THE MUSICAL WIZARDRY OF MIDI

Computers are changing the way everyone does business, from giant corporations to one-person shops, from accountants to entertainers. This month's four cover stories discuss how one such business, the music industry, is changing rapidly with the aid of computers.

The impact of personal computers on the electronic segment of the music business became evident a little over a year ago when professional musicians began adopting a standard method of communicating between instruments called MIDI, which stands for Musical Instrument Digital Interface. The standard was borne of a joint agreement between musical-instrument manufacturers, such as Roland and Yamaha, and computer manufacturers, such as Apple and Commodore, when they realized that computers and electronic instruments were increasingly being used together. Recognizing a potentially lucrative vertical market, these industries banded together in an effort to ensure success by creating a standard operating environment. This agreement was a particularly unusual move for the personal-computer industry, which has been plagued by a lack of standards.

Musicians use the MIDI interface, with appropriate software and hardware, to control the instructions that make sounds for sound tracks and special effects. Procedures that were once done by hand, such as setting

volume, speed, and pitch, can now be automatically controlled by a personal computer.

Automating musical tasks brings several benefits to the music business. First, and probably most significant, is the cost savings that result from programming instruments with personal computers. Musicians can create multitrack recordings without expensive recording equipment and studio time.

The other benefit of the union of personal computers and electronic instruments is the power the combination gives for endless creativity. With just a keyboard, a computer, and some software, musicians can virtually create their own orchestra, without having to know how to play each instrument. Imagination and the capacity for hard work are the only limits.

You may be wondering whether all this wizardry is only for professional musicians with deep pocketbooks. Well, as you will find in our cover-story articles, many products are available for both professionals and amateur musicians, so if you are a budding Bach or hankering to be a Herbie Hancock, be sure to take a look at our MIDI coverage.

SONGPAINTER DEFENSE

Dear A +: I read with interest an article in the October 1985 issue entitled "Of Mice & Music" (pages 132–138). As one of the developers of Song-Painter, a program mentioned in the article, I have some comments.

SongPainter is criticized because the patterns used to convey pitch have no "pattern." The resolution of the Macintosh makes it difficult to provide a gray scale to differentiate twelve pitches. Since pitches are relative and the goal of SongPainter is to encourage imaginative music composition, it was decided to use a combination of angled lines, dots, and crosshatch for the pitch patterns. This encourages an unconventional approach to composition.

SongPainter was never intended to be a music score writer. It is a novel piece of software to be used by nonmusicians for ear training and to explore their musical potential. It also gives experienced musicians a different perspective on composition.

JUKI BUFFER UPGRADE

Dear A +: With reference to the Juki 6300 daisy-wheel printer, which you recently reviewed (October 1985, pages 56 and 59), it is easy and inexpensive to upgrade the text buffer from 3K (the way it comes) to 15K. This improvement allows the printer to accept about five pages of text and frees the Apple for other work while the document is printing.

To perform the upgrade, you must first remove the top cover. There are four Phillips screws, two on the top of the printer and two on the inside at the extreme right and left. Once they're removed, you can pop the cover off.

Locate chips 304 and 305 on the green CPU board at the right rear of the printer. These are 2K chips that need to be replaced by 8K chips. The replacement chips are TC 5565 (or 6264), which I was able to purchase from Taft Electronics at 68 West 45th Street, New York, New York for \$15 each.

Remove the 2K chips and replace them with the 8K chips. You will also need to move the jumpers on the CPU board. The correct positions for the jumpers are numbers 3, 4, 7, and 8. Replace the cover, and you're in business.

SWYFTCARD REVISITED

Dear A+: Your SwyftCard review (November 1985, pages 86-90) was very timely. This product has barely hit the marketplace and is certainly getting lots of attention. Your banner, 'SwyftCard makes an old dog-the Apple IIe-do new tricks," may offend many Apple IIe owners. The Apple IIe is not old, and it certainly is not a dog. To top it off, the SwyftCard hardly provides any new tricks. Text editing, communications, printing, keystroke shortcuts, and load/save of files have been around for years.

