Your August editorial indicated that home application is a problem for a good number of potential computer users. I have a unique use for my Apple. Although I use it for most of the same domestic functions that other home users do (budget, word processing, spreadsheet, and games), I have another use for it, too.

I have hooked it up to the furnace for the heating season and to a fan and air conditioner for the cooling season.

The Apple, or any micro with access to its communication bus, is remarkably well suited to this application. I have read other articles about similar applications, but the functionality programmed in was little more than what a wall thermostat does. The computing power, speed, and flexibility of the microcomputer allows not only complex direct control but also text and graphic display of current and historical data. It can look at trends and predict what will occur in the near future. It can also learn from its past prediction errors and be self-adaptive, getting better with time and changing with seasonal fluctuations.

All these capabilities have been built into my programs, which have been running for the past two years. The result is greater comfort at reduced operating cost.





COMPUTERS IN SCHOOL TO STAY

More than a third of all college students will own personal computers by 1987, according to a new study by Talmis, Inc., a Chicago market-research firm specializing in education. From 1982 to 1983, the number of college students with personal computers tripled, from 250,000 to 750,000. Colleges are beefing up their own purchases of microcomputers, too, from 190,000 last year to about 500,000 in 1987.

Elementary and secondary schools also feel the computer boom—a study by Mazer Corporation speculates that the number of microcomputers in grades K through 12 will jump from 333,000 last year to 1 million in 1987.

Strangely enough, however, yet another study shows that most students probably encounter computers first at home, rather than in class. The School of

Education at Stanford University surveyed 12 schools in the San Francisco Bay Area and found that one in three high-school students used computers at home or with friends, but only one in eight had taken school computer courses. (This may be related to another finding that only 7 out of every 80 faculty members knew how to use computers.)

But it wasn't strange at all to find that a quarter of the students polled in this computer-intensive silicon center had already used a computer before high school. Hey, you think kids got nothing better to do than watch "Star Trek" reruns all afternoon?

YOUR COMPUTER'S MID-LIFE CRISIS

Machines don't age, eh? Don't bet on it. It's only now that computers have been around for more than a couple of years that we're seeing the ways a computer's arteries can figuratively





harden—cataracts begin to cloud the monitor, the keyboard develops a gentle palsy, the joystick sticks, and the disk drives sag.

But you can stave off your Apple's mid-life crisis a little longer by going through a few basic maintenance steps, says Erik Sandberg-Diment of the New York Times. You can't send your computer out to jog a few laps around the track every morning, but you can try these tactics:

- Seek and destroy dust.
 Dust is to computers what plaque is to teeth and arteries: it builds up and eventually damages the host surface. Vacuum your keyboard (gently!), and don't miss the spots around the outside of the disk drives, near the cooling slots and exhaust fans, and the assembly seams.
- Don't forget your printer as long as you're in the dustseeking mode. A can of compressed air is better than the blower setting on your vacuum cleaner. Clean printing elements individually.

· Your older monitor may develop the equivalent of wrinkles, "visual echoes," if you leave it on too long. That's because the electron beam producing your monitor's image eventually etches an image into the phosphorus of the screen. It's better not to switch your computer off and on if you step away from it for a few moments, but the opposite holds true for the monitor. Let it get its beauty sleep. • Finally, investing in a dust cover will save you vacuuming time. Don't put an electronic air purifier, or ionizer, in the same room with your computer wheth-



THE MOON'S A BALLOON, THE WORLD'S A COMPUTER

Did the universe begin not with a bang, but with a byte?

That's one viewpoint now percolating through scientific circles. At a conference sponsored by the research company Thinking Machines, Inc., held near Boston late last summer. scientists from assorted disciplines gathered to ponder the possibility that the structure of atoms and molecules, the neural pathways of our brains, and all the other physical processes and events we currently think of as "chaos" may best be studied as components of some unimaginably huge computer.

Joseph Traub, a computer scientist at Columbia University in New York, said that information processing is superseding mechanics as our basic pattern for understanding the universe.

Traub told the Los Angeles Times: "In the history of

science we've always had some kind of model to explain the world. After Newton, it was masses and springs... But computer concepts are now being used to build models in physics and biology.

"For the next few decades, the computer is going to be the paramount paradigm used to build models. It's going to dominate our lifetimes."

Not that this "computer of computers" is anything like an Apple, or even a Cray 2, you understand. It's that the sheer complexity of the universe seems to arise from simple rules applied to simple building blocks—nucleotides in DNA, atoms in a rock—and that the process operates strikingly like a computer does. It's all in how you organize the information.

In fact, even though our current level of mathematics couldn't begin to crack the code, Thinking Machines scientist Daniel Hillis speculates that "maybe chaos is really a computing machine."





Adding elements from computer-aided engineering (CAE) to computer-aided design, the system acts as a specialized database, report generator, simulator, compiler, and presentation package, all rolled into one.

For the drawing stage, the big advantage of computer-based systems is the ease with which you can replicate and modify existing elements. In drawing schematics with most CAD packages, you can pick from an existing library of circuit elements or create library elements of your own. Then you can make copies of those items, placing them in your drawing as you need them. If you make a mistake or want to try out a change, you can erase parts of the diagram, add new lines, or even start over.

For the analysis stage, the package models the operation of the elements that you've combined to form the circuit. Without so much as warming up a soldering iron, you can get a good idea of whether your circuit produces the proper outputs or sticks permanently at some erroneous level.

When you have a circuit working the way you want, the more complex packages will tell you how to wire it. Using database-like subsystems, these programs produce a list of every pin and connection in the circuit, along with a

list of all wires leading into and out of that point (called a netlist).

Last, the package can draw out charts, diagrams, and graphs of all the simulations. Because scale is not important for this type of drawing, a printer with a graphics card will do, but you'll get the best results if you use a plotter rather than a printer.

Software authors are now creating Apple-based CAD/CAE systems for many schematic systems other than electronics (see the CAD/CAM/CAE chart in this issue). Among them are plumbing, industrial hydraulics, and a host of other fields that make extensive use of schematic diagrams.

A Ouestion of Scale

Scaled-drawing systems for Applesize computers also cover a wide range of complexity. At one end of the spectrum, you have simple paint programs with optional grid lines and, at the other end, systems that can accomplish tasks that required a large mainframe a few years ago.

Paint programs merely draw lines and fill in areas right on the screen in response to your inputs with a mouse, light pen, joystick, or other controller. Some programs accept inputs from digitizer tablets or video digitizers, so you can also trace existing material or add video images to your drawings.

Just like editors that operate on the "what you see is what you get" philosophy, paint programs store and work with your diagram as an actual screen image, so you see exactly what you're

doing. On the other hand, these programs can't accept or remember details smaller than the finest dot on the screen (up to 1024×1024 dots for the Apple II with special cards such as the Number Nine RGB card and up to 512×342 dots for the Macintosh).

With a paint program, you have to do almost all the geometric work yourself. The program, at best, can create straight lines or smooth curves, but it knows nothing about perspective, shading, hidden lines, or three dimensions. A trained draftsperson can often do the job faster and better with a pencil and paper. On the other hand, a paint program lets you turn out useful drawings

of simple regular objects, even if you've never learned to draw a right angle.

A 2-D (two-dimensional) drawing package lets you produce the same kind of image that you might with a paint program, but you go about it in a different way. Instead of drawing directly on the screen, with this type of program you give the computer a set of instructions for what you want done, which, in turn, drives the software to draw the specified image.

Because the computer translates the instructions into an image in a 2-D program, you can specify objects by their dimensions and location and have the program put them on screen, instead of trying to make everything line up yourself. The computer can make lines of any specified angle, curve, or shape and keep all elements precisely positioned.

In addition, because the image is not stored entirely in the screen memory, you can work with scales and details that would not fit in a paint program. You can enter far more information than what fits on the screen, using the free space in the main memory and, in the case of some programs, on disk. The image you see on the screen is derived from your instruction list and often con-

tains only a small part of the total available information.

As another result of this separation between image construction and presentation, 2-D drawing packages are more flexible than others. You can scale objects (make them proportionately bigger or smaller), translate them (move them up and down or sideways), or rotate them. If you want to look at one region of the drawing more closely, you can zoom in. If you want an overview, you can zoom out. If the screen is showing only a portion of the diagram and you want to see another one, you can pan across or up and down to the correct spot.

When you change the scale or view on a 2-D program, objects that are off the screen are not lost from memory. With a paint program, if you squeeze an image horizontally until you have lost some level of detail and then expand the image again, you can't retrieve the details. With a 2-D program, if you compress an image and lose details, the details return when you expand the image again.

Last, because 2-D software can turn the instructions for drawing an image into the commands a plotter needs or into the commands that display it on

the screen, a 2-D program can produce hard-copy output with as much detail as is present in the original input, rather than only what can fit on the screen.

Three Dimensions

Most of the interesting design problems in the real world involve three dimensions, not just two. A CAD system for professional use generally employs 3-D (three-dimensional) methods, which allows it to work on either two-or three-dimensional objects. Naturally, just as on a paper diagram or picture, three-dimensional objects appear two-dimensional, but a series of visual conventions indicates the missing dimension.

Two major differences mark the step from CAD packages that draw in two dimensions to the more advanced programs that draw in three: The 3-D packages handle hidden lines and they provide perspective. Hidden lines are the edges and surfaces of a three-dimensional object that you don't see because some other plane or object is in the way (on a two-dimensional image, all lines are always visible). Perspective is the seeming foreshortening of certain lines that occurs with three-dimensional objects and that must be reproduced in a two-dimensional rendering of such an object if it is to look 3-D.

Hidden-line removal is the more difficult task, and many programs for Apple-size computers omit this feature. Instead, they present drawings of solids as "wire frame" models showing the edges as lines and the surfaces as transparent. Because you can see through the transparent parts, and since lines that overlap simply are superimposed to form a single line at the intersection, there are no hidden lines—and no prob-

lem with their removal. Programs that show solids as solids, however, must calculate whether each edge and surface is visible, a slower and more complex process.

Perspective drawing is easier, and most Apple 3-D drawing and CAD packages include this feature. Using a set of trigonometric transformations, these systems can figure out what the apparent length and angle of a line or segment should be, based on the viewing angle and true position.

scaled drawings often offer many of the database and reporting features that those intended for schematics do. In addition to producing properly scaled drawings, most systems let you annotate your diagrams with text, combine two or more drawings, or temporarily superimpose them in layers.

Apple's CAD Future

The cost of big, commercial CAD systems for designing large buildings or complex chips such as microprocessors runs into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, equivalent to the price of a score of Apples and their software.

If you look at CAD/CAM/CAE on Apples, you'll find that most new personal-computer software has already outgrown the memory size and power offered by the eight-bit processors used in the Apple II family. What these new programs need is more memory, finer screen resolution, and a more powerful processor.

If you look at the Lisa and the 512K Macintosh, compared with the Apple II family, that's exactly what you find. The large and growing number of Macintoshes should give software authors the incentive they need to produce CAD programs for these machines. The capabilities are there, and some rumored developments at Apple should make the Mac an even better graphics machine. It may not be long before you can sit down and do some serious design work on your Mac—such as designing your next computer.





CAD/CAM

A short glossary

CAD/CAM or CAD-CAM

An acronym for computeraided design/computeraided manufacturing. The term covers a range of systems that use computers to help in the design of electronic or mechanical products and in the transfer of that information.

CADD

Abbreviation for computeraided design and drafting.

CAE

See computer-aided engineering.

COMPUTER-AIDED DESIGN (CAD)

A system for using a computer to assist in creating electronic circuits or mechanical products. You create the design as a drawing or set of drawings on a video screen, using graphics commands to make lines, boxes, curves, and other elements. For best results, the output is sent to a plotter not a printer.

Most CAD packages include software for interactive drawing, databases for parts, and often rule-checking programs that test to make sure the design follows specified practices. CAD systems that emphasize additional design and engineering tools are known as computer-aided engineering (CAE) systems; systems that emphasize finished drawings are known as computer-aided-designand-drafting (CADD) systems.

COMPUTER-AIDED ENGINEERING (CAE)

The use of computers to help

engineers create, specify, and debug products. The term is used for computer-aided design (CAD) systems that provide additional engineering tools, such as programs that simulate the operation of an electronic circuit or the stress distribution of a steel beam.

COMPUTER INTEGRATED MANUFACTURING (CIM)

The complete linking of the design, manufacturing, and testing process through an exchange of computerized information. CIM starts with computer-aided engineering (CAE) and computer-aided design (CAD), produces the product with computer-aided manufacturing (CAM), using computerized numerical-control machines (CNC); then CIM tests the result with automated testing equipment (ATE). Apple's automated factory for producing the Macintosh contains many elements of CIM.

CONNECTIVITY

On electronic circuits, the number of circuit paths between two parts. If connectivity is high, it is helpful to locate the parts physically close together. Most computer-aided-engineering (CAE) systems for electronic design generate a connectivity list, showing all wires and other connections to each pin and junction in the circuit.

DIGITIZE

Turn an image into a list of coordinates. If you are going to work with an existing object, digitizing and entering its coordinates is the first step in the process of entering it into a computer-aided-design system. You can use a digitizing pad (including one made by

Apple) for flat images. Three-dimensional objects require more complex input devices.

ELEVATION

A two-dimensional image representing an object as seen from the side. Users can create elevations in orthogonal (right-angle) drawings as well as in perspective.

ENTITY

In computer-aided design, an object—such as an arc, plane, or cube—that is a basic building block from which users can construct drawings. Entities can acquire assigned characteristics, and users can replicate entities and combine them into more complex objects.

FLOATING POINT

Systems that internally store object coordinates as floating-point (fractional) numbers. Although it takes longer to make calculations and draw images with this method than it does using only integers, floating-point numbers allow smooth scaling, zooming, and scrolling. Most CAD systems for eight-bit processors (including the Apple II family) use integer coordinates; many programs for the 16- or 32-bit machines (such as the Macintosh and Lisa) use floating point.

INTEGER-BASED

CAD and drawing systems that keep coordinates as integer numbers rather than as numbers with fractions. Integer-based systems are much faster and require smaller amounts of memory (just as Integer BASIC is smaller and faster than Applesoft), but they cannot do smooth scrolling, scaling, or zooming.

LAYER

A single-image plane that combines with other layers to make a composite picture. For example, on a design for a circuit board, one layer might show the traces on one side of the board, another layer the traces on the reverse side, a third layer the solder masking, a fourth the silk screen for labels, and a final layer the components.

PAN

Move the displayed part of a drawing from side to side or up and down. The image translates (moves) in space. Note that the panning motion in computer graphics and CAD is not the same as a pan in film and video, where a translation is done with a dolly cross or elevate, and a pan is a rotation from a single point rather than a translation in space.

SCALE

To make an object in a drawing proportionately larger or smaller. On integer systems, this operation must be done in fixed steps. On floating-point systems, scaling can be continuous.

SKETCH

To draw freehand on a computer-aided-design system. Strangely enough, this is harder to do on many of the large, expensive systems than on systems based on Apples (because larger systems use a more complex way of keeping track of images). When you actually create the drawing by changing the screen image itself, this operation is known as painting.

VIEWPORT

What the computer-aided-design world calls on-screen windows (sections of the screen showing different programs or different aspects of the data).



ing/engineering process. Apples produce detailed drawings and/or reports that technicians use to manufacture anything from electrical circuits to concrete columns to ball-bearing mounts. CAD-Who, What, and Why

Peter Kendall is the marketing manager for Apple-based CAD products from Chessel-Robocom Corporation. About computer-aided drafting and design, Kendall says, "The types of people who use our system are architects, engineers, designers, manufacturers, draftsmen, educators who are teaching CAD, hobbyists, and graphics designers—just about anybody who has a need to create pictures for later reuse."





drafting task on a microcomputer. But when you talk about floor plans, space planning, construction detail, and all the kinds of routine drafting work that are common to any drafting task, CAD certainly can offer productivity gains."

Today's CAD systems also boast attractive cost-to-benefit figures. Kendall explains, "The typical architect who buys a microcomputer-based CAD package is one who can't afford a \$100,000 minicomputer-based CAD system that will do 95% of his job, so he settles for a \$7000 microcomputerbased CAD system that does 80 or 85% of what he needs to do. He doesn't need the other 10% for the extra \$90,000."





One architect who agrees is Brian Johnston, president of Architects North. After 18 years in the business, Johnston recently purchased his first CAD system from Chessel-Robocom Corporation. "For my small firm, it's a must. A CAD system gives us a chance to be a little more creative and a little more time to do a few more things—maybe improve our profit margins."

Tom Barron also fits Kendall's description of a typical CAD user. As president of Heist Engineering, a chemical-engineering consulting firm, Barron uses CAD software from Ditechs to complement his written reports to illustrate them to clients. Barron ex-

plains, "The type of diagrams we do are chemical-engineering diagrams and process flowcharts that show the different vessels in a process, the pipes between them, and the pumps and compressors. A typical report of ours might be somewhere between 150 and 250 pages long, and we might have 50 figures in it."

Because CAD is directly tied to drafting, draftspeople may be the group that benefits the most. According to Jim Atkins, draftsman/consultant/owner of Computer Drafting Services, his Ditechs CAD system is "an allaround drafting tool. It takes the need away for everything that a normal draftsman has on his desk—the triangle, the T square, everything. He can throw away all his old tools."

CAD/CAE and Building Construction

Consider for a moment all the work that goes into the construction of a building. CAD/CAE on Apples can perform many specialty jobs, including structural engineering and HVAC—heating, ventilation, and air conditioning.



the firm use Apples for its engineeringsoftware needs. Why? Because, compared to more expensive specialized CAD hardware and software, as Pardoen emphatically states, "Apples provide much more bang for the buck."

On their Apples, Englekirk and Hart use structural-engineering soft-ware from ECOM Associates, Inc., whose offerings include steel-column and -beam design, reinforced-concrete-column and -beam design, flat-slab analysis and design, and general frame and truss analysis.

A typical design and engineering scenario begins with an expensive, specialized CAD/CAE workstation that determines a structure's seismic load requirements. Next, based on these requirements, Apples go to work designing specific structural components, such as slabs, columns, and beams, that conform to accepted building standards.


Brian Esser has capitalized on the ROBO System's custom-symbol-library feature. Symbol libraries are collections of objects that are predrawn and stored on disk for subsequent repeated use. As an engineer with Stove Plumbers Supplies, an industrial-automation and -plumbing supplier, Esser designs control panels that house all the

components that control a building's environmental and safety conditions, including HVAC, smoke alarms, and lighting.

Esser draws a control panel by retrieving components (from his own custom library of control components) that are appropriate for each building's requirements. Once all the necessary controls are on the screen, Esser relates, "I wire them, I end up with a functional diagram, and I print it. Then I take it home and build the panel."

For Esser, since every building's control panel is "similar to but never the same as the others," the ability to design control panels with his own library

of components provides a definite edge. Apple-Based Breadboards

Charles Groves, associate professor of engineering at the Colorado School of Mines, teaches senior-level design courses in advanced analog-signal processing. Groves and his students use Micro-Cap, an electronic-circuit-design and -analysis package from Spectrum Software. The circuits they are learning to design are signal filters for geophysical instrumentation used in earth exploration.

Groves describes Micro-Cap as a "computer-based electronic bread-board." Electronic breadboards are what circuit designers produce to test

their designs. The breadboards require manual fabrication with a circuit board, electrical components, solder, wire, dexterity, and time. With a tool such as Micro-Cap, designers simply design their circuits and analyze their functionality right on the Apple. If modifications are necessary, changes are easy to make. Groves estimates that this Apple-based analysis takes one-tenth of the time required for a traditional pencil-and-paper analysis—again, a significant productivity gain.

Another Micro-Cap user is John Massey, who runs Electronic Innovators, an electrical-engineering-consulting firm. Without Micro-Cap, Massey says, he'd be down in the lab "using up parts and trying things that don't work." Not only does Massey save on materials and time, but he also saves on hardware and software costs. Specialized equipment for Massey's work sells in the \$35,000-plus range. Instead, Massey designs his circuits on his Apple: "I play with it until I like it and then take the design down to the lab and build it."





Digitizers such as the Houston Instruments Hi-Pad are typically controlled with mouse-like pucks; a mouse by itself is not a preferred input device because of its difficulty with fine detail and precision accuracy.

Display choices start with standard-resolution monochrome monitors and range up to high-resolution color monitors that require special graphics cards such as the Number Nine Board from Number Nine Computer Corporation (see A+, August 1984, pages 68-71). The intended application dictates the display requirements. CAD is best suit-

ed to high resolution, and color is an effective enhancement. On the other hand, CAE programs that focus primarily on calculations and simulation usually run on standard-resolution monitors.

On the high end, a variety of single-pen and multipen plotters (2, 4, 6, or 8 pens) accommodate a range of paper sizes from $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches to 24×36 inches. The ROBO System uses a variety of plotters available from Hewlett-Packard and Houston Instruments. The output quality of pen plotters is outstanding (see figures on pages 32-37).





▶ BOOK EXCERPT/BY PAUL FREIBERGER AND MICHAEL SWAINE

This month we are beginning a two-part series on the history of Apple Computer, Inc., excerpted and condensed from the new book *Fire in the Valley*, by Paul Freiberger and Michael Swaine, which chronicles the development of the personal-computer industry.

This installment presents the modern-day Horatio Alger story about two guys named Steve who sold a Volkswagen and two calculators to start a company that was destined to become the first corporation

to make the Fortune 500 list in only of the Apple I and learn how and how Apple became a major player five years. We follow the development it evolved into the Apple II, in the personal-computer industry.


