EDITORIAL A MESSAGE FROM MAGGIE



As the days get shorter and we relegate vacation memories to the scrapbook, thoughts turn to new teachers, homework, sports, and all the other elements of going back to school. Starting school in September is a ritual we are all familiar with, which is why we picked this month to cover Apples in education.

As our special articles illustrate, education is not limited to classroom activities. From the minute we are so rudely brought into this world, the process of learning starts. Psychologists uniformly agree that the first five years of cognitive development are the most critical. In his article on education, Robert Sylwester, a renowned educational expert, discusses the stages of cognitive development in infants and toddlers, on up through high-school students (see page 34). Sylwester provides suggestions for software purchases that will encourage your childrens' cognitive development.

For some of us, education doesn't end when we hang the diploma on the wall. In my experience, the most successful people are those who continue to learn and apply their knowledge to plan and to solve problems in new ways. A good example of ongoing education is exploring and using computer technology to enhance a company's productivity and profits. Another aspect of continued learning is using computers to teach professional skills. In the last few years, utilization of computers to' train professionals on the job has become more common, although not widespread. As you will see when you read Sue Crissman's article, "Training the Work Force" (page 26), personal computers are being used to train many different kinds of professionals, from engineers to business executives.

Not only is education important to your livelihood, but it also has recreational rewards. Say, for example, you've finally saved up enough money and vacation time to take that trip to France, but alas, the only French words you know are Moet Chandon. So, you decide to take the plunge and learn a second language. Your trusty Apple can help you with this project. Read Patty Winter's article on foreign-language programs (page 40), and with some diligence, you'll have the waiters thinking you're a native.

While you may be learning French on your home computer, an ever-increasing number of children and young adults are using computers in the classroom. The Apple II is the most popular microcomputer used in schools. In fact, to help drive that point home, Apple is sponsoring a contest called the "Apple \$50,000 Scholarship Sweepstakes" that will run from August 24 to October 31. MAILING-LIST OMISSION

Dear A +,

I have just finished reading "Four Ways to Manage Your Mailing List" (A +, June 1984), which I had rather expected would cover my own personal favorite, Bulk Mailer (Satori Software, 5507 Woodlawn Avenue North, Seattle, WA 98103).

I am one of the producers for a community light-opera group, and, owning the only computer (an Apple II Plus) among the four of us, undertook the organization and management of our mailing list, which accounts for about two-thirds of our ticket sales. I originally kept the list on a Cyber at our state university, which, of course, would sort the list 14 ways from Sunday in .0256 seconds, print labels in a thousand different formats, and never breathe hard. I used my Apple as a dumb terminal. Trouble was that toward the end of the semester I was often unable to dial up the damn machine (students, for some reason, come first at the institution), and then if I were lucky enough to get on, as often as not I had to sit there and wait for the cursor to come back while another of the 250 ports was serviced.

Then I saw an ad for Bulk Mailer, called the company, and asked about my application. I have a list that runs between 1600 and 2000 names. We purge it every year. Could Bulk Mailer do what I wanted, which was to give us a list of all the people on the list alphabetically and sort by ZIP code for labels? Sure could! I've been using it for a bit over two years now, and for a small group such as ours, it's great! (For larger uses, it also supports a hard disk.) I've had occasion to talk to the people at Satori for advice now and again and have invariably found them helpful; their product is continually updated.

I continue to enjoy A + and was especially taken with your June issue, some of which I will refer to in a class I teach at the university.

APPLE KEEPS TALKING TO IBM

Apple Computer has introduced data-communications software for the Apple III that permits the III to communicate with all mainframes, minicomputers, and personal computers that support IBM 3270 protocols.

The Apple Access 3270 works with either an Apple Cluster Controller or an Appleline coaxial attachment to emulate an IBM 3278 Model 2 terminal. The software's capabilities include text-file transfer, on-line data entry, inquiry and response, electronic mail, and remote-data access.

Other program features include support of datatransmission rates from 110 to 9600 bits per second; customized help screens; a command file with auto-dial, auto-log on, and unattended operation abilities; and the ability to filter control characters to or from the host computer.

The product is available from Apple or an authorized dealer for \$150.

ALL BOOKED UP

A+

Book after book after book. After book after book after book after book. That's probably the feeling you get after browsing your way through your local computer store's seemingly endless shelves, especially if you're searching for specific applications for your Apple.

One new book, the Annual Bibliography of Computer-Oriented Books, attempts to chew that informational cud for you. Now in its 17th edition, this book digests the more than 1200 computer books from 173 publishers and organizes them into 86 categories, cataloged by type and style of presentation.

Categories include business uses of computers, advanced programming, introductory texts on languages, system design, decision support, and many more. If you think 86 categories is too many, munch on the fact that the publisher, the University of Colorado Press, excluded all introductory books published prior to 1980 and omitted other books it felt were "inadequate."

SOFTWARE PIRATES WASHED UP

There's more than one way to snag a software thief, and H & H Scientific hopes its method will really work.

H & H created the Stock Option Analysis Program (SOAP) for the Apple IIe and the IBM Personal Computer. To utilize SOAP's features fully, users need to tie in to the Dow Jones News/Retrieval service.

Fine, says H & H, but for users to hook into the Dow Jones service, they must return the original program disk to the company, in Fort Washington, Maryland. There H & H will encrypt your Dow Jones password



directly onto the disk—any copies of the disk will carry your Dow Jones password for all to see.

Says H & H President Hersch Piloff, "In effect, the user's password is held hostage (by the user) to guarantee the security of his personal program. We think very few purchasers will be willing to give a copy of a program containing their password to a friend and thus risk incurring even modest usage charges."

COULD MICRO-COMPUTERS EXPORT MACRO-WARFARE?

Your Apple II Plus computer is a critical part of our nation's military strategy, according to the Department of Defense.

Because the II Plus and the 256K portable computer from GRiD Systems play key roles in NATO's European battlefield plans, in analyzing strategy and aiding troop-management decisions, the DOD wants to add certain unspecified commercially available Apple-compatible software to its list of controlled high-tech exports.

The Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations recently heard that "the commercial software is vital to solving a lot of our problems, but we still will need to reconfigure that software to be sensitive to military problems," according to Dr. Stephen Bryen, deputy assistant secretary of defense for international



economic, trade, and security policy.

"It is partially commercial, but with a Defense addon, we find that the layman is no longer a layman, and our adversaries would be able to figure it out if it is readily available," said Bryen.

At this writing, the U.S. is still negotiating within the **Coordinating Committee** for Multilateral Export Controls (Cocom) on the question of limiting microcomputer and software sales to the Soviet Union.

Said Richard Perle, assistant secretary of defense for policy, "Some people believe that because these machines are widely available on the open market, we shouldn't try to control the Soviet acquisition . . . We know we cannot put a hermetic seal around the Soviet Union. but we don't want them to be able to import them by the thousands.'

TECHNI-CARE

Put away those cans of food for the hungry in Central America and start saving your nonperishable software. A newly formed organization of technically oriented professionals is looking for programmers, analysts, economists, statisticians, foresters, and others to offer brain power, not buying power, to the nation of Nicaragua.

Appropriately named tec-NICA, the group plans to organize its high-tech volunteers into project teams to help Nicaraguans solve computer problems in banking, agriculture, education, health, and other areas.

Economist Michael Urmann, a tecNICA founder. said that project group members would become familiar beforehand with the software, hardware, and personnel involved at each project site. Consulting trips to Nicaragua will be scheduled | Drive, Berkeley, CA 94705.

regularly, depending on the demand and tecNICA's resources

Urmann said tecNICA members had already conducted a well-received database workshop in Nicaragua, primarily for workers at the country's Banco Central. "Until six months ago,' he said, "they didn't know much about off-the-shelf programs. They'd never seen the catalogs [of software]." He told the story of a programmer who spent six months writing a payroll program for his Apple that he could have purchased ready-made for \$250.

In addition to computer consultants, tecNICA is also looking for mini- and microcomputer software for databases, spreadsheets, statistics, communications, portfolio analysis, and simulation models. For further information write Michael Urmann, 110 Brookside

CRUSHING THE COUNTERFEIT APPLE

The International Trade Commission recently forbade the import of Apple II and He lookalikes, unless the importers post a 200% duty on the value of the product.

Apple Computer, Inc., had originally charged 15 foreign-based companies with infringing on its patents and software copyrights. The ITC not only agreed. but also expanded the ban to imports "that have motherboards substantially similar to the Apple motherboards."

Within the United States, four men and three companies recently pleaded guilty to felony and misdemeanor charges involving counter-



feit Apples. Gary Hecker, a patent and copyright attorney for Apple, lauded the case, saying that "this is the first case with a clear message that piracy is illegal and can result in a jail term."

PEDAGOGICAL PROGRAMMING

Computers and education may be natural partners, but it takes a skilled hand to make the best of the match. Writing educational software for the Apple is easy—but writing *good* instructional software takes more effort.

From Apple's earliest days, the Apple family of computers has been the favorite in schools. The number of Apple IIs in this country's classrooms is now well past 100,000. Most of the nearly one million other Apple owners have also tried their luck with one or more educational packages.

Partly as a cause and partly as a consequence, you can now find thousands of educational programs for the Apple. *Swift's Educational Software Directory Apple II Edition*, for example, runs to more than 400 pages, with an average of several dozen programs per page.

If you're out to pick some education-

al software and definitely if you're thinking of writing your own, you should put some thought into what goes into good instructional software. Education may not be as clear-cut a science

as chemistry, for instance, but it does have a large body of accumulated knowledge. Good computer-aided instruction (CAI) is based on some expertise about computers and an even better familiarity with learning. Actually, CAI systems were available long before the advent of personal computers. Some experimental systems were written for early mainframe computers, but the spread of timesharing systems (where several people share the use of a single computer) and minicomputers made instructional use of computers an economic possibility.

The largest of these mainframebased systems was the PLATO network, created by the Control Data Corporation in association with the University of Illinois. The PLATO system is still running today, with more than a dozen mainframes across the country, and hundreds of terminals.

One of PLATO's distinctive features (and one of its biggest economic constraints) has been its use of special high-resolution display terminals. Mainframe-course designers learned

early on that pictures and text were far more effective than text alone. The PLATO project led to more insights, particularly since the program funded many studies of what elements contributed to successful computerized instruction.

Current CAI efforts also draw on the experience of programmed-instruction-book projects, popular especially in the middle and late 50s. In these books, as in CAI, the material is broken into frames, and as you finish most frames, you are asked a question.

At critical points, you pick from a list of answers, each of which directs you to continue working on a different page. Depending on whether the answer you pick is correct or not, the page leads to more advanced material, remedial instruction, or clarification.

Another ancestor of computerized instruction is the humble flash card. Automated flash cards, in fact, were one of the earlier popular applications of CAI. Even in BASIC, a language not particularly intended for instructional presentation, it was easy to write a program that would pose a series of arithmetic problems and check for the correct responses.

Micros Learn Two Lessons

The earliest microcomputer CAI programs were quite limited. Because the first micros had no graphics and only tiny amounts of memory, the pioneer generation of micro-based CAI programs was little more than automated page turners. The program displayed a screen full of text, asked the student to enter a constant character, and then showed the next screen.

Two developments have radically changed the nature of microcomputerbased CAI systems. One was the emergence of the Apple II and other personal computers with color graphics and affordable disk storage. The other was the widespread availability of authoring systems.

Apple graphics are still no match for PLATO's plasma-display terminals, but for most purposes they're good enough—and a complete Apple system costs far less than a PLATO terminal alone. With graphics, educational programs can offer clarity as well as entertainment value and still be affordable.

Disk-based systems have made it possible for individual Apple owners, schools, and small companies to develop and distribute software efficiently. Compared to paper-tape and eassettetape-based systems, computers with floppy disks have greatly accelerated the process of developing, testing, and debugging all kinds of software.

Authoring systems have made computers such as the Apple accessible tools for instruction. These programming systems let lesson authors define their scripts in instructional terms, rather than in the more intricate structure of a general-purpose programming language. Someone who has a body of material to teach can now concentrate on educational design rather than on the details of programming in BASIC or assembly language.

The most popular of the authoring systems is probably PILOT, a language that first came to Apple as Dr. John Starkwether's version for the CP/M operating system. Apple brought an improved version of PILOT over to Apple DOS and later expanded it further into SuperPILOT. Other software developers have created their own versions of PILOT.

Play to Learn

While some Apple programmers were busy learning PILOT or writing skills-teaching programs in assembly language, another group put its energy into games. Although you may be hard put to find much direct educational value in many computer games, the process of writing games has trained thousands of programmers in writing fast graphics routines, pacing action to maintain user interest, and organizing presentations of related material.

Seeing what can be done in computer games has raised to higher levels both the expectations of users and the abilities of programmers. After spending an hour playing games that are lavishly illustrated, responsive, and even animated, most of us insist on this liveliness in instructional materials as well. Games have been particularly influential in the growing sophistication of simulation software. In this type of program, the computer reports a current situation to you and asks for your response.

Based on your input, the program displays the resulting state of affairs and asks what to do next.

That the accumulated experience from industrial training is strongly reflected in much current CAI software is almost entirely due to one institution—Bell Laboratories. In the halcyon years before the breakup of the Bell System, the Labs and Bell's Western Electric manufacturing arm did trailblazing work on what is now known as human-factors engineering. Most of this work was freely published and Apple owners shouldn't be jealous of integrated software like Lotus 1-2-3. Now you can have something better. Magic Office System.™

widely read. Whether you wanted to know what colors made the most readable screen or how long it took to sharpen a pencil, one of the Bell Laboratories people had probably written it up.

In any case, industry in general is now one of the largest users of CAI services. Corporate training expenses are, according to some statistics, even larger than the cost of public education. Thus, an increasing amount of CAI packages is aimed at commercial firms instead of schools.

Industrial CAI users get a kind of feedback that schools do not. If you learn your algebra from a CAI system, the amount you retain in a year or two probably won't matter much unless you become a mathematician. In industry, however, you're likely to need the job skills that you learn with a computerized system for many years.

Until recently, corporate computerbased instruction was devoted almost exclusively to instruction about techniques and procedures, but just as many corporations now pay at least partial tuition for any academic training for employees, a growing number of corporations are making general CAI courses available to the people who work for them.

Theory and Practice

If industry has contributed an extensive body of knowledge about norms and human capabilities, educational theory has come primarily from universities. Most computerized instruction is based either implicitly or explicitly on academic theories of how people learn.

The general class of learning theories behind most CAI software involves response-reinforcement models. These hold that if students get confirmation or praise for correct answers—even from a computer—they will attempt to produce more right answers. Exactly what internal dynamics lead to this response is still a matter of hot debate, but getting answers right is in itself a powerful motivator for CAI users.

Academicians are still the most frequent authors of CAI material. Unfortunately, being a subject-matter expert does not automatically make a person an expert in CAI instructional design. Just as many brilliant researchers are soporific instructors, CAI material that is outstanding in content may or may not be a delight to work with. Lessons Worth Learning

Out of all these antecedents and the rapidly-growing base of CAI experience, some pointers seem to be emerging. What makes for good CAI software depends in part on the audience and the subject, but we can identify several broad principles.

In general, the best CAI software takes into account the nature of both humans and computers. Good software is highly interactive, suitably paced, graphic, and tightly organized. When the purpose is the reinforcement of simple skills, reasonable periods of repetitive drill and practice are appropriate. Otherwise, software should vary the presentation to hold student interest.

Just as good computer programs reflect a clear structure and an explicit algorithm, good CAI has clear objectives and a defined strategy for getting them accomplished. Every frame in a CAI program should have a purpose.

Entertainment value can enhance most presentations, but it has to be kept in perspective. Continued success at a reasonable challenge is a better longterm motivator than an occasional laugh.

Although simulation and drill can be beneficial, experiential knowledge is not completely programmable. Computers and learning do go together, but there's a whole world beyond the screen.

A short glossary

AUTHORING SYSTEM

A programming system designed to help users create computer-aided instruction (CAI) lessons. The more sophisticated systems are attempts to let users who know nothing about computers use their expertise about a subject area to create good computerized lessons. Most personal-computer authoring systems, such as the authoring mode in Apple Logo, do require some expertise in instructional design and computers. AV

An abbreviation of *audiovisual*—teaching and presentation aids that project images or produce sounds. Originally, the term applied mostly to filmstrips, slides, overhead slides, and films, plus records and tapes. Now, it includes videotape and other electronic displays as well.

CAI

An abbreviation of either computer-assisted instruction or computeraided instruction—the use of computers to present lesson material to students. See computer-assisted instruction for more details. **CAL**

An abbreviation of *computer-assisted learning*—a method of using the computer for instruction that leaves the student in charge.

CBT

An abbreviation of *computer-based training* an educational strategy in which computerized instruction is the main component of the teaching process. See *computer-based training* for more details.

CMI

An abbreviation of *computer-managed instruction*—a system in which the computer presents lessons, keeps track of student progress, and selects the sequence and pace of materials. See *computermanaged instruction* for details.

COMPUTER-AIDED INSTRUCTION (CAI)

The use of computerized systems to present lesson material or to quiz students on their progress.

Generally, the computer presents sections of material and asks the student to answer questions. Based on the responses, the system presents further material, covers the preceding material again, presents related material, or reviews past lessons.

COMPUTER-ASSISTED INSTRUCTION (CAI)

Most people use this term as a synonym for *computeraided instruction*, but others reserve it for situations in which the computer plays a less prominent role and a human teacher a greater one. **COMPUTER-BASED**

TRAINING (CBT)

An instructional method that uses the computer as the principal teaching agent. Most people apply this term to development of industrial and commercial skills and not to general education.

COMPUTER-MANAGED INSTRUCTION (CMI)

A system in which the computer not only presents the material but also monitors student progress and selects further lesson material accordingly. CMI systems usually offer extensive testing and recordkeeping facilities.

COURSEWARE

Originally the term referred to software that contained actual lesson material for computerized instructional systems. Now, the term is often used more generically, denoting any educational computer software, possibly including AV materials, or even any lesson material in either electronic or printed form

DRILL AND PRACTICE

An educational approach that has the student work through many instances of the same type of problem. Computers are particularly good at presenting this type of lesson because they don't ever get bored, lose patience, or forget or miscalculate the answer. If the expected answers involve concepts that can be phrased in various ways, the software must be advanced enough to recognize alternate formulations, or users will become alienated. FRAME

In computerized instruction, usually taken as the material shown at one time on screen. But with greater use of animation and interactive screens, the term is also used to mean a logical sequence of images treated as a unit in the instructional design. **INSTRUCTIONAL**

DESIGNER

A person who figures out how a body of material can best be presented to students. Designers often work with a subject-matter expert (SME) and a graphic artist to develop lessons and illustrations that make the material interesting, understandable, and correctly paced.

INTERACTIVE VIDEO

In computerized instruction, the linking of a videodisc or videotape player to a computer, allowing parts of the video program to be shown under computer control. Several companies make interface boards to connect video systems and Apple II-series computers. Apple SuperPILOT includes commands for controlling video players, making it easy to integrate video segments into a lesson.

LOG

As applied to computerized instruction, a record of student responses to lesson material (and, as a verb, to create the record). A logging facility can help a lesson author spot which sections are giving students trouble and need improvement, or it can help a teacher spot problems a student may be having that the computer cannot help with. Several of the more advanced

A computer language created to help children learn how to use a computer. It is most famous for its "turtle graphics," which lets users draw shapes by giving simple commands to an imaginary turtle. The Apple implementation (Apple Logo) shows the turtle as a triangle on the screen.

Along with turtle graphics, Logo also includes a programming language that is good with words and strings. Both the graphics and programming parts are extensible, meaning that you can define new routines from existing commands and then use those new routines just as if they were part of the Logo language.