The SwyftCard does offer its limited functions in a small, convenient package. Reading Thornburg's rather enthusiastic review, one gets the feeling that he has never used anything better than the cryptic keyboard editor for Applesoft. All one has to do is use AppleWorks, Apple Writer, or Mouse Write to see what the "lowly" 6502 can do. These products do more for word or text-file processing than the SwyftCard will ever provide. The "lowly" 6502 was doing amazing things for years before the SwyftCard came along.

The SwyftCard's method of cursor movement is hardly new. Many editors use it on a single-character basis. What the SwyftCard provides in ability to create and edit a text document, it takes away by its inefficient use of disk space. Would you buy a 14-megabyte hard disk and then use a program that restricted use to only 4 megabytes? Well, that is what the SwyftCard does with a floppy (only 40K out of 140K). Worse yet, the rest of the space is lost to anything else, and the file cannot be used by anything else (without conversion).

The SwyftCard comes nowhere near the total performance of the word-processing program of Apple-Works, Apple Writer, or many other fine word-processing programs on the market. Moving the cursor, moving a paragraph, or saving a file is not the measure of performance of a word-processing program.

In today's world of Apple IIe computers, we are adding 2.5 megabytes of memory (RAMWorks II), connect-

ing 10- to 30-megabyte hard disks, running 3.5-megahertz 65C02 processor speedup cards, using full-function integrated software, connecting to local-area networks, and installing 16-chip replacements (65802), and David Thornburg would like to have us believe that the SwyftCard is the best thing that has happened to his Apple IIe. This may be true for his computer, but I would not waste a valuable slot in my IIe for the very limited function provided by the SwyftCard.

I believe this product should have been given a few hard knocks in the review. Time gained in saving a few keystrokes will easily be wasted trying to get the documents to where they can be used. Or worse yet, it appears that only limited techniques are available to get existing data or information into SwyftCard documents for editing, transmitting, or printing (other than the school of hard knocks, via the keyboard; perhaps no keystrokes are saved here). If there is a technique, the reviewer failed to tell us about it. Speaking of printing, saving printer-control strings in the document went away with Apple Writer Version 1.1.

From the advertisement on page 207: "You've never seen an Apple IIe do word processing, filing, communicating and calculating the way it does with a SwyftCard." Quite frankly, I would not want to. It is too restrictive for practical use.

I must agree with your comment that calling the Apple IIe an "old dog" is to slight its abilities. But with respect to the product being reviewed, the reviewer has the advantage: He has actually tried SwyftCard, and you have not, which may account for his enthusiasm and your lack of same. In terms of speed of operation and ease of use, Mr. Thornburg's statement that the SwyftCard outperforms any other Apple II-word-processing system is certainly not challenged by any of the products that you mention.


Another point you make is absolutely correct: SwyftCard will *not* do what you can with a 14-megabyte hard disk or with gobs of expensive and relatively-hard-to-use software.

But Detroit once made the mistake of thinking that everybody needed a few tons of electric accessories, chrome, and tail fins. Volkswagen, Toyota, Honda, and other makers of small, efficient cars made Detroit change its tune. I am sure you truly need all the equipment you've invested in, but there are probably a lot of us that just want to get simple tasks done easily and inexpensively.

Last, using "only" 40K on a disk so simplifies the human interaction and so minimizes the probability of error

that we see it as a major advantage SwyftCard offers. I could (to present the other side of the coin) also ask what good is having megabytes of storage if making a simple error can wipe out hours or even weeks of work on it? For compact archival storage, we do provide a ProDOS converter so you can pack multiple SwyftCard texts onto a single diskette or even onto a hard disk.







RAM WARS

Applied Engineering deserves credit for popularizing memory-expansion boards that add a megabyte or more of RAM to an Apple II and help turn the Apple into a powerful business computer. Other companies such as Checkmate followed suit with

their own products, and Apple's announcement of the Apple II Memory Expansion Card last fall indicated that Apple had seen the wisdom of providing high-end business-oriented add-on products to the Apple II series.

Now AST Research, one of the largest producers of add-on boards for the IBM PC series, has started shipping two onemegabyte RAM boards of its own. The SprintDisk is much like Apple's Memory Expansion Card, and the MegaRamPlus is an auxiliary-slot board that is similar to the Applied Engineering and Checkmate

boards. AST offers a sophisticated enhancement called disk caching to RAMdisks on its boards; it moves files from the diskette to RAM as you need them, dramatically speeding up the operation of virtually any program that uses the disk drive during operation.

