If your /// is used to keep a phone/address directory of business acquaintances, then a filer is

plenty versatile. If you manage large amounts of data from many interrelated departments a data base manager might be a must. For most applications a decent electronic filer will be adequate.

Files, records and strawberry fields forever

Files, records and fields are terms used with data base programs of any type. Think of an address book. It has "fields" where information is to be entered. Name, address, and telephone number are all examples of fields. A "record" is a collection of fields. If our example had one person per page, each page would be a record. The entire address book is a "file". Simple enough?

Desirable features

A decent file manager should allow at least four level sorts. This means that sort can be done by at least four columns (or fields) at the same time. For example, we sorted the KRUM personnel file first by department, then by last name, and finally by first name. That was a three level sort.

A report generator can output data in an organized manner. More often then not, the output is sent to a printer. But reports also are sent to a modem, a disk file or a monitor. Report generators can be part of the data base or separate

programs. More powerful report generators tend to be separate programs. Some allow calculated fields, statistics and a wealth of helpful features. The ability of the report generator to do mathematical or logical operations on certain fields is important. It can be used to provide totals, averages, subtotals and counts.

One feature which can be very important is the ability to reconfigure the record after the data base is set up. When the form was designed, a field may have been overlooked. Or perhaps a field would make more sense in another location on the form. Some data base programs are downright unforgiving if you forget a category and want to add or change it later. They will destroy your reports or record layouts.

Others will re-configure your data to accommodate the change. Since a computer is supposed to facilitate changes, an overly restrictive data base program can cause real grief when you have to change a record layout.

Akin to the ability to change records is the ability to repair damaged files. Although it is not a pleasant thought, data base files can be damaged. Improperly exiting the program, a power line glitch or an unsuccessful modification of the data base record can cause damage. Some data bases will attempt to repair the files themselves. They will leave damaged information out of the reconstructed files and prompt you in repairing the damage. In a data disaster, this can literally save the day.

The ability to transfer information to and from other sources is important. Some popular Apple /// sources are DIF, ASCII, and Quickfile/Three Easy Pieces files. DIF (Data Interchange Format) files can be used to transfer information with spreadsheets and some other data bases. ASCII ("text"

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

files) are used primarily for word processing and communications programs. The ability to merge data with other programs (mail merge, for example) is valuable.

Investigate the different data types that are allowed by the program. Some programs have special features for entering characters, numbers, dollars, dates, Social Security Numbers and repetitive entries. This is especially important if another person will be working with the files later on. Data types reduce the chances of errors and make it easier for the other person to enter data in the form.

Holly macros

In the early days of word processing, the company I worked for purchased an expensive, dedicated word processing system. The most fascinating feature of this megabuck machine was its ability to memorize keystrokes typed by the

operator and play them back on demand. It was sort of a digital instant replay. Today we call this feature a "macro". Some data base programs come with their own built-in macro functions. They can be real time savers in printing reports, or selecting records based on complicated criteria. A macro eliminates the need to endlessly re-key the same keystrokes again and again. All the individual keystrokes are recorded by the macro as the operator

types them in. The next time the same report is needed, it can be executed with a just a few keystrokes. By the way, it is important to execute the macro from the same place each time. The computer can do some very interesting things if a print macro is executed from the data entry menu!

Other nice features include scratch

pads, calculator and abundant help screens.

To relate or not to relate

A relational data base can search two or more files simultaneously for related information. Usually, there is one "key" field common to each file which the relational data base uses to extract information from the files. Relational data bases are easier to illustrate than explain, so let's consider Funkauto's eastern regional office. Several data base files are kept by Funkauto personnel. One file is a list of models that Funkauto manufactures. This file includes model numbers and specifications such as color, engine size, fuel economy and options on the models. Another file contains a list of models located at local dealers. Each record contains the model number, dealer's name, address and telephone numbers. There is also a file of customers in the region who have purchased various models from regional dealerships. These records have the customer names, addresses, telephone numbers, car models and purchase dates. It would be very difficult to keep all of this mostly unrelated data in one large "flat" (non-relational) data base.

One day, Funkauto discovered that after 6,000 miles the left front wheel of the Z-311 Deluxe model develops a tendency to fall off at speeds above 35 miles per hour. The regional office was instructed to send out recall letters to customers and dealers. As a precaution, all Z-311 Deluxe models were to be brought to the dealerships for inspection. Funkauto's regional office used its relational data base to print a list of customers and dealers who have the 7-311 Deluxe Notice that all three files have a common field, the model. The relational data base will seek out records from all three files based on the Z-311 Deluxe model since that is the key field. The key field, then, "links" all three files together. By using a relational data base, a complicated task can be done very quickly. (We wish we could say the same for Funkauto's service departments.)

While this kind of power is very impressive in action, it really is not needed by everyone. A simple, flat filer can go a long way towards meeting the needs of most users.

What's next?

In our next installment, we will consider some of the better known data base programs written for the Apple ///. We will look at some programs that represent sophisticated data base managers, simple electronic filers and somewhere in between. For comparison, we will consider AppleFile by Apple Computer, Aladin by A.D.I. America, Keystroke by Brock Software and /// E-Z Pieces. QuickFile and AppleWorks by Haba Systems and Apple Computer will be examined as well.

Ask Doc

Dead mouse?

I own an Epson MX-100 printer with the Dots-Perfect upgrade kit connected via an Apple UPIC card.