PILOT

A computer language developed for writing computer-assisted instruction (CAI) programs. The language uses simple commands customized for presenting material, soliciting responses, and then matching inputs with sets of possibilities. Thus, writing computerized lessons in PILOT is easier than it would be in a generalpurpose language such as BASIC. Apple offers two versions of PILOT, and other commercial and publicdomain PILOTs for the Apple II family are also available.

PLATO

A computer-based educational system from the Control Data Corporation. The system is based on about a dozen linked mainframe computers. The thousands of PLATO courses cover general education, industrial training, high-school equivalency, job skills, and organizational methods. Until recently, you needed a special plasma-display terminal to use the PLATO system, but now you can run the Home PLATO service on your Apple. Control Data is also marketing stand-alone instructional programs for the Apple under the PLATO trademark.

SIMULATION SOFTWARE

Software that presents you with a set of facts concerning a particular situation or event, solicits your inputs about what to do next, and then shows you what the results of your decisions would be. Simulations show up extensively in industrial training and often in educational and game software.

SME

An abbreviation of subjectmatter expert—a person who supplies the content for computer-assisted instruction (CAI) lessons or artificial-intelligence (AI) expert systems.

SUBJECT-MATTER EXPERT

The person who supplies or checks the content for computer-assisted instruction (CAI) lessons or artificial-intelligence (AI) expert systems. In most cases, the SME works in a team with experts in instructional design or AI and perhaps a programmer, researcher, and graphic artist to create the lessons.

TRAINING

As applied to computerized instruction, training generally refers to lessons about a specific task-related skill; education, on the other hand, refers to general instruction in broader topics. Commercial and industrial training is one of the largest applications for computerized instruction.

VALIDATION

In computerized instruction, trying a lesson out with a group of students to check that it proceeds the way it should. Full validation tests whether students have actually learned the material; program validation simply checks whether the flow of lesson screens takes students from beginning to end.

BUSINESS TURNS

Apples are making inroads into a new educational setting: business and industry. Educators have come to accept personal computers as effective teaching tools both in the classroom and at home, but the business world has taken longer to realize that many training functions can be streamlined with the aid of computers.

DAI

Now, Apples are teaching sales representatives about new products, student pilots how to fly helicopters, managers how to improve their interpersonal skills, and Army personnel how to repair missiles. The American Heart Association uses Apples to monitor whether correct force is applied during cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training.

These kinds of training are specialized, which is just one reason why personal computers have gotten a late start in industrial training. Cost is another factor-training departments frequently have small budgets, and innovations always require a heavy initial outlay. Once they are in place, however, computer-based training systems have many advantages: They can be used over and over, are easy to update, can be sent to diverse locations, and are infinitely patient. When teamed up with other equipment, such as videotape or videodisc machines, computers can deliver superb training.

The growth of computer-based training has been irregular. Some areas of business and industry have developed extensive programs; others have just begun to explore the options. Consulting companies design custom training programs at high prices, but the cost is coming down, and software and hardware to help you develop your own training programs are becoming available and affordable. A system can be as simple as a single interactive diskette or as complicated as a combination of disks, video monitors, videotapes, and ancillary equipment. Let's take a look at what's available and what it can do for you.

If you've ever encountered a computer whose screen had a series of questions awaiting answers, you've seen interactive software in action. Programs like this are part of all computer-

omputerbased training systems are easy to update and infinitely patient.

based training programs. One of their most common functions is to teach you about computers; in addition to presenting information, they also provide hands-on experience with the machine. You use a computer to learn about it.

Imagine that you are employed in a small company that has purchased several computers, some word-processing software, and perhaps a spreadsheet package. A few years ago, your options for learning how to use the equipment would have been limited to struggling through the manual, with your boss breathing down your neck, expecting you to increase your productivity immediately. But things are changing.

Interactive training diskettes are available from companies such as Cdex

and ATI. These tutorials are designed to teach you how to use many of the major microcomputer software packages (VisiCalc, WordStar, and BPI General Accounting, to name just a few) on the market today. Prices range from \$65 to \$75. At first glance, these figures may seem a stiff price to pay to learn to use a product that cost \$150-200 in the first place. Another way to look at it, though, is in terms of the time you spend learning. You may spend 20-40 hours getting down a complex application, but the tutorials can get you through the basics right away.

ATI also provides samplers that compare different brands of application packages. For \$12.95, for instance, you can purchase an overview of eight different word-processing programs. Again, you save yourself research time and gain a quick sense of which program is right for you.

Interactive software is the simplest form of computer-based training. Some companies are now adding an audiocassette that you can play while you work through the tutorial. Additional hardware (videocassette players and color monitors, for example) provide the capability for more advanced training systems.

One of the most advanced computerbased training systems currently in use is the Electronics Worksite Training Program developed at the College of San Mateo, in San Mateo, California. This program has been over four years in the making, and workstations for it are located across the United States. Extensive courses in AC and DC electronics are available. I took a look at one module of the series, which involved assembling a circuit, to see how it worked.

Each workstation consists of an Ap-



ple II Plus or IIe with two disk drives, a Sony Betamax, a color monitor, earphones, a special interface card, and electronics equipment such as a multimeter, signal generator, digital frequency counter, and a semiconductor-parts kit. A course has 12–15 modules and requires 24 videotapes, 60 diskettes, lab manuals, and other written materials. A necessary adjunct to each station is a phone to use as a hot line when you need help.

If you do your homework for a lesson, you read some theory and concepts before going to the lab and logging on. A special disk can record your name and scores on any quizzes that you take. The first part of the lesson is a review of prior work.

The program then tells you how to set up your equipment for today's lesson. The video screen shows the lab equipment, and you assemble the circuit in question. Afterwards, you hook up the test equipment to your circuit and take various measurements, entering your readings at the keyboard for the program to check against the correct answers. After completing the exercise, you take a post-test of randomly generated questions (no two tests are the same). The program does not let you proceed to the next lesson until you have mastered the current one.

I give this lesson an A for its excellent teaching style. The extensive color graphics, use of sound to present explanations, and the possibility of pausing or reviewing some particular topic all make this lesson more interesting than reading a textbook and more paced to your needs than a classroom lecture would be.

Of course, a program as extensive as this costs money. Each course costs around \$10,000, and the price of the necessary hardware can bring the total up to \$22,000. Nevertheless, you can find these workstations in a variety of Silicon Valley electronics companies. Companies usually use the systems to upgrade the skills of current employees. The alternatives (sending them to school or giving them one-on-one training) would cost the same, if not more. Once these workstations are in place, companies can use them 24 hours a day to train as many people as schedules permit.

Doing It Yourself

Like all new technologies, computerbased training systems were originally expensive and complicated, but now the price is dropping, and new software and hardware products are making the creation of training programs less intimidating. To help you design interactive lessons on diskette, software developers have created special lesson-creation languages called "authoring languages." These programs are designed to reduce the amount of complex programming that goes into designing lessons.

One of the best-known authoring languages is Apple SuperPILOT. True to its educational nature, this \$200 pro-

to see an explosion of training programs in the near future.

gram comes with its own self-paced tutorial (Apple Co-PILOT) to help you learn the program. Once you have the basics down (the tutorial takes about 40 minutes), you'll be able to begin creating lessons. SuperPILOT lets you create double-size characters, color text with color backgrounds, graphics, animation, and sound effects.

When you've created and saved your graphics and sound, you write text and include instructions about when to call up the graphics. The program can record student responses and grades for your records. Lessons can be as simple or complicated as you want them to be. With SuperPILOT and an Apple, you can easily create interesting interactive lessons that are more than just an onscreen textbook.

Other authoring programs are rapidly becoming available. The Whitney Interactive Video System for the Apple II Plus, IIe, and IIc includes the Insight 1000 Plus Authoring Program, which lets you write text with AppleWriter. JAM, Inc., includes its DiscWriter course-authoring system as part of its laser-videodisc program in computer literacy.

The more advanced systems combine Apples with videotape or videodisc machines. In these instances, the Apple not only creates programs, lets the learners do lessons, and keeps track of records, but it also manages and coordinates the rest of the hardware. In a simple system that employs a disk and an audiocassette player, on the other hand, the user performs this function. The Electronics Worksite lab hardware uses an interface card designed by Whitney Educational Services that provides the electronic link between the Apple and the videocassette player, so that you can show material from each in any preset sequence.

Companies that specialize in training systems usually provide all the components you'll need to set up such a system, sometimes including lesson content.

For example, the JAM Introduction to Computer Literacy system includes two double-sided laser disks covering topics such as hardware, software, telecommunications, and new technologies; floppy disks containing the program software; users' guides; and the Disc-Writer authoring system. You can purchase the JAMCARD interface and the DiscWriter system separately. The Whitney Interactive Video System for the Apple II consists of the Whitney Interface Card, Insight 1000 Plus Authoring Program, computer diskettes, and an interactive video demonstration. In addition, Whitney Educational Services provides hardware interfaces for videotape/videodisc, and other authoring packages.

Experts in the field of computerbased training agree that they've just scratched the surface. They expect to see an explosion of business- and industrial-training programs in the near future. As prices go down and the technology improves, more and more companies will discover the advantages of turning training over to personal computers.

The adult-software market is still in its infancy, and it may not mature until young computer users who are growing up on today's software for children can tell developers what they want.

Even now, it's hard for most of us to remember how recently the microcomputer boom originally took place. Let's face it, despite the headlong pace of technological change in this country, five to seven years isn't long enough for it to penetrate every available market.

Although the educational market as a whole took off a couple of years ago, software designed to help people of college age and above learn a wide variety of skills and subjects—especially software that genuinely engages the adult intellect—largely remains to be written. Software that's both technologically and conceptually state-of-the-art may be even further away.

The Untapped, Unknown Market

In 1982, Americans spent \$12 million on educational software to be used outside of the schoolroom, according to Talmis, Inc., a Chicago-based marketresearch firm that specializes in computers and education. In 1983, however, that figure leapt more than 780%, to \$94 million.

According to SRI Research Center, the high-tech market-analysis division of the firm Selection Research, Inc., in Lincoln, Nebraska, 16% of the computer-owning population used their microcomputers for educational purposes (as defined by the user). As of May 1984, that percentage had more than doubled, to 38%. All available evidence indicates that little of that river of funds is flowing to adult education. Instead, it's flooding the kindergarten-through-eighth-grade market.

A quick flip through the catalog of SoftKat, Inc., probably the nation's

> he adulteducation software market has barely been scratched.

largest distributor of educational software, shows that among the 53 developers represented in its pages, the overwhelming majority have directed their efforts at the elementary-school level. Except for some flurries in the science and mathematics areas, the adult-education software market has barely been scratched.

Debra Sutton, SoftKat's vice-president of sales, said, "There's a void of adult-education software, the same way there's a void of special-education software for the learning disabled. I think that with educational software being as new a phenomenon as it is, people haven't really explored all the avenues they should address."

Sutton noted that even the collegelevel programs tend to be like textbooks, workbooks, or flash cards transmuted into screen form.

"We have people saying, 'Listen, we want to get into the educational-software business, we've got programmers, and everything ready to go. What do you recommend we focus on?' And we tell them it's wide open in special education and adult education. This is where we're seeing a real need within the marketplace. Sometimes they take the advice, and sometimes they don't.

"Mainly they're looking at what's already selling, and they want a piece of the cake."

Part of the reason elementary-level software sells better is that the installed computer base is much larger in elementary schools, said Sutton. In a junior- or senior-high school, students may have access to a total of eight or ten computers, she said, "whereas in an elementary school, they will have 30 to 50 in one classroom, and they'll have three or four classrooms of them." Elementary schools own an average of 32 software packages per school; juniorand senior-high schools make do with 16 per school.

At the college level, the number of available packages drops steadily until at the master's level, said Sutton, "students are out of luck—unless they're going for their master's in computer science."

Most of the firms contacted ex-



pressed the belief that adult education is the wave of the future—the next big growth area for software—and they were *just about* ready to enter the field.

For instance, Lee Rade, public-relations director for Avant-Garde, said his company had been concentrating on remedial-math and language-skills programs, but now would be targeting the children's home-education market. "As far as developing software specifically for the adult-education market, it's something we want to move into, but we're right on the edge of it."

Sheryl Leach, software-marketing manager for Developmental Learning Materials (publisher of Academic Skill Builders and Drill Builders), said that DLM would publish more upper-bracket adult-education software early this fall.

Even the research firms and distributors told me they were just about to study this area, or were expecting more software.

What's There Now

Of the more than 300 educationalsoftware packages SoftKat offers in its catalog, about 20% aim mostly or partially at the above-high-school market.

Actually a wide variety of adult-oriented programs exists, said Kathy Hurley, vice-president of microcomputer software for Grolier Electronic Publishing.

Hurley, while in the process of compiling a catalog of software for home computing, unearthed a range of software for grown-ups that met every definition of the word *educational*: software for analyzing stocks and bonds, dream analysis, auto mechanics, health and dieting, planting and gardening, home safety, real-estate investment, car costs, and football strategy. The list doesn't include computer-literacy kits or scholastic-aptitude and achievement-test skills.

The problem may lie with the mechanics of marketing. Sheryl Leach quoted Andrew Bingham, president of DLM, as saying the home market "might keep the revolution in educational software from happening, because the people who really know about educational software are going for the home market instead."

Said Leach, "It could be that educational software will not evolve to its utmost because of all the money in the home market. Not all of the developers are the knowledge people. They'll put their money in what they *deem* to be creative, innovative, and educational; and sometimes it's in direct conflict with what truly *is*. The dollars say that the home market dictates. If you're a software manufacturer, it's in your best interests to go where the money is; and that's not necessarily the best way to go."

What Is Educational Software?

I have intentionally avoided giving a definition of "adult-education software" because the concept is not at all clear. Each different expert produces a different answer.

Debra Sutton of SoftKat said, "It's

easy to categorize everything when you're in the primary and secondary levels of education. Everything's math, science, social studies, history—when you get into adult education, it's very difficult to draw the line."

For instance, when does businesstraining software become adult education? Western Behavioral Sciences Institute in La Jolla, California, offers executives an \$8000 schooling by computer that they can undergo at home, typing on their own terminals. In this instance, it's hard to say where training leaves off and education begins.

Future Software

Whatever the definition, developers and researchers alike agree that the boundaries of adult-education software are due to change in the next few years.

Hurley suggested that books and software would be teamed more frequently and that interactive fiction and preprogrammed databases would increasingly enter the market.

Leach envisioned a combination of computer and videodisc that would, for instance, permit users to study history by seeing history on the screen. "Take children or adults back to the medieval days by letting them see the ruins that exist today. You could study problems of architecture, costume, dress, and agriculture. Include not only programs that give question-and-answer-type branching and problem solving, but also actual simulation that would get you there—that would combine with real-world things and make them relevant."

For now, the adult-education software market is more one of potential than fact. Maybe we will have to wait for our grown-up children to articulate their needs as adults before that market potential can be realized. In the meantime, we might do well to emulate our children, who have taken to computers with ease and rapidity. Said Avant-Garde's Lee Rade, "At first adults don't see it for themselves; kids are more receptive. But eventually adults get turned on to using the computer for education and self-improvement. Maybe it's sort of natural. People learn a lot from their kids."

EARNING MORE

Your family's computer can be a powerful force in the intellectual development of your children, and September is a good time to think again about the role it has played—and can yet play in your children's education.

This article focuses on three key developmental factors and provides specific suggestions about them.

1. To begin, don't underestimate the impact of the family environment on child/computer interaction. The informal learning atmosphere of a supportive home has definite educational and developmental advantages over the frantic atmosphere of a video arcade or the formal atmosphere of a school.

2. Accept your children's view of the computer as an exciting toy. It's an electronic doll, a magic chalkboard, a puzzle palace. The noted Swiss psychologist Jean Piaget insisted that play is the serious business of childhood. It's the best way for children to explore and finally understand the complex interacting forces and objects of the physical world. You can *work* at your computer if you wish, but you'll have to let your children *play* at it.

Real play is exploratory and educative. Children respond to stimulating activities on expensive computers with positive play.

3. Draw on current cognitive theory and research. Our understanding of factors that affect the development of the human brain and its mental processes has increased markedly in recent years. This knowledge can help you use your computer to enhance the intellectual development of your children.

The following sections summarize cognitive theory and research and suggest specific types of positive com-

puter/child interactions during three major developmental stages identified by Jean Piaget—the preschool period, the elementary/middle-school years, and adolescence.

A Developing Brain

The brain, as it develops, quickly creates the environmentally independent neural machinery for survival the general organizational structure and the regulators of basic life processes that are the same in all humans. Then, more slowly, the brain develops the environmentally dependent neural machinery of social interaction and problem solving, which varies among societies and people.

The brain is composed of more than 50 specialized areas. Gradually, during the first 16 years of a person's life, these specialized areas connect and integrate mental processes that are generated in young people as they confront increasingly complex patterns and problems in their environment. It appears that related specialized areas initially create more connections than the brain needs—to allow for different human environments. Parenting, teaching, and experience help determine the child's most efficient set of connections, and a process called synaptic pruning eventually eliminates connections that aren't used.

Language development illustrates this developmental strategy. An infant has the potential to learn any of the world's 3000 languages (which range from 13 to 71 sounds), but most children need to become fluent only in the language spoken in their immediate environment. Thus, the child's brain reduces its initial broad language capacity to a simple, more efficient, single-language system. Conversely, the two-year-old's limited language ability increases in complexity to 5000 words and 1000 rules of syntax by the time the child begins school, and to more than 50,000 words by adulthood.

The developing brain adapts itself to the demands of its environment, and this specialization helps it master even the most complex elements of that environment.

Genes create a basic human brain; the environment helps to shape it into a unique brain. An intellectually stimulating environment during childhood and adolescence can stimulate the learning (cognitive) process in children and enhance the growth and efficiency of connections among related brain areas, creating a broader, more rapidly functioning mind.

Computers are and will be an integral part of your children's environ-


ment. Thus, factors such as a computer's ability to process information rapidly can affect your children's mental development.

How can your family computer enhance this development?

The Preschool Period

Preschool cognitive development focuses on basic environmental and social interactions through the development and integration of a complex sensory system that monitors variations in temperature, physical contact, air pressure, light rays, and the chemical composition of food and air; a muscular-control system that learns how to control conscious and unconscious movements with increased precision; and oral comprehension and speaking skills and related social behaviors.

Your computer can supplement the many informal family interactions that stimulate the development of these functions in your children. For example, can you recall anything in your childhood that required the quick eye/ hand coordination of a joystick-operated computer game? These games can enhance the development of important sensorimotor functions—eye/hand coordination, spatial/vector relationships, and the ability to predict observed movements.

In many respects, video games are the logical extension of Saturday-morning cartoons, with children now getting into the animation itself by affecting movements on the screen and becoming an integral part of the story.

Further, good software programs provide electronic extensions of such important early-childhood spatial activities as finger painting and drawing. For example, Facemaker (Spinnaker) introduces young children to the keyboard and to the concept of programming through face-drawing activities. Paint (Reston) allows children to transfer the colored pictures in their mind to the computer screen. Delta Drawing (Spinnaker) allows them to color any shape they made on the screen.

Use your word-processing program to introduce your preschool children to the computer and to the concept of written language. Type a word and ask your child to reproduce it or reverse it on the next line. Create pattern/sequence games that require your child to type the next element in the sequence: XIIXIIXI., ABC CBA DEF _____. Ask your child to type his or her name, but to leave two spaces between letters. Type the stories your child dictates to you ...

The Elementary/Middle School Years

Elementary-school children develop the ability to integrate, classify, and store complex sensory information; use concrete objects to organize and perform variable and reversible operations; and expand materially their ability to master written code systems (language, music, math, and so on).

Your family computer can complement many of the formal language and

omputers are and will be an integral part of your children's environment.

math activities that dominate the elementary-school curriculum. Keyboard/ word-processing skills are especially important to a child growing up with a computer.