FIRE II IT

The Apple I had only the essentials. It lacked a case, a keyboard, and a power supply. The hobbyist owner had to connect a transformer to it in order to get it to work. It also required laborious hand-assembly. Woz spent a lot of time helping friends implement his design.

Steve Jobs saw an opportunity in this skeletal machine. He suggested that they start a company. Woz reluctantly agreed. The idea of turning his hobby into a business bothered him a little. But Jobs persisted. "Look, there's a lot of interest in what you've done at the Homebrew Computer Club," he argued. Since he wouldn't have to leave his job at Hewlett-Packard, Wozniak conceded.

The two soon sold their most valuable possessions—Jobs, his Volkswagen microbus, and Wozniak, his two HP calculators—to pay for someone to create a printed circuit board. The PC board would save them the trouble of assembling and wiring each computer—a task that was driving them to 60-hour weeks. Jobs figured they would be able to sell the boards at Homebrew.

But Jobs set out to do more than sell them to hobbyists. He also began trying to interest retailers in the Apple. At a Homebrew meeting in July 1976, Woz

gave a demonstration of the Apple I. Paul Terrell, one of the industry's earliest retailers, was in attendance. Jobs gave Terrell a personal demonstration of the machine. "Take a look at this," Jobs told Terrell. "You're going to like what you see."

Jobs was right. Terrell did like the machine. He told Jobs that it showed promise and that he should keep in touch. Terrell meant what he said. The machine was interesting, but there were a lot of sharp engineers at Homebrew. This computer might be a winner, or some other machine might. If Jobs and Wozniak really had something, he figured, they'd keep in touch.

The next day Jobs appeared, barefoot, at the Byte Shop. "I'm keeping in touch," he said. Terrell was impressed by this confident perseverance. He ordered 50 Apples. Visions of wealth flashed before Jobs's eyes. But Terrell added a condition. He wanted the computers fully assembled. Woz and Jobs were back to 60-hour workweeks.

They had no parts and no money to get them with, but with a purchase order from Terrell for 50 Apple I's, Jobs and Woz were able to obtain net 30

days credit. Jobs didn't even know what net 30 days credit was at first. Terrell later received several calls from suppliers who wondered whether the longhaired kids really had the guarantee from Terrell that they claimed.

They were in business. But though they knew they could work together under time pressure, they also knew they couldn't do this task alone. The parts had to be paid for in 30 days. Thus they had to build 50 computers and deliver them to Paul Terrell in 30 days. Jobs paid his sister to plug chips into the Apple I board. He also hired Dan Kottke, who was in town for the summer from college, telling him, "You've got to come out here this summer. I'll give you a job. We've got this amazing thing called 30 days net."

Terrell got his 50 Apple I's on the 29th day. The 200 or so Apple I's that were eventually built were sold through a handful of computer stores in the Bay Area and through United Parcel from Jobs's garage for \$666. Jobs ran the business.

By the end of the summer Wozniak had begun work on another computer. The Apple II would have several advantages over the Apple I. It would be a complete computer with a keyboard and power supply, BASIC, and color graphics all built into an attractive case. Jobs and Woz made provisions to sell just the circuit board to hobbyists who wanted to customize the machine. For output, the user would hook it up to a television set. They agreed it was going to be the hit of Homebrew. Jobs hoped it would have a much broader appeal.

When the features of the Apple II became clear, Woz and Jobs argued over its price. Jobs wanted to sell the board alone for \$1200. Woz said that if the price were that high, he wanted nothing to do with it. They finally decided to charge \$1200 for the board and the case.

Now they had at least the outline of a real commercial product, and Jobs's ambition flowered. "Steve was the hustler, entrepreneur type," said Woz. Jobs wanted to create a large company. He sought advice from Atari founder Nolan Bushnell, who introduced him to Don Valentine, a successful venture capitalist in Silicon Valley. Valentine suggested that he speak to a friend of his. Although Mike Markkula was now retired, Valentine had a hunch that this former Intel executive would be interested in Jobs and Wozniak's machine.

In 1976 A. C. "Mike" Markkula

had been out of work for over a year. His unemployment was deliberate, self-imposed, and rather pleasant. Markkula had done well for himself during his tenure with two of the most successful chip manufacturers in the country: Fairchild and Intel. He was uniquely suited to the work. Though a trained

clectrical engineer who understood the possibilities of the microprocessor, at Intel he worked in marketing, and friends said he was a marketing wizard. He certainly loved the job. Beyond the excitement of the technology, Markkula enjoyed forging a large company in a competitive environment. Outside the hobbyist community few people understood the potential of microprocessor-based technology as well as Mike Markkula. No microcomputer company had anyone like Markkula. No microcomputer company could afford him.

In 1976 Mike Markkula had retired. Intel stock options had made him a millionaire, and he had no financial prod to work any longer. He was a dedicated family man and wanted to spend more time at home. He planned a leisurely existence, and he convinced himself that after the breakneck pace of life in the semiconductor industry, he could be happy learning to play the guitar and taking skiing vacations at his cabin near Lake Tahoe. Friends might have observed that his investments in wildcat oil wells did not bespeak a full commitment to the idle life, but Markkula was adamant. He was out of the rat race for

In October 1976 Markkula visited Jobs's garage. Like Terrell, he liked what he saw. He wasn't violating his resolve to stay retired, he thought. He was just giving advice to two sharp kids. One couldn't even call it business, since they couldn't afford to pay him what a consultant with his experience would normally get. But Markkula was interested in their project. It made sense to provide computing power to individuals in the home and workplace. He offered

Within a few months, Markkula decided to join the corporation. He assessed Jobs and Woz's equity in it at about \$5000 and added \$91,000 of his

own money, telling the pair a one-third interest in their company was now worth that amount. Why did this 34-year-old retired executive throw in his lot with two long-haired kids in jeans? Even Markkula couldn't answer the question precisely, but by this time he had become convinced that Apple could make the Fortune 500 list in less than five years, a feat never before accomplished. The idea hooked him. He couldn't stay out.

Thereafter, Markkula set the tone for the company. He helped Jobs with the business plan. He obtained a line of credit for Apple at the Bank of America. He told Woz and Jobs that neither of them had the experience to run a company and hired Mike Scott as its president. Scott, known as Scotty, was a seasoned executive who had worked for Markkula in product marketing at Fairchild. He was accustomed to a traditional business environment, and for this reason would later have problems with Woz's work habits.

The first decision Markkula made was to retain the name Apple. He recognized the simple marketing advantage of being first in the phone book. He also believed that the word Apple, unlike the word computer, had a positive connotation. "Very few people don't like apples," he said. Furthermore, he liked the incongruous pairing of the words apple and computer. It would be good for name recognition, he realized.

The Evangelist

By the fall of 1976 Woz had already made progress on the design of his new computer. The Apple II would embody all the engineering savvy he could bring to it. He had made it considerably faster than the Apple I. There was a clever trick he wanted to try involving color too. The Apple II would be the com-

puter Steve Wozniak would like to own.

As Wozniak had worried about forming his own company, he worried about working full-time for it. He always enjoyed his job at Hewlett-Packard. In particular, he admired the company's emphasis on quality design. He was having a good time. Woz had shown his Apple I design to the managers at Hewlett-Packard with the hope that he could convince the company to build it. But they told him that the Apple was not a viable product for HP. It made more sense for a start-up company to sell it. HP eventually gave Woz a release that permitted him to build the machine on his own. But Wozniak made two more attempts to join computer development projects at HP and was turned down for the project that eventually developed into the HP 75 computer and for work on a hand-held BASIC machine.

As good an engineer as he was, Woz could only work on projects that interested him, and then only for as long as they interested him. Jobs understood his friend's genius better than anyone. He constantly urged Woz on, and this pressure sometimes led to arguments.

One thing that Woz did not want to design, and perhaps could not design, was the device to connect the computer to a television set. Another was the power supply. Both devices required skill in analog electronics and differed from the digital electronics that Woz and Jobs had been working with. The internal circuitry of the computer was basically on/off: one thought of voltages as high or low, present or absent, 1 or 0. To design a power supply or send a signal to a television set, one had to consider actual voltages and interference effects. Woz didn't know or care about these things.

Again Jobs turned to one of his former superiors at Atari, Al Alcorn, for advice. Alcorn suggested that Jobs consult with Rod Holt, a sharp analog engineer at Atari.

Holt told Jobs that as an Atari engineer, he felt helping Apple represented an obvious conflict of interest. Besides, he added, he was expensive, at least \$200 a day. But that didn't worry Jobs. "We can afford you," Jobs said. "Absolutely."

Holt liked the brash kid at once. Regarding the conflict of interest, Jobs told him to check with his boss and that it would be all right. "Steve is a nice guy. Help the kids out," Holt recalled Al Alcorn telling him. He started working in the evening at Atari on the televi-

sion interface and the power supply, concentrating on the latter. He also persuaded Jobs not to challenge FCC regulations by trying to build an interface for a television set. Holt knew that the FCC could cause them distress over the interface issue and told Jobs so. Jobs was frustrated at first, but then hit upon a clever way out of the problem. He made it a simple task for others to design the modulators to link the computer to a television set. If laws were broken or regulations bent, the malefactor wouldn't be Apple-at least technically.

Rod Holt was not the first employee Woz and Jobs hired. That honor went to the friend who had introduced them to each other several years earlier, Bill Fernandez. As a formality, Jobs gave Fernandez a test before officially hiring him. Fernandez answered a series of questions about digital electronics before going to work in Jobs's garage manufacturing the Apple I's. Fernandez practiced the Bahai faith, and he spent many hours discussing religion with Jobs in the garage.

Other early employees were highschool students Chris Espinosa and Randy Wigginton, Woz's friends from the Homebrew meetings. After the meetings the trio would often return to Woz's house and continue discussing means of improving the capabilities of the Apple I to turn it into something

Espinosa and Wigginton were hobbyists, but of a different sort than either Jobs or Woz. They had no special expertise in designing a machine. Rather, they enjoyed writing programs. When Woz brought the Apple I to Homebrew, they would quickly write some programs to demonstrate the machine to club members. Woz had built a working prototype of the Apple II by August of 1976, and he loaned one to Espinosa, who began developing games and demonstration software. By actually using the new computer, the self-confident teenager was able to suggest

ways to better its design.

Jobs was just then facing his biggest challenge in persuasion. By that time the company had coalesced. Markkula had agreed to join Jobs and Woz. The final obstacle was convincing Woz to leave his job at Hewlett-Packard to work full-time for Apple. Markkula would have it no other way.

In October of 1976 Woz wasn't sure he wanted to make this move. Steve

Jobs was panicking. All of his carefully wrought plans depended on Woz. Then, one day in October, Woz said that he would not do it. "Steve went into fits and started crying," said Woz. But Jobs's self-control wasn't lost for long. He began lobbying with Woz's friends, having them call Woz to get him to change his mind. The effort was successful. Woz had been afraid that designing computers full-time might not be as much fun as it had been in Homebrew. Somehow his friends helped him overcome this fear. At the time Woz believed, at his most optimistic, that they would sell no more than 1000 Apple IIs.

But Jobs was more ambitious and he aggressively set out to get people who could help him-people like Regis Mc-Kenna, owner of one of the most successful public relations and advertising firms in Silicon Valley.

Jobs had already placed an ad in the computer magazine Interface Age. But he had also seen the Intel ads and was impressed enough to call the semiconductor company and ask who had done them. Regis McKenna, he had been told. Jobs wanted the best for Apple, and he decided that McKenna was the best. He was going to get McKenna.

McKenna's ads had indeed been very good for Intel. McKenna wore suits and had a large desk and photographs of his favorite Intel ads on his walls. He spoke softly and reflectively and appeared the antithesis of the unkempt and pushy kid who had walked into his office that afternoon in cutoffs,

sandals, and what McKenna called a "Ho Chi Minh beard." But since Mc-Kenna normally took start-up companies as clients, Jobs's garb did not frighten him off, although he took note of it. "Inventions come from individuals," he reminded himself, "not from companies." Jobs was certainly an individual, McKenna thought.

At first McKenna turned Apple down. But Jobs had never taken rejection passively and he persisted in his efforts. "I don't deny that Woz designed a good machine," said McKenna. "But that machine would be sitting in hobby shops today were it not for Steve Jobs. Woz was fortunate to hook up with an evangelist."

McKenna eventually agreed to take Apple on, and right away his firm made two important contributions. The first was a colorful design that has served as the company logo ever since. Initially, Jobs feared that the multicolored picture of an apple wouldn't work, that the colors would run together. But when the first metallic labels arrived for the Apple II, he loved them.

McKenna also decided to run a color ad in Playboy magazine. It was a bold, expensive grab for publicity when a cheaper ad in Byte would have reached virtually all the microcomputer buyers of that time. "It was done to get national attention," said McKenna, "to popularize this idea of low-cost computers."

Other companies had been selling microcomputers for two years, but no one had yet tried to excite the general public's imagination in this way. Apple's publicity campaign resulted in articles in national publications, articles not just about Apple but about small computers generally.

By February 1977 Apple Computer had established its first office in two large rooms a few miles from Homestead High School in Cupertino. Desks were brought in, and lab benches were trundled over from Jobs's garage. The night before they were to begin working in the new suite, Woz, Jobs, Wigginton, and Espinosa sat in different parts of the 2000-square-foot office playing a game with the telephones, each trying to buzz one of the others' phones first. "We never thought that we'd grow up to be battling one-on-one with IBM," said Espinosa.

In early 1977 the young company faced more modest tasks: to finish the Apple II design by the time of Jim Warren's First West Coast Computer Faire in April and then ready it for production shortly thereafter. Markkula was already signing up distributors nationwide, many of whom were eager to work with a company that would give them greater freedom than MITS had and also functional products.

Steve-Wozniak is justly credited with the technical design of the Apple I and Apple II. However, an essential contribution in making the Apple II a commercial success came from Jobs.

Most early microcomputers were far from attractive as consumer fare. Typically they were ugly, drab, blue metal boxes. Steve Jobs decided to pick up the look of the product. He covered it with a lightweight beige plastic case that brought the keyboard and computer together in a modular design. Woz could design an efficient computer, but he cheerfully admitted that he didn't care whether wires dangled from the side or not. Jobs realized that the Apple had to look presentable.

It took much travail to ready the Apple II for the West Coast Computer Faire. Woz worked, typically, day and night until it was done. Jobs made sure that it would be seen. He arranged to have the biggest and most elegant booth at the Faire. He brought in a large projection screen to demonstrate programs and placed Apple IIs on either side of the booth.

The First West Coast Computer Faire was a big success for Apple. Everyone seemed to like its computer, although Computer Lib author Ted Nelson complained that it displayed only uppercase letters. Jobs, Mike Scott, Chris Espinosa, and Randy Wigginton manned the booth while Mike Markkula toured the auditorium signing up dealers for the company. Woz walked around checking out other machines. He also played one of his favorite practical jokes. He decided to advertise a product that did not exist. To avoid immediate disavowals, he had



to play the prank on a company not at the show. MITS was not at the show. With the help of Randy Wigginton, Woz whipped up a brochure on the "Zaltair," supposedly an enhanced Altair computer. "Imagine a dream machine. Imagine the computer surprise of the century, here today. Imagine BA-ZIC in ROM, the most complete and powerful language ever developed," the fake advertisements purred. Woz was satirizing marketing hype as he had learned it from Jobs. "A computer engineer's dream, all electronics are on a single PC card, even the 18-slot motherboard. And what a motherboard . . . " On the back of the brochure was a mock performance chart comparing the Zaltair to other microcomputers including the Apple. Jobs, who knew nothing of the joke, obtained one of the brochures at the show and read it in dismay. But after a quick, nervous scan of the performance chart, he looked relieved. "Hey," he said, "We came out OK on this."

Magic Times

In 1977, Apple could do no wrong. It was a magic time for the tiny company, which radiated an innocent confidence. Hobbyists praised Woz's design, dealers requested the new computer, and investors sought to sink money into the company.

Right away Woz and Jobs had offered work to their friends in the Valley. Chris Espinosa and Randy Wigginton frequently came by the Apple offices after school to help develop software for the new machine. They were paid a modest hourly wage, but mostly it was fun. They enjoyed working with Woz because he was their technical mentor, the "extremely brilliant" computer ge-

nius, according to Wigginton.

In May Woz reviewed Wigginton's performance to see if he deserved a raise. His work was fine, but Wozever the stern taskmaster-demanded something more. He was irritated that he had to walk around the block to get to a nearby 7-Eleven Store. A large fence prevented his direct access. But if Wigginton would remove a big board from below a section of the fence, Woz could pass under it and Wigginton would get his raise. The next day Woz found the board on his desk, and Wigginton started earning \$3.50 an hour.

Each Tuesday and Thursday the company opened its doors to the public for a demonstration of the product. Chris Espinosa was completing his final semester at Homestead High. Each Tuesday and Thursday he drove his moped, the "first sign of [his] entering the business world," to the Apple offices and supervised the demos. Once when representatives of the Bank of America came by, Espinosa acted quickly to remove "OH SHIT" from Woz's Breakout game and replace it with "THAT'S TERRIBLE." Though boyish in appearance, Espinosa had a serious, responsible, scholarly air that impressed everyone. Jobs and Markkula were thankful that he kept the visitors engaged so they could attend to the more important task of signing up new dealers. "For about six months I was the sole means by which people off the street in the Bay Area would learn about Apple Computer," Espinosa said.

But there were also indications that Apple meant business. Markkula and Scott were growing tired of the youthful crowd that frequently dropped in to check out Woz's progress. Alan Baum, a close friend of Wozniak's from Hewlett-Packard, had even contributed ideas to the design. But Mike Scott finally decreed that some confidentiality was essential. Scott felt obliged to instill a professional atmosphere at Apple. Baum visited less and less frequently as the year wore on.

On the other hand, Scott appreciated the contributions of some of the youthful employees. He convinced Randy Wigginton to stay by offering to have Apple pay for his college education.

Mike Scott was a complex individual who was vital to Apple's success. Scott was not a smooth-talking, dapper individual like Mike Markkula. His management style was less formal, more abrupt. He liked to stroll through the company and chat with employees. He often alluded to his role in maritime metaphors. He was a ship captain, standing at the helm. "Welcome aboard," he would say to a new employee. Scott didn't hide his moods. When he was happy, he would make other employees happy too. Around Christmas time in Apple's first year, he dressed up in a Santa Claus suit and walked through the company handing out presents. But if he was displeased with someone's performance, he could let that person know it.

Scotty's bedrock goal was a desire to build a big company. But he could be flamboyant too. According to Rod Holt he had a "slush fund" for special expenses, such as an enormous hot air balloon and a large sail for Holt's yacht, each beautifully decorated with Apple's logo.

Scott quickly grew impatient when projects were delayed. At least once Woz's generosity to his friends caused friction with Scotty, who was less tolerant than Markkula of corporate eccen-

tricity. He couldn't understand Wozniak's irregular work habits, which swung from total dedication to headstrong avoidance, depending on his interest in the task at hand. Scotty also failed to understand some of Woz's friends.


Woz had kept in touch with John Draper. In the fall of 1977 Draper was visiting Woz at Apple and expressed interest in helping design a digital telephone card for the Apple. No one understood telephone lines better than Captain Crunch. Scott had granted Woz a separate office in which to work, hoping that it might encourage his creativity. John Draper went to work there too. But many of the other employees disliked Draper. He was an awkward young man with strange interests, and he made them feel uncomfortable.

Draper and Woz constructed a device that could, among other things, dial numbers automatically and function much like a telephone answering machine. But Draper also built a blue box capability into the card. The cards were powerful. According to Espinosa, a network of a dozen Apples equipped with Draper's cards could bring down the nation's entire phone system. When Scott learned that the device could be used illegally, he stalked the deck in rage. The phone card didn't last long after that, although, without Draper's knowledge, modifications were being designed into the card by other engineers to nullify most of its phone



phreak capabilities. According to one Apple board member, Scott almost tried to fire Woz during that time. Would Scott actually have made one of the company's founders walk the plank? "Scotty is the only guy that could [dare] fire me," said Woz. "That guy could do anything." Rod Holt agrees: "Scotty could fire anybody. All he needed was one excuse."

When John Draper was arrested for phone phreaking, he had an Apple with him. The machine was confiscated and Scotty cursed Woz again.

During 1977 and 1978 Woz worked on a number of accessory products that were necessary to keep Apple from falling to earth as soon as it ripened. To make the Apple II appeal to customers outside the hobbyist world, add-on peripherals were needed so the machine could work with different kinds of printers and connect with the modems that allowed users to transfer information from one machine to another over a telephone line.

Business was promising. More and more dealers signed on, and Apple began manufacturing the Apple II. By the end of 1977 the company was making a profit and doubling production every three to four months. An article in *Byte* popularized the Apple II further. Mike Markkula had also attracted investment capital from the successful New York-based firm of Venrock Associates, a firm formed by the Rockefeller family to invest in high-tech enterprises.

By year's end the company moved into a larger office on nearby Bandley Drive in Cupertino. The structure was huge, and it gave the Apple employees a feeling that the firm was going to get big. They were right. Apple soon outgrew the building and added another on the same street.

Perhaps the most significant accomplishment of this time came out of Woz's 1977 Christmas vacation.

DIGITAL RESEARC GOES FO

Seven years is a long time in the life of any small computer, but the Apple IIs are a hardy bunch, and they have proven to be the most durable and flexible of all microcomputers. One proof is that designers continue to come up with new peripherals to dress up the IIs' output and increase their processing power.

Among the more recent enhancements is the Gold Card from Digital Research, a hardware/software package that includes a high-speed Z80 processor, a built-in 80-column card, highspeed RAM, extensive documentation, CP/M versions 2.2 and 3.0, and the CBASIC programming language. The Gold Card comes in two configurations (64K RAM nonbanked and 192K RAM banked) and lends to the Apple II, II Plus, and IIe a degree of flexibility most people associate only with computers of more recent vintage.