SPECIAL-EDUCATION POSTER

Apple Computer, Inc. has designed, produced, and donated a poster to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the Education for All Handicapped Children Act, which holds public schools responsible for appropriate and free



education of handicapped children. The poster was unveiled during a congressional reception attended by more than 500 members of congress, parents with disabled children, leading educators, and officials of more than 20 groups that work with the handicapped. Dr. Alan Brightman, Director of Apple's Office of Special Education, hailed the legislation, saying, "We are honored to participate in this event. Nothing could be more consistent with Apple's vision of individual potential and participation."

You don't have to wait for a 68020 in your Mac if you have a good technical background and are willing to do some expensive experimenting. A new 68020 piggyback board designed for generic 68000 computer systems (not the Mac) is available to developers from Computer Systems Associates (7564 Trade Street, San Diego, CA 92121; [619] 566-3911). This board plugs into the 68000's socket and replaces the existing 8 Mhz 68000 with a 12.5 MHz 68020 and 68881 floating-point math coprocessor. The floatingpoint coprocessor really speeds up operations such as number crunching and graphics. I'm going to try to see how hard it is to use it in a Mac. I'll keep you posted.

THE CLOSEST INTERFACE

The recent COMDEX exhibition in Las Vegas covered more than one

million square feet and qualified as the largest computer show of the year, but there were surprisingly few new-product introductions as compared with previous years. One new product that couldn't help but catch my eye was IntraCourse, "the computer program for sex," being promoted by well-known psychologist and broadcast personality Dr. lovce Brothers.

Dr. Brothers, who seems to be vying for recognition as a high-tech Dr. Ruth Westheimer, introduced the program at a COMDEX press conference by calling sex "the closest human interface" and saying, "IntraCourse is the first program to scientifically bring the power of the computer to human sexuality. With Intra-Course you can privately explore and better understand your own sexuality, and two persons can mutally discover each other's sexual attitudes."

The program, which will be available for both the Apple II and Macintosh, was created by a group of 14 psychologists and computer programmers, includes an "interactive sexual dictionary," and produces a password-

I'm getting the definite impression that, in contrast to 1985, 1986 is going to be a big year for product introductions. Although no new Apple computer models were introduced in 1985, I thought it might be appropriate to take a look at the most significant Apple products introduced last year, now that the year has come to a close.

In the Apple II arena, I think the most significant new software product is Instant Pascal, an interpretive version of Pascal that is virtually the same on the Apple II and the Mac. Instant Pascal bridges a software gap between the Apple II and the Mac, and I think it will help further Apple's lead in the education market. The most significant new Apple II hardware product is the UniDisk 3.5. Its 800K of diskette storage breaks an important barrier to developing sophisticated software for the Apple II.

In the Mac camp, the most significant new software package is Microsoft Excel, because it makes the Macintosh the computer you need if you want to run the world's best spreadsheet and because it lets Macintosh users work with the vast amounts of corporate data that are now stored in Lotus 1-2-3 files. In the realm of Machardware, the most significant new product is

APPLE SOFTWARE BUSINESS BOOMING

Apple appears to have finished the year with excellent sales. Although all the final numbers are not in yet, some of the early indicators are favorable. Hardware sales were up

because of lower prices, and dealers were not left with as much inventory as they were last fall. According to an InfoCorp study last fall, Apple Computer, Inc. was ahead of IBM in software sales, both in dollar volume and in units sold. The breakdown is as follows: dollar share of U.S. software market-Lotus, 26%; Ashton-Tate, 16%; Apple, 9%; Microsoft, 9%; Software Publishing, 5%; and IBM, only 2%. Unit share of U.S. software market—Lotus, 16%; Apple, 11%; Software Publishing, 10%; Ashton-Tate, 8%; Microsoft, 7%; and IBM, 3%.

CBS SOFTWARE CLOSES

connection with the closure. Although CBS says it will continue to sell a few existing successful products, the company will not develop or acquire any new products for the home-computersoftware market.







he very same digital-electronics revolution that brought us the microcomputer phenomenon has redefined what we expect to hear in today's music and has radically changed the way music is made. You can hear it in any top-40 song, in high-tech TV commercials, in the theme music on network sports events, and even in elevator music.