Hi-Res Mastertype (Lightning Software), which uses a game format, and Typing Tutor II (Microsoft) are fine keyboard-skill programs. Kidwriter (Spinnaker) adds pictures to the stories children write, and Story Tree (Scholastic) provides story shells that children can expand in a variety of ways.

Word-processing programs remove much of the drudgery of editing. Preliminary studies with The Bank Street Writer (Brøderbund), a simple wordprocessing program widely used in schools, suggest that middle-school students on a word processor enjoy writing and spend more time in editing their work than those working with paper and pencil or typewriter.

Ease of writing and editing means little, however, if the writer can't improve the quality of the writing or isn't encouraged to write. Encourage your children to read well-written children's books. Subscribe to quality family magazines. Place a good set of reference books next to your computer. Read what your children write, and talk positively about style and syntax.

Logo (Apple) is perhaps the most widely acclaimed computer program for children. Developed by Seymour Papert of MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology), Logo provides children with an easily mastered computer language that creates marvelous graphics and then goes way beyond in developing computer literacy. Since buying Logo is an expensive decision, you might want to read Papert's excellent paperback book, *Mindstorms: Children, Computers, and Powerful Ideas* (Harper and Row, 1980), which is a discussion of the philosophy that underlies Logo and its approach to the development of logical thinking.

Songwriter (Scarborough Systems) approaches music in much the same way that Logo approaches space. Children use a screened keyboard to compose simple to complex songs.

Moptown Hotel (The Learning Company) uses seven attribute games to help children develop important classifications and logical problem-solving skills that develop during these years.

Enter, produced by Children's Television Workshop, is a fine children's magazine on computers and electronic games (\$14.95 a year). It also provides useful information on new software. Adolescence

The childhood development of sensorimotor systems, the ability to internalize the external world, and basic classification and language skills prepare the adolescent for the final frontal-lobe development that facilitates mature logical, abstract, hypothetical, and planned thought and action. Secondary-school curricular and extracurricular activities include labs, games, and projects to encourage adolescent decision making in nonthreatening situations—to help prepare them for the real-life decisions they will have to make as adults.

Your adolescent children can use the family computer to advantage to write school papers and create programs for their computer courses. The recreational software available for this age group encourages the development of thought processes through simulation, fantasy, logic, and decision making. For example, Karel the Robot (Cybernetics International) teaches the fundamentals of Pascal and structured programming. Volcanoes (Earthware Computer Services) is a fine science simulation. Adventure (Apple) allows the player to seek adventure down the electronic road, and Sargon (Hayden) plays a good game of chess.

You and your children share your home with a computer. Make the relationship a comfortable one for all and an intellectually stimulating one for your children's developing minds.

Trying to learn a little *français* before you hit the Alps this winter? Are you tired of adding umlauts and cedillas by hand to your business correspondence?

Whether you're a newcomer to foreign languages or a fluent businessperson dealing with many countries, don't overlook a valuable helper sitting right on your desk your Apple computer.

For beginning language students, computers can provide the repetitive practice so necessary in sharpening grammar and vocabulary skills. They won't wander off to another student just when you need help or get upset because you still don't know how to conjugate *être* after 15 tries.

If your goal is working in a foreign language, you've really hit pay dirt. Computers don't know—much less care—what combination of dots they put on the screen when you press a key, so it might as well be a $\frac{1}{6}$ as a ?. And yes, you can print your text, either on a dot-matrix or on a daisy-wheel printer. **Getting Started**

First things first: How can you use your Apple to learn another language?

For starters, you should have a computer from the Apple II family (or a III running in emulation mode). The II

Plus, IIe, and IIc are the most popular Apples for educational programs, and all the programs I'll be mentioning in this section were written for the II family.

No one's going to claim that computers can replace a native speaker for language instruction. They are, however, excellent for the nuts-and-bolts practice you'll need to master the basics, and they're also good for teaching non-Roman alphabets, such as Hebrew and Russian.

The good news is that a lot of foreign-language software is available for the Apple II. The bad news is that very little of it is suitable for the absolute beginner. You'll almost certainly need to supplement your computer work with a class or at least a good textbook. That's not a recommendation to forget the whole thing—just a cautionary note.

Surprisingly, I found only one language program that is available with audio cassettes. This lack of pronunciation guides points up the importance of using the computer as a support for your language studies, not as the only source.

French, German, Spanish

I've lumped these languages together because software houses frequently publish similar programs for all three. The packages from Gessler Publishing (see Polyglot Software chart) provide a good sampling of what you can expect from foreign-language software, so let's look at them more closely. The ones I received for review were Le Présent and Le Passé Composé des Verbes Réguliers et Irréguliers, Deutsche Grammatik "Der-Die-Das," and Spanish Word Order.

The three programs vary considerably in style, indicating that Gessler has purchased existing software from various authors, instead of commissioning programs with consistent design and format. (Presumably, a given language series is more consistent.) The variations are interesting, though, because they demonstrate some of the common good and bad design features of foreign-language programs.

For instance, the German and French programs don't give you translations of the practice sentences after you've completed them. I successfully typed in lls ont rendu des livres à la bibliothèque, without ever finding out exactly what it meant. This approach hardly seems sporting, even if Gessler assumes you're using the program in conjunction with a class.

The German program has another

quirk: It doesn't faithfully reproduce the German character set. OK, so lots of textbooks and dictionaries forgo the traditional β for *ss*; they don't abandon umlauts, though. This limitation relates to the Apple II's ability to generate unusual characters.

The character set you see on the monitor of your Apple II (any Apple II, including the IIc) resides on a chip inside the computer. To produce any characters other than the ones stored in that ROM chip, you have to change ROM chips or program the characters in one of the Apple II's graphics modes, which is a pain in the neck.

Therefore, I understand why the authors of Deutsche Grammatik didn't want to write the whole program in a graphics mode just to get a couple of silly dots above the umlauted vowels. Nevertheless, the alternative-namely, adding an *e* after the vowels-takes some getting used to. Seeing old standbys such as für and über suddenly showing up as fuer and ueber is disconcerting. Aside from having that small gripe, I think Deutsche Grammatik is a fine program, and it has one feature other programs would do well to follow: It teaches you to run the program in the language you're studying. For instance,



the first few times the command Press space bar to continue appears, it's in both English and German. Then the English disappears, and you find yourself responding to the German prompt. The same goes for such frequently used prompts as Type the number of your choice and Check your spelling.

Spanish Word Order was produced in Apple II graphics, so it has the full range of Spanish characters. Grammar hints and English translations of individual words are available during the exercises—and yes, it does translate the whole sentence when you're done.

The program does, however, have one extremely annoying feature that impels me to issue an ultimatum to educational-software publishers: Don't put sound effects in your programs without giving users some way of turning them off (in the case of the IIc, the volume control will solve the problem). This particular program emits about 15 seconds of annoying beeps while it's booting. It also buzzes every time you type a wrong answer—even if you've chosen the No Sound option.

These three typical programs demonstrate that you should decide how you feel about such features as translations, accurate alphabets, and sound effects (or lack of same) before you purchase foreign-language software.

Esoterica

New DAVID-DOS I

French, German, and Spanish are definitely the "big three" foreign languages in this country, but several others have also attracted the attention of Apple programmers.

The Institute for Computers in Jewish Life offers a wide range of programs, including the introductory Learning to Read Hebrew. It's an excellent introduction to the Hebrew alphabet and is available with audio cassettes. Unfortunately, the cassettes aren't well integrated with the computer. The speaker on the tape goes too

fast for beginners to follow, and the screen instructions don't specify clearly when to start the tape.

The Russian Disk, from Instant Software, is a top-flight introductory program, especially for travelers. It's the only foreign-language software I've seen that I'd consider using without supporting materials.

The first part is a primer on the Cyrillic alphabet, which isn't nearly as fearsome as you might expect. Once you're familiar with Cyrillic, the pronunciation of Russian words is straightforward.

The rest of the disk contains tutorial material on Russian words for common foods, drinks, places to eat, stores, and signs. It even has several short biographies of Soviet poets, scientists, and political leaders. The Russian Disk doesn't cover grammar, but who cares when it can help you find a piroshki shop in Leningrad?

Probably one of the preeminent language schools in the country is Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah. It is now marketing foreign-language software through Computer Translation, Inc. The company's first offering, Chinese Lessons, is a tutorial on written characters and their pronunciation.



The program uses the Yale (rather than Pinyin) romanization system of Mandarin. The disk includes characters for food, transportation, family members, important signs, greetings, time and seasons, and the like.

Doing Business

OK, now that you know French, German, Spanish, Hebrew, Chinese, and Russian, where do you go from here? Probably back to your Apple, hoping to type reports and letters in your newly acquired tongue. But American Apples speak only English, don't they? Yes and no. The Apple II needs some encouragement to become multilingual, but the Macintosh and Lisa have foreign characters built right in, and the Apple III can change fonts with just a few keystrokes.

Software publishers must contend with the fact that the character set for the II is stored in ROM and that the only ways to produce foreign-language characters are to change ROM chips or write your program in a graphics mode.

Some publishers have taken the latter route and created graphics-based text-editing programs. If you just want to play around with other languages, they might be marginally acceptable, but they're not the sort of programs you'd want to use day in and day out. They're rudimentary, awkward, and frustrating.

The only practical alternative—and it's not as extreme as it may sound—is to change ROM chips. A company called International Solutions has been licensed to use Apple's proprietary foreign-language chips, and it has put together a first-rate conversion package for the IIe and IIc called The Diplomat. (It's not available for the II Plus, unfortunately.)

can work in English or another language at the flip of a switch—using *any* text-based Apple II software. Yes, any. Apple Writer, Quick File, AppleWorks, WordStar, VisiCalc: Whether the program is formatted in DOS, ProDOS, CP/M, or whatever, The Diplomat can convert it into your chosen language, just like that.

Each package includes two ROM chips (keyboard and video/screen), new keycaps, an English/foreign switch, a chip puller, and even a keycap puller. If you enjoy soldering, you can do the conversion on a IIe yourself; the more squeamish will want to leave the job to a trained Apple serviceperson. The IIc version must be installed by a dealer. Note that since this conversion involves modification of the Apple's motherboard, it voids the computers' 90-day warranty.

The Diplomat is available in French, French Canadian, Western Spanish (North American), UK (British), Italian, German, Cyrillic (Russian), Hebrew, and Dvorak versions. (You're right, the last one's not a language—it's a nonstandard keyboard configuration—but it does require a different keyboard chip on the IIe.)

International Solutions also does



special orders. The company has recently created custom Lithuanian, Polish, Swedish, and Norwegian chips. Prices range from \$98 to \$398, depending on which computer you have and which language you need.

The Diplomat works in conjunction with the Apple DMP or Imagewriter printers, as well as many other dot-matrix printers. It also works with daisywheel printers that support foreign languages. (For instance, the Apple Daisy Wheel Printer's print wheels include numerous foreign characters.)

In short, if you have an Apple IIe or IIc and want to work in a foreign language, The Diplomat is the way to go. What if you have an Apple other than the II? Rejoice, because you can produce foreign characters even more easily.

The Apple III is a dream machine when it comes to foreign languages, because it gets characters from software, rather than from ROM. Several foreign-language fonts come on the latest System Utilities Data disk and are easy to load into programs such as Apple Writer III.

You may not even need them, though. You can access the foreign characters on the Apple Daisy Wheel Printer directly from Apple Writer II and III with control characters. For instance, Control-N V Control-O produces an \tilde{n} . You won't see it on your screen, but you'll get it from the printer.

The Macintosh and Lisa are even simpler. They have many foreign characters already built in, yours to use at the press of the Option key. Those characters will print out exactly as you see them when you use your Mac or Lisa with a dot-matrix printer. The Macintosh itself is also available in several international versions.

So experiment a bit and find out how your Apple can help bring the rest of the world a little closer. Happy conjugating—and *bonne chance*!

SOFTWARE REVIEW/BY JAN AND TORY SKOPECEK

BATTING

BPI Systems has created an accounting package for various types of businesses with the potential to expand with companies as they grow. We reviewed BPI's four basic software packages, General Accounting, Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable, and Payroll, on an Apple IIe with DOS 3.3, applying them to a sole proprietorship, a partnership, and a corporation.

Whether you have previous knowledge of computers or this is your first introduction to computers' possibilities, BPI will take you by the hand and lead you. We found that the basic requirement for success with these programs was a background in the fundamentals of accounting. These programs are set up for easy conversion of existing books. If you are just starting a business, however, you should read the documentation first and then determine how you want to set up your books, before converting to BPI.

General Accounting, Version 2.1

Each of the four programs we're looking at can stand on its own or combine with the others to form a complete financial system. The General Accounting program is a general-ledger package that contains accounts payable, accounts receivable, and payroll functions. The separate Accounts Payable, Accounts Receivable, and Payroll programs give you extra power for these functions if your needs are more complex than what the basic General Accounting package can handle.

The G/A program can produce a single income statement or multiple income statements for as many as ten departments, locations, or stores. It writes checks automatically, using informa-

tion you record in the cash-disbursements journal about payments to employees, vendors, and other payees. If you have a small company with five to ten employees and accounts receivable and payable that don't require aging and other special treatment, then this program should be sufficient for your needs.

The first two chapters of the manual provide a brief introduction to the program and tell you how to get started. Chapters 3 and 4 give you examples of program operation.

BPI provides a demonstration disk with a full set of books for a small company, as well as worksheets for configuring and transferring your books to the system. During configuration, you should allow extra space between account numbers—e.g., account #1000 for your checking account and #1050 for your savings account. This approach will let you add additional accounts as your company expands.

Before entering your configuration, determine the number of monthly transactions you have laid out on your worksheets. BPI sets forth a formula in chapter 7, "Data Management," for computing the maximum number of entries you will be able to enter on one diskette for the month. It helps you evaluate whether the General Accounting package can handle your accounting capacity or if you need to work additionally with any of the other programs, which let you expand the accounts beyond the capacity of a single diskette.

Accounts Receivable

BPI gives you flexibility in dealing with your accounts receivable. With the Accounts Receivable program, you can close your accounting period weekly, biweekly, or monthly, and have the ability to post your accounts receivable daily and age them, adding finance charges where necessary.

The Accounts Receivable system allows you to enter 450 customer accounts and can hold up to 200 transactions in each account per billing period. You can create up to 100 repetitive charges—for deliveries, for instance—and configure 120 accounts, if you need to, so the program will transfer your Accounts Receivable totals in them to the general ledger.

In setting up your accounts, you are able to include pertinent data such as customer number, name, address, phone, type of customer account (A for regular accounts, P for regular accounts with repetitive charges such as delivery, V for revolving accounts with minimum billing amount, and F for customers who pay a fixed amount each month.)

In evaluating our specific needs within Accounts Receivable, we could choose between the balance-forward and the open-item method. We chose the open-item method to facilitate audit procedures for late or partial payments. When you record your cash receipts with this method, the program requests the invoice number and has you note separately if finance charges are being paid. The program manual does advise you to be cautious in choosing your method, because changing methods can create serious problems.

You can specify two types of finance charges, with a rate and minimum balance for each, and can waive finance charges for specific customers.

The program enables you to compile a customer-account history and assign categories by type of sale, sales territory, or state. The system does not print financial reports by category, but it does allow you to print lists of customers and mailing addresses by category, so that you can print mailing labels or address lists. On the invoice statements, you can print a one- or two-line message from your company. In addition to listing aging balances and payment dates, you

can inform customers of upcoming sales or company closings for holidays, for instance.

Payroll

The BPI Payroll system enables companies with up to 100 employees to process their payroll with the standalone system or to integrate it with the General Accounting system.

A demo disk introduces you to Payroll and gives you the opportunity to practice with the program, which is the case with all of the programs in the BPI package. A problem we encountered with the Payroll system was the inability to have the program function as anything but a practice program. The manual explained that we should mail the registration card; upon receipt, BPI would send us the updated tax tables we needed to make the program useful. The Payroll program covers three principal methods of compensation: hourly, salaried, and commissioned. You can specify three hourly rates—regular, time and a half, and double time—for each employee.

If you are using the Payroll program as a separate system without General Accounting, the time you spend on configuration will save you time during each pay period. For example, you may have four employees who work under different compensation structures: Employee 1 works on an hourly basis with different hours each week; employee 2 works 40 hours per week, paid by the hour; employee 3 is salaried, paid semimonthly; and employee 4 is a commissioned salesman paid monthly.

At the close of your weekly payroll period, you can "manually" review each employee for the period or select an individual employee from the Method of Payment menu and enter any necessary information such as the number of hours worked. During payroll config-



uration, you've already entered wage information and types of deductions besides payroll taxes (union dues, IRA's, medical insurance, city taxes, and the like). After you enter the hourly employees' hours for the payroll period, the computer asks if the workers have taken any sick leave or vacation time and then automatically computes taxes and shows net pay. You can then return to the Method of Payment menu and select automatic processing for the employees who are paid weekly. The program processes their payroll and distributes it to the appropriate salary expense accounts.

You can choose to pay the employees manually or have the computer print the checks. You then close the pay period and post the employees' earnings to their payroll accounts, which maintain the balances necessary for quarterly taxes, as well as SUTA and FUTA taxes and W-2 forms preparation at year end.

The following week you process employees 1–3, with the only requirement being that you process employee 1 for hours and note if employee 2 or 3 had sick leave, vacation, or expense reimbursement. You then follow the procedure described above. At the end of the month, you process employee 1 for his hours and employee 4 for his total sales, determining his salary based on 15% of sales. The computer then computes all salaries for employees 1–4, distributes the payroll to the salary expense accounts, and posts the amount earned to the employee payroll accounts in preparation for the monthly close.

Your period payroll reports will enable you to determine productive vs. nonproductive time (sick leave, vacation, and so on) and summarizes salary expenses by department.

If you are combining Payroll with General Accounting, you should back up your disk before you transfer your net payroll data to the general ledger, to prevent accidental loss of information. The Payroll Update Service (\$100) available with this program provides you with updated tax-table information whenever payroll tax changes affect federal, state, or certain local taxes.

One thing we recommend with this particular program is a third disk or, preferably, a hard-disk drive. Shuffling disks around gets tiresome and can lead to mistakes.

cash-flow requirements: These three factors can give an accounts-payable department headaches. The BPI Accounts Payable program allows you to assign a voucher reference to each invoice with which you can track the distribution of that invoice to various general-ledger accounts.

You can also break down invoices into different amounts with separate voucher numbers if partial payments with different due dates are to be made. The voucher number allows you to recall an invoice if you need to note return of defective merchandise or a change in discount, final payment date, or credit terms. You can have the computer pay the entire bill on its discount date or final due date or hold the payment until completion. You can also enter comments, when entering an invoice, that are for internal use only and do not appear on the check stub.

After you've entered an invoice amount, the program takes the credit information entered previously for this particular vendor (e.g., discount and payment terms) and computes the net invoice. After approval, it presents the expense accounts normally associated with the vendor, and you can either distribute the charges to those accounts or enter other expense accounts. The system holds the information until you are ready to actually print checks and then automatically debits the appropriate accounts and credits the appropriate checkbook.

The Accounts Payable program allows you to designate different cash accounts when paying invoices. For example, laws in certain states require

insurance companies to maintain separate checking accounts for premiums/ commissions received and for operating expenses. The Accounts Payable program, with its multiple checking accounts, fulfills these sorts of requirements.

During your accounting period, you can request a detailed vendor analysis that includes a complete vendor list of names and addresses, the number of days each vendor allows for payment, discount days allowed, information on year-to-date purchases and payment, the high balance for the year, and current balance of payables, as well as the number of checks written to date in the year.