The existence of more than 5000 CP/M programs, including such popular packages as WordStar, SuperCalc, and dBASE II, has resulted in a market rife with hundreds of dedicated CP/M machines and models equipped with a Z80 microprocessor. More people are now running CP/M on Apple IIs (and compatibles) than on any other computer, however.

CP/M did not become popular among Apple users overnight. One reason why many early Apple users were slow in adopting the Microsoft CP/M card was the cost. In addition to the \$300 CP/M card, the system also required an 80-column card, 48K of RAM (preferably 64K), a monitor capable of displaying 80 columns (many people were using their television sets with an RF modulator), and two disk drives (most systems had only one disk drive or a cassette). Remember, Apple drives cost \$500 in the early days. Finally, transforming an Apple into a business-oriented system made little sense unless you also had a printeryou didn't get much of a printer for under \$800 back then. Thus, at 1980

prices, the cost of adding CP/M could run as high as \$2000.

A Range of Choices

Microsoft's Z80 Softcard no longer has the market cornered; now a plethora of CP/M and 80-column cards is available at prices as low as \$50 each (not including software). Such inexpensive CP/M boards may perform as well as the old Microsoft card, but they are a far cry from the newer, more expensive models, which are both faster and more powerful. The software has changed, too. As microcomputers have proliferated and designers have taken them down mutually incompatible

paths, Digital Research, the creator of CP/M, has developed several varieties of the operating system to suit new generations of processors; the most widespread is CP/M-80, the version tailored to Apples and other 8-bit machines. Version 2.2 of CP/M-80 continues to predominate, but with hardware advances and increased memory limits, using CP/M 2.2 becomes tantamount to occupying a mere two rooms in an otherwise empty mansion. To keep up with the changing technology, Digital Research introduced CP/M 3.0, also known as CP/M Plus.

The Digital Research Gold Card package reflects both the hardware and software advances. After all, CP/M belongs to Digital Research, so it stands to reason that the company designed its first CP/M card to take full advantage of one of the latest editions of its software

All That Glitters...

When the card was delivered to me. I first thought there had been a mistake. The huge box looked more like it might contain a set of dishes, and its weight bore out that impression. No, the Gold Card is not actually made of gold; the accompanying manuals-1100 pages of explanations, descriptions, and operating instructions—are the heavyweights. The CP/M Gold Card User's Guide is only 44 pages long, the CP/M Plus User's Guide takes up 263, and the CBASIC Reference Manual comprises 176 pages. The rest, a separate three-ring binder, is strictly for programmers.

The Software

The card I received for review came with the full complement of RAM, and it was easy to install, although the 128K piggyback "Disk Cache" card makes it a tight squeeze when another card resides in the higher adjoining slot. Slot 8 is, therefore, the best bet. Digital Research advertises that the card works in any slot of the Apple II, but the manual specifies slots 4 or 7. Actually, the Gold Card works in all slots except 0.

The CP/M Plus software that comes with the card works with either the 64K or the 192K configuration. The software has many more features than the previous version (see chart, page 77). One immediately apparent advantage of using CP/M in its latest incarnation is that you no longer have to log in a new diskette with a warm boot (Control-C); thus, you can avoid many a dreaded BDOS ERROR ON X: R/O. Anyone who has used CP/M 2.2 will immediately recognize this improvement as a major one, and it is only the



beginning. CP/M Plus also takes advantage of the Gold Card's on-board real-time clock interrupt. Unlike battery-powered clocks, it has to be set each time you turn on the computer, but it keeps time well. Entering DATE produces the date and time in the format Fri 06/22/84 23:04:25, and DATE C keeps the clock display running until you press any key.

I ran it for close to five hours without losing more than five seconds. Being able to produce the date and time on the screen is fine, but the practical application of this feature uses CP/M Plus' ability to label files in a directory with the date and time. This function is useful for determining when a file was last updated.

Owners of Apple II and II Plus machines will welcome Newkey, a command that lets you temporarily redefine the keyboard. The Apple IIe is equipped with an adequate keyboard, but it is no secret that the Apple II and II Plus keyboards leave much to be desired. The Newkey command remedies some of the shortcomings by letting you redefine any key with a simple data file.

The supplied utilities disk contains the Newkey command file and two sample data files—one with a definition called WORDSTAR.KEY and definition called one with a NORMAL.KEY. The former redefines keys specifically for use with WordStar, and invoking the latter returns the default setting. You can write your own definitions, too (using the CP/M line editor-ED.COM-or your word-processing program), and save them on a disk containing the program to which they apply. The manual is too general to deal with this Apple II-specific solution, but the disk contains a help file that lives up to its name. One use of Newkey is to move it and the two sample files, WORDSTAR.KEY and NORMAL.KEY, to a disk containing WordStar and then save the following batch file as WST.SUB:

NEWKEY WORDSTAR.KEY WS NEWKEY NORMAL.KEY

Entering the command WST invokes the built-in batch processor, with the following results:

- 1. Keys are redefined for WordStar.
- 2. WordStar is activated.
- 3. Keys return to default (normal) values on termination of WordStar.

If you get a 64K version of the Gold Card, you can later upgrade it to a capacity of 192K RAM with a Disk

Cache piggyback card. It sells for \$325 and uses a 192K systems disk that accompanies the 64K version of the card. The main board is the same for the 64K and 192K configurations, so even if you start with the 64K version, you get the advantages of a system-clock speed of 6 MHz, as opposed to the Softcard's 2 MHz. As the comparison chart on page 77 shows, however, the added RAM gives the 192K version some significant additional advantages.

Speeding Up

If you have ever used a pseudodisk, you know that zipping from one place to another is a breeze when your text or data is in RAM; the fully equipped Gold Card works the same way. For instance, scrolling one screen at a time (using Control-C), I moved from the top of a ten-page WordStar file to the bottom. In the process, WordStar accessed the default disk about a dozen times, but the text was simultaneously being loaded into the Gold Card's RAM, so when I scrolled back to the top of my file, the process took no measurable time, and the disk did not have to be accessed at all. From then on, find-and-replace functions were almost instantaneous.

Considering its speed, the built-in 80-column-display generator, and the advantages of being able to run CP/M Plus, the 64K Gold Card is a vast improvement over the old Z80 Softcard, but it also has the edge when you compare it to the newer generation of CP/M cards. Other new cards have similar features (see "Comparing CP/M Cards," A+, March 1984, page 51), but only the Gold Card has up to 192K of TPA (transient-program area), the region of memory where transient programs execute; a full 80column video-display generator; compatibility with Apple II, II Plus, and He; and CP/M Plus.

Now, not all that is gold glitters. For example, you will not be able to use the Gold Card's 80-column-display generator or the extra RAM in DOS. This limitation may not matter to you now, but as more and more advanced programs are written for ProDOS, having all that memory available on the board and not being able to access it will be wasteful, and having two 80-column generators will seem unnecessarily redundant.

Then, too, I was alarmed by the heat this card generates; it is worse than the first Videx card, and that was almost bad enough to make the chips flee from their sockets. If your Apple is already

crowded inside, don't add the Gold Card without having a good fan. Since I had no intention of moving my Apple II Plus around, I overcame the heat problem by adding a fan and placing the power supply on the outside.

Is It for You?

So who should buy the Gold Card? I found the Gold Card's performance impressive, and everything I tried worked as advertised, but, with Z80 cards selling for as little as \$50 (without software) and older cards already installed in so many Apple II, II Plus, and IIe machines, owners may find it difficult to justify spending \$775 or \$495 for the Gold Card.

Granted, these are the list prices set by Digital Research, and many of us have developed an aversion to paying the manufacturer's suggested list price for peripherals when there are attractive alternatives. Discounted or not, the Gold Card will probably remain relatively high-priced, but the price is right if the card is not duplicating something you already have and if you really want to turn your Apple II, II Plus, or IIe into a serious tool. Also, if you are using your computer for a task that makes heavy use of the processor, the Gold Card will provide a dramatic increase in the speed of the computer's operation.

I have barely touched the surface in describing the advantages of CP/M Plus over version 2.2, but although I still am not sure that the Gold Card is the best hardware to get, I can vouch for the software.



GRAPHING YOUR OBASE DATA

Isaac Newton noted that if he deserved credit for any significant achievements, it was because he had stood on the shoulders of giants. Similarly, many personal-computer companies today owe their accomplishments to products that have come before.

One of today's giants is dBASE II, and outside software developers have eagerly created add-on utilities, enhancements, and application programs for dBASE in an attempt to catch a free ride to the top. Of these firms, Fox and Geller, of Elmwood Park, New Jersey, has gained attention by strongly marketing three programs: Quickcode, dUtil, and dGraph.

I have spent some time experimenting with these packages, and here are my findings.

QUICKCODE

Imagine. It's 3:00 P.M. on Friday, and your boss is wondering where those programs for dBASE II are that you were supposed to come up with this week. There you are, struggling away, writing modules for editing, appending, reindexing. Another ***SYNTAX ERROR***! Sound familiar?

Suddenly, from between the raster lines on your CRT appears your Electronic Fairy Godmother with a copy of Quickcode. Within two hours you have read the manual and created several programs, complete with formatted screens, report generation, MailMerge interfaces, and label printing.

Can it be true? Well, partially. QuickCode is a program generator, a

program that creates other programs. Without too much hassle, Quickcode "writes" dBASE II programs that can meet elementary database needs, using your specifications. These programs can be stand-alone fully functional systems or separate modules that experienced programmers can subsequently alter or rearrange to suit more complex tasks.

Creating Databases and I/O Screens

First you design a data input/output screen that suits your fancy, complete with field names, types, and whatever prompts you want on your screens. Designing the screen is simple with a fullscreen editing mode called Quickscreen (similar to ZIP, dBASE II's screen editor). By placing special reserved codes and names on the screen, you declare the size, number, and location of field and memory variables you need. Userdefinable control codes move the cursor, set margins, center text, and draw lines. Quickcode uses your single screen layout to create supplementary screens and code for appending, editing, and displaying data.

Once you've designed your I/O screen, you have two choices. You can elect to fine-tune your system, or you can have Quickcode generate programs using the newly created layout. Choosing the latter option requires a slight delay while Quickcode and the computer process your design. After the pause, you get ready-to-run programs that work with dBASE II, complete with fully structured database tem-

plates. Some fine-tuning is usually preferable first, during which you declare the nature of your variables, lengths of fields, and so on. If you don't, Quick-code can give you undesirable results because of the default values—as many as 79 spaces for a character field, for example, which can waste considerable space on your disks.

Using the Fine Tuning option brings up a mode similar to Modify Structure in dBASE, only with more columns. In this mode, you can specify the parameters of your data fields. You can set a field's data type to any of the following formats, which control the appearance of your data when you enter it or display it on the screen:

Type Example Numeric 0.000 asd" \$i Character Dollars 999.99 Date 00/00/00 Telephone (000)000-0000 Social Security 000-00-0000 Logical Y/N

Two more impressive capabilities that can save you a great deal of coding are data validation and default value of fields. You can direct your system to check for the correctness of new data with minimum/maximum range checking, list checking, or validation involving "lookup" data in an indexed file. Finally, you can tell Quickcode to fill a given field with a default value each time you add a record to the database, which spares you from repetitive

data entry if all or most of a field is often the same.

What You Get

The programs you end up with are straightforward and fairly simple to use. You even get a main menu that ties them all together. On-screen prompts tell you what to do in most cases. Appending and editing are easy. To search for data, you use the top field on the screen, unless you chose otherwise when creating the system. Once you've found a record, you can edit, delete, or print it easily.

You can also "dSCAN," which means that you can type in a line of dBASE code that, if the syntax is right, (and it'd better be—otherwise the program bombs) uses dBASE's Locate command to find a particular record using fields other than the index key.

Issuing the Report command results in dBASE's usual confusing prompts if the report-form file doesn't already exist.

Finally, a labels/forms printing option prints out hard copy of exactly what appears on your screen or mailing labels in 1-up or 4-up format. You can also use dSCAN for selective label/form printing.

The Pros and Cons

One of Quickcode's limitations is that it allows only 9 characters (instead of the usual 10) in database field names. Thus, you may have to rename fields in existing databases if you plan to use them with Quickcode-generated programs.

Quickcode also has some notable file and index restrictions. You can use only one database per set of generated programs, and you can employ only one key file (index file) with this database. Creation of multiple indexes is possible, but you have to design a separate set of programs, complete with screen I/O and other associated files. Since each system keeps only one index up to date, you must regularly rebuild the other indexes if they are to be accurate.

In the good-news department, installation is easy, and Quickcode includes numerous on-screen help and error messages, most of which are helpful. Also, the documentation is well written, and voluminous at 165 pages. Explanations are clear and concise, with numerous examples.

Quick and Easy Programs

The manual emphasizes from the start that Quickcode cannot generate intricate programs, but it can handle simple data entry, retrieval, and reporting, as well as form generation. Once I

became familiar with the few bugs running around in this program, it seemed to work acceptably. My success in raising action via Fox and Geller's phone number (which is even printed on the manual!) bodes well for the uninitiated.

Personally, I like writing dBASE II code by hand, but if you don't mind doing some experimentation, giving up about half of dBASE II's power, and reading another manual, you and Quickcode can churn out lots of quick-

and-easy programs in a snap. If you have to turn out lots of relatively straightforward dBASE code, Quick-code may be the answer—assuming you have the time to learn the program.

Quickcode may also be a useful tool for dBASE II novices, though watering down dBASE with Quickcode is analogous to putting bicycle tires on a Maserati. The extensive capabilities of dBASE are so muted by Quickcode that you'd be better off purchasing a database program that is simpler than dBASE II at a significantly lower cost. As an intermediate step to mastering the full capabilities of dBASE, though, Quickcode may make good sense, especially if you already have dBASE sitting on the shelf.

dUTIL

dUtil is supposed to make your dBASE programs run faster, look better, and require less development time. It can also help you create and maintain up-to-date documentation of programs. Sound too good to be true? Perhaps.

The general idea of dUtil is that it takes dBASE II programs you have already created—either manually or with a program generator such as Quick-code—and modifies them in several ways. First, it checks for errors in logic flow (such as DO WHILEs with missing ENDDOs) and generally cleans up

the appearance of the database using tabs and capitalizing and expanding key words of your choice. It gives ENDIFs and ENDDOs identifying suffixes to simplify debugging. Another option is to have the program remove comments from your code, which can speed up execution time. Finally, dUtil's Do command can replace any calls to other programs with the code found in the called program (up to nine levels deep), creating one larger program that may run faster, since some file opening and closing is eliminated.


Figure 1: dUtil error message

Other Features

dUtil can perform other duties as well. The most notable is the creation of a "tree" file that contains a structural chart of your programs for reference. Another option is the creation of a Submit file that contains instructions for automatically printing out all your program listings for reference. Each line of the listing can be numbered if you wish, and you can choose to have your new files printed out or sent to a disk file, automating the chore of program backup. Unfortunately, you can get the tree file only when you merge command files into one larger file.

dUtil sounded good on paper, but making it work was another matter. I tried about ten times to create one functional file containing all the programs I use most often. The programs encountered several logic errors, each of which dumped me out to the CP/M prompt. It's frustrating when, after ten minutes of waiting, a utility program bombs out because of an error in your programming. Interestingly, these errors had not caused trouble before. Once I got the interesting message in figure 1 (below).

Who would have guessed this jumble meant I was out of directory space on my disk?

Next, I decided to see whether keeping my programs separate but running them through housecleaning might help. Doing my best to follow incomplete instructions resulted in the automatic erasure of all 15 of my command files! Perhaps Fox and Geller knew more than they revealed when they cautioned extra care in making backups.

Finally, after about six hours of experimentation (and frustration), I end-



ed up with 15 erased files, 5 debugged and rewritten files, and 1 large command file that failed to execute.

Documentation

Claims by Fox and Geller that its "documentation is second to none in the industry" stretches the truth more than a bit. The manual has some obvious omissions, topics are introduced a bit out of order, several command definitions are based on terms that have not yet been explained, and some abuses of standard English grammar are glaringly obvious.

On the positive side, the customization notes are helpful, and you should have no trouble installing the program for your computer. Even troubleshooting notes are included.

Limited Applications

In addition to having some serious flaws, dUtil seems to be very picky about how you write your code. If you have used Quickcode to create dBASE II programs for you, however, then dUtil may be useful, since Quickcode has the habit of writing lots of little files whose code dUtil can merge into a single file. Otherwise, it's easier, cheaper, and less frustrating to join programs using your text editor and develop good programming practices such as flow-

charting and indentation.

dGRAPH

dGraph is a graphics generator that, using dBASE III data files or other sources of data (spreadsheets, text files, BASIC data files), can produce a variety of charts and graphs on many dotmatrix and letter-quality printers. With dGraph you can

- Print line, pie, bar, or "piebar" charts
- Edit your chart data with the supplied editor
- Add titles and text to your charts

dUtil seems to be very picky about how you write your code.

- Specify data to be included in or excluded from your chart. Selection can be based on exact matching of values or falling within a specific range of values
- Save an "image" of your chart that you can send to other computers via modem
- Elect to have the Autograph program utility determine all the details of

your charts, or determine them manually

You cannot do the following:

- Freehand drawings, type fonts, or special symbols
- Change the size of the charts (3¾ inches high by 8 inches is the only size you get)

Charting Your Course

As supplied, dGraph works on the Apple II, II Plus, and IIe, with an 80-column card and an Epson 70, 80, or 100 printer, though other printer options are available. Because of the limitations of standard Apple II drives, you will have to be content with swapping disks at appropriate times. Some transferring of files is necessary before you start, but after that, the program is fairly easy to use, even though it's a bit complex.

Since dGraph has a built-in data editor, you can build chartable data files in dGraph or use existing files created by dBASE or other software. Either way, selection of the data you want to use is relatively simple.

First you choose which fields you want charted (the "subject") and the mathematical basis for the charting (sum, count, average, percentage of the sum, or percentage of the count). The

subject matter can also be a mathematical relationship between two different fields—Sales minus Costs, for instance.

Next you choose how you want to organize the data (using other information such as Month or Company Division from your database), which translates into row and column information when you print out the chart. Finally, selecting Draw sends dGraph off for some time, reading and writing files, computing the graph in memory, and then printing it either in normal or reverse shading.




Figure 2: Line graph of Utilities database

As a test, I pulled out my utility bills for the last year, created a data file, and charted it in various ways (see figures 2-5). If you have one of the dot-matrix printers dGraph works with (see Product Information), you're in luck. Average print time was about five minutes on my Epson. The same graph on a NEC 5510 looked great but took 20 minutes.

Documentation

The 152-page manual is well written and includes a step-by-step tutorial, but like the other Fox and Geller manuals, it is not typeset.

The first few pages discuss how the manual is organized, as well as how to get started without reading the manual—a nice touch. Also included is an introduction to graphics in general, a discussion on interfacing to other programs, a section for programmers on dGraph file structures, five appendices, and an index.

This program is versatile and includes lots of nice features including exception reports (to locate bad data) and charting of dates by month, day, and




Figure 3: Histogram of Utilities database





Figure 4: "Pie-Bar" chart of Utilities database

year. Even a sample MBASIC program for data-file generation comes on disk. The on-screen help is well thought out, too, complete with page references to the manual. If you need to chart data from dBASE or other sources, I recommend dGraph.







"Floyd... I felt terrible when he was killed. Every move I made I expected Floyd to bump into me or go exploring. I began to miss his constant chatter... the way he said '... are we gonna try something dangerous now?'... and his lopsided grin... the electric shock when I kissed him. I fell into massive depression..."

Ah, the wonders of fiction! It can grab you, transport you to another world, and make you believe in—and what's more care about—something as uncaring as a robot (in this case named Floyd), and a fictional robot at that. Delightful, you say, but not unusual; any good book can do the same. The opening quotation isn't a reaction to a book, though. It's one of many letters to Infocom about one of its more recent games, Planetfall; and, as such, it's a measure of a rapidly evolving category of computer software called interactive fiction.

Born in the vast Underground Empire of Zork, and owing a significant debt to Wizardry (Sir-Tech Software, Inc.), the most popular piece of software ever produced for the Apple, interactive fiction is rapidly developing into a new communication (should we say literary?) form. Users must decide whether or not it has yet arrived, but in the next 12 months, several pieces of software will no doubt appear that leave the ax-wielding trolls and magic spells far behind. By and large, this software will try to involve you in something more than puzzles; and, like the robot Floyd, it may even touch your

Puzzles, Prose, and Graphics

The key to this change is a rapid evolution from games created solely by programmers to new efforts based on the work of some of the best science-fiction authors of our time—Arthur C. Clarke, Michael Crichton, Ray Bradbury, Douglas Adams, Robert Heinlein—as well as some of the best-loved children's classics, such as Swiss Family Robinson, Wind in the Willows, and The Wizard of Oz.

At the same time, a switch in marketing strategy will include a new emphasis on packaging, using bookstores as outlets, and capturing a new audience with familiar titles. Furthermore, this may just be the beginning. We may be looking at the nickelodeon of computer-delivered fiction. Future efforts could involve multiple users in a world that is largely of their own creation, and the tools of that involvement could include biofeedback, which aids the de-

velopment of a story by monitoring reactions that users may not even be aware of (or only vaguely so), such as increased pulse rate.