A rainbow of timbres, from the most dazzlingly electronic to the most uncannily authentic imitations of "real" instruments, marks this music, as do rich musical textures and suddenly shifting rhythms that often conjure up the illusion of large bands. More often than not, however, what you hear is the work of just one or two musicians relying as much on programming skills as on instrumental virtuosity.

Synthesizing

The continuous evolution of musical technology that not so long ago replaced the harpsichord with the piano has taken another leap forward to what has generically been dubbed the synthesizer. Of course, the synthesizer isn't news anymore. Wendy Carlos' groundbreaking Switched on Bach album (performed entirely on the Moog synthesizer) was released more than 15 years ago and is still the best-selling classical recording of all time. Like all sophisticated electronic devices, synthesizers have evolved tremendously over the past 20 years, as developments in electronics have been adapted to the special needs of musicians. What is new is the availability and affordability of powerful hardware and a much greater ability to control networks of musical devices with precision.

Like mainframe computers, "real" synthesizers used to weigh hundreds of pounds and cost many thousands of dollars. A full-blown Moog system could line a wall from floor to ceiling and drain a lifetime of savings. Plum-

meting integrated-circuit prices have brought the cost of synthesizers down to earth and made their bulk manageable. A decent instrument can now be purchased for less than \$1000 as a self-contained unit, including a keyboard, that weighs 15-30 pounds and whose base measures around 3×1 feet.

Early synthesizers were modular in design, each module performing a separate function in shaping the sound. Just as early computers had to be hard-wired before the invention of software programming, a modular synthesizer required connection of the individual modules in the desired configuration with patch cords (cables with connectors on each end) and then adjustment of each module's controls. Synthesized-sound sculptors might spend hours or even days adjusting the instrument until they were satisfied with the sound. To preserve their creations, they'd then have to write down the exact position of each and every knob and patch cable if they wanted to recreate the same sound later.

Microprocessors were an obvious solution to such housekeeping drudgery because they could read the position of each knob and store it as a value to be called up from memory at any time. Likewise, you no longer needed a tangle of patch cables in order to connect modules. Instead, you were able to choose one of an instrument's many predefined routings, selecting and storing it along with module-control settings for a complete sound definition "program" for later recall and play.

usicians welcomed the increases in convenience and the cost reductions that microelectronics brought, but a major problem, common to the development of all parts of the electronics industry, remained: the absence of interfacing standards that would let synthesizers work with one another. For example, you couldn't necessarily expect to play your Roland synthesizer from the keyboard of your Minimoog synthesizer.

Finally, in a rare cooperative effort, electronic-instrument manufacturers have now developed a communications standard for musical devices that may prove to be one of the greatest advances in music since the adoption of the equal-tempered scale nearly 300 years ago. Announced in 1983 and quickly adopted by the entire industry, the MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) standard is fueling the introduction of numerous

powerful and fascinating products for use by both professional and amateur musicians.

In its simplest application, MIDI allows you to play any number of synthesizers from one keyboard to produce combinations of sounds that you can't get from a single instrument. Since MIDI information is simply a digital data stream, you can use many devices other than keyboards to create, send, receive, and respond to MIDI data. For example, you can make specially equipped guitars or microphones generate digital information in the MIDI format and then control the sound-generating circuitry of a synthesizer. In fact, many manufacturers are now offering keyboardless synthesizers for use with any MIDI controller.

MIDI also allows remote programming of synthesizers. A musician can set all the parameters that determine the instrument's sound from another synthesizer or a programming device. Effects devices such as reverberation units or "chorus" effects can also be controlled from a master MIDI device. Even the lighting for an entire performance can be programmed in sync with the music.

MIDI Technical Details

An understanding of the role of the computer in this musical maze first requires a bit more technical detail about MIDI. If you are a nontechnical reader, don't be thrown by the specifics if you don't understand them.

rom a technical standpoint, MIDI uses a relatively simple serial hardware and software protocol. The hardware requirements of the MIDI standard are minimal, specifying only the type of cable (a shielded three-wire cable with five-pin DIN connectors at either end) and a circuit design appropriate for receiving and transmitting data in the MIDI format at 31.25 kilobits per second.