The vendor-analysis reports include your regular vendors only, not casual vendors that you purchase from only occasionally. You can request such an analysis of any individual vendor at any time during your accounting period or have the system print all regular vendors.

You can also ask for a printout called a Vendor Query, which provides a detailed list for a specific vendor of all outstanding invoices, credit memos, undistributed payments (due date upcoming), and the total balance due that vendor.

An excellent summary at the end of the practice section details each step.

By following checklist procedures at the close of each accounting period, you will be able to produce month-end financial statements on the afternoon of the last day of the month. You will also be able to begin the next month's accounting on the first day of the accounting period, rather than two or three

BPI Support Service

When you purchase BPI accounting software for your Apple, you can subscribe to the On-Line BPI Customer Service Program for \$50 per program. If you subscribe to the Payroll Tax Update Service for \$100, the On-Line Service comes free of charge.

The On-Line Service is an excellent resource for technical assistance. As we found out during our review of the package, the technical-support employees will research the answer and return your call, usually the same day, if they are unable to answer your questions immediately. Within three weeks of purchasing the programs, you will receive a toll-free number and access code for the support service.

During the three weeks before you receive your access code, the dealer from whom you purchased the program should be able to secure the answer, from the support service, to any questions you may have.

Accounting Ease

The Apple IIe and the BPI package are an unbeatable team. The programs, with their simple documentaion written in clear English, are easy to learn and use

After learning the General Accounting program in two to three days, we were able to convert the entire set of 1983 books for one of our companies onto the computer within two weeks, complete with 12 month-end financial statements and the books closed and ready for the auditors.

MONITORS IN SCREENING THE MARKET FOR THE PERFECT SCREEN

re you in the market for your first (or maybe second) Apple computer? Maybe you've heard that amber screens cause less eye fatigue, or you're just interested in upgrading your current computer system. These are some of the typical reasons

for considering the available options in monitors. Last month, we discussed composite and RGB color monitors (see the August issue, pages 56–60). Most of us, however, are probably just in the market for a monochrome monitor.

You may be asking yourself what's so complicated about shopping for a monochrome monitor. Well, nothing is complicated about it, but you should consider certain factors that may influence your decision. In this article we'll look at why a monochrome monitor may be the best choice for you.

To help you judge the quality of a monitor, we'll describe how images are produced on a monochrome screen. Next we'll take a close look at seven

Monochrome or Color?

We're used to seeing our world in "living color" and are conditioned to viewing color on televisions and at the movies. For these reasons alone, you may be tempted to purchase a color monitor for your Apple. A color monitor may not be the best choice, based on your computing needs and finances, though. Color monitors are generally more expensive than monochrome monitors, and some of them (the RGB type) may require the purchase of an additional card to be compatible with your computer, unless you have an Apple III. Consider these questions:

- Are most of your computer applications word processing, spreadsheet, or data-management software?
- Do you rarely display or produce graphics on your system?
- Is cost an important consideration?

If you answered "yes" to at least two questions, you probably need nothing more than a monochrome monitor. If your heart is set on a color monitor, however, be aware that only the more expensive RGB type can display 80-column text reasonably clearly. You might even consider purchasing an inexpensive color monitor as well as a monochrome monitor and switch back and forth to meet your needs.

ow do they work? When you shop for a monitor, it helps to know a little bit about how monitors produce images in order to be able to judge whether you're getting a good one. Inside a monochrome monitor, a highspeed beam of electrons scans across the screen, which is coated with phosphor. This electron beam pulses to make some of the phosphors glow for a fraction of a second, while leaving others black.

These individual on-or-off phosphors are called *pixels* (a contraction of *picture element*) and produce the letters, numbers, symbols, and graphics that you see on the screen. Because the light the phosphors produce dies out in less than a second, the electron beam must scan over the screen many times per second in order to "refresh" the phosphors (maintain the image on the screen) without giving the appearance of a flickering character or screen. The number of pixels that the monitor uses to display each character on the screen on't be too quick to write off this part of your Apple that demands so much of your attention whenever you use your computer.

determines the resolution or quality of a picture. The greater the number of pixels that can form a letter or number, the more solid this character will appear.

Another characteristic of a monitor you may hear about is its bandwidth. Bandwidth is the rate at which the monitor can accept and display data from your Apple. Like the number of pixels, bandwidth also determines resolution. The faster the monitor receives and displays data, the sharper the images will appear.

Don't assume that the monitor with the highest resolution is the best monitor for you. This monitor may cost hundreds of dollars more than another monitor that would be just as adequate for your needs. Because higher resolution demands more speed and memory from your computer, you should try to match the bandwidth of the monitor to the bandwidth of your Apple. If you do so, you will get the best service from your computer system without spending more than necessary for the monitor. **Some Monitor Options**

Now that you can hold your own with the salespeople at the computer store, let's look at a sample of monochrome monitors. For this article we examined seven monitors, using an Apple IIe with an 80-column card. These monitors represent a few of the many options now available.

You may feel that a monitor is a monitor, and that it doesn't merit much discussion, but don't be too quick to write off this part of your Apple that demands so much of your attention whenever you use your computer.

Now we'll take a look at each monitor's physical features, controls/adjustments, and picture quality. The comparison chart which is included in this article gives each monitor's vital statistics.

Amdek 300A

Although we examined an amberscreen monitor (amber characters on a black background), this monitor also comes in green. The Amdek 300A is a fairly heavy monochrome monitor at 17 pounds and has its brightness, contrast, and power controls conveniently located on the front of the monitor. The screen, which is nonglare and mounted at a pretilted angle, has good picture quality. Characters in inverse video (dark characters on a light background) appear particularly sharp. This monitor has no visible phosphor tracing or smearing that can occur on some monitors when the cursor moves rapidly across the screen.

Apple Monitor II

This relatively new addition to the Apple II series of products is available in green. Designed to fit well on top of your Apple computer, the Apple Monitor II has a conveniently located handle for easy transport.



pple uses international symbols to identify the control knobs and connection points on this monitor. Unfortunately, these symbols may initially be more a source of confusion than of help. The biggest selling point for the Apple Monitor II is the easily tiltable screen, which allows you to select a position that's comfortable for your line of vision. This feature is great for those of us who share our computer with someone who's not the same height.

The picture quality is good—definitely better than that of the Apple III monitor we are used to. As you might expect from Apple, the documentation is excellent, and it even includes some helpful hints on how to prevent eyestrain when you work for long periods of time.

Gorilla

How about a Gorilla for your Apple? We looked at both the amber and green versions of this monitor, manufactured by Leading Edge Products. Both options are exactly the same, except for the screen color. Frequently used adjustment knobs are located in the front, and you can manipulate the controls in the back by hand, without any special tools. If you turn up the brightness too high, the background loses its black color or contrast. A tilt bracket under the monitor allows you to choose one of two viewing angles, no tilt or quite a bit of upward tilt.

The Gorillas in both colors perform adequately as far as picture quality and phosphor tracing are concerned, although you can see some excess glossing around the fringes of the displayed characters. All in all, if price is one of your major considerations in purchasing a monitor, a Gorilla at about \$100 is not a bad choice.

Hitachi MM1218

The Hitachi is another monitor (in green only) whose screen has a preset tilt. The resolution is good, although the characters appear a little more grainy (meaning the individual pixels are more noticeable) than those of some of the other monitors. Little phosphor tracing is evident. Unfortunately, the monitor we looked at lacked an owner's manual and, thus; a warranty. Sakata SG-1000

At first glance, the Sakata SG-1000 looks like a cute little TV sitting on your computer, although its display size isn't noticeably smaller than that of the other monitors. The cabinet surrounding the monitor turns out to be contoured more closely to the CRT (cathode-ray tube).



he Sakata, like most monitors, comes only with a green screen, which is pretilted and nonglare. Additionally, the resolution is fairly good, and a second video jack allows two monitors to run in parallel.

Taxan KX-121

The Taxan monitor comes in either green or amber and has reasonably good picture quality. In addition, the color of the monitor's cabinet makes the Taxan one of the few monitors that actually looks like it belongs aesthetically with the Apple computers. The handle designed into the cabinet is a nice addition. Unlike those of many monitors, the controls are all adjustable without the need for any additional tools. The Taxan has some nice advantages for a price of less than \$250.

On to the Computer Stores

Last month, we gave you some useful (we hope) tips on shopping for a good monitor. Without repeating them here, we'll simply reiterate that the most important consideration to keep in mind is your own viewing comfort. If you feel good about a monitor, you can probably look forward to many productive years with it. Happy shopping!

A couple of years ago, humorist David But VisiCalc was the software that run it.

Lachenbruch compiled a list of the things people did with their home computers, in decreasing order of popularity:

1. Play Pac-Man.

That was it. No home finance, no recipe index, no letter writing. And, although by now the list might bear some expansion (Choplifter, at least, should be added), Lachenbruch's point is still well taken. The home computer is still, as Atari founder Nolan Bushnell once put it, "a tremendous solution looking for a problem."

The VisiCalc Phenomenon

We need a VisiCalc for home computers. By this assertion I don't mean that people should be using spreadsheet programs such as VisiCalc to balance their personal checkbook on a home computer.

small-business owners bought personal computers specifically to run VisiCalc.

Perhaps I should say, then, that we need something equivalent to VisiCalc for home computers. We need an application that's so useful that people will go out and buy a home computer just to

Clearly, such a program hasn't appeared yet. If it had, Texas Instruments wouldn't have fled the home-computer business, Atari wouldn't have laid off half its work force, and IBM's and Coleco's warehouses wouldn't still be full of PCjrs and Adams. There are plenty of computers in homes, but the homecomputer revolution that will make computers in homes as common as telephones and TVs still hasn't hit.

What kind of breakthrough program can open up the home-computer market? I think we can safely say that it won't be VisiCalc or another spreadsheet program. The needs of home- and business-computer users are vastly different. To paraphrase Edward Heite, balancing a checkbook with a spreadsheet program is like hauling firewood

in a Rolls Royce.

Remember the food-processor craze of the late 70s? Cuisinarts were selling like hotcakes, and the bookstores were full of titles such as *The Joy of Processing*. A noted chef was asked if he knew any good food-processor recipes. "Don't kid me," he scoffed. "Do you know any good knife recipes?"

His point was a good one. A food processor is essentially a knife hooked to a motor, and there's not much you can do with one that you can't do with a good knife. The machine is still useful, though, because it makes all those "knife recipes" far simpler and faster.

It's the same with computers. I use my computer for both home and business functions. Yet *I don't do anything* with my computer that *I didn't do* without one. I write, outline, store notes, draw graphs, organize, plan, communicate, play games—all of which I did before getting a computer. Granted, I do them faster, more efficiently, and (I hope) better now that I have the machine, but I don't do anything new.



Actually, there *is* one important thing people do only with computers: write programs. In other words, they instruct the computer to do new tasks which, more than likely, they did by hand before they got the computer. You get the idea.

So we need to find an important home application that people are already doing, but need to do in a better way. The possible areas for such a breakthrough application include home finance, home control and security, telecommunications, education, and recreation. Sounds easy, right? Wrong, as a glance at the home-finance area will show.

The Home Financial Wizard

Home finance seems to be a ripe area for the home-computer breakthrough. Everybody has to pay bills and calculate taxes, and everybody hates it. Computers could end this drudgery by helping people write checks, balance their checkbooks, prepare budgets, fill out tax forms, and monitor their spending.

Prospective computer buyers certainly hope for help with these tasks. In a recent Yankee Group study, 53% of the people who were interested in acquiring a computer wanted to use it for home budgeting and management more than for any other application. When people buy their computers, they buy home-finance software as well. Programs such as Home Accountant consistently appear on the best-seller lists.

Once people buy these programs, however, they don't seem to *use* them much. When the Yankee Group interviewed people who had already purchased a computer, only 27% actually used it for home finance.

Why so few? Some recent market research conducted by Intuit, a Palo Alto, California, software company just entering this market, provides some clues. Intuit asked members of 200 households—not necessarily computer owners—whether, and how often, they performed various financial tasks.

Paying the Bills

Three activities showed up consistently in these reports: paying bills, reconciling checkbooks, and adding up checks. Almost all households did these things, usually once a month or more.

Other financial tasks were performed much less often. Fewer than a quarter of the families prepared household balance sheets or totaled their expenses. Fewer than 10% prepared a written household budget or compared
actual expenses to budgeted amounts. None prepared graphs of their financial activity.

Notice that these less popular tasks are all *elective*, not required like those in the first group. People know they ought to do these things; most plan to get around to it one of these days—but when they have a choice about financial chores, they usually choose to ignore them.

Now most home-finance programs emphasize precisely these elective activities. So people figure that, with the help of their computer, they'll finally be able to do these tedious chores. When

they find out how much work it is to enter and maintain the data, though, they lose interest. Since they don't really *need* a nice, neat pie chart of their expense categories, they won't go to much trouble to prepare one.

The moral of this story, again, is that people like their new bottles to contain old wine. If they didn't budget before they bought the computer, they won't budget afterwards either.

Ironically, most people don't even use these programs to do common financial tasks such as writing checks. That's because the programs often tie their functions together and require that you set up a complete accounting system before doing anything. Writing checks by computer turns out to be more trouble than doing it by hand. So, with a sigh, they consign the home-finance program to the top shelf and try to master Zork III once again.

Some Solutions, No Breakthroughs

I've recently seen two programs that might get people to actually use their home computers for financial applications. Although both were released initially for the IBM PC, Apple versions are forthcoming.

Intuit has followed up on its market research, described above, by introducing a product that performs only the three tasks that people actually *do*. With this product, called Quicken, you can print checks, balance your checkbook, and find and total checks within categories. Because it's so simple, Quicken really is quick—and easy enough to compete favorably with doing the tasks by hand.

Quicken isn't the breakthrough product, the VisiCalc of home computers, though—people won't buy a computer just to write checks and balance their checkbook—but it may do what no home-finance program has done before it: get used.

A Westport, Connecticut, firm called Micro Education Corporation of America (MECA) has taken a different tack. MECA recruited Andrew Tobias, a leading financial writer, to design a complete home-finance package. The program, called Managing Your Money, contains "chapters" on budgeting, writing and reconciling checks, estimating your income tax and mortality, planning your insurance, managing your portfolio, and calculating your net worth. It also contains a reminder pad and a financial calculator.

These functions are tied together but loosely enough to be practical. For example, if you maintain an investment portfolio, the program can automatically enter the totals onto your personal balance sheet. You can also construct the balance sheet without doing the portfolio, entering your investment figures directly from the keyboard. I suspect that people may start by using the basic checkbook functions and then be drawn into the more complex tasks.

If anyone can minimize the drudgery of performing some of these chores, Tobias can. He's the author of the highly successful book *The Only Investment Guide You'll Ever Need*. Besides giving good advice, he's an engaging, witty writer. For example, he dedicated his book "to my broker—even if he has, from time to time, made me just that." **Excuses, Excuses**

Programs such as Quicken and Managing Your Money may help people manage their finances on home computers, but since people try to minimize the time they spend on financial affairs, I don't think they'll buy computers just to run home-finance programs. Unlike VisiCalc, these programs won't single-handedly usher in the home-computer revolution.

On the other hand, home-finance applications may be a good *excuse* for people to buy a home computer, when they really do so for other reasons. In my next column (in the November issue), I'll examine some of those other reasons to buy a home computer.

Transylvania and Millionaire

he proposition that computing on the Macintosh ought to be simple, powerful, and fun gets a big boost from the first pair of games released to run on the Mac.

The authors of Transylvania (a graphics adventure) and Millionaire (a stock-market game) have done more than just bring to market a couple of challenging games. They have also demonstrated that Macintosh redefines the term "ease of use."

Damsel in Distress

Slip the Transylvania disk into the Mac. Double-click the document file, and the game's title page appears, divided into three sections.

"Velcome to Transylvania! Von't you please sign the guest register?" you are bidden. You enter your name at the keyboard and press Return. "And your next of kin?" it asks, menacingly.

You see a picture of a tree stump in the upper left quarter of the screen, below which is a N-E-S-W compass that you can activate with a click of the mouse button; selecting a direction brings a new image into the picture window.

Your mission is to find and rescue a damsel in distress. Beyond that, you're on your own. You wander through a forest, exploring and collecting odd items as you go. Of course, this wouldn't be Transylvania without a werewolf, or a vampire, or or—but that would be telling too much.

The text scrolls neatly up the right side of the screen, the game's message in Mac's Venice font, your own commands in New York. This typographical difference permits a clear distinction between lines of text. You communicate with the computer by typing simple two-word commands;

the program replies with text or graphic routines from a 300-word vocabulary.

The game was originally written in full color for the Apple II, but the black-and-white Mac version compares well. The graphic images are so well designed and in such high resolution that you soon forget that they occupy only a $2^{1}/_{2} \times 4$ -inch space.

Robert Hardy, who wrote the Mac version of the game, has provided an Inventory pull-down menu at the top of the screen. It shows a list of items you've collected during your travels. He has also produced 80 finely etched pictures that make you forgive Apple for not giving the Mac a color screen (well, almost).

Although Transylvania is exciting, easy to play, and visually satisfying, you might complain that it does not take full advantage of the Mac's resources. Why, for example, must we scrawl our map of the forest on a sheet of actual paper? The thrill would be greater if we had a mousepowered, map-making routine. How about using the mouse to manipulate objects on the screen? Or offering animation?

game that makes even better use of the Mac's unique features is Millionaire, from Blue Chip Software. It has scads of pulldown menus, and virtually the entire game is mouse-controlled.

Your goal is to build a \$10,000 grubstake into a cool million by buying and selling stocks and stock options.

If that sounds like an obscure or complex premise, don't worry. The game mirrors the obscurity and complexity of real-life stock trading. It is so well designed and so well suited to the Macintosh that you will quickly become enthralled.

Millionaire opens on week 14 of a 91-week playing session. Each "week," you have the opportunity to buy or sell stocks and options. The game tracks the activity of 15 stocks, Real stock trading is a lot like this game. Millionaire has simplified it enough to be comprehensible, without sacrificing the experience of risk.

and, with the click of the mouse button, you have access to a wide variety of investment information.

The stock-market graph shows overall stock-market activity to date; the specific industry graph tracks, say, the three retail-industry stocks in the game; and another graph reflects each specific company's performance. In addition, you can read the weekly *Financial Journal* for business news, pull down a description of any company in the game, or look up the high-low-close of any stock for the week.

Once you've done your "research," you buy your stocks and pay your brokerage commissions. (I told you it was realistic.) Your score is your net worth. The game also tracks your cash on hand and interest you owe on borrowed funds.

As your net worth increases, you earn certain privileges. For example, you can reach a status that lets you buy stocks "on margin"—that is, you put up only a part of the funds required to buy the stock. As in the real world, this strategy can produce great gains or stunning losses.

Higher levels of the game enable you to buy and sell stock options. You can even borrow up to 80% of your net worth and buy stocks with that money. By the time you've reached that extreme, you'll likely be holding the mouse with a sweaty hand.

You don't need to understand the stock market to enjoy the game (is there anyone who "understands" the stock market?). On the contrary, the game's proposition that stock prices relate to observable phenomena may lead a player to appreciate how the real stock market actually works.

Millionaire on the Mac can store up to 14 players' data. You can store a complete game's status, including the market environment, for later recall. A shrewd player can take notes as the game proceeds and may develop strategy based on past developments.

The game manual offers detailed instructions, a glossary of stock-market terms, and guidelines for working with the Mac. You can simply boot the disk and learn to play by playing.

Anyone who has learned a previous Mac application will find that this one runs in the same way as all the others—mouse controller, pulldown menus, windows, scroll bars, size boxes, close box: the works.

Does it matter that Millionaire lacks a color screen? Not a bit. Jim Zuber, who wrote the original version of the game for the IBM Personal Computer in color, says that color is unnecessary.