I'm jumping ahead just a bit, though. Interactive fiction begins with programmers' inherent love of puzzles, as expressed in Adventure, the first adventure game, which was developed on mainframe computers in the 1960s at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Stanford. Apple enthusiasts got their first real taste of adventuring when Zork arrived in 1980. Zork resembles the mainframe adventure in many ways. It has no plot. The environment is part logic, part fantasy. The goal is simple—you explore the world, map it piece by piece, collect treasures, and thus accumulate points. What sets Zork aside, however, is the richness of its prose and the wonderful sense of humor of its writers, who seem to have anticipated an incredible number of possibilities.

Since Zork's introduction, companies that produce interactive-fiction roughly divide into two camps—those who write text-only programs (Infocom), and those who support their adventures with graphics (nearly all others).

"There's a place for graphics," says Jonathan Palace, one of the editors at Infocom, "but they take up so much room on the disk that the text can't be as long or as colorful as it can be without graphics."

The Infocom party line has always been that "your brain is the best graphics generator" and that computer graphics, at this point, are simply not good enough to significantly enhance its products.

In contrast, Mark Pelezarski, president of Penguin Software, which has produced some of the best graphics adventure games, feels graphics definitely enhance the game. "We have a lot of things in a picture that test your powers of imagination," says Pelezarski. In fact, to get through a Penguin game such as Transylvania, you have to study the pictures for clues that exist nowhere else.



to use a mixture of text and graphics, as do Penguin's. But whether the games are text or a mixture of text and graphics, two major trends are worth noting:

- A move away from strict puzzle solving and into plot and character development.
- Use of successful fiction writers and proven stories.

These trends are evident in the development of Infocom's line, but the last few months should mark a turning point of sorts, with several new offerings in the field from other companies.

As Palace describes it, Zork is made up of puzzles, with no plot or character development. With Infidel and later games, the puzzles were part of a story, or a series of puzzles made up a story. Witness shows real scene development. Written in the tone of a 1930s detective novel, the goal is "to simulate the experience of being in Southern California in 1938," says Palace. That's a routine goal for fiction, but a giant step for adventure games. Now Infocom has just released Cutthroats, a tale that places you in a treasure hunt with some pretty seedy companions, and it is working with Douglas Adams to bring out a game based on his novel The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy.

The Washington Post described the book version of The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy as "inspired lunacy," which is also a good way to describe Zork. Thus, Adams and Infocom should be a natural team. (Adams approached Infocom with the idea.) The result will be more a story than a puzzle, says Palace, and "more enjoyable than the book."

Tempting a Broader Public

What lies ahead, says Palace, is a new product, as yet untitled, that involves no scoring and gives players no choice but to follow through on their actions. (It won't have a "save game" feature, which adventurers often use to ward off disaster. Such a feature holds a copy of a game at a specific point so adventurers can take a dangerous action without fear of losing all they've done so far.) The new product will offer many possible actions, "some of which are good, many of which are bad, many of which are ambiguous." There won't be a single path to success, but many.


The editors at Infocom are trying to find where the enjoyment lies—in solving difficult puzzles or just in wandering through the story. "And that's a hard question to answer," says Palace. "Some people like the hardest puzzles we can come up with, but others find

the puzzle aspect frustrating."

Infocom isn't the only company looking for an answer. Penguin and others plan to stick with the puzzles while developing other aspects of the medium, but at least three new lines of software are just beginning to test the taste of a broader public—those from Baen Enterprises and two subsidiaries of Spinnaker Software, Trillium and Windham Classics.

New-World Authors

Trillium has an impressive stable of writers and titles, some just recently in-



troduced and others on the way.

"We attempted to go to the people who are best at creating new worlds," says Trillium brand manager Seth Godin. If you're a science-fiction fan, the list has got to set your mouth watering.

Familiar works blossoming into interactive fiction include Clarke's Rendezvous with Rama, Heinlein's Starman Jones, and Ray Bradbury's Fahrenheit 451. Michael Crichton, author of The Andromeda Strain and other novels, has developed a story just for interactive fiction called Amazon. (One of Trillium's first releases, Amazon presents a helpful companion, a parrot called Paco, for whom you quickly develop a strong attachment.)

Rama is a space ark that arrives for a short spin around the sun. It is apparently a dead world, and in Clarke's book you follow the actions of a small team that explores it. In the book, though, the team doesn't always look at the things you might want to examine. They don't always ask the questions you might ask. In the computer version, you'll do the exploring—up to a point. Obviously, limited disk space inhibits the inclusion of every alternative.

"Some things the book doesn't do as well, some things it does better," says Godin. As with all the Trillium releases, this one will include graphics. Trillium isn't afraid to inject a page or two of pure text, however. As for puzzles, "they're great if they fit into the plot," says Godin, "but a lot of times they don't. In Rama there are puzzles, but they add to the plot or the characters."

Trillium has also tried to increase user involvement by rewarding users for acting in character. In Dragon World you play a shy adventurer who wouldn't hurt a fly. When a crying woman blocks your way in a cave, you must keep your character in mind if you hope to get by.

Getting long-term interaction between users and fictional characters isn't easy, though, says Godin. "Paco (in Amazon) is a parrot. He can say stupid things; he can repeat himself all the time." You can't have a fictional person behaving that way.

Characters You Care About

Still, you can expect to see some interaction. In the Windham Classic version of *The Wizard of Oz*, for example, you are Dorothy, and you can ask questions of the Scarecrow, the Tin Man, and the Cowardly Lion.

Other titles being brought out under this name offer some interesting situations that should help break new ground and cultivate more markets for interactive fiction. In Wind in the Willows, you start the game as Mole, then later become Toad. Swiss Family Robinson contains a built-in mapping feature, and your goal is basically the same as that of the marooned family—learn how to survive on an island by yourself.

These games aren't aimed at "hard-core adventure players," points out Thomas C. Pavela, brand manager. "One of the things we're trying to do is make these friendly and accessible." Of course, one of the keys is to start with friendly and accessible titles, which Trillium has done. Besides the titles already mentioned, the line includes Treasure Island and Below the Root. The latter, based on the Green Sky Trilogy, is joystick-driven with a text menu that includes some of the interactive commands found in more traditional adventure games.

Another company that has tapped well-known authors and works is Baen Enterprises. When asked how you build user involvement, Jim Baen replied, "The text isn't done by programmers, but by writers, and their whole purpose

in life is to make you care about characters." He acknowledges that "you can't paint as textured and rich a canvas as you can in a book, but the medium offers much more in variability. Your feelings and approach have much more of an effect on the outcome."

Science-fiction author Fred Saberhagen helped design and program the firm's first offering, Wings out of Shadow, a game that draws on Saberhagen's Berserker series. In this one it's possible to "die" and yet have won the game. Heinlein's Glory Road is a game in which one of your tasks is to make sure vour sidekicks, Star and Rufus, stav alive. "If they die, there ain't no way you're going to win," says Baen. He describes Star as a "rollicking wench" and Rufus as her uncle.

Look for different approaches in these games. Baen talks of games that "explode on you . . . You think you're in the middle of an adventure and suddenly you're playing a reflex game." Wings out of Shadow contains four subgames, and variables from each are passed to the next. One is a maze, one is a strategy-and-tactics game, and two involve arcade action. Baen believes that as people watch television or read a good novel, they go into a trancelike state. In Wings out of Shadow, each of the sequences tries to bring you in a little deeper.

How Deep Can It All Get?

Everyone wants to improve the language the games understand. Using tested writers may improve some of the prose the game throws onto the screen, but it takes memory and good programming to create a game that understands more than simple, two-word commands, such as climb ladder, or go north. Here Infocom has always had the edge with a parser that understands nouns, verbs, adjectives, and direct and indirect objects. Infocom has its own language, based on LISP, that is still evolving.

There are other ways to respond, however. Penguin, for example, is developing a game composed entirely of graphics for the Macintosh, says Pelezarski. "You'll be put in locations, and you'll point to things that you want to take, or look at, or manipulate."

As to graphics, Godin looks to the day when we'll be interacting with images of actors on video disks and you'll be "able to move your feet and arms. It will be one step short of Westworld," he says, referring to the movie that portrayed a fantastic entertainment park containing humanoids that helped guests live out their fantasies.

As to biofeedback, why not wear a little ring that connects to the computer and gives it information on your pulse rate? The game could change accordingly. "Ok, we got him really excited now, so zap him," says Baen with glee.

Baen is thinking in terms of optical disks and a "novel that would evolve in terms of what you discover . . . it would require the wordage of four or five novels and a tremendous amount of coding time-more now than the user environment can support."

An Ideal Fictional Form

If the marketplace would support it, if the technology were all in place, and if the artistic skills had evolved to match the medium, what then?

Baen answers, "an ideal fictional form that would include prose that would change in terms of what you wanted it to do, or even in terms of what you thought you wanted it to do, and the picture that went along with it would be a motion picture and would involve the same sort of thing." It would be, in short, "like an illustrated book that died and went to heaven."

Amen.

Are you envious of your Macintoshowning friends because they can use MacPaint and MacDraw? Look again. The Print Shop, an ingenious Apple II program recently introduced by Brøderbund Software, gives the Macintosh's drawing programs a run for their money.

This easy-to-use package lets you quickly and easily design and print out commonly needed custom graphics—greeting cards, signs, banners, letter-heads, and free-form screen images—without even touching a mouse or being a Leonardo da Vinci. You can easily include attractive graphic designs, pictures, borders, and text in a variety of type styles within your designs.

Skeptical? If you are, you probably have a good reason. Up to now, similar programs for the Apple II have required struggles with graphics tablets, font editors, light-pen systems, and programming, and they have relied heavily on users' initiative, time, and imagination. Getting what you wanted out of your printer hasn't been very easy. Because of the approachable and graphic presentation of The Print Shop's menus, though, even a nebbish in a hurry can crank out something creative and even impressive.



Being a sensible person, I rarely force myself to wade through the manual when trying out a new program, and since the general populace seems to apply the same logic, I figure it's part of my research to give a package a "dry run" first. Of course, I usually get stuck somewhere and have to dredge through the manual's index to extricate myself. Not so with The Print Shop.

Five minutes after I inserted my disk

into the drive, the program had automatically made the one permissible copy of itself and prompted me to answer questions about my printer and interface card. A few minutes and keystrokes later, my first creation, a customized birthday card, came spurting out of my printer. I was impressed. What's on the Menu

The Print Shop is menu-driven, with one attractive screen after another asking you to choose the details of your masterpiece. For example, the first screen has you move the highlighting cursor to the name of your desired creation (greeting card, letterhead, banner, sign, and so on)—using the keyboard, joystick, or KoalaPad—and press Return.

Now the fun begins. Say you want to make a greeting card. You can either design your own or let The Print Shop design it for you, using the recipient's name, if you desire. "Canned" greeting-card choices include birthday, Christmas, season's greetings, Valentine's Day, anniversary, invitations, notepaper, and thank-you notes.

If you opt to create your own design, you get a series of subsequent pictorial menus that ask you for more decisions. What You See

For example, to make a greeting card, you first decide which one of nine border patterns you like. An example of each border appears on the screen, one

at a time. Again, you make your selection by highlighting your choice and pressing a button or key. Then, for a background, the choices include 10 interlocking abstract designs and 50 supplied pictures (some of which are reproduced in this article). The manufacturer promises that an auxiliary disk containing 100 more graphics is on the way. Should you choose a picture, you can have it printed in one of three sizes and in various arrangements. A "custom" layout offers more latitude, allowing placement in specific spots on the page, such as the upper right corner. What You Sav

Assuming you want your creation to communicate a message, a menu now appears, asking which of eight font styles you fancy. Again, you get to see an example of each, in their relative sizes, before deciding on one. Choosing a font advances you to the next screen, a text-editing module, where you enter your message.

Text can be right-, left-, or center-justified; solid black, hollow, or 3-D. The size can be large or small. Another attractive feature is that all type styles appear on the screen and print out proportionally spaced, meaning that narrower letters such as *i* fit right up



against adjacent larger letters, giving your text a professionally typeset appearance. Even more unexpected in a program of this price is the use of a lettering technique in which the strokes of some letters intermingle with those of their neighbors.


Moving along, the same process of border, graphics, and text selection repeats for the inside of your greeting card, after which you continue to the Print menu. Here you have the option of "giving yourself credit," which means typing a line of text that will appear on the back of your card where the copyright notice and price usually appear. A nice touch.

Then you conduct a little printer test to help align your paper, and printing begins. Printing a greeting card takes several minutes, but design time is so minimal that waiting at this stage doesn't matter much. Besides, The Print Shop puts a little entertaining show of pulsating patterns on your monitor, which offers diversion during the printing process.

An interesting feature of the printing process for a greeting card is that half of the printout is upside down in relation to the other half. After removing the paper from my printer and folding it over in quarters in the traditional greeting-card fashion, I realized why.

Another element of the program that affects printouts handles the task of clearing a border around letters that would otherwise blend into the pictures or background they overwrite. This feature is nice and probably required some intricate programming on the author's part.

Incidentally, unlike some other graphics programs that use screendump utilities for printing, thereby limiting the resolution of the printout to that of the screen, Print Shop is limited



only by the capability of your printer. My Epson actually printed very-high-resolution (120×72 -pixel) graphics. Okidata printers do not print quite as nicely, with only a 72×72 -pixel matrix.

Reverse Psychology

An almost addicting feature of the entire creative process is the effortless way The Print Shop lets you change your mind (one of my favorite vices). At virtually any point, you can move forward or backward through the menus, modifying your previous choices. You can make anything you don't change revert to your earlier selection by pressing the Return key. You can temporarily suspend or even abort the printing process altogether.

The other types of printouts (letter-





heads, banners, and signs) basically require walking through the same or similar menus, but result in a different layout for the final product.

Worth noting is the ability to create letterheads with designs and text at either the top or the bottom of the page, or both, using two different type styles if you wish. Banners can be as long as you want, using any of the type styles, complete with oversize pictures.

Doing It Your Way

Just in case none of the 60 graphics that come with The Print Shop fill your needs, a well-designed pixel editor is included. Using a KoalaPad, joystick, or keyboard to edit an existing graphic or to create your own is relatively easy on the 5 × 5-inch matrix, measured on a 12-inch monitor. In about ten minutes I modified an existing graphic to my liking.

Saving it on disk was a snap, too, and The Print Shop even asked me if I needed to initialize a blank disk first—useful if you've just spent two hours editing and find yourself diskless.

More Magic

Finally, the most entertaining part of The Print Shop is called Screen Magic. It is essentially a screen-dump utility that lets you print out any high-resolution screens you've created either with The Print Shop or with another program. (Foreign files must be in standard 8K, hi-res, uncompacted format).

Screen Magic has a few unexpected features, too. For instance, unlike other screen-dump programs, this one is designed to reproduce color, rather than monochrome, screens in black and white. The four standard colors and black and white are all represented on printouts in varying shades of gray.

Another special feature is a menu option called Kaleidoscopes that turns your monitor into "living color" with constantly swirling and changing multihued patterns. It's even more hypnotic than network TV. Better yet, you can "freeze" the patterns at any time by pressing a key, superimpose them with text, and print them out. Some tricky menu-hopping can even get you a mixture of type styles on the same screen.

Next, the Print menu lets you choose on which half (top or bottom) of the

page you want to print your composition. It just so happens that the aspect ratio between screen and printer works out right for making a long, horizontal greeting card. You can print one screen on the top half of one side and another screen on the lower half of the opposite side, fold it over, and end up with a real computer-art masterpiece.


The Manual

Oh yes, the manual. Well, I've only needed to refer to it twice—too bad that one of the few well-written manuals I've seen should be wasted on a program that doesn't need it. Anyway, the Print Shop manual is 27 pages long, with copious examples and instructions for carrying out creative ideas such as making name tags and emblems, multicolored signs and banners, and new graphic patterns.

To complete the package, The Print Shop includes bright-colored tractor-feed paper (something I've never seen before), matching envelopes, and colored ribbons. The flip side of the disk contains a series of complex images that can serve as a background for signs.

Program of the Month

The Print Shop has won my private Program of the Month award because it's easy and fun to use, apparently bugfree, practical, and novel. It's the first Apple graphics program I have seen that combines ease of use, practicality,



and room for creativity, all in one package. Even my computerphobic friends like it, and it passed the ultimate test: I actually use it regularly. At \$49.95, it's a bargain.









Graphics have always been an important aspect of Apples, the first popular personal computers to offer reasonably high-resolution graphics as well as color. At first these features were buried inside the machines, so only whiz programmers could access them. The Apples had the raw capabilities, however, and application software soon provided us with personal graphics machines.

Artists could avail themselves of dozens of painting programs, businesses suddenly discovered business graphics, and colorful, hi-res graphics practically became a requirement of educational programs. Hi-res graphics brought 70-column screens and lowercase displays to word processing and opened a floodgate of exciting, animated fun in computer games.

These developments are history. Owners of Apple IIc's and 128K IIe's are in store for another revolution in graphics that has been available only to Apple III owners up to now, because these computers now have significantly more powerful graphics capabilities than those of their predecessors. Fo. artists and educators, one word says it all: red! Apple IIe and IIc computers





can finally display Red Delicious apples in addition to Granny Smiths. For that matter, they can also display Golden Delicious apples, because along with the red comes yellow and several other colors, 16 in all, except that two of the colors are the same gray, so there are actually only 15 visibly different colors.

For businessmen or scientists, these new abilities are equally exciting. The

graphs and charts they need can now be more precise than ever, because the newest Apples can display twice as many dots on the screen as Apples could before. Double hi-res on the Apple provides three different video-display modes: 560 × 192 pixels in monochrome, 560 × 192 pixels in a monochrome, 560×192 pixels in a special "sliding scale" that can use

WHAT YOU NEED TO GET DOUBLE-HI-RES GRAPHICS

To get extended graphics capabilities, you must have a 128K Apple IIe with Apple's Extended 80-column card or an equivalent compatible card—or an Apple IIc computer, which has this circuitry built in and ready to go. Apple IIe owners must purchase it as an option and must also have a "rev.B" main circuit board.

You can identify the circuit board by turning the power off, removing the cover of your IIe, and looking at the lettering etched at the rear of the board, behind the slot connectors. There you'll find a three-part serial number, something like 820-0064-A. The letter indicates the version of the circuit board. If it is an A and you have purchased an Apple Computer Extended 80-column card, your Apple dealer will replace the main circuit board with rev. B, free of charge.

To enable the switching circuitry for the hi-res memory, you must install a jumper on the 80-column card. A jumper is a small square (about 2 mm) of plastic, open at two ends, that sometimes comes with the card. Gently push the jumper onto the two small wires (labeled J1) that extend from the lower left corner of the 80-column card. Simply bending the two wires so they touch will also do the trick. Remember to turn the computer off when you remove or install an interface card.

Unfortunately, add-on 80-column cards for the older Apple II and Apple II Plus computers cannot provide double-hi-res graphics. These displays have a small amount of extra memory but handle their own video separately from the Apple. The entire display is contained on the add-on card and works like an external terminal (see Rescue Squad, November 1984, page 197).




Figure 1: Organization of 80-column text screen. A represents aux memory, and M represents main memory.

ing all 16 colors. The term *double hires* applies to the extra colors, as well as the various increased resolution modes. **How It's Done**

The evolution of the Apple II computer has been blessed by a high degree of compatibility between generations of computers, but one dramatic difference between the Apple II Plus and the Apple IIe and IIc is the graphics capability of the 128K memory and the 80-column display of the latter two machines. Although optional hardware from many sources can provide older Apples with increased memory, better keyboards, and most of the other advantages of the newest Apples, no one provides the additional graphics modes possible with the Apple Extended 80column card, as yet.

Apple's display is termed a "memory mapped" display because each character on the screen is located in the memory the computer uses for programs or data. To produce 80 columns on an Apple II, an extra area of memory must be dedicated to the display.

The regular 80-column text card for the IIe requires only 1024 bytes (1K) of memory to store the extra screen characters, but the Extended 80-column card has a whole extra 64K. The Apple's 6502 microprocessor cannot use more than 64K of memory at a time, but you can use the extra memory to store data or to simulate a disk drive at lightning fast speeds, and advanced programmers capitalize on the extra capacity for longer programs. The extra RAM provides parallel addresses for both the text and the hi-res display.

This added display memory is mapped into the same addresses as the normal text and graphics displays. In other words, when the microprocessor is writing to display memory, it does so twice to the same place. The video circuitry takes care of switching between main and aux memory. From our point of view, the character columns alternate between main memory and aux memory (see figure 1).

For example, if the computer is displaying the word *Hello* in the 80-column mode, the *H* is in aux memory, the *e* is in main memory, the first *l* is in main memory, the second *l* is in main memory, and the *o* is in aux memory. This scheme provides easy conversion between the 40-column and the 80-column screen. Apple made the 80-column display an option on the Apple IIe and provided a new peripheral slot, the aux slot, for it. The Apple IIc's extended 80-column display, on the other hand, is built in.




Figure 2: Appearance of screen after you've entered the 40-column mode with Control-Reset

If you type Control-Reset on an Apple IIe in the 80-column mode, the Apple will revert to the standard 40-column display and put only half the information on the screen. SYNTAX ERROR, for example, turns into SNA RO. The rest of the statement is stored in the duplicate text area of auxiliary memory. If we could view only this memory, we would see YTXERR (see figure 2).

A new main circuit board (designated Revision B) allows the hi-res screen to provide a new graphics mode with double the number of horizontal dots, 560, or double the number of colors, 16.