Something I have run into with my printer that has me confused me is the underline mode. When I tell /// E-Z Pieces that I have a MX/Graftrax + printer, the printer doesn't stop underlining once it has started. I can't tell which is at fault. The Dots-Perfect manual says to send ESC-O (write (printer, CHR(27), '-', CHR(O)) to turn off the underline. When I look at the output from /// E-Z Pieces, it sends equivalent of write (printer, CHR(27),'-') which is what Dots-Perfect says is wrong (see page 19 of the Dots-Perfect manual)! Which is right? If the Dots-Perfect ROM is wrong, am I better off waiting for a fix to the ROM before getting Draw ON // so I have a MX with Graftrax +?

I recently purchased an Apple IIe mouse and interface card (in anticipation of Draw ON ///) and am having some troubles with it. I thought I'd try it out with the Desktop Manager, but it doesn't seem to work. I installed the console and mouse drivers from the Desktop disk into the SOS.driver file for Selector and the system wouldn't boot unless I had the interface card in my system (which I assume is normal). With the following Desktop setup mode:

Use the Up and Down Arrows
To Highlight Desired Option.
Press RETURN to CHANGE Option.

Mouse Button -> RUNS DESKTOP Direct Access -> ENABLED Print Options -> <RET> + <LF> Printer Name: .PRINTER

The mouse button starts desktop, but a double click does nothing and moving the mouse does nothing. Does the mouse you sell have a different ROM on the interface card? Here is the information off my interface card:

Please review your installation of the updated mouse driver from the Desktop Manager Installation disk to your hard disk. Follow the instructions on page 80 and 81 exactly in your TDM manual. Your system will hang unless your mouse interface card is installed in the correct slot. It was unnecessary to install the additional console driver into Selector ///'s sos.driver file. Our mouse interface cards are direct from Apple Computer without any modification. Only the driver software is different.

I am unable to answer your question relating to your printer and ||| E-Z Pieces.We support ||| E-Z Pieces but not your particular printer. In order for me to provide tech support it would be necessary to charge for this service as it falls under this category when those items were not purchased from us within the last 90 days.

Dazzled Diagnostic

I have a question regarding the diagnostic test of the Apple ///. My Apple /// has the 512K Memory Upgrade installed and it apparently is operating OK. A Confidence Disk was included with the deal when I purchased my machine secondhand three years ago. Testing the machine status with this program indicates "Machine Status OK" however, I understand that it only checks 256K RAM. The self-diagnostic routine (F6E6G routine) indicates some problems. The first grid RAM checks OK but the second grid indicates several faulty chips. This second grid is not always consistent but generally it indicates the following:

I have made no attempt to check for loose or corroded chips since the machine seems to be operating satisfactorily. Sometimes it fails to boot on the Catalyst disk a couple of times but I attribute that to static, dirt or improper

seating of the disk since it always has worked eventually.

My question is "Does the 512K Upgrade make the seld diagnostic test invalid or should I think about purchasing the Memory Board insurance for the 512K board I purchased from *ON THREE*?"

Your desacription of the problem describes intermittent memory chip errors in the addressing sequence. This can be caused by many things which are:

a. Chips are loosening in their sockets due to heating and cooling.

b. Corroded pins of chips causing poor contact.

c. Loosening of the prom chips at C13 and C12 on the logic board.

d. Loosening of the 6522 chip in the 40 pin socket on the logic board.

Any of these can cause the problems you describe in your letter.

Does the 512K memory upgrade make the self test invalid? Yes, to a point the test is invalidated due to the fact that there is more memory addresses that are not checked during the test. The 512K upgrade cam with three disks of which one was a memory test and the others allowed conversion of your programs to accept the increased memory and created a RAM disk. It sounds

to me that you have not used these disks to check your system. If you don't have them they can be purchased for \$15 each plus \$3 s/h.

Unidisks

More than a year ago I purchased the Unidisk ///.5 driver and now plan to purchase a disk drive. Will the Unidisk ///.5 driver work with the new Apple platinum drives with the Apple IIe card and the Universal Disk Controller card by Central Point Software?

We sell and service the Apple Unidisk ///.5. Our company wrote a device driver that will allow the drive to work on the Apple /// computer. This driver, written specifically for the **///, only works with the Apple interface card that comes with the unidisk drive.

The unidisk driver we make will not work with the Apple platinum drives with the IIe card. It has not been tested on the Universal Disk Controller card from Central Point Software.

Mail merging

For the past four years I've used Quickfile and AppleWriter (the first version) to do form letters via Quickfile files (names and addresses) to AppleWriter. I use a personalized version of the maillist program to merge names and addresses in a form letter.

I've just purchased /// E-Z Pieces and AppleWriter v. 2.0 and would like to do the same thing. Could you tell me how to do this?

Unfortunately, /// E-Z Pieces does not have mail merge capability. However, the files can be merged by using a program called Habamerge that functions in the same manner AppleWriter's merge utility does. Three E-Z Pieces files can be read by Quickfile and vice versa. AppleWriter /// v.2.0 does have mail merge and you can use all the files you created

in v.1.1. Certainly with this information, you can be on your way to happy computing with /// E-Z Pieces and AppleWriter!

With this in mind is it possible for me to obtain further information on the following products mentioned in your magazine?

Furthermore, can I install the 512K upgrade without shipping my computer to California? I have done a variety of non-soldering upgrades to my Apple II+ such as the Videx keyboard enhancer without any problems.