"We took the color out of the original IBM version," he explains. "That's because the current release has to run on 30 machines. We couldn't have it depend on color. In getting the game to the maximum customer base, color doesn't figure."

Playing Millionaire means calling up stock-market charts and company reports, reading the investment news, paying commissions, using leverage, and keeping your portfolio.

Fact is, real stock trading is a lot like this game. Millionaire has simplified it enough to be comprehensible, without sacrificing the experience of risk for players. No doubt, some sharp programmer someday will give us a real-life Mac investment program just like this one.

It is the third major release of Apple's software for the Lisa, and it is more capable and more fully integrated than the Lisa Office System.

The old Office System software consisted of seven separate packages that ranged in price from \$195 to \$395 each. The seven programs were LisaWrite, a word-processing program; LisaCalc, an electronic-spreadsheet program; LisaList, a database program; LisaGraph, a presentationgraphics package; LisaDraw, a freestyle-graphics package; LisaProject, a project-management program; and Lisa Terminal, a telecommunications program. Although the programs shared a similar command structure and user interface, they were not fully integrated; it was not possible, for example, to place graphics in a wordprocessing document.

In contrast, the new Lisa 7/7 is a single software package selling for \$695 that integrates all seven applications. The Lisa 7/7 software also adds several excellent new features such as a spelling dictionary and support for color printers. Here is a rundown of the seven applications and some highlights of their new features.

1. The LisaTerminal telecommunications program has corrected the word-wrap problem that plagued the old version. Previously, LisaTerminal could communicate only with Lisa-Write and LisaCalc documents; the new Lisa 7/7 version works with information from LisaList and LisaProject as well.

2. The LisaCalc electronic spreadsheet now includes the ability to calculate internal rates of return and perform statistical functions and natural-order evaluations.

3. The old version of the LisaList database program was not integrated with any of the other applications. This drawback has been rectified; LisaList can now share information with LisaWrite, LisaCalc, LisaProject, LisaGraph, and LisaTerminal.

4. The LisaGraph presentationgraphics package for creating charts and graphs for business presentations now has a built-in linear-regression function and also can create 3-D bar

charts and stacked bar charts.

Best of all, the software now supports color printers. The printer Apple recommends is the Canon PJ-1080A ink-jet printer, which produces excellent color graphics on plain paper or overhead-transparency material.

5. The new version of the LisaDraw freestyle drawing package also supports color printing on the Canon ink-jet printer, and the program has been enhanced with a reduce-to-fit option, an improved line-smoothing technique, and the ability to rotate text or objects.

6. The LisaWrite word-processing program now works with all the applications and lets you paste from LisaGraph, LisaDraw, or LisaProject into LisaWrite documents. The program can also do multicolor printing. Another great new feature is the addition of an 80,000-word spelling dictionary from Houghton-Mifflin. The dictionary is advanced, and you can operate it with the mouse. Another provision lets you add up to 750 user-definable terms, such as company names, product names, trade jargon, or other specialized terms.

7. The LisaProject project-management program now offers the ability to keep track of project costs and can fully integrate tables and graphics

from the other Lisa 7/7 applications. LisaProject is one of the particularly impressive features of the Lisa 7/7 software package. It is a first-rate project-planning and management tool that is unequaled in the microcomputer world. None of the other "integrated" software packages, such as Lotus 1-2-3, Symphony, Context MBA, or Framework, offer this capability. Since LisaProject is so innovative and useful, we are presenting a full review of this program in the article "Project Planning with the Lisa," which appears on pages 80-83 of this issue.

Besides enhancements to the various applications, Lisa 7/7 also offers improvements to the general "Lisa Desktop" operating system. Password protection is now offered at both the document level and the folder level, and it now has a provision for print queuing.

The new Lisa 7/7 is definitely the best integrated-software package on the market today. The accompanying chart shows how it stacks up against its main competitors. This third revision of the Lisa software has not only improved the software's capabilities, but it has also positioned it better in the marketplace, which may help the Lisa regain some of the ground it has lost to the IBM PC and XT.

Project planning made simple

LisaProject

ow long will it take to build a solar home in the mountains of Virginia? What are the steps in producing a Broadway play? How late can a particular activity start without affecting the final completion date of a project?

Questions like these occupy people who are responsible for making things happen on schedule. Sometimes the main concern of managers is not "when will it happen?" but rather "How many items on our list can we accomplish in time?" or "Is this project feasible at all, given the time frame and current resources?" LisaProject can help answer questions such as these. LisaProject is a project-planning tool that lets you create charts that are similar to PERT (program evaluation and review technique) or CPM (critical-path method) charts (see box on facing page).

Until now, graphic planning tools like this have been available only on mainframes and minicomputers. Some microcomputer packages offer help with scheduling, but they cannot draw the kinds of charts available through LisaProject. The graphics LisaProject creates offer visual clarity that is not possible with comparably priced systems.

LisaProject can help set calendar dates for each step in a project and

evaluate the related costs, as well as produce clear graphic presentations of plans for review by project team leaders.

The Program

The prerequisite for using planning tools like these is simple enough, though not all projects are suited for them. You have to be able to break a project down into a series of sequential, dependent steps. If you're going to produce a Broadway play, for instance, you'll need to choose the play, select a cast, choose understudies, schedule rehearsals, build the set, and so on. Before any new activity can begin, you must complete all preceding steps on which it depends. Furthermore, each person involved in the project can do only one thing at a time.

The heart of the LisaProject program is a diagram that shows the activities required to accomplish a goal. Based on the information you enter into the schedule, LisaProject can create GANTT-type (horizontal-bar) charts of activities, showing the project on a time scale by task or by resource (e.g., person or group).

Using LisaProject, you begin by identifying the tasks in the project and placing them in relation to each other. The program represents each activity with a rectangle drawn on the screen, and it draws lines to connect activities that are dependent on each other, indicating the sequence of events. Figure 1 shows a simple project plan as a series of steps for producing a newsletter.

You can print out such a diagram and distribute it to the major participants in the project for review and input for the next step, scheduling. In their simplest form, LisaProject's schedules show the name of each activity and its duration (in days). After you specify the project-start date, the number of days required per task, and the number of work days per week, the program calculates the projected completion date of the project. You can use LisaProject's Customize menu to enter dates of holidays that occur during the project cycle. You can also schedule a project by weeks (rather than days) by defining each week as having only one "work day."

In scheduling tasks, LisaProject follows a rule of most planning methods: An activity cannot begin until all preceding activities on which it depends have been completed. Following this rule, LisaProject calculates each task's earliest start date, latest start date, earliest completion date, and latest completion date. Figure 2 shows the newsletter production plan with the start date, final deadline,



and days per task that the planner entered. LisaProject calculated the starting date for each task in the project (shown above the top left corner of each activity rectangle). You can enter these dates manually if you wish, thus overriding LisaProject's automatic scheduling.

Critical Tasks

If the earliest completion date is the same as the latest completion date for an activity—if there is no "slack"—then the activity is critical to the timely completion of the whole project. Such activities fall on the "critical path" of the project, which LisaProject automatically displays in boldface type. If any activities along the critical path are delayed, then the entire project will be set back by the same amount of time.

oncritical tasks are those that have some slack in the schedule, tasks for which the earliest completion date is different from the latest completion date. The slack time for these tasks appears as gray shading on a task chart, which LisaProject creates, based on the information on the schedule chart. The task chart in figure 3 shows each activity stretched out across the time scale for the whole project. Any changes you make to the schedule chart will automatically show up in the task chart you cannot make changes to the task chart directly. In the latest release of the program, you can assign fixed costs to various tasks on a separate Project Table.

The Resource Chart

In addition to specifying the duration of each task, you can specify the name of the person responsible for that task. A task may involve more than one person, and you can specify a different amount of time for each person required for an activity. Based on this information, LisaProject creates a resource (GANTT) chart showing each person's activities over time, such as the chart in figure 4, which is based on the personnel plan in figure 5. Here LisaProject follows the rule that each person can be involved in only one activity at a time. If you want people to do more than one thing at a time, you can deliberately set up the schedule accordingly by giving them a different "name" or function identification in each overlapping activity.

As on the task chart, slack time appears as gray shading on the resource chart. Project control begins with a review of the difference between the schedule and actual performance over the life of a project. You can identify review points on the schedule as circular "milestones." At these review points, you can update the schedule to reflect revised task-duration estimates, personnel assignments, and start/finish dates. You can also enter the time remaining for

PERT AND CPM CHARTS

PERT charts were originally developed in the 1950s to help accelerate the development of the Polaris missile. These charts consist of a series of events with estimated completion times or start/finish dates. With a PERT chart, planners can ask "what if" questions such as, "If a certain event is completed by a certain date, how soon will the next event be completed?" and "How soon will the entire project be completed?"

The Critical Path Method was developed independently at about the same time as PERT. CPM is useful in determining the trade-offs between the costs and completion dates of a given project. In the newest version, LisaProject can automatically calculate costs, and it identifies the critical path of the project.





different phases of the project plan, LisaProject has become a truly complete planning tool. Once you've entered dollar figures in the Project Table, LisaProject automatically calculates both incremental and cumulative costs of the project.

LisaProject is not offered as a stand-alone program. Instead, it is now part of the Lisa 7/7 integratedsoftware package (see "All Together Now," on page 77 of this issue). The documentation is also part of the Lisa 7/7 package. The manual is attractive, with many graphic examples, and easy to use. It contains setup information, a tutorial, a reference guide, and an index. If you use the tutorial, which has you access associated disk files, or study the excellent examples of project plans on the Lisa-Project diskette, you'll find the programs easy to learn.

LisaProject goes a long way toward simplifying the previously complex task of planning a project. PRODUCT INFORMATION

THE MAC ACCORDING TO HOGAN/BY THOM HOGAN

Software Development with the Macintosh

ome of you have been writing me to ask questions about the Macintosh. The two most frequent questions are: What is the memory-upgrade process going to be like? and How do you go about developing software for the Macintosh?

I can't answer the first question, since Apple doesn't yet know (or won't tell) the details of the upgrade process from 128K to 512K of memory. I suspect it will be costly (around \$1000) and may include more than just a memory upgrade, since the entire electronics board will be replaced during the process.

So much for guesses.

I can tell you about the softwaredevelopment process for the Macintosh, and since in my last column I was just beginning to describe how the Mac works at the assembly-language level, I thought software development would be an appropriate subject for this month's column.

The Mac and the Lisa

To date, the Mac and the Lisa have been an inseparable pair. Almost all authors of Apple's software for the Macintosh prepared their programs by writing them in a special version of the Lisa Pascal language, compiling them to assembly language, and then sending the program to the Mac via the Mac's and Lisa's serial ports. In addition, since Lisa Pascal lets you write assembly-language code within a Pascal program (a process called "in-line assembly-language code"), you don't necessarily have to program in Pascal (other than providing a few obligatory statements).

You can't get there from here (yet).

The "special" part of Lisa Pascal is a series of prewritten procedures, each of which corresponds to one of the ROM routines I began describing in my last column. Thus, to fill a rectangle with a pattern, you use a Pascal procedure called FillRect. Other ROM routines are similarly named (Microsoft BASIC uses the same names for the few ROM routines it implements).

Apple's preference for Pascal began with its adoption of UCSD Pascal for the Apple II, way back at the turn of the decade (well, it *seems* like a long time ago!). Both of the BASIC interpreters for the Apple II were minimal versions, meaning that they did not sport features that made sophisticated or business programming easy. UCSD Pascal solved all these problems.

Beginning with the Apple III, Apple began using Pascal as the language of choice for development work within Apple itself. By the time the Lisa rolled out in 1983, Apple had its own version of Pascal, which compiles programs into true 68000 assembly-language code. Since Lisa Pascal is a compiler (UCSD Pascal was a quasi-interpreter, meaning it interpreted special instructions while executing), it was ideally suited for the earliest Mac software development, since the Macintosh requires small, fast programs to achieve its desktop illusion.

The Mac Development Process

Writing a program on a Lisa and testing it on a Macintosh is a cumbersome process: (1) write your program, using the Lisa editor, (2) compile it, using Lisa Pascal, (3) send it to the Macintosh through the serial ports, (4) install the resource- and application-file pointers on the Macintosh, (5) boot a special Macintosh diskette that includes a debugger and disassembler, (6) start your program, (7) examine what is happening by using a terminal (a Lisa will do) connected to the Macintosh and make corrections as necessary, and (8) go back to step 1 if you discover a problem.

"Wait a second," you say. "What's this 'install the resource- and application-file pointers on the Macintosh?"

hat's a good question. It turns out that Apple makes a distinction between program code and resource code. A program is a sequence of instructions to the computer; a resource is something the computer might use to carry out an instruction. In the Macintosh, messages, fonts, windows, advisories, and graphic illustrations are all regarded as resources. Thus, a program instruction might tell the computer to send message 1 to the active window. In a special resource file, message 1 might read, I'M SORRY, BUT I CAN'T DO THAT, FRANK.

Circle Blvd. • Corvallis • OR 97330 503 758-0521 One other nifty thing about resources: the Mac operating system figures out where they are (they could already be in memory or still on a disk) and retrieves them. Thus, you sometimes have to insert the System disk, the one you started the computer with, when an advisory message such as "Save changes before leaving MacPaint?" appears.

nfortunately, splitting resource and program code requires that you tell the computer at some point which resources go with which programs, thus we get step 4 in our development process. You can create most resources on the Lisa or the Macintosh with the development tools Apple provides to certified developers.

More than a year before the Macintosh's introduction, Apple began courting software developers, trying to convince them to put their programs out in Macintosh format, using the unique Macintosh operating system. To such developers, Apple provided a low-cost Lisa, a prototype Macintosh, Lisa Pascal, a set of Macintosh utility programs, and a mimeographed copy of the then current version of *Inside Macintosh*, Apple's guide to programming the Mac.

Developers were hindered by several factors: the multistep, multimachine development process described above; the necessity to use Pascal or 68000 assembly language for programming; and the "newness" of Apple's operating system and the still emerging documentation on it.

By now you understand why Macintosh software didn't just pop out when the computer did. Even though Apple did all the "right things," software companies need a certain period of time to learn new ways of doing things. With the possible exception of a handful of firms (Microsoft, Software Publishing Corporation, and Haba Systems are three I can think of), most developers didn't really begin to understand the Mac's unique environment until early 1984. Sophisticated software development for the Macintosh will no longer be the exclusive province of Lisa owners and certified developers.

Fortunately, the situation has changed. Apple's book *Inside Macintosh* is now almost complete, and seminars for developers are in full swing. By the time you read this column, three more programming languages will be available for the Macintosh: Macintosh Assembler, MacBASIC, and MacPascal. In a few months, two more development tools will be available: a Macintosh version of Lisa Pascal and a Macintosh version of the C language.

What does all this mean?

Well, MacBASIC or MacPascal should solve most people's programming problems. Both are definite improvements over their predecessors and exceptionally easy to learn. The only problem I see with these languages is the limitation on program size that both of them impose and a bit of speed deficiency due to the interactive nature of the products. Both use prewritten procedures for most of the ROM routines, making advanced graphics simple to produce.

Personally, I look forward most to the assembler. Assembly language is the best way to make the most of the computing power locked inside Mac. Since the machine has only 128K and a 68000 processor, small, fast-executing programs show the Mac off to its fullest. Also, Apple's version of the assembler promises to be one of the most useful ever produced. Besides easy access to all those juicy ROM routines, the assembler will include a debugger so that you can control a program running on one Macintosh, by using another. This addition allows programmers to optimize their program's performance by observing what actually happens within the programs. In other words, sophisticated software development for the Macintosh will no longer be the exclusive province of Lisa owners and

certified developers (although you will need two Macintoshes).

When the Macintosh Pascal compiler (not MacPascal) and Macintosh C finally appear, programmers will have a full set of development tools. **Required Reading**

If you're going to seriously tackle writing Macintosh programs, you'll need some other tools. One is Inside Macintosh, which currently consists of two photocopied binders full of information about the Mac ROM and operating software. It costs \$150. (Apple promises a bound version available through dealers late this vear.) Another essential tool is the Macintosh Software Supplement, which consists of utility and sample programs for software development. It costs \$100. You can purchase both by mailing payment to Apple Computer, Inc., 467 Sarasota Avenue #621, Cupertino, CA 95014 (Californians, don't forget the sales tax).

f you want to go even further and have access to Apple telephone support, programming seminars, and product-development information, you should apply for the Apple Certified Developer Program. You'd better be serious, however, since Apple will require you to submit a detailed business plan and product information and be able to show your commitment to the Lisa and Macintosh. In return, you can get discounts on development equipment, access to Apple's distribution channels, and other additional support. By the next column, I expect that many of you will have your copies of *Inside Macintosh* and at least one of the three available programming languages, since I'll be getting down to nitty-gritty details of creating Mac programs. You'll get the most out of them if you try out some of what I present.

SERIAL-PORT PINOUTS

The rear panel of the Mac has specialpurpose serial ports marked with a printer icon and a telephone icon. Each of the ports can support three standard serial-communications protocols, the RS-232, RS-422, and AppleBus protocols. The **RS-232** protocol is the most common today (most modems and many printers use it), and we thought you might like to know how to wire an RS-232 serial cable for use with the Mac.

The Macintosh end of the cable should have a 9-pin, male, DB-9 connector attached to it. The RS-232 end of the cable should have a 25-pin, DB-25 connector (whether you use a male or female DB-25 depends on the peripheral device you are connecting the cable to), unless you are connecting it to a device such as the Apple-Modem that also uses a DB-9 connector.

The table shows the proper pin connections. Note that Apple has chosen a nontraditional pin-numbering scheme for its serial port because the port supports more than one serial protocol.

A database management system that grows as your company does

> If you have been waiting to use your Macintosh for something a bit more serious than MacPaint, you may be interested in a new series of software from Organizational Software Corporation. The Omnis family of datamanagement software lets you maintain a sophisticated base of information and produce custom-designed reports, all for a low cost.

> The Omnis family has three members: Omnis 1, a record-storage system; Omnis 2 (The Information Manager), a more sophisticated package; and Omnis 3, which OSC refers to as The Database Manager.

> If you upgrade from one member of the Omnis series to another, you can transfer the files you have used in the past to the newer system. Thus, you can start with the system that meets your present needs without worrying that you may outgrow it in the future.

> Omnis 2 can handle most of the data-management tasks a small business or professional practice requires, and it was the package I tested for this review.

> Each record in an Omnis data file can have up to 12 different "pages," with as many as 120 separate pieces

MOUSE MEETS

The first mouse wanted a modem that would be very Macintosh-like. Icons and all.

The storage space of your computer limits the maximum file size. A single-drive Macintosh can use Omnis efficiently, but a second drive greatly enhances its performance.

The ideal system would incorporate a hard disk for data storage. (Omnis has been fully tested on Maccompatible hard disks from both Tecmar and Davong.)

Omnis is available for many different computers in addition to the Macintosh, and all the versions of the program share the same command structure.

Since most commands start with the Escape key, which is absent on the Mac, OSC chose to reassign the tilde/grave-accent (\sim , \sim) key at the upper left of the keyboard to behave as if it were an Escape key for the purposes of this program.

he initial version of Omnis uses none of the pull-down menus and icons that are integral to most other Macintosh software. It does, however, use standard menus and prompts. OSC plans to release a new version of Omnis for the Mac this October that will make full use of the mouse, Macintosh's pull-down menus, icons, dialog boxes, and other special features. Current Omnis owners will be able to upgrade to the new version for a \$25 materials-and-handling charge.

Record Design

Setting up a record is easier than with most other data-management programs. On a blank screen, position the cursor where you want an entry and give it an appropriate heading, such as Stock Number or Customer Name.

Once the headings are in place, you assign a name for the entry itself, determine its type and maximum length, and specify whether the field should be indexed for use in a search.