The Apple's hi-res screen is similar to the regular text screen. The screen is 40 bytes across, and each byte can contain a single character, which is five pixels across by eight pixels down. On the hi-res screen, the pixels displayed represent some of the bits in each byte of screen memory. Of the possible eight bits in each byte, only seven are displayed. The horizontal pixels on the screen total 280 (7×40). Vertically, each text character is made up of eight dots and the screen has 24 rows of char-

acters $(8 \times 24 = 192 \text{ vertical pixels})$. On the hi-res screen, we control all of these dots-which form a grid of $53,760 (280 \times 192)$ —rather than dealing with them in $5 \times 8 = pixel$, character-sized chunks. In terms of memory, it takes 40×192 (or 7680) bytes to store this screen. There are some unused bytes, and a full 8192 (8K) bytes are assigned to the hi-res screen.

The double-hi-res screen is similar to the regular hi-res screen, but the number of horizontal bytes is doubled, yielding 560 × 192 resolution. Because double hi-res has twice as many dots. 16K of memory is required to store the

screen: 8K of main memory and 8K on the Extended 80-column card.

If you have an Apple IIe and an Extended 80-column card, or an Apple IIc, you can easily see this new graphics mode. First, enter the 80-column mode by keying PR#3, then enter the Graphics mode by keying HGR, and finally POKE-16290,0. This POKE, which tells the Apple to use the main and auxiliary hi-res displays, is the key to double-hi-res graphics.

Your screen should now look like figure 3. The white vertical bars are physically located in the Extended 80column card, and the black bars are in the main circuit board. Unfortunately, Applesoft commands have no effect on the extended memory, so HGR cleared only the main memory to black.

For yet another example, type in HCOLOR=3: HPLOT 0,0 TO 279,160, after which your screen should look like figure 4. Rather than turning out as a continuous diagonal line, the line is dashed, because the Hplot command works only with main memory.

The most dramatic difference with double hi-res is the availability of 15 different colors, giving an entirely new look to hi-res graphics:

REGULAR HI-RES Black 1 Black 2 Violet Blue White 1 White 2 Green Orange DOUBLE HI-RES Black Violet Brown Med. Blue Dark Green Pink Magenta Lt. Blue White Green Orange Aqua Grey 1 Grey 2 Dk. Blue

A pixel is equivalent to a bit, but a bit has no room for color information. Bits can either be on (represented by a 1) or off (represented by a 0), but they have another property beside their on/off status, namely their position in memory.

On the regular hi-res screen, a pixel that falls on an even plotting position is violet, whereas a pixel on an odd plotting position is green. Two adjacent pixels make white. The invisible bit in each screen byte generates the two additional colors, orange and blue. If the shift bit is off, the pixels are green or violet; if it is on, the whole byte turns orange or blue. This method of producing colors leads to problems when you try to mix green or violet with orange or blue.

In double hi-res, the invisible bit is ignored, so you won't run into colorshift problems. Four bits determine the color of a dot in double hi-res, taking us back to the 140-dot horizontal resolution of the regular hi-res screen.

A single bit within this group of four generates a red, brown, dark-green, or dark-blue pixel, depending on its position in screen memory. The other colors are combinations of these four. For example, adjacent red and brown pixels result in an orange-colored pixel in the 140 × 192 mode. If you add a darkgreen bit, the pixel will turn yellow.

These combinations do not follow the color-mixing rules that painters follow but are based on "color bleeding" and other equally mysterious televisionengineering terms. Only assembly-language programmers, who must deal with bits and bytes, need concern themselves with the various combinations of bits. The rest of us must rely on software tools to accept a color command or to select the proper color for drawing and creating double-hi-res graphics.

Next month, we'll look at the software packages that generate double-hires graphics.





rates, or expected startup time . . . but research and development are continu-

Tekbytes provides "hardcore hackers' technical information." Well, sort of. Actually, it reads much like Newbytes, giving information about new developments in the computer field. For example, one story noted that Motorola had introduced a new graphics-controller chip set, compatible with the 68000 series of microprocessors, displaying 650 × 500-pixel resolution with 32 colors out of a palette of 4096 colors.

Oldbytes is a daily trivia column that asks four questions per day and provides answers the next day. Trivial Pursuit and TP-clone buffs will thrill to questions such as "Who is Louis Cristello?" and "What was the name of the frigate rammed by the Nautilus in 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea?" (answers at the end of the column).

Daybytes provides little-known facts about historical events that occurred on a particular day and about famous people who have birthdays on a given day. For example, Michael Jackson, Elliot Gould, and Oliver Wendell Holmes all have their birthdays on the same day, which is also the day that the movie Mary Poppins debuted and Mormon leader Brigham Young approved polygamy.

Scibytes brings forth information from the frontier of science and technology. Capsule descriptions of events, research, and discoveries, most of which are not related to computers, keep you up to date.

Michael Jackson, Elliot Gould, and Oliver Wendell Holmes all have their birthdays on the same day, which is also the day that the movie Mary Poppins debuted.

Fembytes is a weekly column covering science and technology's effect on women, including medicine, computers, physics, physiques, economics, and electronic life-styles.

Finally, the bulletin section informs you about changes and enhancements to NNS. Although I was unable to preview new columns, the bulletin section anounced that NNS is bringing out three new columns on sports, the American life-style, and the popularmusic scene.

NNS also provides a message center where you can leave electronic mail for the system operator.

The Cost

Newsoft is trying to create a telecommunications network across the country. Newsoft supplies NNS to "flagship" BBSs, which then supply the service to at least three other "network" BBSs. Newsoft is market-exclusive, which means no other BBS can carry NNS in the local dialing area.

The cost is \$24.95 per month for a one-time, one-month subscription and \$21.95 per month for a six-month affiliate subscription. BBSs with "flagship" status receive NNS free of charge, but they must have at least three "network" BBSs, each paying \$8.50 per month.

I like NNS and the idea of local BBSs setting up the service and then charging a dollar or so per month per subscriber. The local BBSs can make money to cover the costs of their labor of love, NNS makes money and increases the quality and variety of its



TELEPSYCH

TelePsych is a new service that provides consultation with a clinical psychologist named Dr. Timothy Miller, California license #PS 8283. Rest assured, it is not a computer-simulation program such as Eliza or other counseling software. Miller is a practicing psychologist and indeed a real live human being.

Miller does not intend that Tele-

Psych replace face-to-face counseling. He started the service for those who do not have access to a counselor, cannot afford traditional counseling, cannot fit regular appointments into their schedule, or are uncomfortable with face-toface counseling.

Potential clients receive several psychological tests and a biography form for background information. Clients type their messages on a word processor and upload them to TelePsych. Miller provides a reply within seven days for the client to download.

Although the method of communication is different, the topics are the same as those that arise in face-to-face counseling, including stress, relationships, anxiety, parenting, and others. Miller notes that although the first contact is somewhat tentative, clients find that an intimate therapeutic relationship develops over time.

Telecommunications counseling has its advantages and disadvantages. You can take your time composing your message, saying exactly what you want to say. You do not have to keep regular appointments, for TelePsych is there when you need it, 24 hours a day. Miller notes that just thinking over a situation can be inherently beneficial. Finally, reading is faster than talking, cutting the cost of the therapy dramatically.

On the negative side, Miller cannot respond to nonverbal clues, and the spontaneous give and take of face-toface counseling is compromised.

Miller assures complete confidentiality, within legal limits, and claims that TelePsych is "virtually break-inproof."


TelePsych also contains 16 "electronic pamphlets," each of which discusses a single topic. This information

is available free of charge to all callers of TelePsych, not just clients. The topics include computer addiction, sexual problems, how to quit smoking, anorexia and bulimia, anxiety, infidelity, and weight problems.

The pamphlets convey the topics in easy-to-understand, laymen's terms. They are professional presentations and serve as a good introduction on how a problem starts and what you can do to help yourself. These are not end-all cures—they express only the opinions of Miller and should not be considered a substitute for professional consultation. Nevertheless, they are a good starting point.

TelePsych costs 7/10 cent per word you send to Miller and two cents per word for Miller's reply, which works out to about \$50 per hour. Fees are not re-





Expand Your Memory the Hard Way

ne of the most significant improvements you can make to your Macintosh is to add a hard-disk storage system. Given the amount of space that the system folder and various applications take up, a microdiskette can fill up awfully fast. Constant disk swapping and increasing stacks of microdiskettes may prompt even first-time computer users to investigate hard disks, and anyone who deals with vast amounts of data is already shopping around.

Storage capacities for Mac hard disks range from 5 to more than 90 megabytes, and prices start at around \$1800. This sum may seem like a lot of money, but consider what you get. The most obvious advantage is more disk-storage space. A 5-megabyte disk can hold as much information as 12 of the Macintosh's micro-floppies can. Because we refer to it as a hard "disk," we generally forget that we're getting the drive as well. Comparing a hard disk to twelve micro-floppies in 12 disk drives makes the price more palatable.

In addition to providing more disk space, a hard disk will save you time, not only because you can skip the disk swaps, but also because it reads and writes faster than does the Macintosh's floppy-disk drive. A hard-disk drive spins more than ten times faster than a floppy drive. You'll notice this speed improvement when you open applications and load files. Furthermore, because the read/write heads never actually touch the disk, data storage is more reliable.

If a Macintosh is your first computer, you should keep in mind the difference between memory and disk storage. Having a hard disk won't rid

you of that Almost out of memory message that refers to the Mac's internal memory, or RAM. Whenever your computer has to write to disk, you'll benefit from a hard disk—even when you're printing something out, since a print file goes to your disk. For the most part, adding a hard disk will reduce the Please insert the disk or The disk is full, please delete some documents messages you've come to despise. You'll be able to see many more file listings at a glance (and a slide of the scroll bar, of course). You can forget forgetting what's on which disk.

he one thing you have to lose, at least temporarily, is use of your modem port. Since current versions of hard disks for the Mac connect to the modem port, you won't be able to use the hard disk and the modem simultaneously. If you plan to employ your Mac hard disk to download large files from external databases, you won't be able to do it just yet.

These considerations should help you determine whether or not you're ready for a hard disk. If you're simply looking to avoid disk swaps, a second drive is what you need. If you'd like to have immediate access to a lot more stored information, a hard disk

is the likely candidate.


Several companies are developing hard-disk systems for the Macintosh, and I had the opportunity to examine three of them: a ten-megabyte Davong Mac Disk, a five-megabyte Tecmar Mac Drive, and a five-megabyte Corvus OmniDrive.

Before I get into the differences among the three, let's look at what they have in common and at some other preliminaries.

Each product comes with everything you need to get it running: the drive, an interface cable, a power cord, documentation, and software. You need software because the operating system on your current system diskette doesn't know that a hard disk can be connected to the modem port. Installation is easy—plug the drive in and follow the instructions, which, in all cases, are reasonably straightforward. Now you're ready to begin copying all those files from all those diskettes.

Since I was interested in mass storage, I set out to see just how much of my information these products could deal with. Once I'd started actually using the disks, I found some good news and some bad news. The good news is that life without disk swaps is wonderful. The bad news is that I ran into bugs and glitches and things that went bump in the night.

Original icons disappeared during the duplication process, and the infamous bomb appeared on the screen with no error message at all. I kept getting a message that there wasn't enough memory to insert my microfloppy. How could I copy my floppy disk if I couldn't insert it? I used the Clean Up command to try to get



around the problem. With one of the hard disks, the process took five minutes; with another I gave up and rebooted after 45 minutes.

Finders, Losers

Eventually I tracked down the source of these seemingly unrelated difficulties. The culprit is the current version of the Macintosh's operating system, which is known as the Finder (version 1.12, as of this writing). The Finder was developed before hard disks were made for the Mac, and it is not designed to work with the amount of information they can store. Consequently, after you've entered a certain amount of data, the Finder begins to lose track of things. Apple is currently working on a new version of the Finder, but, in the meantime, anyone who purchases these products will have to deal with the difficulties. Unfortunately, not one of the problems with the Finder was mentioned in any of the documentation for the hard disks I re-

can handle. Once you cross a certain threshold (somewhere around 128 directory listings), you've got problems. The worst situation is when you have many small files. I was working with MacWrite files, which are necessarily limited in size, so I had files that ranged in size from 3 to 20K. Had I been using large files—300K databases, for example—the problems wouldn't have come up. The problem is not with the size of files, but with the number of icons the Finder must deal with. Asking the Finder to "clean up" 200 icons was a presumptuous demand on my part. Keeping this foible in mind, let's take a look at the three disks.

Davong Mac Disk

Four indicator lights on the front panel of the Mac Disk inform you

when the power is on, when a read/ write operation is in progress, when data is passing through the serial port, or when a flawed area of the disk surface is being remapped to prevent errors.

Once you've completed the installation procedures and booted Davong's Mac Disk system diskette, you open the Mac Disk icon and insert your own diskette. At this point you're likely to get a message that reads There isn't enough memory to work with another disk. The message is disconcerting, to say the least. How can you copy your own files if you can't use your diskette? To proceed, you must first remove the icon representing the Davong system diskette.

Opening and closing any application from the hard disk will fool the Finder into thinking the hard disk is the system disk, which solves the problem. After you've played this trick, you can eject the Davong system diskette, throw its icon into the trash-can icon, and insert your own diskette. The manual fails to inform



you of this procedure.

Once I'd loaded the diskette, copying files to the Mac Disk was as easy as dragging icons from one window to another. Until I had about 120 files, that is. At that point, I happened to be duplicating files. After I'd selected a group of five icons and had chosen the Duplicate command, the five copies appeared on the screen, and three of the original icons disappeared. Obviously, I had reached the invisible threshold of the Finder. No error messages informed me of that fact, however.

This situation was particularly disconcerting since I had a ten-megabyte disk and still had 5604K available on it. If you plan to use a large number of small files, you'll be able to use only about half of the space on a ten-megabyte disk. If you have much larger files, however, you won't run into this

One additional limitation of the Davong is that the smallest amount of information it can access appears to be 20K. My MacPaint files on diskette ranged from 6K to 20K, and after I

transferred them, they were all listed as 20K. MacWrite files from 6K to 11K all became 41K on the Davong.

This problem may seem trivialafter all, you have ten megabytes of space—but it can make your life miserable when you're trying to copy things back to a microdiskette. I had a disk full of MacPaint files, which took up 282K on my microdiskette. I put them in a folder and transferred them to the Mac Disk, where they took up 587K.

When I tried to copy that folder back to a microdiskette, I got a message that read There is not enough room on the disk to duplicate or copy the selected documents. This quirk is not only a Finder problem, but also one that involves the way that the Davong Mac Disk allocates space for files.

Tecmar Mac Drive

Tecmar produces both five- and ten-megabyte hard disks in a variety of combinations of fixed and removable disks. The five-megabyte removable version that I tested had only one indicator light, a minor inconvenience you'll get used to, but one that stood out in contrast to the other products. The removable disk combines the advantages of a hard disk and a floppy. You can, for example, purchase two removable disks and use one as a backup.

Pursuing my quest for true mass storage, I managed to get 212 items onto the Mac Drive. When the disk was full-that is, when no more storage space was available—I got a message that announced There is not enough room on the disk to duplicate or copy the selected item(s). Thus, even with my 200 tiny files (plus applications), I was able to make use of all of the hard disk's storage space. Once you get that many



icons on the screen, the system is considerably slower, but that's to be expected.

Having come this far without a hitch, I decided to try the Clean Up command. After 45 minutes, I gave up and rebooted. Things weren't cleaned up, but they were all still there; I didn't lose any files. The Tecmar hard disk converted the size of all my MacWrite files to 20K, which created the same difficulty I'd had with the Davong. My five files, 48K in total, took up more than twice as much space on the Tecmar.

Corvus OmniDrive

The OmniDrive comes in 5-, 11-, 16-, and 45-megabyte sizes. Indicator lights show you Ready, Busy, and Fault. The most important feature of the OmniDrive is that it is divided into 1.25-megabyte sections called volumes. A first glance through the manual gives novices the impression that these volumes are going to unnecessarily complicate life, but in view of the Finder difficulties, these volumes turn out to be immensely useful. The five-megabyte version

contains four volumes. You can think of a volume as being similar to a diskette. The smallest volume on the smallest OmniDrive holds more than twice as much information as one regular disk does.

In search of that unfortunate threshold of the Finder, I opened up a volume, added the system information and MacWrite, and started adding files. After I had 93 items (1232K) in the volume, I noticed that as I continued to duplicate files, the amount of space available on the volume stopped decreasing. I supposedly had 36K remaining, and even though I duplicated more and more files, I still had 36K remaining.

Suspecting I had crossed the line, I tried to open the last file I had created. I was met with This document

cannot be opened. As it turned out, all of my files after number 87 had the same problem. By this time, I'd become used to things happening without warning; in fact, I was expecting it.

This problem appears to be a bug, however, and Corvus will probably be working on it by the time you read this article. On the positive side, I was able to use all the storage space in the volume, and I had three more volumes at my disposal. The Clean Up command actually worked, though slowly (it took five minutes).

The volume format limits the number of volumes that you can "mount" at once—you should mount only one at a time. When you mount a volume, its icon is on the screen, and data can be read from and written to that volume. The Macintosh, therefore, has smaller amounts of information to deal with at once, which lets you circumvent the Finder difficulties and is essential for large-capacity (i.e., more than five-megabyte) hard disks.

The OmniDrive also adds less







space to files you copy to it. My 13K files turned into 16K, and my 6 and 9K files turned into 12K.

To Buy or Not to Buy

Many of the difficulties I've mentioned will disappear with a new version of the Finder that is designed to work with hard disks and other massstorage devices. For the time being, however, users have to live with the Finder's current constraints. Some guidance in the documentation would have reduced my frustration level considerably. In spite of the problems, if you know you're going to need mass storage, purchasing a hard disk now is not a bad idea. If you're prepared to deal with the Finder problems, you'll be able to make use of the products now, and eventually Apple will revise the Finder.

The products from Tecmar, Davong, and Corvus are all in the same general price range, although prices vary, depending on memory capacity. Some of the Tecmar drives have a removable five-megabyte cartridge, and the Corvus provides formatted volumes. These major distinctions will help you decide which product is right for you. If you decide not to purchase now, you'll have more choices in the future. Davong is planning a tape drive for backing up your hard disk and a Backup and Restore feature to help you copy and restore backup files, as well as a volumemanagement program.

ther hard disks are on the way. Quark Incorporated is producing the QC10, which is Macintosh-compatible. You can divide the disk into volumes of any size and password-protect them.

SUN*DISK from Sunol Systems comes in sizes from 8 to 92 megabytes. Sunol is working on a networking interface that will allow several Macs to share a single SUN*DISK.

Symbiotic Computer Systems is creating the Mac Symbile. The Symbiotic Mac IIc Adaptor will reportedly allow you to connect a hard disk to your second floppy port, freeing the modem port for other use.

Because the Macintosh is unique and still rather new, solving the interface problems will take some time. As more products arrive on the scene



Move Over Lisa, the Mac Assembler Is Here

ormally, I write this column only every other month, but this month is special: Apple is finally releasing its assembler package for the Macintosh.

Since you'll want to experiment with the assembler as soon as you get it, I thought I'd write briefly about how you program with it.

First, the good news: Using the Mac assembler is a relatively straightforward process. The manual does a fairly good job of describing what you do, so I won't belabor that subject here. Actually, the process closely resembles the way software developers have been using the Lisa assembler to create Mac products:

- Use the editor to create your source
- Assemble and link your code.
- Use RMAKER to create the resource file and to stuff the code into the resource file.

The procedure for using RMAKER is described in a chapter of Inside Macintosh entitled "Putting Together a Macintosh Application."

Those of you who got early copies of Inside Macintosh should take note that Apple updated the manuscript in August to reflect changes in the software. Thus, some versions of the chapter on RMAKER may provide outdated and confusing information. If you happen to be stuck with the old manual, you may want to write to

Apple's new assembler package allows you to create sophisticated application software with your Mac

Apple to request an update.

OK, you have your 68000 assembly-language handbooks handy, your copy of Inside Macintosh turned to the application chapter, and your Mac turned on and running the assembler disk. Now what?

Well, that's the bad news.

Nowhere in any of the documentation I've received from Apple do the authors attempt to put the whole Mac development environment together to tell you what comes first, what goes second, and so on. I'll use the rest of the limited space I have available this month to try to provide some answers to these questions.

First, you need to tell the assembler about the Mac-specific calls it is going to encounter in your program. Therefore, the first thing in your source code should be a set of IN-CLUDEs, so that the assembler will understand Mactalk:

INCLUDE MacDefs.D INCLUDE HeapDefs.D INCLUDE MacTraps.D INCLUDE ToolEqu.D

and so on, one INCLUDE statement for each of the definition files Apple has provided and that you need in your program. If, for some reason, you aren't going to use the toolbox





goodies Apple provides, you can omit the INCLUDE ToolEqu.D statement, for instance. I strongly suggest that you print out each of the definition files and have them by your computer for reference as you begin to program. *Inside Macintosh* uses Pascal, not assembly, terminology, so you'll see <u>DisposWindow</u> in the definition file. If you're not watching for these small changes, you're going to get stuck real quick.

Now for some quicky hints to round out this month's offering:

1. First, initialize all managers you'll be using: _InitGraf, _InitFont, _InitWindow, _InitMenu, _InitDialog, _TEInit, and so on. Remember, some of these managers have parameters that must be on the stack before initialization.

Ithough *Inside Mac*intosh uses Pascal terminology, you can see how to convert it to assembly language by noting that each argument (the material in parentheses) in a Pascal function is "pushed" onto the stack in order. Thus, in assembly, you simply push that same information (or pointers to it) onto the stack in the order you desire.




Figure 1: Habadex's main image

2. Open your resource file second (see figure 1, page 35).

3. Set up your menus third. Now you're ready to dictate what comes next by writing program specifications.

Next month we'll put together a simple application that consists of nothing more than a menu and a dialog box. From there we'll build to bigger and better programs.







How to find a in a haystack.