A MIDI-equipped device, whether it be a synthesizer, a computer, or an effects module, should have three ports (also called jacks) for MIDI communications, labeled IN, OUT, and THRU (some units lack the

THRU jack). Data travels along a single MIDI cable in one direction only, from the OUT port of one device to the IN port of another. The THRU jack passes data that has been received by the device from an external source back out again, so that many MIDI units can be linked in series.

MIDI's software protocol specifies the format for transmission of MIDI data. The MIDI standard provides for three types of data: standard codes, which turn notes on and off at the proper times and specify each note's relative volume; optional codes, for adding modulations such as pitch changes and vibrato; and the systemexclusive functions, codes unique to each synthesizer for programming it. Sixteen MIDI channels are provided in software. You can set each synthesizer or other device in the system to a different channel, and it can receive its own instructions, which it can pick out in the data stream by recognizing its four-bit channel identifier.

MIDI is not a perfect standard, and criticism of the standard itself and its implementation on some instruments has existed from the beginning. Nevertheless, musicians have accepted it gladly, as a survey of the market reveals: Every new professional electronic keyboard is MIDI-equipped.

Enter the Apple II

Computers are just as capable of handling MIDI data as are any other instruments or devices, since handling streams of information is what computers do best. Thus, the MIDI standard opens a new world for both musicians and computerphiles, especially Apple owners, since so many MIDI packages are now available for the Apple II.

Academic musicians located at well-endowed universities have long used expensive computers for musical education, sound analysis and synthesis, composition, and other musical tasks. Now, the affordability of microcomputers has finally made these applications available to nearly everyone. Apple IIs are perfectly suited to musical uses because of their open design (internal card slots), and a wide variety of musical software and hardware has appeared as a result. The Music Construction Set and the Mockingboard synthesizer board are probably the most successful and well known of these musical products for the general market.

erious musicians were far more interested, however, in packages developed by Syntauri Corporation and Passport Designs that turned the Apple into a full-featured synthesizer. Both the alphaSyntauri and Passport's Soundchaser were keyboard-and-software systems that used Mountain Computer's fairly sophisticated digital-synthesizer cards to generate sound. Although the synthesizer cards lacked state-of-the-art fidelity, their digital oscillators could produce unique timbres, and the alphaSyntauri and Soundchaser packages offered features that weren't available on far more expensive synthesizers. For a few years, alphaSyntauris and Soundchasers were very popular and they showed up in schools, on professional recordings, and in thousands of homes. Eventually, though, compact, inexpensive, dedicated synthesizers with fully professional features forced Passport out of this market and Syntauri out of business.

Nevertheless, the microcomputer's role as a tool for musicians has increased. Running properly designed MIDI software, an Apple can perform a whole range of musical tasks better than can a collection of separate special-purpose devices that cost far more. Although new computers from Atari and Yamaha have MIDI ports built right in, Apple-II-series computers are currently the machines of choice for most musicians. In early 1984, Passport was the first company to bring MIDI products for computers to market, with an interface card and a pair of programs for Apple IIs. A

year and a half later, MIDI products for Apples are available in abundance. Let's take a look at the five general categories into which these products fall.

MIDI Interfaces

Lacking built-in MIDI capability, either the Apple II or Macintosh first needs some additional hardware. The Apple II, II Plus, and IIe require the addition of a small plug-in interface card. For the Apple IIc and the Macintosh, an external box and connector are necessary.

he purpose of the interface card is simply to provide a data path between the computer's data bus. Creating this data path requires a high-speed serial-to-parallel interface and voltage-conversion circuitry. Minimally, an interface must supply MIDI IN and OUT jacks. Some cards also feature a "drum-sync" jack for controlling various brands of electronic drum machines, and others have a "tape-sync" jack for synchronizing multitrack tape recorders with your Apple/MIDI system.

MIDI Sequencers

Anyone familiar with the alpha-Syntauri or Soundchaser systems or who has worked in a multitrack recording studio is well aware of the versatility inherent in these systems. The ability to record sections of a piece of music one instrument at a time and to play them all back at once through multitrack recording was an exciting development popularized by the guitarist Les Paul during the 1950s. Multitrack tape machines have since become the backbone of the recording industry and will continue to be the primary medium for professional music recording, especially for the recording of acoustic instruments.