Indexed fields help you locate specific records efficiently, but you must pay a price. Since they require more storage space than standard entries, the maximum number of records that can fit within a file is reduced each time you add an index field.

You can give any entry a default value that will appear automatically

in each record. You can replace the default during data entry if you need some other value. In addition, you can assign a check function, which verifies that an entry meets certain conditions before the program accepts it.

If you are designing a file to handle customers' orders, you can have Omnis verify that each entry is above a minimum order figure and below the customer's credit limit. The program will reject any values outside of these limits.

Some of the most powerful Omnis 2 functions involve its Date commands. When you specify a field as a date, the program converts any entry in the field into a month/day/year format, such as JUN 02 83. More important, you can add or subtract from date fields or calculate the time between two dates, which is helpful in the report process.

Entering and Locating Data

To enter new records, simply select the Insert function, move from field to field, and type in the information. When you have filled in as much of the record as you wish, press Escape, and the program adds your information to the file.

To find a record—to read, edit, or delete it—you *can* step through the file record by record until you locate the correct one. A more efficient method is to have Omnis look for a match between data you supply and information in the file. For example, if you want to examine the personnel record for Mr. Davis, enter Davis in the name field, and Omnis will find the appropriate record. If the file contains more than one Davis, you can make the search more specific by entering a first name as well.

Multiple Update and "Zap"

Omnis can change or delete many records at once. Say, for example, you are using Omnis to maintain price information for a retail store and you receive notice that Acme, Inc., has raised all of its prices by 15%. With Omnis' Multiple Update function, changing the cost in all records of Acme products to reflect this increase requires only one operation.

The multiple "Zap" feature allows you to eliminate unwanted records just as easily. You can "cleanse" mailing lists, for example, by removing entries whose last-order date is too far in the past.

Report Design

Omnis provides a reporting sys-

tem that is flexible and powerful, though a bit hard to learn and use.

You design reports on the screen exactly as they will appear on paper. You can position headings along the top of the report, above the columns of information.

Data in a report is not limited to what the records themselves contain—you can calculate any part of a report from other information. For example, a report of salaries based on personnel records can include a bonus figure that reflects length of employment and productivity, even though the bonus is not contained anywhere in the record itself.

A report can include every record in a file or only those that meet certain conditions. You can also specify a particular order for results. Our example report can include only members of a particular department who have been with the firm for more than a year, and the program can sort the data by the employees' last names. The final report can also include totals, subtotals, and even averages.

You can store each report format on disk, and it appears in the report menu for later use. Generating a report once the format is on disk is easy, but the design process is best left to an experienced computer user.

Il in all, the report functions of Omnis are among the most flexible you will find in any program—and are almost unheard of in the program's price range. The tradeoff is the complexity of the command structure for report design, which makes the program a bit difficult to learn and use.

Data Security

Some applications require many users to have access to a database. To maintain some control over their actions, Omnis allows assignment of passwords, each providing a different level of system access.

Below the master user, who has control over all parts of the system, you can specify four additional user passwords, with appropriate operations assigned to each. You can prevent users from viewing particular information within a record and can restrict their ability to change data.

Documentation

Omnis comes with a thorough, informative manual that describes program operation and provides a step-bystep tutorial. A complete reference section and several appendices are included in this loose-leaf package.

When you finish both the basic and advanced sections of the tutorial, you'll have a good working knowledge of Omnis. Perhaps you won't know the entire program by heart, but you will feel comfortable designing basic records and reports.

Because Omnis comes to us from across the Atlantic-Suffolk, England, to be precise—its documentation has an unmistakably British accent. In the tutorial section, you design a personnel record in which the salaries are in pounds and the addresses are quite different from the city, state, and ZIP-code format we have come to expect. Support

The Omnis system does not include a warranty, but registered users can receive a backup copy of the program disk and are eligible for telephone support.

Overall Impressions

Any program has trade-offs, but in Omnis 2 the pros clearly outweigh the cons. The only drawback of the system is the time it takes before you feel totally comfortable using it. But then again, the more complex, flexible, and powerful a program is, the more difficult it can be to operate. In view of the program's abilities, it is not terribly difficult to use-but it is certainly not for complete novices.

Omnis 2 is an outstanding value. In fact, I can think of no other data-management program at anywhere near this price that can match its performance.

The Omnis programs are ideal for making the Macintosh earn its keep. They are serious pieces of software that will grow as your company does.

Welcome to Money Matters, a new monthly column that focuses on how your Apple can help you make, save, and use your money more effectively.

You're probably asking yourself, "Who is this guy, and how can he help me?" I come to A + from Softalk. For the last three years I was the investment columnist for that magazine. In Softalk, I looked only at your Apple and its relationship to your money as they pertained to the capital marketsthe stock market, the bond market, and the commodity market.

In Money Matters, I am going to look at those kinds of investments, as well as collectibles, tax shelters, taxes, real estate, home budgeting systems, personal financial software, and so on. You name it, if it's considered an investment, analyzes one, or shows you a way to save money, I will discuss it. Just think of me as the Sylvia Porter of the computer set.

Usually, the majority of people's appreciable assets can be found in the value of their homes; their cash deposits; or the stocks, bonds, T-bills, and other marketable securities that they own. If

you are one of these "average" Americans, you have a problem: With the various capital markets changing so frequently, along with your personal finances, you can't easily keep track of what you own and what it's worth and, at the same time, find new investments.

Because both this distribution of individuals' assets and these problems in handling investments are so common, hundreds of software systems have been designed to help track and/or analyze the performance of capital assets.

One such system is the Micro Portfolio Management System (PMS) from the Boston Company. Micro PMS consists of three modules-an accounting module, a stock-analysis module, and a Dow Jones News/Retrieval module for updating the prices of the securities in your portfolio. Let's see what Micro PMS can do for you.

The job of tracking your assets goes to the accounting module, which is called Portfolio Accounting I. Whereas you view all of your holdings (your securities) as one portfolio, Portfolio Accounting I can view them as different portfolios. This approach is helpful for

two reasons. First, you can have all your high-tech stocks in one portfolio and your options in another. Appraisals

Once Portfolio Accounting I knows what you have bought; sold; given away; or, if you're lucky enough, received, it's ready to get down to work. To keep the portfolio current, you can enter prices, using the Dow Jones retrieval module, the local newspaper, or the *Wall Street Journal*.

By simply pressing a few keys, you can get a transaction summary by portfolio, a realized gain/loss report, and a report that consolidates your positions in the same security across all portfolios. Try accomplishing that with just a few keystrokes on a calculator!

In addition to using the program's fixed reports, you can design your own reports, using Portfolio Accounting I's powerful reporting capability. Just like a successful politician, Portfolio Accounting I can be many things to many people. You can incorporate in a report any piece of information about a security or computed values, such as gain/loss, annual income, and dividend yield.

filtering such as greater than, less than, equal to, not equal to, and so on. You can also compound information into formulas to calculate criteria.

The result of the filtering is a list of investment possibilities that meet or exceed your criteria. You can save the list and run it through the report generator, turn it into a portfolio, or add it to an existing portfolio.

The program shows you the number of securities that meet each criterion. You get a gut feeling about whether you are being too soft or harsh in choosing investments that make the cut. If you find that you have been unreasonable, you can adjust the criteria.

If a company that you follow is not included in the database, you can add it and other update information by using any combination of the Dow Jones News/Retrieval service, research reports, and the financial pages of your local newspaper.

Entering, editing, and updating this volume of information (more than 7500 items) could be a horrendous task, but the filtering program makes the job more manageable.

Portfolio Pictures

A picture of your portfolio is worth 1000 reports. You can plot any of the information stored on your portfolio as a bar chart or scattergram. You use bar charts to look at different statistics or different investments as a percentage of the total portfolio; scattergrams compare two pieces of information to each other.

The graphics this plotting program produces are not high resolution, but they do get the point across. For quickand-dirty visual analysis, they are just right.

The charts appear on the Apple's display, or you can print them with any standard printer—nothing fancy, just functional.

If you disagree with them and have an adventurous nature, you can use a text editor to change the characteristics. One hitch, though: You have to call Boston to get instructions.

When you put your portfolio through the Enhancer, you get a set of buy/sell recommendations. In order to gauge the effects of following the program's advice, you can do "what ifs" without actually changing your portfolio-a good idea, unless you enjoy losing money (strictly for tax purposes, of course).

Analyst Extraordinaire

The analysis module's Report Generator is especially impressive. You can incorporate any piece of information in the 1500-item company database into a report. The only limitation is the number of characters on your Apple's display or that your printer can print. To stop you from using too much information, the program tallies how much space you have used, so you know when the report is full.

Not only can Report Generator print out the information in the database, but it can also sum and average, or weight and then average, all of the financial information. That's right, a real report writer. If you're going a little crazy from trying to collate, track, and analyze your investments, then Report Generator will help you keep what little sanity you have left.

High-Performance Graphics

The Performance Graphics program produces x,y charts from portfolio in-

formation, where the horizontal axis represents time and the vertical axis represents value. With Performance Graphics, you can plot the performance of one investment or a market index (Dow Jones Industrials, S&P 500, or two other indexes of your choice); compare two investments; index two investments to 100 and then compare them: or compute the relative value of two investments to each other.

The graphics have higher resolution than do the bar charts and scattergrams, but it's still not the best. They do get their point across, though.

You can print out the graphics through any interface/printer combination that prints binary files. No printer drivers come with the software. however.

The Spreadsheet Connection

Report Generator can create a Data Interchange File (DIF) that you can use with any number of spreadsheets.

With Micro PMS's data and your spreadsheet, you can not only design your own analyses, but you can also combine your portfolios with the rest of your finances and get "the big picture." The Accomplished Program

taxes, to the design of the reports, the authors have shown that they are in touch with the real world of investments

On the computer side, Micro PMS has some flaws, the biggest of which is Micro PMS's temper-it loses it every so often. The damage is usually minimal, but the program could handle certain errors better.

Still, each module carries an appropriate price for what it does; and, for what it does, each is an excellent investment. Micro PMS from the Boston Company: a good weapon to have in the battle of the buck.

Before we go any further, let me explain my system for organizing phone numbers and business cards. No, don't stop reading yet—just bear with me.

I have seven stacks of "important business papers" nudged into (usually) neat piles around my office, some near my computer, some not. I have a Rolodex near the telephone and two address books, one of which I tote with me on my travels, the other remaining at home like patient Griselda in case I lose my briefcase. Occasionally I transfer the accumulated new addresses and/or phone numbers from the spiral-bound message pad beside my answering machine to one or both address books.

Business cards have a separate stack, most of the time. Cards may or may not be attached to the appropriate files in my filing cabinet; other than that, they have no categories, since I have no business-card file, alphabetical or otherwise.

It's a nice, tall stack, though, and it makes me feel important when I unearth the card of a software company

vice-president next to the calling card of a daytime-TV director and the card of a manufacturing CEO. How the mighty are jumbled. It may take me a spot of time to find those cards, but find them I do. Usually.

In practice, my "system" provides

me with minutes, or even hours, of sidesplitting hilarity and concomitant ulcers. Many's the time I've rummaged through eight stacks of goodies and a pile of business cards to locate the name of a public-relations officer who can whisper the lowdown on a two-page press release, for which I've also had to search under several different categories.

We will not discuss the difficulties inherent in billing for telephone calls when some of the calls are billable and some are not, and when you have to juggle monthly multipage phone bills from several sources and tot them up painstakingly. My calendar and I have been

A new call-accounting system called Habadex could revamp your telephonenumber locating, calling, and accounting methods.



Chances are good that you yourself, a coworker, an employee, or a friend share some of these problems with calendars, categories, and calls.

Imagine my interest when I was in-

troduced to a new call-accounting system called Habadex, which claims that it can revamp your telephone-number locating, calling, and accounting methods. (It works with all the Apples except the Lisa—I'll focus on the Apple III version here.) Not only that, the product's manufacturer, Haba Systems, says, but it can also provide a handy source of names for mailing lists, an electronic calendar that alerts you to your appointments, and a program that links frequently used programs together for easy access.

System Components

The complete Habadex system includes the Habadex software and a Ha-

baphone plug-in-interface phone card. Using both the software and the card, you can locate the desired file, retrieve a phone number from it, "dial" the number with a single keystroke, and automatically add Other Common Carrier (OCC) numbers for Sprint, MCI, Metrophone, or your other access codes. Without the phone card, you won't be able to auto-dial or keep records of your phone calls.

Habadex's call accounting keeps track of all calls placed from your phone or extension. The program calculates, stores, and bills the costs of any calls to your phone account. If you levy a surcharge on calls as part of your daily business, the program figures that into the final charge for the call. Builtin costing tables for phone rates reduce end-of-the-month calculations for your accounting department.

You can store up to 6000 names, addresses, phone numbers, or other reference information. More than a business-card filing system, this part of Habadex is akin to a politician's Rolodex or "Farley file," in which you may want to record not only a person's address, but also a reminder that you met him or her at an office-automation conference, or that her favorite flowers are freesias.

Another feature of Habadex is its report-generation package, capable of printing mailing lists, multiple memos, letters, and labels. Any word-processing, spreadsheet, or other ASCII-generating program can accept information from your Habadex files and merge it into, for instance, the body of a report.

Perhaps you're tired of flipping through the pages of your "Month at a Glance" to jog your memory about where you should be today. A calendar,

clock, and appointment-book package lets you review your monthly or daily schedules with a couple of keystrokes, and alerts you with an attention-getting beep when it's time for an important meeting.

One extremely important part of the system is called Ha-

banet, or Haba Memory Manager, depending on whether the system is running on a ProFile hard disk or on diskettes. Either way the program lets you load multiple programs and change applications without rebooting. In the complete Habadex system, Habadex is merely the first program on a Habanet menu that can accommodate up to 24 programs.

The system works best if you have a hard disk—without one you'll lose the benefit of Habanet's quick switching from program to program. Instead, you'll be reduced to plugging in diskettes if you want to bounce back and forth among more than three or four programs.

Who Uses Habadex?

Chaz Haba, president of Haba Systems, says Habadex and the company's other products are among the first to use an advanced telephone-management system for microcomputers as part of their databases.

The company's vice-president of finance, Doug Redding, says that Habadex's chief users are salespeople and other professionals who spend a lot of time on the phone. For salespeople, says Redding, "it dials the phone and tells you whom you're talking to, and you can type in information on what you're discussing, save it, and go on to the next record."

Lawyers, accountants, consultants, writers, and frequent telephone users who want to bill clients for their time and trips to the touch-tone need no longer puzzle through sheaves of bills either.

Plugging It In

Far from being difficult to install, Habadex is ridiculously easy to plug into your Apple.

After turning your computer off, remove the top cover to reveal the empty expansion slots and install the Habaphone card in slot 3. Ease the phone card into the connector located on the circuit board. Connect your hard disk, if you haven't already done so, with a

hard-disk-interface card (not provided by Haba Systems). Unplug your modular phone from the wall, plug it into the top jack of the Habaphone card, and run a standard phone cord from the wall jack to the bottom Habaphone jack. Tough, eh?

The program takes up 32K of RAM, no problem with a hard disk and still manageable without one. If you have a modem, you can do without the phone card; in that case, make sure you have the Apple III clock chip, or the clock and calendar won't function.

Once you've installed and booted the system, you can begin entering names into your database.

Individual records have fields for the usual name, address, phone number, home address, and business title. They also include two fields for "categories," subheadings you can search through if you can't remember a salesperson's name but know he worked for a particular type of company.

The program lists records alphabetically. in the last name-comma-first name format, and also by category. The program doesn't overlook errors in capitalization, so be consistent in data entry, or you won't be able to find names when you need them. Don't get too fancy with the category listings. "Garden" and "gardener" may mean the same thing to you, but to Habadex they're two distinct categories. An unwary user could end up with a tangled proliferation of categories.

At the bottom of each record is a "miscellaneous" space—here's where you list the inside dope that can help you make the sale the next time you call.

Redding ran the Habadex system through its paces when I visited Haba Systems offices. After entering my name, telephone number, and category, we auto-dialed my home in Northern California, which took little time, since I wasn't home. Habadex reported that the cost of the 48-second call to my answering machine from the San Fernando Valley to the Bay Area was 62 cents via Metrofone.

"That information has been saved on disk," he said, "and I can call that information back on a report at any time."

Call reports list the date, time of call, duration in minutes, the number dialed, the cost of the call, and the surcharge for the call—this last field is designed for professionals such as attorneys who bill clients not only for the calls but also for the cost of their time. For instance, Habadex permits you to tack on a surcharge of \$1 for the first minute of a call and 50c for each additional minute.

"Dialing" a number requires nothing more than pushing the Return or Enter key when the cursor is positioned over the appropriate telephone number in the name or category listing. The alphabetic name display shows the names, account numbers, business phones, cities, and home phones of everyone on file. One handy Habadex trick is to let you bill a client's account directly, instead of languishing until the end of the month, by simply waiting till the call has begun and them moving to the account number and typing B.

Habadex can save you money on your long-distance calls through sheer convenience, Redding notes. Placing a long-distance call with an OCC Sprint takes 15 to 20 seconds, since you have to dial 13 extra digits on top of your original 10, and that's assuming that you don't make a mistake anywhere in those 23 digits. With Habadex, however, you have to press only one key correctly, and the program does the rest.

This menu-driven system doesn't

force you to memorize scores of doubleor triple-keystroke commands. Approximately 15 commands, most of them singlestroke, suffice to operate the keyboard, along with a few more to set up parameters for printing reports: Z to zoom in on the individual record from

a name listing, D to direct-dial instead of auto-dial, Control-P to print the contents of the screen.

Once you've made your calls for the day, you can check on your day's appointments in the calendar-or you can do it the other way around, if you prefer. When you move from the Habadex main menu to the calendar, the cursor moves immediately to the first day of the month. Zoom in on the requisite day; enter your meeting name and time; and on the stroke of the designated hour, Habadex reminds you of your engagement. The calendar reaches as far forward as 1999 and as far back as 1900. You can't save the screens, though-each screen is computed by an algorithm, so the screen itself doesn't take up much space. The program saves only the data on the calendar.

Ideally, with the Habadex/Habatel system, experienced users can make a series of telephone calls, update their records within the individual listings, and produce a report of the day's activities within seconds. The programs linked together by Habatel can take the proper date, time, and names from the Habadex files and complete an office memo. Habadex can feed information to any program that accepts ASCII files.

Documentation

Habadex comes with a terse booklet of approximately 60 pages; the documentation has spaces for notes, a quickreference command listing in the back, and a schematic for tinkerers.

Habadex's documentation doesn't exactly stand on ceremony, as readers will discover upon encountering one help section entitled "Uh-Oh," or noticing that with the help screen "you should be able to extricate yourself from any difficulty. Knock on wood." Any resemblance to documentation from Apple Computer, Inc., is intentional—Habadex works closely with Apple, both in developing software and providing the company with products for in-house use.

Other Habadex Versions

Haba Systems is one of the companies Apple has "seeded" with the Macintosh technology. Haba Systems' first contribution to Mac software is a version of Habadex designed specifically for the Macintosh.

The original Habadex approached the visual look of its tables of names in prosaic, line-graphic manner. This new version takes the pictorial view common to the Lisa and the Mac, the icon orientation.

For instance, the listings of names and telephone numbers don't appear in a blocky vertical list, but rather in a representation of a personal address book with tabs from A to Z. You move the cursor with the mouse to the desired letter of the alphabet. When the proper "page" flicks open on the screen, you can click the mouse's button to expand a particular record. You can reshuffle the information on the lists in eight different sorts.

"In terms of what the program does, it's conceptually the same" as the original, says Redding, "but the whole user interface is different. It's very Macish."