Making Space for the Electronic Desktop

f any machine, even a Macintosh, wants to claim a share of the scarce space on the office and professional desktops of the world, it must displace some of the items that are already there. That's exactly what several of the first "productivity" packages for the Mac claim to do: replace books and pads traditionally found on physical desktops with improved equivalents on the Mac's electronic desk.

Intermatrix's MacPhone is an allin-one address book, calendar, and auto-dial telephone that also records and reports billing information. Haba Systems' Habadex also combines an address book, a calendar, and a dialer, but this program places special emphasis on working with address lists. Factfinder, from Forethought, Inc.'s Macware line, wants to edge out your card file and the blotter or notepad where you jot your notes. Living Videotext's ThinkTank has eyes on your yellow pad.

You can get along for now without any of these packages if you're fond of the scratching of a sharp #2 pencil. Unlike word-processing programs and structured databases, these programs won't so vastly and immediately change the way offices work that those who don't use them will be quickly left behind. Instead, they're tools that can, if they match the ways and rhythms of how you work, make your day run a bit more smoothly and productively.

Four productivity programs for the Macintosh can replace your telephone directory, calendar, and notepads.

Habadex and Macphone both let you type in your telephone list once and then let your Mac electronically thumb through the pages to find and dial numbers. An adapter box that plugs into the speaker jack of your Mac does the actual dialing.

Habadex's main image shows an address book (the Habadex Directory), a calendar book (labeled Habadex Appointments), and the usual Macintosh pull-down menu strip across the top (see figure 1, page 148).


One of Habadex's outstanding features is its addressing and sorting capability. You'll notice, in fact, that the address book is deservedly the largest item on the main Habadex desktop

As a first step, of course, you have to enter your address list into the Habadex. Using a predefined form provided by Haba, you can enter the name, address, phone, account number, and three other short identifiers for each person on your list. Then you can look through your list in order, by first name, last name, category, company, ZIP code, account, or three miscellaneous identifiers. You can rearrange the list as often as you like; each time you do, the address book on the screen shows the appropriate tabs for dividing your list into about 20 subsections.

If you have an Apple modem, an equivalent modem, or Haba's own Habadex Adapter, you can even have your Mac actually dial the phone. If you call up a name from your address book, you can tell Habadex to dial that person's home or business number (either directly or using a discount long-distance service).

nce you have entered your list, you can use it for more than looking up and dialing phone numbers. Using the Print menu, you can produce several kinds of mailing labels, a printed name-and-address list, or even a merged form letter.

In the Calendar mode, Habadex lets you pick a month, then zoom in on an individual day within the month, and then list your appointments for the day. If you enter the time for each appointment when you close up the calendar, Habadex keeps track of your next two entries, listing





a shortened form of your entries under the name Habadex Appointments.

You can also pull up a Things to Do list, where you enter your projects in order of priority. The two top items on this list also show up on the main Habadex screen, along with your impending appointments. There's no elegant way to print out the calendar pages or the Things to Do list yet, so you have to use the standard Macintosh screen-print routines (pressing X, Shift, and 4 key for direct printout or the \$\mathbb{H}\$, Shift, and 3 key to send the image to a MacPaint document).

Habadex turns out to be extremely easy to use, if at times a bit clumsy. If you make a lot of additions or changes to your lists and your calendar, however, you'll find that you really need a hard disk or a lot of patience to make effective use of the program. With a floppy, I found adding and changing data to be painfully slow.

For example, when you add new names to your list, the program indexes each entry eight different ways so you can call it up from your address book in any of eight arrangements. On a floppy, with 100 names on file, this process takes an excruciating 30 seconds per name—on a Davong hard disk, it takes a more acceptable 11/2 seconds. Similarly, it takes the Mac up to two minutes with a floppy to put away what you've been working on and another minute to boot up Habadex; the same procedure takes only a few seconds with the hard disk.

Dialing for Dollars

Intermatrix's MacPhone keeps your name and phone list only in name order, so it takes no more than ten seconds to update a record using a floppy (and about a second on the hard disk). Instead of offering an address book, it features more extensive telephone support, including call tim-




Figure 2: MacPhone screen display

ing and a complete call log. In addition, if you enter the telephone rates, it can display and log the cost of each call. If you charge consulting fees for your time on the phone, MacPhone can also compute what the fee should be at your usual rates.

Intermatrix's MacPhone adapter is a lightweight electronic handset and base unit about the size of a software

binder that adheres onto the side of your Mac with double-sided tape. You plug it into the Mac's speaker output and connect it to the phone line (and you need to supply power to it through its included AC adapter). If you like your own phone better than Intermatrix's, you can substitute yours by plugging it into the standard jack on the base unit.

Dialing out with MacPhone is fast and easy. All you do is pick a name from your phone list, and MacPhone dials the number (see figure 2). If the number is busy, it stays selected, so you can redial without finding the name and number again. If you have several long-distance services or wish to alternate between using a service and dialing directly (using your default long-distance service, usually AT&T), MacPhone lets you enter several services and pick among them.

During your call, you can take notes with MacPhone, using the Mac as a simple word processor. These notes become part of the phone log MacPhone accumulates, giving you a record of whom you called, when, how long you spoke, what the charges were, the amount of your consulting bill (if you've filled in the values), and your notes.

Along with telephone management, MacPhone includes a calendaring function similar to the one in Habadex. Instead of a closed calendar book with tabs for a year, however, you get a three-month open-calendar display when you select MacPhone's calendar. Just as with Habadex, to add items or examine a particular day, you




Figure 3: Factfinder screen display

zoom in by clicking on the selected day with the mouse. MacPhone also lets you create and store longer memos for future dates—they will appear automatically on the appropriate day.

If you spend most of your time on the phone and are willing to keep your notes up to date, this program can be a great help. The built-in accounting system works adequately for figuring time charges if you keep a strict relationship between phoneconnect time and charge, but it cannot handle the complexity of longdistance rates.

Just as with the other desktop programs, a hard disk or at least a dedicated machine will help you get the most out of this product. If your cal-

endar or phone log becomes very long, it can take a minute or longer to file and retrieve your data on floppies. Last, if you're busy enough to keep a phone log, you probably can't spare three minute to close what you're doing and bring this program up every time your phone rings.

Notes Made to Order

While Habadex and MacPhone tuck away lists with neat name, date, or address pegs, Factfinder promises to help you straighten out all those scribbles about less-structured information. The program is basically an electronically indexed, erasable, reusable notepad.

Factfinder's electronic metaphor is a stack of papers that represent a complete word-processing document or a complete file within a database. You can rearrange the sheets in the stack, sort them, temporarily or permanently winnow out certain sheets, print the stack, or even send part or all out as a text file for inclusion in a MacWrite document.

To enable Factfinder to quickly sort through and arrange your stacks, after you enter the notes on each sheet with a simplified word processor, you assign each sheet one or

more "keys." The keys are either terms that appear in the text or concepts under which you want to cross-reference that particular sheet. Then, when you want to find something in the stack, you give Factfinder the keys and let it electronically sift through the stack (figure 3, page 158).

Marking the keys is easy. You can mark words as you type in your notes, use the mouse almost like a highlighter pen to mark them later, or type your keywords directly into the keyword window (this method lets you use keywords that don't appear in the text).

Along with simply searching for all the sheets in your stack that include your specified key, you can also select ranges of data values and Boolean (and and or) combinations, and you can limit your search to previously found subsets. Curiously, the initial version has no negation operator, so if you want to search for sheets that do not include a keyword, you have to start with the complete stack and temporarily delete what you don't want.

If you want to see the results on paper rather than as fleeting phosphorescences on the screen, FactI start considering a computer to be slow and unresponsive if response time is more than about two seconds.

finder can print the complete stack or a portion of it. Using a formatting option, you can even choose to print the first several lines with a set amount of space between the sheets—an ideal way to combine a structured mailing list with an unstructured collection of notes about each person on the list. You can also print your list of keywords or the titles you gave to each sheet in the stack.


The program is a wonderful idea, but once more, a hard disk is a great help for most practical applications. For example, in a stack of only 20 sheets, moving from one page directly forward to the next takes about 18 seconds with a floppy, and making a new keyword selection takes the better part of a minute. With a hard disk,

the times for these tasks are less than two seconds and less than five respectively. Since I start considering a computer to be slow and unresponsive if response time is more than about two seconds, these floppy-disk intervals seem positively glacial. It also means that reading a dozen short pages of notes might take a good five to ten minutes, instead of the one to two it would take with 3×5 cards.


Having Second Thoughts

ThinkTank, by contrast, doesn't want you to leave your information as disconnected jottings, but instead seeks to help you get your ideas in order. This electronic outline processor keeps track of indentations and hierarchies as you type in your outlines. If you want to see overall structure, you can "collapse" parts of the outline, temporarily hiding more detailed headings while you look at the overall structure.

ThinkTank does assist with outline making admirably in its Apple IIe and IBM PC versions, but I think you'll be somewhat disappointed in the version written for the original 128K Macintosh. Unlike its predecessors, Macintosh ThinkTank 128 lets you make an outline but doesn't let you

flesh it out with text. The program doesn't use the same user interface that most Macintosh programs do, and it has several significant restrictions that keep you from rearranging your outline as freely as you might wish. In light of Living Videotext's past performance, however, I expect to see a more powerful and smoother version forthcoming for the Mac.

Standing Fast

Since quick switches in context are not the Macintosh's strong suit at present, perhaps all of these programs need to be regarded, for now, not as items on an electronic desk, but as possible desks in themselves. Unless you have a limitless supply of Macintoshes, though, and space to put them in, the question becomes whether any of these applications can justify dedicating a machine to a single application.

One drawback of MacPhone and Habadex is that they cannot listen for tones while they are dialing. Particularly when you dial through a switchboard or through a long-distance service, which may involve unpredictable delays, these products often fail to dial correctly. They seem to work fine, though, when you dial di-

Most of the programs worked strikingly better with a hard disk. If you can afford an upgraded system, running these programs on the Mac means working with a nimble partner rather than dealing with a friendly slowpoke. In addition to response time, a hard disk gives you room for larger files and more programs ready at once—giving you, in effect, a bigger and better electronic desk.

If you can't see shelling out the

money for a hard disk right now, but you're clever, fortunate, and restrained enough to have established a relaxed work schedule, then any of the first three desktop aids may seem worthwhile, even on floppies. But if you're like most of us and can't spare those extra minutes, then you may want to pencil a reminder onto your calendar now to take another look at these programs when they come out in faster versions or when you can buy an affordable hard disk that works well with the Macintosh.

Mac Tips Suggestions from our readers

Protect Your Mac Picture

Suppose you draw a neat picture and you want to quit for a few minutes, but you don't want anybody to disturb your drawing. All you have to do is open one of the desk accessories and drag it all the way down to the lower right-hand corner so that it is almost totally off the screen. Mac-Paint will not be accessible until you put the desk accessory away.

Self-Centering

If you want to find the exact center of the drawing screen (to center text, for instance), draw a dot anywhere on the screen and circle it with the lasso. Choose Cut from the Edit menu and then Paste. The Paste command automatically centers images on the drawing screen. Actually, the exact center of the screen is the lower right-hand corner of the dot, since the screen is an even number of pixels horizontally and vertically.

Columns of Text in MacWrite

Creating MacWrite documents with two columns of text while utilizing word-wrap-around can be quite a hassle. If you're going to print the document, however, you can get around this problem easily.

Choose full justification from the alignment boxes in the ruler. Then set the right margin at 3¾ inches. After you've entered the text, insert a new ruler at the top of every page except the first. On the second page, set the left margin at 4¾ inches; on the third, set the right margin at 3¾ inches; and so on. Then, using the cut-and-paste technique, rearrange the pages so the pages with the text on the left are all grouped together, followed by the pages with the text on the right.

Print the document by choosing Print from the File window. When the

dialog box appears, check Continuous Paper Feed and type the page range of the first half of your document under Page Range. For example, if your document is ten pages long, choose a number between 1 and 5 for the page range.

After the printing, tear off these pages and refeed them into the printer. Printing again, after choosing a number between 6 and 10 for the page range, will place the right-hand columns next to the preprinted left-hand columns.

Wide-Column Multiplan

This tip allows you to print Multiplan columns with up to 128 characters on a single sheet of paper, using the wide-print option.

1. Select the Show Values option.

- 2. Set the column width to half the final value that you want; for example, set the column width to 50 characters if you want 100 characters as a result.
- 3. Select the Show Formulas option, and the column width will double; for example, a column width of 50 characters will become 100.
- 4. Notice that invoking the Column Width command results in an Invalid Column Width message, even though the program works fine and the spreadsheet prints properly.





Merry Christmas and a Happy New Tax Year! Tax Year? That's right. January 1, 1985, at 12:01 A.M. is the beginning of a new calendar and a new tax year. Tradition dictates that the new year requires a New Year's resolution.

If I may, let me suggest one: "My New Year's resolution is to keep my tax records in order so I can save money and, in case I'm audited, have my records organized enough that the Internal Revenue Service won't consider sending me to Alcatraz.'

You're probably saying to yourself, "No problem-Alcatraz is closed and the new 'white collar' prisons look like country clubs." If the IRS had its way, though, Alcatraz would be reopened, and you or someone you know would be an inmate.

Every year, everybody gripes about keeping tax records. Most of us just throw our receipts into a drawer and sit down at the end of the year, collate them, add them up, and wonder what happened to the receipts that we can't find.

A few people are a little more organized. They throw their receipts into a drawer and add them up monthly.

Then we have the hard-core record keepers who add up their receipts weekly,

put them in an envelope, and add them all up at the end of the month.

All three systems have merit, and their result is the same: At the end of the year, you have a set of numbers and shoe boxes full of receipts you need to do your

taxes. Organizing them and adding them up is a headache, though—a headache that can turn into a bigger headache if you don't take care of it promptly.

Also, because you are probably looking at your mass of receipts after the beginning of the year, you don't have a chance to do any tax planning. With few exceptions, you can't do anything to change your tax liability for the previous vear after January 1.

Turning Over a New Leaf

Let's look at a way you can be prepared next year. How? With an automated, tax-deductible, inexpensive record-keeping system that will keep you apprised of your current financial situation. The system we will use is Dollars and Sense from Monogram of Inglewood, California.

Dollars and Sense does a lot more than just keep tax records. You can also use it for household budgeting or for doing the books of a small business. The only difference that distinguishes the three uses of the program is the chart of accounts for each function.

A chart of accounts is like a map that explains the financial geography of a business or individual to an accountant. It lists all of the accounts that contain records of financial transactions. For example, a household budgeting system has an account called Groceries, in which you record all food purchases. A business doesn't have a grocery account unless it's a restaurant, but it does have a furniture/fixtures account. Dollars and Sense can accommodate up to 120 accounts.

A tax-oriented chart of accounts may include some accounts, such as interest expenses and medical expenses, that also appear on the household and/ or business charts. You may want to tailor some of the accounts to pertain specifically to taxes. For example, on a household-budget chart, you record your total mortgage payment in one account called Mortgage. On a tax-oriented chart, on the other hand, you should break that payment into subcategories such as Principal, Interest, Real-Estate Tax, Insurance, and so on. Making these distinctions is important because the principal portion of the

payment is not tax-deductible, but many of the other parts are.

To use Dollars and Sense for tax purposes, you can create your own chart of accounts from scratch, use the chart that comes with the software, or do a combination of both. We are going to use Dollars and Sense's standard chart.

A chart of accounts is like a map that explains the financial geography of a business or individual to an accountant.

Dollars and Sense uses four categories, or types of accounts. The most frequently used account is a checking account, which is one of the Dollars and Sense base accounts. Dollars and Sense tracks the activity in and out of the base accounts, which is how it keeps track of where your money goes and for what. The other accounts that usually serve as base accounts are money-market funds, credit cards, and so on. Any account that you can use to pay bills can

be a base account.

By tracking transactions through these base accounts and by knowing what is and isn't tax-deductible, you can assemble the information you need in order to do your taxes easily.


The remaining three categories of accounts are for assets, income, and expenses.

Now, I'm not naive enough to think that you are going to sit down at your computer every night and enter in all of your day's transactions. So, how do you capture the information in the meantime? The answer is simple: you use your checkbook and an accordion file.

An accordion file is a file that has pockets that are usually labeled with the letters of the alphabet. Its name comes from the expanding sides, or gussets, that let the file expand as you put paper in.

Whenever you think about it, empty your wallet, pocketbook, pockets, and briefcase and throw your receipts into the section of the file whose letter corresponds to the account name (*E* for Electric Bill, *T* for Telephone, and so on.) Then, every so often (the more frequently, the better), enter the information into Dollars and Sense.

After you've entered the informa-

If you ever get audited, you will find that it helps to have receipts, as well as canceled checks, in order, in one place.

Why not wait until the end of the year or not use Dollars and Sense at all? Because you will miss opportunities to save on your taxes. Remember, with very few exceptions, you can't change your taxes from last year.

By entering into Dollars and Sense each check you write and each tax-related charge you make, you create a chronological record of your transactions. Even more important, you get a reporting capability that allows you to prepare your taxes quickly and easily.

Also, if you have your return prepared professionally, giving your accountant the reports Dollars and Sense has generated will probably save him or her time, which will lower the fee (your accountant will undoubtedly hate this program).

Using the Program

Now that you understand what you

are trying to do, let's assess how Dollars and Sense can help you.

Whenever you enter your transactions, you must choose between two types of transactions, unique or recurring. Unique transactions can be for almost anything: a purchase, a repair bill, a donation. Recurring transactions, as the name implies, happen over and over again. Examples of recurring transactions are your paycheck, mortgage payment, and car payment.

Whenever you enter a transaction, you have to break it down into components such as the cost of the item or service, the income, the taxes, and the like.

Consider a car payment, which consists of a loan-principal repayment and interest. To record this payment, you take the amount of the payment out of your checking account and distribute the principal repayment to a loan account and the interest to an interest-expense account.

Car payments recur, so why should you type the same entry, month after month? Well, you don't have to. Dollars and Sense lets you set up automatic transactions that take care of this distribution for you. You can use these automatic transactions for mortgage payments and paychecks (FICA, federal tax, state tax, and so on). You can build up to 25 sets of 100 automatic transactions each.

Let's assume that it's April 14, 1985, and you have been using Dollars and Sense all year long. You know that doing your record keeping during the year was easier than putting it off till the last minute and that Dollars and Sense was easy to use and did a good job.

By pressing just a few keys, you will get a complete, itemized financial history of the previous year.

The first report you need is a year-to-date summary of how much money you've spent, and for what. Figure 1 shows Dollars and Sense's year-to-date account summary. Take a look—the aggregate totals you need to figure out your taxes are right there, along with your balances and, if you set them earlier, your budgets.

In addition, you can generate a personal-income statement, a balance sheet, a cash-flow analysis, and an item-by-item listing of every transaction all year long. Just think of your accountant's face when you pull that out of your briefcase.

As a bonus, Dollars and Sense comes in handy during the year for graphically analyzing why you invariably go over your budget.

So far, so good. You have an excellent record-keeping system for taxes, but you don't have any way of forecasting or doing tax-planning "what ifs." Not this month, anyway. In February, we will revisit Dollars and Sense and an accompanying tax-planning program from Monogram called Forecast.

For now, though, you have an orderly, auditable set of records that is easy to work with. Not bad for less than \$150 and a little bit of time during the year.

FLIGHT SIMULATOR II

Take notice, all you would-be Charles Lindberghs and Amelia Earharts, here's your chance to take the controls of an airplane and log flight hours without risking life and limb.

Flight Simulator II from Sub-LOGIC Corporation lets you sit in the pilot's seat of a simulated Piper PA-28-181 Archer II that is capable of cruising at 148 miles per hour. Flight Simulator II provides a set of features and capabilities that cover a wide range of interest levels-from the "I've always wanted to feel what it's like to fly" person, to the student pilot who wants to hone basic flight procedures, to Snoopyesque flying aces itching for a dogfight. According to the people at SubLOGIC, instrument-rated pilots fly Flight Simulator II to keep their instrument skills current.

You can fly out of one of more than 70 airports in four metropolitan areas: Chicago, Los Angeles, New York, and Seattle. For you fighter pilots, the World War I Ace game features an aerial fighting grid laid out to facilitate bombing raids and aerial skirmishes. When you fly out of the cities, major topographical features give you visual points of reference that add interest to an otherwise dull flight. I'd like to see

more ground features to enhance the flight simulation, but at least you can circle Seattle's Space Needle or cruise by the Empire State Building.

Flying, of course, is the principal feature of Flight Simulator II. Getting airborne is a cinch, as it is in a real airplane. The difficulty begins, again as in a real flight, in controlling the airplane for straight and level flying—and, even worse, for landing. The most criti-

cal difference between real flight and Flight Simulator II is that real flying is decidedly easier. Straight and level flight in Flight Simulator II is an unrealistic challenge. Landings are devastating. I'm a licensed pilot with, admittedly, only 70 hours of logged flight time; but I've never crashed. (I'm writing this, aren't I?) With Flight Simulator II, in more than 60 attempted landings, I've only landed four times—and not once on a runway. All the other times-splat! That's not counting the time I flew into the Sears Tower or the several times I was shot down after taking on too many enemy fighters. The point is, if you are seriously trying to reinforce flight training or master simulated flight, Flight Simulator II is a real test and then some. If you can successfully fly Flight Simulator II,



you may be a latent Chuck Yeageryou've got the right stuff.

Besides being difficult to fly, Flight Simulator II has at least one irritating bug. On a couple of occasions, in what I had intended to be a controlled bank. the wings went into an uncontrollable teeter-totter motion that gave me vertigo. I was so relieved when I crashed because I would have needed one of those small paper bags airlines provide, if it had gone on much longer. A Sub-LOGIC employee told me to use the keyboard instead of the joystick for controlling turns; but that takes away much of the tactile simulation, and I chose not to listen because I like the joystick. I just learned to use a delicate touch. Real airplanes are not so sensitive and are easier to control.