Electronic instruments, on the other hand, with their potential connection via MIDI, offer alternatives to and advantages over multitrack tape. Using a MIDI interface and sequencer software, your Apple can become a MIDI multitrack recorder. Here's how it works.

a normal tape recorder does. The genesis of the name *sequencer* is that the programs remember and can replay sequences of events—e.g., which note you pressed and how long you held it down. Unlike a tape recorder, however, the sequencer records not the actual sound of the music, but rather only MIDI information, such as which keys you pressed and how hard or how long you pressed each one.

To make a recording, you connect the MIDI output jack from an instrument (typically a keyboard) to an interface board in the Apple and load the sequencer software. Once you've set it in the Record mode, the Apple computer begins to store all the MIDI information it receives, saving this data temporarily in RAM. It can store as many as five parameters about each note, including pitch, how hard each note was struck (key velocity), when it was pressed and released (key on and key off times), and how hard the key was pressed down after hitting bottom (aftertouch—used for special effects). In addition, you can also record sustain-pedal and pitchbend parameters.

Advantages of Sequencing

Depending on which sequencing program you choose for your Apple/synthesizer combination, more or fewer features will be available to you. In general, the value of using a sequencer is somewhat akin to using a word-processing program for writing. That is, once you have entered your data (music), you can manipulate or rearrange it in numerous ways, until it finally sounds the way you like it. Just as we can decide to print out this article from a word-processing program with any number or types of printers, MIDI-recorded mu-

sic can be played on any MIDI instrument, from a \$15,000 Kurzweil to a \$350 Casio synthesizer, without modification of the music itself.

The other common denominator of sequencing programs is their multitracking capability, which allows a piece of music to be recorded one track at a time, with tracks later edited individually, linked, or merged "on top of" one another. In contrast to what you can do with normal tape recorders, you can perform an infinite number of digital overdubs without the usual problem of tape noise such as hiss being multiplied with each take. Also, getting back to the beginning of a piece for each take is instantaneous. No more waiting for the tape to rewind, finding the right spot, and so on.

nother musicians' dream come true is a sequencer's ability to modify the tempo of a perfor-Amance at any time. Until now, modifying the tempo of a recorded piece meant altering the speed of a tape recorder, which consequently changed the pitch of the music. With a few keystrokes on your Apple, however, you can speed up or slow down a MIDI performance without this effect. You can also record difficult parts of a piece at a slow speed and play them back at normal speed or even transpose the whole thing into a different key.

Transcribing

The symbols of standard musical notation and their "geographic" arrangement compactly record and communicate a tremendous amount of information about musical events and their interrelationships. A piece of written music lets you follow the flow of the music at a glance, and you can use the score to communicate to other musicians efficiently or to submit the composition to a publisher. The science (and art) of musical notation is not easily mastered, though, making this phase of the creative process a common stumbling block.

A music-transcription program can analyze MIDI data (what you've played on an instrument, for example) and convert the data into standard musical notation, on your



computer's screen and/or printed out on paper. If you've ever struggled to write out a piece of music, you may feel a sense of awe the first time you watch it happen effortlessly. Getting the transcription to appear exactly as you want it is sometimes tricky, because the computer accurately displays all your little playing mistakes and because the software logic may not be able to handle every curve you throw at it, but most programs allow enough on-screen editing to let you clean up any rough edges.

Synthesizer Programming

Despite the elimination of bulky patch cords and controls in recent synthesizer design, programming a specific sound (often called a voice) for a synthesizer can be a tedious process of trial and error. What's worse, some newer instruments employ digital programming, meaning that they have no knobs to twiddle, so you typically accomplish voicing with tiny push buttons and a small alphanumeric display window. Although the elimination of moving parts increases product reliability and cuts costs, programming time and hassle have escalated as a result.

everal helpful tools called voicing programs have come to market that, along with the Apple, serve to ease this burden. Using the MIDI interface and MIDI system-exclusive functions, these voicing tools take advantage of the Apple's resources (particularly graphics) to aid musicians in sculpturing a desired sound.