The Macintosh version of Habadex sells for \$199.95 retail, a considerable drop from the \$295 price of the III version. The demands of the marketplace dictated the pricing decision, Redding says. "Microsoft has set the level for pricing for the Mac—we didn't want to buck the trend. I haven't seen anything much higher than \$195 announced for the Mac."

The recently introduced Apple II version of Habadex works with all the computers in the II series. A mouse will be available for this version in the near future. The Apple II and III version are similar, with only slight differences in some of the commands.

Power and Simplicity

This superficially simple system actually wields a lot of power. Salespeople and other professionals aren't the only market. Schools can use Habadex for their student records—for immediate recall of a student's emergency telephone number, for example, or for the student's or faculty member's class schedule.

The Manpower temporary agency had Haba Systems custom-design a version of the program, called Manpowerex, which records applicants' experience, education, and employment history, the better to match employer and temporary employee.

Larger companies that aren't particularly interested in the personal-productivity enhancements of Habadex but are still anxious to keep phone costs down can look into another product called Habatel. This product is an accounting computer that logs all calls going out of a company and prints results regularly, so that managers and employees can locate the source of costly calls. Habadex is oriented toward single workstations and lone workers, whereas Habatel will appeal to businesses that are trying to manage a large volume of telephone communication.

Although Habadex isn't the computerist's answer to interminable telephone gab sessions, it is a tool that many professionals will appreciate. Until I get one for myself, have you seen that software company's press kit? I knew it was around here someplace....

Question: What do you get when you cross your Apple computer with a fantasy adventure game, the movie *Time Bandits*, arcade action, and graphics wizardry?

Answer: The Revenge of the Enchantress: Ultima II.

Ultima II, an outstanding arcade adventure game, whisks you through time and space on a magical, mystical quest. Not only do you scour the Earth searching for clues, recovering ancient artifacts, and slaying evil monsters, but you also rocket to other planets in the solar system, including those not yet discovered. If that isn't enough, you travel through time itself via time doors gateways connecting Earth's past, present, and future—if you can catch them.

Ultima II is a sequel to Ultima I, but you do not need Ultima I in order to play Ultima II.

Ultima I's villain was a powerful sorcerer named Mondain. Presumably, if you have finished Ultima I, you've already vanquished him. In Ultima II, Mondain's apprentice, Minax, the "enchantress of evil," takes Mondain's place. She's so vile she makes Mondain look like a Boy Scout. Your mission is twofold—discover what will eliminate Minax, and then proceed to do so.

R+ THRT'S

As all role-playing games do, Ultima II requires you to create a character—a computerized alter ego—to adventure across Earth, space, and time. You have 90 points to distribute among your character's six attributes, which are strength, agility, stamina, charisma, wisdom, and intelligence. The higher the point total, the better the attribute.

Next, you choose one of four races human, elven, dwarven, or hobbit; one of four professions—fighter, cleric, wizard, or thief; and one of two genders male or female. Each race, profession, and gender adds points to a particular attribute. For example, selecting elven increases your agility five points, wizard adds ten points to intelligence, and male boosts strength by five points. You can add points to your attributes, up to 99 points apiece, during the adventure. You must discover how to do so, however, and the points are costly.

Your character starts with 400 hit points, 400 food points, and 400 gold pieces. The hit points, which indicate how much physical damage you can take, decrease quickly during battle, especially if you are not wearing armor. The food points gradually dwindle as you explore. The gold pieces allow you to purchase weapons, armor, information, and other items—if you can find a place that sells them.

You then begin your quest in earnest by being dropped somewhere on Earth—usually in the middle of a hostile wilderness with no friendly village in sight. Your first order of business is to find a village and buy some weapons





and armor, and then you can start exploring and have a reasonable chance to survive.

Ultima II contains truly impressive graphics with seven colorful types of terrain. The deep-blue ocean rolls between the coasts. Blue-and-green swamps mingle with dark-green forests, and purple mountains tower majestically over plains of green spotted grass. White walls flank the purple cobblestone streets in the villages and inside the castles.

That's just the surface. When you enter dungeons and towers, you see corridors and rooms displayed in three-dimensional perspective. Since you face only in one direction, long corridors fade into the distance, and you cannot see around corners.

Evil monsters populate the countryside, and they swarm around you like piranhas after fresh meat.

The monsters, creatures, and men on the surface are small, slightly fleshedout white stick figures. Despite their diminutive size, you can easily tell the difference between an orc, a thief, a daemon, a jester, and anything else.

The monsters in the towers and dungeons are another story. They're colored green—perhaps with envy of the aesthetic quality their surface counterparts possess. These monsters are much larger than their surface cousins and are sculpted with block graphics more reminiscent of a TRS-80 than an Apple.

The game also contains good sound effects. About the only thing missing is a speech synthesizer. As you explore, you hear the click of your heels echoing off the ground. During battle, you can hear the swish of a miss or the crunch of a hit. A high-pitched whine signals your entry and teleportation through one of the blue time doors.

The movement controls permit rapid responses, and they are very simple to

use. As in an adventure game, you travel in the four compass directions. Ultima II is a real-time arcade adventure game, however, so instead of typing in a direction, you press the Return key, the / (slash) key, the right-arrow key, or the left-arrow key to move north, south, east, or west respectively.

Into Battle

Only evil monsters populate the countryside, and they swarm around you like piranhas after fresh meat. If you're clever, you'll put your back to something impassable such as a wall or a mountain. Some monsters are easier to kill than others—for example, a daemon is pretty tough, but an orc is "more pest than peril." To attack, you press the letter A and then a direction key.

Pressing two keys in sequence during a real-time battle can be tricky. Sometimes you accidentally reverse the order, pressing the direction key first, followed by the *A*. This sequence causes you to try to move through the monster, which you can't do, and you end up losing your turn. Even the manual notes that "the timing will come."

Ultima II contains 26 letter commands ranging from A, for attack, to Z, for character status. Some of the more interesting commands include C, for cast one of nine magic spells; H, for engage the rocket's hyperspace drive; S, for steal item from a store; and Y, for yell something nasty to release your frustrations.

An 18-page illustrated booklet, skillfully crafted to look like old parchment, provides instructions to start you on your quest. The documentation contains a one-page story on the rise of Minax, but pitifully few hints on how to depose her. After all, the manual says, "Your purpose is to learn how to fulfill your quest and then do what is required."

That's a pretty tall order, though, especially when you can roam all over the globe, enter dungeons and towers, rocket around the solar system, and pass through time doors to five distinct periods of Earth's past, present, and future.

Even worse, all those time doors are not fully mapped. You receive an artistic, 16×22 -inch cloth map of Earth with interconnecting time corridors printed on it. Unfortunately, the map is not all that accurate. You can get real lost real fast trying to navigate the corridors, but that adds to the fun of exploring the game.

Ultima II has many plot twists that mix technology and magic across time and space. With each accomplishment, you receive experience points. The more experience points you accumulate, the more powerful you become. In general, the tougher the battle, the greater the points. Thus, you receive more experience points for defeating a devil than you do when you get a lowly orc.

Whenever your character dies, and that will happen all too frequently during the first few times you play Ultima II, the program will "reincarnate" your character with all attributes, gold, and

Once again, Lord British calls for all true heroes to undertake a perilous quest to rid his realm of an oppressive evil. No one knows who or what is plaguing the good land of Sosaria. The only clue is the word *exodus* written in blood on the deck of an abandoned ship.

Exodus: Ultima III, a captivating multiplayer arcade adventure game by the Lord British programming team, is the most sophisticated game of the Ultima series. It picks up the story line begun in Ultima I and Ultima II and sends you on another mysterious quest. You do not need Ultima I or Ultima II to play Ultima III.

The object of Ultima III is to find out where the great evil resides, discover how to exterminate it, and then do so. In Ultima I and II, a single hero could destroy the evil sorcerer Mondain and the enchantress Minax. In Ultima III, one hero is not enough.

Ultima III warns "bare is the back who hast not kin to protect it" and allows up to four adventurers to play at once. Each player creates and manipulates one character—a computerized alter ego—to find clues and fight battles across the width and breadth of the land. The program can hold up to 20 characters on disk.

To create a character, you choose a name up to 13 letters long; pick a sex male, female, or other; and pick one of the five races—human, elf, dwarf, hobbit, or fuzzy. You then pick a profession from the 11 choices—fighter, cleric, wizard, thief, paladin, barbarian, lark, illusionist, druid, alchemist, or ranger.

Finally, you divide 50 points among four attributes—strength, dexterity, intelligence, and wisdom. As in Ultima II, the higher the point total, the better the attribute. During this adventure, too, you will be able to add points to attributes. You must be very shrewd in picking a race and a profession and in assigning points to your attributes. Each race contains limitations on attribute-point totals, and these points affect a character's profession. Essentially, this means certain races are better suited for certain professions.

For example, a fuzzy, which looks and acts like an ewok from *Star Wars*, does not make an effective fighter. Its strength—a prime requisite for a fighter—can only increase to 25. A fuzzy would make a good wizard, however. Its intelligence, which controls magic spells, can increase to 99.

Each character's equipment includes food; gold pieces to buy weapons, armor, information, and other items; and hit points that determine how much damage a character can take before it dies.

The party of four characters, represented by an elaborate stick figure, wanders the face of Sosaria in search of clues and treasure. Ultima III's graphics, like those in Ultima II, include rolling blue oceans, spotted green grasses, blue-and-green swamps, green forests, and majestic purple mountains. Unlike Ultima II, with Ultima III you can see only part of the surrounding countryside on your screen. Adventuring can become pretty intimidating and frustrating when only a small "window" of the land is visible.

When you explore deep dungeons or high towers, spectacular three-dimensional graphics greet your eyes. Long corridors fade into the distance, and you do not know what lurks inside rooms

until you actually open the door.

Like Ultima II, Ultima III lets you enter the purple cobblestoned streets of towns and castles. Again, you see only part of the town at one time.

The big improvement in graphics occurs during battle. In Ultima II, one character fights against one monster.



Sometimes, when the monster decides to retreat, you have to chase it hundreds of miles to strike it down. In Ultima III, the real-time battles take on a new look and feel with four players.

When characters and monsters clash, the program magnifies the area and turns the screen into a tactical arena. The four characters appear on the bottom of the screen with a group of monsters at the top. Players control their characters individually during combat. Only one side may emerge victorious after battle.

As the monsters charge, characters fire arrows and cast spells from long range. As the monsters close in, players maneuver their characters for hand-tohand combat. Swift sword strokes eventually vanquish one side, but not before numerous orange auras flare around those who have been hit.

The controls governing movement are the same as in Ultima II. Pressing the Return key, / (slash), right-arrow, and left-arrow keys moves the party north, south, east, and west respectively. Again, Ultima III contains letter commands ranging from A, for attack foe with weapon, to Z, for a status report on a character.

The game's only drawback is crowding four people around an Apple. You can have more of a battle reaching the keyboard than on the screen. Since Ultima III features real-time play, slowpokes could end up losing their turn. A better arrangement might be to have one player act as a master typist to enter all the commands.

Documentation

The 20-page "book of play" provides an adequate set of instructions. Since much of Ultima III is based on your ability to discover various facets of the game, the instructions provide few tips on actual play strategy. The well-illustrated digest contains numerous illus-

trations of towns, shops, citizens, and monsters.

Ultima III includes a 13×21 -inch cloth map of Sosaria with pitifully few details. It teases you with various locations to visit, such as the City of Yew, Castle of Lord British, and City of Fawn, but not a spot on the map tells you where they are.

The map also fails to mark the location of the mysterious moon gates, which Ultima II called time doors. The moon gates, which provide instantaneous travel through Sosaria, appear and disappear with the phases of the twin moons, Trammel and Felucca. The map shows the phases but not the gates. **Spell Casting**

Ultima III lets you cast 16 cleric and 16 wizard spells, far more than Ultima II's 9 spells. *The Book of Amber* lists the wizard spells, and *The Ancient Liturgy of Truth* contains the cleric spells. Each 20-page booklet contains a spell description as well as an imaginative ritual for casting.

For example, the "Lorum" spell reads: "Before entering any dungeon, cave, or even any houses, with unsteady lanterns, be sure that thou hast prepared a goodly supply of Lorum dust. This is easily done by collecting the fine dust from a spider's bath, which has been warmed by a strong sun for many hours.

"Gather the dust into a chamois bag and seal the sun's energy within it by singing these words: Obrey Uricum Obla Sum. To release the energy, chant these same words in reverse order, and cast a small portion of dust into the air. A warm, soft, magical light of short duration will be produced."

In actual game play, you just press *C*, for *cast magic spell Lorum*. These types of embellishments, present throughout Ultima III, add to the flavor of the game.

Ultima III borrows heavily from the popular fantasy role-playing game Dungeons and Dragons which also features group play, sword and sorcery action, and a quest for triumph over evil. As in Dungeons and Dragons, players compete against the situation, not against each other.

Ultima III is a tough game as well as an extensive adventure. It is so challenging that Origin Systems offers a players' guide, called *Secrets of Sosaria*, that details the land, magic realms, clues, and dungeons.

Ultima III is an excellent sequel to Ultima II, which is already an impressive sequel to Ultima I. The imagination, riddles, arcade action, superb graphics, and fine details make Ultima III a challenging and enjoyable game. In the realm of computer adventure games, Lord British deserves to be crowned king.

PART II OF A REVIEW OF FIVE SHAPE-UTILITY PROGRAMS

The first part of this article, which appeared in last month's A+, introduced the concept of shape tables. It also reviewed two software packages, Accu-Shapes and Apple Mechanic, for creating shapes and shape tables. In this second and final installment, you'll find a review of Higher Graphics II, Pixit, and Shapes in Color, as well as general hints for using shape tables. HIGHER GRAPHICS II

At one time Higher Graphics II was the only program that provided full shape-table editing for the Apple II series of computers. The Shape Shuffler utility was reason enough to purchase this program.

The 24-page manual is easy to follow, but you will seldom need to refer to it, since every mode in the program is preceded with on-screen instructions. A section of the manual is devoted to high-resolution routines, but these apply only to Integer BASIC. The author refers you to the Applesoft manual for further information.

The demo effectively shows how to use animated shapes and shape fonts. It includes a shape table of 60 shapes, as well as a complete ASCII shape font.

Higher Graphics II is composed of three modules: The Shape Maker, the Shape Shuffler, and the Screen Creator. Pressing the Escape key, in any mode, presents you with a list of options, and pressing the space bar displays the commands, which are mnemonic and easy to remember.

The Shape Maker program creates tables of up to 255 shapes. A count of shapes and bytes used and remaining appears at the bottom of the screen. When you begin, the program asks if you want to start a new shape table or load an old one. If you start a new table, you must enter the number of shapes your table will contain. You cannot change the size of the table after you set it, so you should input a number higher than the number you think you will actually need. Then you get a large crosshair cursor in the center of a blank screen. You can choose to work with or without the cross hair, but you must start your shape in the center. You use D, U, L, and R to plot your shapes.

You can toggle your plotting on and off. The cursor is one step behind your directions, so when you press D, U, L you will not see the downward move until you input the upward move, you will not see the upward move until you input the move to the left, and so on. This delay is disconcerting at first, but you can learn to compensate. The program lacks a background grid, and the crosshair cursor is difficult to line up, so you can easily lose your place if you look away from the screen.

Only Higher Graphics II, of all the programs we're looking at here, allows you to design your shape in any scale, rotation, or color. You can change these options at any point during the shape's creation, so you see the shape exactly as it will look upon completion. Another excellent feature is Z-shapes, which lets you display any shape in your table anywhere on the screen, at any angle or scale, to use as a reference for your new shape. This is helpful when you are designing a series of shapes with moderate changes for animation. Editing of the shape in this case is limited to removing the last two or three moves you plotted.

When you finish the shape, the program draws and xdraws it. If you are satisfied with it, the shape is compiled and saved to the table, and you can go on to the next one. If you are not satisfied with the shape, you respond N when the program queries you, and it erases the shape. A screen message says Try again, and you end up back at the blank screen. This is the most obvious flaw in the program. You expect to return to the screen with the shape intact so that you can take another stab at editing it, but instead, the shape that you may have been working on for quite some time just disappears.

The Shape Shuffler program allows you to load two tables and shift shapes from one to the other. You can display any shape from either table or see all the shapes in a table, 50 at a time, and they may overlap. You can insert a shape from table 1 into table 2, delete a shape, or transfer a shape from table 1 to the end of table 2. A word of caution here: When I deleted the first or the last shape from a table, I ran into trouble. Even though the program showed the new table without the deleted shape, when I used the table in a regular Applesoft program, the "deleted" shape was still there, and the last shape was distorted.

The Screen Creator module lets you design background screens for your shapes. You can draw with lines or dots or you can load a shape table and place any of the shapes on the screen in any color, at any angle or scale. If you load in a shape font, you have the same flexibility. Adding text upside down or verti-

cally is quite easy. You can move your screen up, down, left, or right, and you can load a reference screen onto hi-res page 2.

Higher Graphics II is a complete shape-utility program. At one time I would have recommended it without hesitation, but some of the newer shape programs do just about everything this

Pixit is a menu-oriented program that is easy enough for a novice of any age to use.

The documentation, a 38-page manual, is concise and easy to read, with sample screens to aid you in following the tutorial. The manual provides comprehensive instruction on the use of the program, but more information on using shapes and shape tables would have been helpful. The demo is effective, with appealing sample animation. The disk comes with a large selection of shape tables and fonts.

When you enter the Shape Creator, the program asks you to choose a drawing scale from 1-7, and the scale you select determines the degree of magnification on the screen. If you choose a magnification of three or greater, you also receive the option of using a grid. Next, you select the beginning plot position, which can be top left, left center, bottom left, or center. You can change any of these choices while you are working on your shape.

The Shape Creator has two sets of cursor-move keys. I, J, K, and M move and plot, and A, W, S, and Z move without plotting. You can backstep with the arrow key to correct errors. You can back up one, two, or five moves, or all the way back to the beginning of your shape. Control keys allow you to move forward or backward through your shape.

When you have completed your shape, simply return to the function menu and choose the option that lets you compile your shape table. After you give it a name, the table is saved to disk. You then decide to create another shape or return to the main menu. This particular utility does not allow you to create complete shape tables; you create one shape, save it, create a shape, save it, and so forth. To assemble the shapes into a shape table, you use the Shape Table editor.

The Shape Creator includes a utility called The Shape Sourceror, which allows you to load any shape table from disk, review the shapes it contains, and select one for editing. The Sourceror uses the same commands as the editor. **Shape Table Editor**

The Shape Table Editor is as easy to use as the shape maker. You load a shape table, scan its shapes one at a time, and select as many as you want to go into the new table, up to the maximum of 128 shapes. Your options are on the screen at all times. You can add shapes (to the end of the new table), insert them (between any two shapes already in the new table), or delete them from the new table. You can scan the new table as well as the source table. When you have finished creating your new shape table, it is saved to disk.

The Picture Editor

This program allows you to draw your shapes on the hi-res screen and add lines, circles, color, and text (see figure 1). This flexibility is useful for creating standard hi-res pictures from your shapes, backgrounds for animations, and charts. After loading in a shape table, you can display, move, rotate, scale, draw, or xdraw any of its shapes, in the standard Apple hi-res colors. The color-fill option has 16 colors and patterns.

The Printer Graphics Dump

This utility is extra for those who have an Epson MX-80, FX-80, MX-100, or FX-100 printer with the Graftrax option and a standard parallel interface. You can send your hi-res pic-



tures directly to the printer, without leaving the Pixit program.

Pixit is a complete shape utility program. Its author intended it for use in schools, and its design is virtually foolproof. My only criticisms of Pixit concern the Picture Editor utility, but for shape creation and manipulation, I highly recommend this program.