Aggression, the Better Part of Valor

In World War I Ace, I encountered another problem. I flew into enemy ter-

ritory, bombed a factory and a fuel depot, and then engaged in several dogfights. I downed two enemy fighters and came away virtually unscathed, save for a few minor hits. No biggie-I was still flying. But horrors! My fuel

gauge read empty. Since there are two fuel tanks, I quickly grabbed the manual to learn how to switch to the full one. The documentation details the keystrokes, but in World War I Ace, switching tanks doesn't work; so I helplessly crashed in enemy territory.

Nevertheless, I enjoy World War I Ace—at least when I maintain the proper perspective. There's nothing like a couple of bombing runs after a tough day at the office to soothe the nerves and work up an appetite for dinner. I just don't plan on making it home in one piece. My choices are limited. I can plan my flight so that after leveling a factory or two, I hightail it back to friendly territory. The only problem with this strategy is that my chances for landing are slim or none—remember my safe-landing percentage? My other choice is to be macho and wreak as much havoc as possible by dropping all five of my bombs and tangling with (instead of avoiding) all the fighters that are sent out to turn me into winged flambé. Then, when the fuel runs out or my plane is riddled with holes, I turn kamikaze. If I'm going to crash and burn, I might as well do it with honor. Banzai! A well-placed dive makes short work of an enemy fuel depot. I only wish I could get points for such bravado.



Flight Simulator II allows the serious flyer to specify a variety of flying conditions—including aircraft position, altitude, attitude, reliability, and environmental controls. The Reliability mode simulates engine and other sundry aircraft problems; reliability is specified as a percentage that regulates how often something unhealthy happens. You can set a range from a totally reliable aircraft to a terribly unreliable aircraft (good luck).

Using environmental controls, you can specify seasons, two cloud layers, and three wind levels. You define each cloud layer by its bottom and top altitudes; each wind level gets its own altitude, velocity, and direction. Also available is a reality mode that, when switched on, makes flying more diffi-



cult by activating subtle factors such as an engine that dies when too much throttle is applied too quickly.

Flight Simulator II stores various combinations of flight conditions in user-mode categories. Ten user modes, 0-9, are preset. They include conditions from easy flight, to dusk flight, to badweather flight. You can set and save 15 additional user modes of your own choice.

For instance, I'm going to define a set of conditions that puts me 1000 feet above ground level, one mile from a runway, and perfectly lined up for a successful landing. Then I'll just specify my user mode and automatically be set in a position to practice crashing, uh... I mean landing.

Is It Real, or Is It . . .?

Flight Simulator II nosedives because of the exaggerated difficulty of controlled flight and landings. Conversely, it soars in terms of the motion, visual perspective, and instrumentation of flight simulation. The topographical graphics are ho-hum, but the simulation graphics are truly amazing. Your view out of the airplane's window accurately depicts the airplane's physical attitude (banking, climbing, descending, or spinning). Plus, at any given moment, you can look out of the airplane in eight directions that cover the full 360degree panorama. As if that weren't enough, you can also select ground radar, which tracks your position directly beneath your airplane. The radar zooms in and out, which is most helpful when you are taxiing around an unknown airport—you zoom out to see where your airplane is in relation to the entire airfield.

Not only do the instrument panel and radio stack comply with FAA regulations for visual and instrument flight rules, but their actions are also authentic. They are so comprehensive and authentic, in fact, that SubLOGIC is currently seeking FAA approval for accepting the logging of Flight Simulator II instrument approaches.

You can fly in color or monochrome; color is desirable but not essential. Mechanically, all the controls are handled at the keyboard. As might be expected, becoming fluent with these controls requires a certain period of adjustment. I like the optional joystick because of the yokelike feel of working the ailerons and elevator.

Flight Simulator II's documentation comes in two manuals. One is a basic flight manual; and the other contains explanations on the physical dynamics of flying, eight basic flight lessons that cover takeoffs through instrument-landing-system approaches, and an introduction to aerobatics. Both manuals are adequately written in a serious tone. Additionally, you get area charts for the four metropolitan cities and a flight-reference card.

Nothing surpasses flying in a real single-engine aircraft. To experience it, you can contact a local flight service for a scenic ride or bear the expense of flight lessons. If neither of these choices suits you, but you still want to discover the sensation of small-aircraft flight, Flight Simulator II is the next best choice.



BOOKS

When in doubt, buy a book. This time-honored trick works even better in the computer world, where someone has written a book for almost every possible application or interest. We won't bother to list books for every specialty, but instead offer a sampling of more general tomes, suitable for reading while curled up next to a warm CPU. Introduction to the Lisa, by Arthur Naiman: \$9.95 from Addison-Wesley. This copiously illustrated book clearly explains the Lisa's hardware and software features and describes each of its applications. Good for Lisa owners or prospective Lisa owners.

The Apple Macintosh Book, by Cary Lu; \$18.95 from Microsoft Press. A simple, readable compendium of what you need to know to work with your



Macintosh. Also a good gift for your friends who've been slavering over the possibility of getting a Macintosh. Help them suffer happily.

Computer Wimp, by John Bear; \$9.95 from Ten Speed Press. This witty wandering through the seamy side of owning a computer entertains as well as it teaches, splendidly in both cases. We wish we'd been the ones who'd had the fun of assembling the collages of clip art to illustrate this book. Good for any computer owner.

Hackers: Heroes of the Computer Revolution, by Steven Levy; \$17.95 from Doubleday. If the names Ricky Greenblatt, Lee Felsenstein, and John Harris don't mean anything to you, they should—these people are some of the "hackers," in the true meaning of the word, who created the computers, programs, and computer languages we blithely use today. The Hacker Ethic's four commandments—hands on at all costs, information should be free, mistrust authority, and computers can

change the world—have collided with other more mundane commandments lately. This book is a hagiography of hackers.

The Unofficial I Hate Computers Book, by Rich Tennant and John Barry; \$4.95 from Hayden. This is a great computer gag gift, best presented to people who think computers make them gag. The Unofficial I Hate Computers Book is better than The Official I Hate Cats Books; in fact, as you'll see from the cover illustration, this book could be considered the cats' revenge. Cartoons to illuminate every nasty fantasy you had about what to do with that fershlugginer computer.

Apple II User's Guide, by Lon Poole, Martin McNiff, and Steven Cook; \$17.95 from McGraw-Hill. A hands-on resource book not only for the II, II Plus, and IIe, but also useful for the IIc. Explains all the basic features of your Apple.

Fire in the Valley: The Making of the Personal Computer, by Paul Freiberger and Michael Swaine; \$9.95 from McGraw-Hill. In interviews with Silicon Valley pioneers such as Steve Jobs, Gary Kildall, Bill Gates, and others, Freiberger and Swaine trace the slow mustering of forces and the sudden, explosive growth of the microcomputer. A fascinating read. (See the excerpt in this issue, pages 55-68.)

The Book of Adventure Games, by Kim Schuette; \$19.95 from Array, Inc./The Book Division. This is a dangerous book: for the uninitiated, because it lures you into the world of adventure gaming, and for the aficionado, because it gives away a few (but not all) of the answers. You may not agree with the author's assessments of the games, but you get enough information to make your own choices.

SOFTWARE

We hesitate to offer you too many hints on software. Hundreds of packages are available, and you know your needs better than we do. For gifts, a good rule of thumb is to buy something the recipients may want but can't bring themselves to buy. On that note, we'll mention the following:

Rocky's Boots, from The Learning Company, listed at \$49.95, for the II Plus and IIe. We want this one. It painlessly teaches you the basics of computer logic and electronic circuitry. You build machines, plug "spare parts" into each other, and play "games" that let you play with hardware and wiring. Especially good for kids, but you might try it too.

Music Construction Set, from Electronic Arts, listed at \$39.95, for the II se-



ries. Construct your own melodies with this icon-oriented program. Most fun for budding musicians or closet music lovers. They laughed when you sat down at the keyboard—but they'll cry when they hear your rendition of "Tears on my Apple."

Sargon III Chess, from Hayden Software, listed at \$49.95, for the Macintosh and Apple II series. Chess, for beginners or experts, with nine levels of difficulty. You can replay historic chess games, let the computer suggest good moves for you, or practice openings, midgame strategy, or endgame moves. You'll be glad we pawned this one off on you.

The Print Shop, from Brøderbund, listed at \$50, for the II series. Buy this program right away for yourself, and you can make your own Christmas cards. Buy it for other people, and they'll have



different type styles, formats, border designs, and graphics to experiment with and make cards, invitations, flyers, and logos. (See review, page 95.)







licorice?) disks are always welcome, no doubt, but your loved ones may appreciate a change of pace—multicolored disks. They're all the rage now; there's no truth to the rumor that Boy George has started to braid them into his hair, but they still look good, and the performance is the same. Go for a rainbow of colors (at about \$33 for a box of ten) or buy two tasteful boxes of red and green in honor of the season.

A carrying case. For the portable members of the Apple family. Cases for the II family run about \$40; cases for the Macintosh will cost around \$99.

Disk-filing boxes. You can find something in every price range here. Diskette files begin with workhorse plastic and end with the polished finery of oak and mahogany. Plastic file boxes cost \$15-\$19; wooden boxes are \$25-\$30.

Printer ribbons and printer paper. As with disks, you can spring for the colored versions, but a healthy supply of standard-issue ribbons and paper will still be appreciated.

HARDWARE

Go ahead, be adventurous. You can help your friends make their own kind of music, play their own kind of games, use a new operating system, or just you should pardon the expressionreach out and touch someone. The following interesting peripherals and cards can open up new, uncharted regions for computer users. One caution: If you're going to get hardware that you think may have the *ghost* of a chance of being incompatible, ask somehow. Hint around. Just be casual, but find out whether the stuff plugs in, or you're courting disappointment.

A RAM expansion card. If the gift recipient has an Apple II or II Plus with only 48K RAM, you can get a 16K RAM card for about \$50 to bring the system up to 64K. An Apple IIe can be upgraded to 128K with a 64K Extended 80-column card from Apple that lists for \$295, but you can locate them less expensively at discount stores or mail-order houses. Or you might want to look for a CP/M card, which would make even more software available for your Apple. Check the magazine ads.


An inexpensive modem. This peripheral will put confirmed computer addicts in contact with hundreds of other computer addicts. Guaranteed hours of pleasure for them. Two modems under \$200 are The Networker from Zoom Telephonics, at \$129, 300 baud, software included; the Volksmodem from

Anchor Automation, at \$79.95 (\$12.95 for cables), 300 baud; and The Operator from Timecor, at \$159, 300 baud, software included. You'll discover other models and various pros and cons, but the idea's well worth exploring.

The Mockingboard Sound Effect Generator, from Sweet Micro Systems, listed at \$99.95 without speech effects and



\$199.95 with speech. Enhances other software with stereo music, sound effects, and speech-synthesizing capabilities. Good for the entire II series, including the IIc.

DAPPLES AT WORK

OPEN WIDE

YOUR DENTIST CAN USE AN APPLE TO HYPNOTIZE YOU, TO PLAN YOUR ORTHONDONTIA, OR TO CURE YOUR FEAR OF FILLINGS.

Apples are good for your teeth. Dentists throughout the country are using Apple computers to manage offices, plan orthodontic treatment, help hypnotize patients, and give anxious clients a chance to overcome their dental phobia.

Currently, few of the 126,000 dentists in America use computers in their practice. The American Dental Association estimates that fewer than 10% of its 104,000 practicing members have computers in-house. Another 20% contract with outside bureaus for computer services.

Those numbers are growing as more and more dentists discover how computers such as the Apple can help them run their offices and clinics. More and more of these practitioners are using Apples in ways that make them and their patients feel like smiling.

Hypnotism vs. Hypodermics

Are you afraid of pain? Do you require novocaine for even the slightest dental treatment? If you went to see Dr. Skip Neiburger, he would sympathize but probably try to talk you out of wanting the anesthetic, not because he wants to hurt you, but because he believes he can offer you a better pain deterrent—hypnosis.

The Waukegan, Illinois, dentist has used hypnosis in his practice for 15 years—often with the aid of an Apple II Plus computer and his program Hypnosis—to keep patients from feeling any pain. The technique works for most patients, he says, whether they're getting a cavity filled or undergoing the rigors of oral surgery.

Neiburger, head of the International Apple Core's Dental Special Interest Group (SIG), reports hypnosis has reduced or eliminated the need for novocaine or other anesthesia in 90% of his patients. The dentist also reports success with posthypnotic suggestion to promote healing and reduce bleeding after surgery and help people overcome such nasty habits as clenching their teeth. ["The computer and Hypnosis provide] a way of verbally treating people," says Neiburger, adding that the computer appeals more than a needle to patients. "Drugs have side effects, and people are more fearful of a shot than this procedure. Young children react very well. They just look for the joystick."

Most of Neiburger's patients can be quickly hypnotized without the aid of the computer, but occasionally people have trouble reaching a suggestible state. If the patients are willing, Neiburger introduces them to the Apple II Plus and Hypnosis.

Hypnosis displays a variety of colored shapes at varying speeds on the Apple and makes soft clicking noises that help patients reach a suggestible state. Then Neiburger hypnotizes them. "It might take 30 or 40 minutes using classical hypnotic techniques to put a patient into a state in which you can operate on him," says Neiburger. "By using the Apple and a program such as Hypnosis or any electronic hypnotic therapy, you can shorten this time. We've got it down to about two to five minutes. Then once we've got the patient's readings—what frequency they respond best to, what color and shape image on the screen—we can reproduce this for the next visit and induce the patient in 90 seconds or less."


Using an Apple as an hypnotic aid, says Neiburger, frees time, allowing him to see more patients. The Hypnosis program is available for \$20 through Andent, a software company Neiburger established in 1978.

"The way I use this in bread-andbutter dentistry works very effectively.

It is not the only technique that can be used for rapid hypnotic analgesia, but it certainly is one method and helps very much," he says.

Neiburger, who edits the Dental Computer Newsletter, a six-year-old publication for dentists, physicians, and others interested in technology, is impressed by the Apple's versatility. Preparing patients for hypnosis is not the Apple's only function. Neiburger uses the two Apple II Plus computers in his office to acts as a catalyst. maintain a patient recall system; do word processing; schedule appointments; prepare insurance and billing statements; and perform statistical analysis, inventory, and payroll. He is happy that he doesn't have to dedicate an Apple exclusively to hypnosis. "That's the beauty of the machine. You stick in the disk and it's dedicated [to a particular function] until you take the disk out. Then you can put in another disk and do payroll."

Fear of Fillings

Apple computers function as well in large dental clinics as they do in small private practices. At Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York City, practitioners are using an Apple II Plus to help people both to overcome their fear of dentists and to stop the injurious habit of grinding their teeth.

The 1300-bed hospital houses two dental clinics that treat patients with a unique combination of relaxation exercises and biofeedback training. Mt. Sinai's Dental Phobia Clinic helps anxious patients overcome their fear of dentists and a Temporo Mandibular Joint Disorder (TMJ) Clinic aids people with special jaw problems. An average of five clients a week use the Apple II Plus the clinics share.

"People who are afraid of the dentist and don't go, yet function happily in every other area of life, have usually been hurt repeatedly by dentists as children or young adults," says Dr. Ted Goldstein, director of the Dental Phobia Clinic. "Often those have been situations in which they could not stop the dentist or discuss the problem."

Dental phobia affects many Americans. Goldstein estimates that 12% of us are so scared that we never go to the dentist, and 50% go only in case of emergency.

According to the doctor, poor dental health can do a lot more than ruin your chances of starring in a toothpaste commercial. It can lead to serious illness. Bacteria in the mouth spawn infections that can spread to other parts of the body. Chronic mouth and dental infections have been linked to heart disease, and undetected mouth cancer can lead to death. Techniques the Dental Phobia Clinic employs help anxious patients

of four It also very nicely computes dentists. any data we want for a psychologist, and an oral surgeon, research.' the clinic uses an Apple II Plus with specialized Cyborg BioLab System biofeedback software, two disk drives, a color monitor, and a bar- and line-graph printer.

> Staff members at the phobia clinic teach patients to calm themselves, using simple relaxation techniques, and the Apple and biofeedback software let them chart their progress. Most clients learn how to relax without biofeedback, but about 25% of the clinic's patients need the extra encouragement the training offers.

> The patient rests comfortably in a dental chair in an office void of other dental equipment. There he learns to relax with the help of a psychologist and the biofeedback system. The therapist puts three surface electrodes—sensors that detect muscle activity—on the patient's body. Often they are placed on a patient's forehead to record the activity of the frontalis muscle, located between the skin and skull. "If we can get you to relax that muscle, it generally relaxes the whole body," says Dr. Andrew Kaplan, a phobia clinic staff member and coordinator of Mt. Sinai dental ser-

> Then the psychologist teaches the patient a simple relaxation exercise, how to tense and then relax each part of his body from head to toe. While accomplishing this task, the patient can watch his level of muscle activity on the monitor. During the session, a tape recorder also captures the therapist's instructions.

> "When you finish a session, you see it on the screen. We give you a cassettetape recording, and you take it home with you and practice," says Kaplan. "The computer acts as a catalyst. The biofeedback system teaches the patient how to relax more quickly, and it also very nicely computes any data we want

for research purposes," he says.

Patients can see their progress reflected on the Apple's screen in subsequent appointments. It takes two to ten sessions for patients to learn to relax using the biofeedback system. Once they have mastered relaxation, patients spend a session getting acquainted with equipment in the room where they'll have the work performed. After that, they're ready to move into regular dental treatment.

The Apple and biofeedback software are also used in Mt. Sinai's TMJ Clinic. This clinic, under the direction of Kaplan, deals with disorders of the jaw. TMJ, or temporo mandibular joint disorder, is a catchall designation for several different problems related to the jaw joint and the muscles that control the jaw.

One kind of TMJ patient clinicians see often, says Kaplan, is a person who complains of sore jaw muscles or "myofacial pain syndrome." TMJ victims often bring this pain on themselves by clenching and grinding their teeth. The disorder can cause head, neck, and shoulder pain, as well as pain around the face. The Apple and biofeedback training offer many of these patients a way to learn to relax and break their gnashing habit.

"People who clench their teeth can experience pain in the sides of their face and can end up with temporo mandibular joint disorder," says Kaplan. "What we can do with those patients is put the electrodes on the particular muscle they're causing to go into spasm and teach them to relax the muscle. Then we do a little talking to them to find out what in the environment makes them grind their teeth. Some people grind their teeth Apple whenever their boss walks by them.' and biofeedback Treattraining offer many of these ment at patients a way to the Mt. Sinai TMJ Clinic helps learn to many people whose jaw relax. problems have gone unrecognized for a long time, says Kaplan. "We have patients who have seen psychiatrists for years, and the psychiatrist is teaching them how to live with their pain because nobody diagnosed the

the Dental Phobia Clinic give courses in their treatment technique.

The doctors making use of computers at the clinic are also doing exciting things with them outside of the hospital. Goldstein has a limited partnership with Enterprise Technology Corporation, a New York company that will publish his CP/M-based dental-management system this year. He also uses an Apple in his private practice for various office procedures. It is programmed to print messages on bills urging patients to keep their mouths clean.

"I've found in my practice certain kinds of messages or slogans are useful. Some of the most recent ones I used were 'A family that flosses together stays together' and 'Love your mouth and all its little teeth.' It personalizes the statement, and, more than that, it really personalizes the dentist. It's slightly invasive, which is appropriate sometimes," Goldstein explains.

Apples in Orthodontia

Apple computers are also making their presence felt in the offices of dental specialists. Orthodontists, for example, are using them to help devise treatment plans for patients. Orthodontia is an exacting science. Depending on the age and the particular problem. each patient's case is unique and calls for individualized treatment plans.

Dr. Homer Phillips, Dr. Carolyn Flanary, and Dr. Alan Avery share an office in San Antonio, Texas. Their office's treatment area includes three dental chairs flanked by various equipment, including an Apple II Plus computer. "It runs all the time. We use it throughout the day," says Phillips.

What the Apple II Plus runs is an integrated package of 43 orthodontic diagnostic programs called the Phillips Cephalometric System, by Dr. Phillips and his friend, engineer Ned Snead.

The software package features programs that compute measurements and create vital orthodontic analyses quickly and a specialized interactive program that lets a doctor actually simulate a treatment plan on the computer's screen. It is marketed by Databill, of Van Nuys, California. "It allows you to simulate different treatment modalities," says Phillips. "It will show you what it looks like both graphically and in numbers, and if you don't like it,

Along with the Apple II Plus and two disk drives, Phillips' office also has a Houston Instruments Hipad Digitizer, a specially designed caliper, and an Epson MX-80 dot-matrix printer. The orthodontist can input data into the computer manually or by using the caliper and digitizer. The digitizer is used to capture information from x-rays that will then be stored inside the computer. The caliper, which plugs into the Apple's game port, is used to measure the length and width of teeth and various dental arches. The measurements are stored in the

evaluation. manually.' Once a variety of information has been collected, a trained person can use an interactive program in the software package to simulate an actual treatment plan on the computer's screen. Experimenting with different treatment schemes on the computer helps the orthodontist find the best one for the patient.

It's a way of working that Phillips enjoys, and, he says, his patients enjoy having an Apple II Plus as a part of their diagnostic team.

At pretreatment conferences, Phillips shows clients "hard copy I have generated from the computer, or, depending on the interest level or understanding of the family or patient, I sit them down at the computer, and they see their child's information or their own on the screen."

Initially, Phillips, who has practiced orthodontia for more than 20 years, worried whether patients would react favorably to the involvement of an Apple in their treatment. "It's like a candle you make by hand vs. one that's poured by a machine. I had the feeling they would think I was taking shortcuts, when in effect I was actually doing far more in terms of planning. But that wasn't the reaction at all. It was a very favorable one," he says.

"In a physical sense, we know much more about our patient than we would without the computer. We generate probably ten times the amount of information that you would manually simply because you don't have time manually. So by using a computer, whatever time we allocate for study of a treatment plan can be devoted to studying information rather than generating it."

Phillips sells his Cephalometric Sys-

tem for \$3500. It is currently in use in practices throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, and Brazil. The University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio bought a system to use in its dental school's oral-surgery department, where Carolyn Flanary works as an associate professor.

"There are a relatively small number of orthodontists so far who are interested in this. But the number seems to be growing," says Phillips, adding that doctors who have run excellent practices for years without computers need time generate to get used to the idea of using probably ten times one. the amount of information "This is that you would an educational thing. Dentists Can't Wait

Because few dentists are using computers right now, dentists interested in computerizing their offices don't always find appropriate software. Thus, many dentists are writing their own programs.

When Dr. Ken Goldenberg of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, shopped for an office-management system, he couldn't find an affordable program to do what he wanted.

"I wanted to computerize my office, and I looked at five or six different vendors. Most of them were in **Future** the range of anywhere between \$15,000 and applications \$30,000. "I couldn't see how I was going to be able to make \$30,000 more to pay for this system, or put up with the aggravation of learning how to use it. So I gave up." But not for long. Goldenberg defined the kind of office system he wanted one that would generate various insurance forms, maintain a patient recall system, expedite paperwork, more—and tried to hire programmers to write it for him. None of them worked out. So he bought an Apple II Plus to play with. He started playing games and then began copying game programs out of magazines to try to

learn programming.

"I said, 'Hey, this isn't so hard.' And, if you can believe it. I remembered that my senior paper in college was on computer analysis of analytical-chemistry problems. So I really did have a background in computers, but I'd just forgotten about it!" says Goldenberg, who was a senior at the University of Pittsburgh in 1969 and went on to attend the University of Pennsylvania Dental School.

Goldenberg took a programming course in BASIC and went on to write the program he wanted himself. The software offers dentists a range of functions but does not track accounts receivable. According to the dentist, "The Apple is not really big enough to handle it without a hard-disk drive, and with a hard-disk drive, you step the price up."

Goldenberg gave away copies of the program to several dentist friends. After they gave him good feedback, he decided to offer the program for sale. The system, called the Apple IIe Dental System, is available by mail (c/o Dr. Ken Goldenberg, 307 East Fourth Street, Bethlehem, PA 18015), costs \$500, and runs on the entire series of Apple II computers. About 30 systems are in use. The program was favorably reviewed in a recent issue of Focus on Dental Computers.

The Future

Apples, will grow in dental offices and clinics throughout the country. More and more dentists are discovering ways in which computers can help them organize their offices, do research work, and make

their patients more comfortable. Future applications will be limited only by the imaginations of the doctors who use them.

Mt. Sinai's Goldstein has an idea that could keep dental offices packed with teenagers. He hopes in the future to use the Apple in his private practice as a "video-game distraction mechanism." That is, he would like his patients to be able to play video games while he works on them.

"The games Apple has are wonderful, and it's a very nice distraction mechanism to give video games to patients while they're having dentistry performed," says the dentist. The trick, he says, is to build hand controls into the arms of the dental chair.

In a tutorial series on dBASE II, a popular

program for database management



elcome to the last in our series of 14 dBASE II tutorials.

Picking up where we left off last time, you may remember that we wrote a program that quickly scanned our stereostore inventory file and then calculated and reported a series of totals. In case you don't have a copy of the file struc-

ture, data, or program, see figure 1.

Recall that the data is your stereo-store inventory list, which an employee keeps up to date on a daily basis. Once a week you want to know just how many items you have in each category, what your total investment is, and how much retail value is wrapped up in your inventory.

Looking at the program we used to get this information last time, remember that the ? tells dBASE to print whatever appears in quotation marks or print the value stored in a memory variable (as in ? ††) in the absence of quotation marks. By adding extra spaces after the quotation marks but before the first letters of text, you can "push" a prompt or message further into the middle of the screen or page, improving the appearance of the printout. For example:

" This message is in the middle"

Using this technique, you can rewrite your program to

prevent your prompts from appearing at the left margin. Another, more versatile, way of doing the same thing is using the @ X,Y SAY . . . command, which lets you specify the exact position of a message or variable:


a 3,20 say "Hello"

tells dBASE "at line 3, column 20, print *Hello*." Try it from the dot prompt; the *Hello* should appear near the top of your screen. (Incidentally, lines are counted 0-23 from top to bottom and columns 0-79 from left to right.)

Now, let's give our whole program a more attractive screen display by using some variations of the @ SAY technique. Use either the dBASE II editor (the Modify command) or your word processor (in the Nondocument mode) to create the following program:

The @ Say command can format information that goes to your printer. You use the Set Format to Print command, but you must make certain your x,y coordinates progress in ascending numerical order only. For example,

a 20,30 say "there" a 10,30 say "Hello"

will work fine on the screen, but it will confuse your printer, since it would have to do ten reverse line-feeds to get back up to line 10 after printing *there* on line 20.

OK, now let's expand the sample program a bit more to illustrate another point. Complex programs, unlike our simple example, are often designed to let users choose between several different tasks, rather than have the computer perform all of them at once. Say you need only to know how many items you have, not their value. You can rewrite your program to determine only the number of items. With a large database, eliminating unnecessary calculations can save time.

Breaking a program into separate sections that perform

different tasks involves two changes. First, the program prompts the user to choose a task, usually by typing a letter or a number. Next, the program uses that choice to determine which specific portion of the program it needs to ex-Fortunately, dBASE includes easy-to-use programming commands to make this determination. ACCEPT "any message" to <variable name>, and GET

dBASE creates an empty memory variable for storing the user's choice and then waits for the user to press a key. When you press the key, the letter or number is stored in the variable. You can use any of three commands to request input from the user: WAIT TO <variable name>,

Each of these commands has its advantages. Wait, which is the simplest command for single-keystroke responses, creates the memory variable automatically, and you don't have to press Return to terminate your response. The Accept command allows a message of your choice (rather than the WAITING message that appears if you choose the Wait command) and allows multiple letter/ number responses. The Get/Read command lets you place the cursor wherever you want it, but you have to create your variables before issuing the command. Try typing these examples after the dot prompt to get the hang of each command.

Once it has stored a choice in a variable, your program must evaluate the variable and figure out what action to take. dBASE also uses the logical operand IF. If the IF statement is true, then dBASE executes any commands between it and the next IF. In the example below, if x does equal 1, then only Hello will be stored to Y.

if x = 1store "Hello" to Y if x = 2store "Good-bye" to Y endif endif

Also, notice that every IF statement needs a corresponding ENDIF—just one of the rules of dBASE programming that keeps the computer from getting confused.

Now that we have covered the basics of getting choices and "branching" to their appropriate responses, let's expand our program. Even though it is relatively simple, we can break our program down into two sections, one for each type of calculation:



So there you have it—a fairly complicated program, actually. There are ways of returning to the main menu without having to type DO REPORT each time. The easiest way is to use the Do While command. Unfortunately, I've used up my allotted space for this article, so you will have to experiment on your own.

Why not see if after each of the two sections of the program, you can get back to the menu automatically? (Hint: Use a Loop command just before each ENDIF and a Do While statement just before the main menu. Also, add an Exit Program option in the main menu with an IF and ENDIF that enclose a Cancel statement. This way you won't get caught in an endless loop.

If you've come this far from our first tutorial over a year ago, you're really on the road to programming in dBASE. There's always more to learn, more quirks to drive you crazy occasionally, and tough problems to program around. But don't give up. Just consult the manual, keep thinking creatively, and talk to other dBASE programmers when you get stuck.



HARD-DISK DRIVES AND THE IIC

Q. I want to use a hard-disk drive with my Apple IIc. My dealer says that the Apple ProFile and other hard disks he has for sale all require a special interface board that plugs into one of the slots in the Apple II Plus or IIe. Since the IIc doesn't have expansion slots, he says that the ProFile and other harddisk drives will not work with the IIc.

On the back of the IIc are a bunch of connectors that Apple claims will let you expand the capabilities of your system. Is there some way to hook a hard disk up to the IIc using these connectors?

A. Yes, it is possible to hook up a hard disk to your Apple IIc using the connectors on the back of the computer. You can connect a hard disk to one of the serial-port connectors or to the floppydisk connector. Any hard disk that supports the RS-232 serial interface (either directly or via a networking device) will hook up to a serial port on the IIc. The serial port provides a relatively slow communication path compared to the typical hard-disk drive, however. The slowness of an RS-232 connection is a major drawback of this type of hookup. Also, to ensure that you have the proper cables and software, you should get a hard disk that is specifically designed for use with the Apple IIc.

The floppy-disk connector on the IIc provides a faster communication path for a hard disk and therefore offers a better means for using a hard-disk drive with the IIc. Using the floppydisk connector requires a special interface that the manufacturer must build into the hard-disk unit. One example of this type of hard disk is the 10-megabyte drive from Quark, Inc., 2525 West Evans, Suite 220, Denver, CO 80219. Plugging in the Quark hard disk uses up the only floppy-disk expansion connector, but on the back of the Quark drive is another connector for a floppydisk drive, so you can still add a second floppy drive to your system.

Another hard disk for the IIc that attaches to the floppy connector is the Symbfile, which comes in sizes ranging from 10 to 40 megabytes. The Symbfile networks with other IIc's and Macintoshes. POINT-OF-SALE DEVICES

Q. Is there a way to hook up a cash register or cash drawer to an Apple so it will work with a computerized accounting system?

A. Yes, you can hook up a cash register or cash drawer to your Apple. Computer-compatible cash registers, cash drawers, and the more recent bar-code readers all fall into the technical category of "point of sale devices," i.e., devices that, at the point of a sale, provide information about the transaction. Most of these devices use a standard RS-232 serial hookup to communicate with the Apple. Since all Apple computers can use the RS-232 serial hookup, theoretically any of them can work with any of the many point-of-sale devices now offering an RS-232 hookup.

Just hooking up a point-of-sale device, such as a cash drawer or cash register, is only half the solution, though. The other half involves having software that can use the device to its fullest potential. You may be able to write some simple programs that will make use of the point-of-sale device; but in order to integrate it with a computerized accounting system, you should select software meant for a particular brand of cash drawer or cash register. Also, check the specifications of the software to make sure that it will accomplish your accounting tasks.

1984: THE YEAR IN REVIEW

1984 is almost over, and it seems that Big Brother wasn't watching us very closely after all. But Big Blue has been watching Apple very closely. When Future Computing held a forum about the Macintosh, more people attended from IBM than from any other company. Although Apple is only 1/40 the size of IBM, Apple grabbed the spotlight away from IBM several times during 1984.

Norman Rockwell vs. Big Brother

Last January's Super Bowl game saw the kickoff for the 1984 Apple/IBM rivalry, when both companies bought some of TV's most expensive advertising time to showcase their new computers. IBM's commercial—as wholesome as a Norman Rockwell painting—featured the bumbling Charlie Chaplin wheeling out the PCjr in a baby carriage. IBM hoped that the PCjr would appeal to the serious homecomputer user and compete with the

Apple II. Apple's TV commercial was an Orwellian, surrealistic shocker that portrayed IBM as Big Brother and introduced the Macintosh as the hero of the oppressed masses. Apple hoped that Macintosh would appeal to the business-computer user and compete with the IBM PC.

Both the PCjr (code-named Peanut) and the Macintosh (code-named Macintosh) had been the subjects of intense speculation by both the press and the computer industry for more than a year prior to the time they were introduced. After the introductions, software and hardware manufacturers rushed to market new products for the new computers. Interest was so intense that four magazines were started for the PCjr and two for the Macintosh.

Cheers for the Macintosh

Perceived quite differently, the Macintosh elicited cheers, but the PCjr got jeers. Brøderbund Software got ahold

of its first PCjr and first Macintosh at about the same time. According to Brøderbund President Doug Carlston, the company's programmers were falling all over each other to get at the Mac, but relegated the PCir to a closet. Software and hardware companies started accelerating development on Macintosh products and canceling PCjr products. Even the mighty Microsoft, producer of PC-DOS and MS-DOS, announced that the development of Macintosh software would be its top priority. After less than a year, all four of the PCjr magazines ceased publication, and only the stronger of the two Macintosh magazines remained.

People started complaining about the PCjr right away, so IBM scurried to come up with an upgrade that included extra memory and a new keyboard. After a while, people also started complaining about the Macintosh. An early Mac owner who had purchased an Apple II in 1977 (with only 16K RAM and a cassette tape for storage) made this criticism: "Apple said they were trying to recreate the phenomenon of the Apple II. Well, in my opinion they've done it again—the Macintosh was also introduced with inadequate disk storage and insufficient RAM." Other voices echoed similar sentiments. Not surprisingly, Apple went scurrying to upgrade the Macintosh to 512K RAM and then signed over all its hard-disk technology to Sony, which, not so coincidentally, manufactures the Macintosh's disk drive.

Razzle-Dazzle and Ho Hum

Meanwhile, Apple brought computer razzle-dazzle to new heights with the introduction of the Apple IIc. The gala extravaganza held at the site of the 1984 Democratic convention featured off-color jokes by Steve Wozniak, a full day of computer hype, and an evening of somewhat bizarre music by Herbie Hancock. Although Apple set a new computer-industry sales record by taking orders for 50,000 Apple IIc's in a single day, nobody started a magazine about the IIc.

Not to be outdone, IBM held a gala

extravaganza of its own in "bigger is better" Texas (near the site of the Republican convention, hmm...) to celebrate the IBM PC's third birthday. The party was for IBM dealers, and it helped them forget how they had been stung on the PCjr. About a month later, IBM introduced the IBM PC AT advanced computer, and it was back to the usual ho-hum product introduction for a pretty ho-hum product that will probably make lots of money for IBM.

IBM also introduced its new localarea network for the PC. The good news is high performance; the bad news is a high price tag—\$1000 per connection. Apple claims that its inexpensive \$50-per-connection Apple Bus network for the Macintosh enables a group of Apple users to tap into the IBM network using some type of gateway device.

Another difference between the two companies occurs in their marketing strategies. Apple seems to be encouraging third-party developers, and IBM seems to be discouraging them. Apple President John Sculley says he wants to keep Apple's product line quite short, which leaves plenty of room for other companies to produce products for use with the various Apple computers. IBM, in contrast, has been steadily adding to its product line, with more than 50 new microcomputer products introduced this year, including Topview windowing software, a Lotus-like integrated-software package, Displaywrite professional word-processing software, and the IBM Assistant Series.

The most notable addition is the IBM Assistant Series, a group of simple-to-use software packages for most of the major business-software areas. The series includes the Writing Assistant, Filing Assistant, Reporting Assistant, and Graphing Assistant. These programs are actually Software Publishing's popular PFS:Write, PFS:File, PFS:Report, and PFS:Graph products, which have been licensed to IBM. Ads for the IBM Assistant Series are prevalent not only in computer magazines but also in airline magazines, business magazines, and others. This may be good news for Software Publishing, but it's bad news for a lot of other thirdparty software companies with competitive products.

During 1984, Apple expanded its dealer network by adding some important dealerships such as Computer-Land, BusinessLand, and the Sears Business Centers. The ComputerLand deal alone added more than 700 dealers

in 25 countries to Apple's dealer network. Apple is also attempting to strengthen ties with dealers and increase dealer profit margins by cutting out the manufacturers'-rep firms that were acting as middlemen in Apple's retail sales. IBM, however, appears to be undermining its dealer network to get more of the action for itself. At the beginning of 1984, approximately 30% of all IBM PCs were sold directly by IBM; IBM's authorized retail dealers handled the majority of sales. IBM itself is now selling more than 60% of all IBM PCs, however. Several IBM dealers have told me that they view IBM as their major competitor.

1984 is almost over, and the rivalry is still going strong. A tally of the 1984 sales figures will probably show that Apple has sold more personal computers than IBM and that IBM will have made more money on what it sold than Apple. We'll soon welcome 1985, and both IBM and Apple have a variety of new products they'll be trying to dazzle us with in the months ahead. It should be an interesting year.

THE LITTLE KINGDOM

Anyone interested in Apple Computer, Inc., should enjoy *The Little Kingdom:*

the Private Story of Apple Computer by Michael Moritz, published this fall by William Morrow and Company. Moritz, Time magazine's San Francisco bureau chief, is a seasoned business writer who knows how to provide insight into a company's inner workings. He uses Apple as a case study in modern American business, which gives the book a broad appeal. This in-depth study of Apple takes a hard look at how the personalities of Apple's founders affected the company in its rise from a garage operation to an international billion-dollar-a-year corporation. As an avid Apple watcher, I found the book fascinating. Highly recommended reading.

HELP FOR MAC DEVELOPERS

Two recently formed groups provide support for Macintosh software developers, but it's hard to tell which of these new start-ups provides the most useful service. The first group is the Macintosh Developers Exchange, sponsored by The Programmer's Shop, 128 Rockland Street, Hanover, MA 02339; (800) 421-8006 or (617) 826-7531. The group offers a computer-bulletin-board service and support services

aimed at Macintosh programmers. The Programmers Shop says that the service will be free of charge for the first few months and that some type of charge may be considered in the future.

The second group is the Programmers Network, spearheaded by the infamous John Draper, aka Captain Crunch. Draper is the eccentric yet brilliant programmer who wrote the original EasyWriter program for the Apple II while he was in prison for incurring the wrath of the phone company. Draper's Programmers Network claims to provide to users nationwide Tymnet access to a more sophisticated bulletin-board system for only \$3 an hour, but so far I've been unable to verify this claim. Programmers Network asserts that its services will include tips on contract negotiation, job-placement listings, and other resources, as well as programming tips and algorithms. Although the Programmers Network would seem to have the most potential (\$3-per-hour Tymnet access sounds like a real plus), it costs \$75 to join, which seems steep to me. Draper told me it helps them provide the service while keeping people who aren't serious off the network. Decide for yourself. You can obtain further details from Pro-

APPLE IIE SALES BOOMING

Apple expected IIc sales to decrease demand for the Apple IIe, but IIe sales are better than ever. Schools have been increasing their orders for IIe's; the state of Tennessee placed a single order for more than 5000 He's this fall. The Apple IIe's easily accessible bus makes it more versatile than the IIc, so home and business users have also been continuing to buy IIe's in record quantities. The only bad news for Apple is that it underestimated the demand and has been having a hard time keeping up with IIe orders. There are plenty of Hc's around, though, which is one reason Apple lowered the retail price of the IIc; the original price of \$1295 now includes the IIc monitor and stand.

APPLE BUS LOOKING GOOD

The new low-cost Apple Bus network for the Macintosh and Lisa is almost ready, and it's looking really good. The network allows a group of up to 32 computers and/or shared peripherals to be interconnected at a cost of only \$50 per connection. The connectors are simple transformers about the size of a matchbox. The network operates at about 250,000 bits per second and is self-configuring, which means that computers and peripherals can be daisy-chained together in any sequence. Although the Apple Bus network is not as powerful as IBM's \$1000-per-connection network for the IBM PC, the Apple Bus is easier to install and provides most of the functionality of the IBM network.

CP/M FOR THE MAC

IQ Software has announced the availability of CP/M-68000 for the Macintosh. The company offers CP/M-68000, the C language, and a terminal program in a \$395 package. The CP/M-68000 operating system performs two to five times faster than the current version of the Finder. The company also offers a CP/M-80 emulator that lets you run programs such as WordStar and dBASE II. Color Mac

It seems that a color version of the Macintosh, code-named "Rainbow," is now in the works. The local scuttlebutt is that Texas Instruments is preparing a set of custom CRT controller chips that will give color capabilities to the 512K Mac through the addition of a video-output jack on the back of the computer that will allow you to connect an external color monitor. Upgrading the Mac to color won't be cheap—the cost is said to be in the \$800 to \$1000 price range. Miniscribe

Apple appears to be developing a new portable version of the Scribe printer. It should help make the IIc a truly portable system when combined with the much-awaited LCD display.

Flat Mac

Sony has just introduced a new flatpanel CRT display for microcomputers that is a spin-off of the Sony Watchman personal television. The Sony flat screen is available in both a monochrome and a color version and ranges in size from 4 inches to 10 inches diagonally. Sony claims that the new flatscreen technology is not planned for use in any Sony product, but is designed for use as an OEM product by other computer manufacturers. Considering the strong ties between Apple and Sony, it wouldn't be too surprising to see the display show up in the much-ballyhooed lap-size Macintosh that Steve Jobs calls Mac-in-a-book, a takeoff on Alan Kay's Dynabook concept.

Higher ProFile

Many of us have packed our fivemegabyte ProFiles to their capacity. Apple is busy upgrading its hard-disk products, however. The first to be released will be a ten-megabyte ProFile, and the next will be a Mac hard disk.

Fast Mac

One of the main complaints about the Macintosh is the relatively slow speed of the disk drive. In order to remedy this situation, Apple is readying a RAM disk that should greatly increase the Mac's performance.

IIc Compatibility

Apple is planning to offer a set of chips that will let you upgrade the IIe to be fully compatible with the IIc. The upgrade will involve swapping the 6502 processor with a 65C02 processor and replacing the computer's ROM chips with new ROMs that support Mouse-Text and other IIc features.