SHAPES IN COLOR

Shapes in Color is the only one of

hapes in Color is the only one of these shape programs that creates multicolored shapes.

these shape programs that creates multicolored shapes. You save the shapes with a 199-byte color directory that precedes the shape directory.

The 52-page manual effectively covers the use of the program, including a step-by-step tutorial for creating an image of a candle and a summary of commands. In addition, it has several documented sample programs for using hi-res graphics and shape animation.

The excellent demo includes five attractive shape fonts, as well as animations and screen displays that use six different shape tables. A series of multicolored cards shows the potential of creating shapes in color. Shapes

When you enter the Shapes program, you see a cluttered hi-res screen that includes a violet, 15×15 -pixel plotting grid-you can also choose a different grid size, ranging from 5×5 to 40×25 —and a green "field grid" in the lower right corner. The manual pronounces, "Each time the cursor is moved out of the display window (or field), it 'wraps around' to the other border of the display. The marker in the field grid indicates the new field being plotted in. If the field marker leaves the field grid, it disappears until the plotting marker has returned to a field that is within range of the field grid display. (This has no effect on the shape being drawn.)" Confused? Simple and elegant are not the words to describe this software.

On the same screen, directly above the green field grid, a small rectangle represents the relative size of a shape that would fill the entire plotting grid. Above the plotting grid is a color chart that shows the colors that you can plot. In the upper right corner is a color bar that indicates the shape color that you have selected. If you are working on a partially completed shape table, the first and last shape in memory are also displayed. When these shapes overlap the grid, you press T and Return to remove them, but you can call them back again when you need to refer to them. You can view the entire shape table, in groups of 20, by pressing R. The shapes may overlap.

Every time you want to plot a point, you must press P, because the program lacks plotting. When you plot on the grid, you get a magnified shape. (The actual-size shape appears below the grid and on hi-res page 2.) If you work on a large shape, you may be unable to see the entire shape on the bottom of the screen, so you must press Z to see your shape on page 2, and then press Return to go back to page 1. If you want to see the shape in its actual size while you are working, you can continue plotting on page 2, but you won't have a cursor. To find your place, you can press the space bar and a small cross-hair cursor appears momentarily. To see the length of your table, you must press ?.

Background

The Background program allows you to design background screens for use with the shapes, as well as for the creation of title pages and other graph-

ics displays. Unless you are thoroughly familiar with the graphics-screen layout of the Apple and you have prepared a complete rendering of your design on graph paper, you will have a great deal of difficulty with this utility. You input lines, shape placement, and color blocks by keying in the exact x, y coordinates. You can't take a shape, move it around to see how it will look, and then draw it. To draw freehand, you use ten keys to move the cursor horizontally, vertically, or diagonally. T toggles between continuous and manual plotting, and when the T option is set to continuous, you have to hold down a direction key and the Repeat key to get a continuous plot. Modify

This utility allows you to transfer shape tables from one disk to another, to construct a table of shapes by combining shapes from one or more tables, and to edit tables. You can delete shapes from the end of a shape table, change the name of a table, review the shapes in the table, append shapes to the end of a table, expand a table, and insert and replace shapes in a table. To edit shape tables, you work with three files-the original; a second, temporary one to hold the shapes you will be inserting; and a third, new file that you'll create by combining the original and temporary tables. **Other Utilities**

Convert allows you to take a standard Applesoft shape table and convert it to the format Shapes in Color requires. Hardcopy allows you to get a printout that gives you the date, the name of the shape table, the number of shapes in the table, and the length of the binary file.

This program, more than any of the other packages we've looked at, ex-

plains everything you need to know about working with shapes and shape tables. The demos and the documentation are superb. Using the utilities, however, is frustrating. I found Shapes in Color to be the most difficult program of the five I reviewed.

WEIGHING THE CHOICES

No one shape-utility package will answer all your needs. Each offers options that are unavailable in the others. You must decide what your priorities are and select accordingly.

Working with Applesoft shapes can be challenging and fun. With a good shape-creation program and the hints provided here, the possibilities are endless.

program for database management

elcome to our ongoing series of tutorials on the increasingly popular microcomputer data-management tool dBASE II. If you have been following along through the last ten installments in A+, you should now be fairly adept in many of the rudimentary as well as some of the more complex techniques for creating data-

bases, storing information in them, and keeping that information up to date. We've also covered most of the approaches for data retrieval, including the use of sorted and indexed databases as well as "operators," memory variables, some "functions," and commands that accomplish large-scale modifications of an interaction between existing data files.

Another command that falls under this last category is Update. Update can be a real timesaver in systems that use several interconnected databases. Before we get started, though, here are a few points for newcomers:

Tutorial Conventions

These tutorials contain many examples. Sometimes I ask you to type in a command, and then dBASE II responds. Just to differentiate between what you do and what dBASE II responds with, the lowercase words are the ones you type. Uppercase works too, so it doesn't really make a difference—it's just clearer this way. Some examples may

specifically ask you to type uppercase letters but these cases always involve a series of words between quotes. The dBASE II responses are usually in uppercase letters. All screen interactions are in different type to distinguish them from the text. To make these sections more readable, carriage returns are implied rather than included.

In the command-syntax examples, words between square brackets (e.g., [scope]) indicate an optional phrase or "argument."

Instant Update

The basic gist of Update is that it lets you modify an existing database with information from another database. Say you have two files that overlap in some way. For example, your stereo retail shop may have an inventory list as well as a receiving list. Each time you receive new stock, you append the receiving list in dBASE II, recording the items. Sometimes the items' prices have changed, and you need to record this information.

After several shipments have arrived, you want to bring your inventory list up to date, reflecting your increased stock and possibly altered prices. You can take care of this chore by printing out the receiving list and then editing the inventory file by hand—a tedious process. Or you can let dBASE's Update command do it automatically.

Finding clearly written information on the Update command isn't easy. In this respect, Update is a bit like the

subtotal option in the Report command (which I did my best to render less obscure in a previous issue.) To make things worse, the command has many options. In version 2.3 of dBASE, the Update command is limited, but 2.4 expanded it a lot. See figure 1 for the full syntax.

After reading this syntax the first time, I was lost, too! Let's get a handle on it by starting with an example of the simplest form of the command on the databases in figure 2 (please create them if you intend to follow along).

See what happened? The records I marked with the arrows have been updated as follows: The quantity field has been added to, and the Cost and Price fields have been replaced. The rec-1 database supplied the data for the changes. A translation of the command we used goes something like this:

dBASE II:

UPDATE ON part:numb FROM rec-1 ADD quantity REPLACE cost,price English:

Dear Computer,

Open the inv-1 file first. Then look at the rec-1 file, starting at the top. Compare the part number in the rec-1 file with the part number in the open file (inv-1). If they are the same, add the quantity in the rec-1 file to the quantity in inv-1 and replace the cost and price fields with the cost and price fields in rec-1. If the part numbers aren't the same, then figure out which one is smaller in value. Skip forward one record in whichever database has the smaller value and try the whole thing again.

A few things to remember:

- You must open the database you are modifying with Update by invoking the Use command before updating, and you must index or sort it on the "key" field (the one you're using for the comparison—in our case, PART :NUMB.)
- The other database (called the From database) must meet two requirements:

1. It must have at least some fields in common with the

- Use database (same field size and type).
- 2. It must be sorted on the "key" field.

Once you feel comfortable with the general idea of Update, we can expand on it with further complications (or opportunities, depending on your orientation). First, look back at the full syntax again. Notice the clause

[<field> WITH <fromfield>]

What does it mean? Well, just in case your field names in the From and To databases don't match, this clause eliminates the need to do the Copy Structure-Modify Structure-Append routine necessary to change field names without destroying data. So, let's say the Cost field in rec-1 is called Cst. The command will look like this:

- UPDATE ON part:numb FROM rec-1 ADD
- quantity REPLACE cost with Cst, price

Cost in the first database will be replaced by Cst in the second database, and Price in the first will be replaced by Price in the second.

Finally, let's consider the Random clause. If you use this clause, then dBASE assumes that the From file is not sorted into order but is instead in random order. This clause is handy if you don't have time to do a sort (which can take eons on large files). The catch is twofold, though:

1. The To file must be indexed (not sorted) on the Update key, and that index must be in use.

2. The Update key must be a single field key only and one that can "match" index entries in the To file. This restric-

tion arises because dBASE uses the Find command internally to do the update when you stipulate the Random clause. You see, keys *can*, at other times, be created from parts and values of several fields in combination, but that technique is not allowed in this instance. One thought: Say you want to update an inventory file from a sales file. Since Update can only add and replace, subtracting an item from your inventory may be impossible. So there you have it. The combinations are endless and the limitations a bit obscure until you experiment with this command for a while.

OPTICAL CHARACTER READERS

Q. Our school library has an Apple II Plus with 64K RAM, one floppy-disk drive, and a Corvus 10-megabyte harddisk drive. We are typing the information from our card catalog into the Apple in order to convert our card catalog to a computer database. Typing in all the thousands of cards has been going very slowly, and we estimate that it will take between six and eight years to input all the cards at the current rate. Is there some type of optical character reader that will enable us to get the information into the computer more quickly?

A. Several types of optical character readers (OCRs) are available that can read your card catalog into the computer. The fastest, most versatile machine I know of is the Kurzweil Data Entry Machine from Kurzweil of Cambridge, Massachusetts. This OCR can read all types of printed materials quickly and can transmit the data to your Apple, using an RS-232 serialcommunications link. The drawback of the Kurzweil is that it is an expensive machine costing tens of thousands of dollars. One solution would be to rent time on a Kurzweil if you can locate one in your area. A lower-cost solution is to use the new hand-held OCR called Omni-Reader from Oberon International of Irving, Texas. This device is slower and less sophisticated than the Kurzweil, but it only costs around \$500. This device also connects to your Apple via an RS-232 serial port and can read an 80-character line of text in two to three seconds. The Omni-Reader is a new product that I have seen only in a demo, but it looks like a significant new peripheral that delivers a lot of performance for a low cost. We'll be taking a closer look at the Omni-Reader in an upcoming issue of A +.

MAIL MERGE

Q. I am having difficulty setting up a form letter to automatically fill in names and addresses using Apple-Works. Currently I have to cut and paste each name and address individually, which slows the process down considerably. Do you know of an instruction, command, or shortcut?

A. The AppleWorks program and its cousin, III E-Z Pieces, are both a bit clumsy at merging a mailing list into a form letter. In order to remedy the situation, you will need a utility program such as Habamerge from Haba Systems, 15154 Stagg Street, Van Nuys, CA 94105; (213) 901-8828. Habamerge retails for \$69.95 and is available in a version for either AppleWorks or III E-Z Pieces.

SCREEN CLEANING

Q. Help! I have an Apple Monitor III, and my screen is so dusty that I can no longer see it without at least some difficulty. I've tried using a household cleaner, but that only makes the situation worse. I now have deposits between the ridges and ribs of the screen. I've been looking around for some type of commercial screen cleaner but, alas, to no avail. What should I do?

A. The Monitor III and the Lisa both have antiglare filters covering their screens in order to reduce the eyestrain and fatigue that can be caused by the glare of light reflecting from the glass surface of the screen. The "ridges and ribs" you refer to are actually the fibers of a woven material that comprise the glare filter.

Apple provides a specially treated chamois cloth for the purpose of removing dust from the filter. If this special cloth doesn't do the trick (and in your case, I'm sure it won't), then Apple suggests cleaning the filter with a lint-free cloth moistened with a small amount of isopropyl alcohol (don't use the cloth provided with the monitor). If the filter is still dirty, you'll have to remove the filter and either thoroughly clean it

You should not try to remove the filter from a Monitor III, since you might damage the monitor. Instead, bring the monitor to an Apple dealer or service center.

If you're a Lisa owner, you can easily remove the front panel of the Lisa to remove the filter, but you should not try to remove the filter from a Monitor III, since you might damage the monitor. Instead, bring the monitor to an Apple dealer or service center, and the personnel will be able to clean or replace your antiglare filter.

IMAGEWRITER WITH MAC

Q. I have had an Imagewriter printer for about six months that I have been using with my Apple IIe. I recently bought a Macintosh and was told that it was compatible with the Imagewriter printer I already owned. I obtained a Macintosh/Imagewriter cable from my dealer, but the printer still does not work correctly. What could be the problem?

A. Your problem is that the Imagewriter must be configured differently for the Apple IIe and for the Macintosh. Although the Imagewriter can work with any of the Apple computers, it contains some small on/off switches called DIP switches that must be set differently for various computers. You can reveal two small banks of switches by removing the top section of plastic from the printer. The two banks of switches are labeled SW 1 and SW 2. Figure 1 shows the proper configuration of the switches for the Apple II and III series, and figure 2 illustrates the correct switch settings for the Macintosh and Lisa computers.

writer dot-matrix printers this summer ended up affecting sales of the Macintosh, since the Imagewriter was the only printer the Mac was designed to work with. Many people are suggesting that Apple should have made the Macintosh compatible with other brands of graphics-capable printers. I've heard talk that other printer manufacturers are thinking hard about making their printers "Imagewriter-compatible" to cash in on the demand.

An intriguing rumor about why the Imagewriter printers were in such short supply is making the rounds. It seems the hang-up was due to a shortage of the Intel 8085 microchip, a critical component of the Imagewriter's internal circuitry-interesting, considering that IBM owns a significant chunk of Intel. Hmmm . . .

Sales of the Apple IIc were also slowed this past summer by lack of

Monitor IIc, mouse, external disk drive, Scribe printer, Imagewriter, and various cables. Apple promises to increase availability of these products this fall, in time for the year-end buying season. By that time various third-party suppliers should also have competitive products ready for sale.

LETTER QUALITY FOR MAC

Although Apple is hurriedly working on making the Macintosh compatible with the Apple Daisy Wheel Printer, several other companies already offer ways to hook up daisy-wheel printers to the Macintosh. Two companies with a Macintosh letter-quality printer hookup are Applied Creative Technology of Dallas, Texas, which offers a hardware solution called the Printer Optimizer, and Assimilation Process, of Los Gatos, California, producer of a software solution called the Mac Daisywheel Conproducts in upcoming issues.

C COMPILER

Softworks Unlimited of Chicago, Illinois, recently announced a C compiler for the Macintosh. It allows you to develop applications that run up to 200 times faster than similar applications that use Microsoft's MS-BASIC for the Mac. The Softworks Unlimited C compiler works with Apple's new 68000 Assembler software and supports all of the Macintosh's 500 ROM calls. The C compiler works in a 128K Mac, a 512K Mac, or a Lisa 2. The C compiler should help accelerate the development of Macintosh software.

HUGE MAC ORDER

Apple Computer recently received an order for 13,000 Macintosh computers from the University of Texas, which is the largest single order for any product that Apple has ever received. Other colleges and universities such as Dartmouth and Stanford have also increased their orders and can't get Macs fast enough. The Mac seems destined to replace the stereo as this year's "status" electronics item for college students.

COMPATIBLE BATTLE

Apple-compatible computers do not constitute nearly as large a market segment as do the IBM-compatibles, but the imitators and the imitated are still slugging it out. The best-known Applecompatible is the Franklin Ace, produced by Franklin Computer Company, which declared bankruptcy just a short while after Apple won a major copyright battle with it. Foreignmade clones such as the PineApple from Asia and the Wombat from Australia have also lost out in the courtroom

Nevertheless, more and more compatibles are still being rolled out. Some of the newcomers include the Eve II from CTI of East Rutherford, New Jersey; the Sekon 64z from Sekon Systems of Santa Monica, California; the Laser 3000 from Video Technology of Elk Grove Village, Illinois; and the Alex 500A portable computer from Comp-U-Save of Skyland, North Carolina. We'll be taking a closer look at Apple compatibles in an upcoming issue of A+.

CLUB MAC

Club Mac was formed April 1, 1984 as a national users' group to support the Macintosh computer. The annual membership fee is \$35 and entitles you to a monthly newsletter, telephone support from 8 A.M. to 5 P.M. (Mountain Time), a club disk with some software and utilities for the Macintosh, and access to an on-line bulletin-board system.

APPLE II MISSILE LAUNCHER

Pentagon officials recently showed Congress an Apple II computer that was configured as a nuclear-missilelaunching system. No, it wasn't a new part of America's defense system. The military bigwigs were simply out to convince Congress that shipping Apples overseas poses a threat to our national security. This situation must cause Steve Jobs considerable consternation. Did the Pentagon forget that counterfeit Apples are available worldwide? The U.S. trade deficit is bad enough already without the military trying to stop shipments of American-made microcomputers.

MUPPET MANIA

The Muppets are certainly making their mark on microcomputer technology. Koala Technologies of Sunnyvale, California, producer of the KoalaPad, has teamed up with Jim Henson, creator of the Muppets, and come up with a fabulous new keyboard designed for kids. The new keyboard is called Muppet Learning Keys, costs only \$79.95, and is designed for children aged 3 and up.

The Muppet Learning Keys look like things that kids might find in their desks: ruler, small blackboard, watercolor set, eraser, compass, and arithmetic exercise book.

These objects are beautifully integrated to perform the functions of a computer keyboard. For example, pressing the eraser deletes a character, and the four points of the compass are the four cursor arrow keys. Kids should

To further boost the Muppet's move to microcomputers, Jim Henson Associates, Joyce Hakansson Associates, and publishing giant Simon and Schuster have teamed up to produce educational software for kids. The new software will be sold under the Muppet Institute of Technology label and includes such titles as Kermit's Electronic Story Maker and The Great Gonzo in Word Rider.

▶ 512K MAC ON THE WAY

Rumor has it that Apple will be able to make good on its promise of a Macintosh with an expanded 512K bytes of RAM. Apple has reportedly obtained more than two million of the necessary 256K RAM chips at a cost of more than \$20 each. If this information is correct, you may have to spend around \$1000 to upgrade your Mac to 512K, since 16 of the precious chips are necessary for the upgrade.

Apple has already started to make the 512K Macs available to Apple-certified software and hardware developers. In fact, a good number of developers have been using 512K Macs for several months to work on new, more powerful Macintosh products.

HABA DABA DOO!

Chaz Haba, CEO of Haba Systems, Van Nuys, California, claims that his company sold more than a million dollars worth of its Habadex program (see our review of the Apple III version in this issue of A+) for the Macintosh during the first month the program was offered. The \$200 package is a combination appointment calendar and Rolodex. If Haba's sales claims prove to be accurate, they certainly bode well for Macintosh software developers.

SONY, APPLE ALLIANCE

Apple Computer and Sony have signed an agreement that gives Sony the right to all of Apple's hard-disk technology under a special licensing agreement. Under the agreement, Sony will supply Apple with hard-disk drives, beginning in 1985. Sony is already supplying Apple with 3¹/₂-inch floppy drives for the Macintosh and Lisa and may supply hard-disk drives for these machines as well.

This alliance should be advantageous to Apple, since Sony is the most highly regarded Japanese electronics company. The agreement opens the door to future cooperation on other R&D projects—Sony's expertise in electrical engineering and consumer electronics could be a great resource for Apple.

Sony is reportedly strong in the area of CMOS technology, which is important for the development of lap-size and portable computers, such as the Apple IIc. Rumors are starting to circulate that Apple is thinking of cooking up a lap-size Macintosh, and if these rumors are true, Sony's CMOS technology could really come in handy.

Ile SALES RECORD

When the IIc was introduced earlier this year, various market-watchers predicted that sales of the popular IIc would cut heavily into sales of the IIe. Sales of the IIe have remained strong, however, and the market-research firm InfoCorp has therefore revised its estimate of how many Apple II-series computers will be sold in 1984. InfoCorp previously predicted that 750,000 Apple IIs would be sold this year. Since sales of the IIe are stronger than expected in the education, business, and scientific marketplaces, however, Info-Corp now predicts that 900,000 Apple II computers will sell by the end of the year. This figure would represent a new sales record for the Apple II.