Once you're satisfied with a series of new sounds, you can tuck them neatly away on floppy disks-one of the greatest savings that MIDI has to offer. A typical synthesizer RAM cartridge costs anywhere from \$70 to \$90 and holds 32 sounds; in contrast, a single floppy disk can store as many as 800 sounds! Small wonder that many inexpensive voice-library programs, jam-packed with preset parameters, but without sound-editing capacities, have appeared in order to meet the needs of musicians in search of vast (and painlessly acquired) arsenals of sound.

Low-cost dedicated synthesizers

haven't completely squelched the demand for computer-based instruments, and for good reason. Most dedicated synthesizers can play in only one or two timbres at a time (monotimbral), whereas the alpha-Syntauri and Passport Soundchaser systems (and others) are capable of up to 16. Several upgraded cards, capable of higher fidelity and lower noise than the older products, have recently made an appearance.

Of special note are the "digital sampling" cards for the Apple II. Rather than synthesizing sounds themselves, these cards digitally record real-life sounds through a microphone, assign pitches to them, and let you play them from the keyboard. Suddenly, any sounds, from trashcan lids to barking dogs, become musical instruments!

Music Education

The use of music-education software has all the advantages (and disadvantages) inherent in computeraided instruction in general. There is no replacement for a good teacher, but musical training, both in performance and in theory, does often involve simple repetitive testing—a computer's forte. Music-education programs have been around for some time, particularly on the Apple II, using graphics and the Apple's internal speaker (or perhaps a plug-in sound board) to teach sight-reading, pitch and interval recognition, and even musical terminology.

Now, using MIDI, a computer can more easily supply a major part of your instruction aurally by playing your synthesizer for you. Educational programs can demonstrate melodies or chords and give students hints, prompts, and correct answers, as well as sense keyboard entry of notes. A properly designed program could ask a student to play music that appeared

on the monitor and sense whether it was performed properly or not. The student's input could then be displayed next to the original on a musical staff, while the computer and synthesizer, via MIDI, played both parts for comparison.

Tou don't absolutely need a MIDI setup to use these features, but a good-quality synthesizer sounds much better and is much more fun than the tinny internal sound circuits in your computer. Program developers, in addition, will be more encouraged to write for an established widespread standard, especially one that eliminates the burden of bundling hardware with educational packages. As long as a school owns an Apple, a MIDI-compatible keyboard, and the correct interface, that should be enough.

MIDI has emerged as a standard method of interconnecting computers and electronic musical instruments. It allows computer-software and -hardware designers to create sophisticated control systems for musical instruments. These developments will benefit musicians by providing them with powerful creativity tools, will assist school and home users by providing new tools for computer-assisted instruction in music, and will aid the computer industry by opening up an important new market.

Because Apples have played a central role in the development of MIDI, A+ is presenting three other articles in this issue that will give you an overview of MIDI and Apples. The first article, "MIDI Gear Galore," explores the various MIDI instruments that your Apple can control. The second, "A Crescendo of Products," is a survey of Apple II MIDI applications, and finally, "MIDI for the Macintosh" presents a roundup of Macintosh MIDI applications.

An endless array of instruments and accessories awaits you.

IDI is a communications protocol, so the logical question is "Once I've got my computer speaking MIDI, what can it speak MIDI with? The answer is that if it's musical and you want it, you can have it (or something very close to it).

No fooling. There's no good reason for anyone who's interested to hold back from exploring the wonders of MIDI, regardless of budget. In fact, so much MIDI gear is available right now that some computer users, well schooled in the ways of vaporware, may find the treasure trove too good to believe.

KEYBOARDS

Keyboards have dominated the MIDI scene since it began-hardly surprising, since the first microprocessors in musical instruments were in keyboard synthesizers (and the MIDI concept itself began life as a way of linking two different synthesizers so they could be played as one). What is unexpected is the depth, breadth, and speed of MIDI's penetration into the keyboard marketplace. In 1983 the first commercial MIDI product appeared, a small, inexpensive synthesizer from Sequential Circuits called the Prophet 600. Less than three years later, it's virtually impossible to find a keyboard without MIDI jacks-and I'm not just talking about "professional" or obviously electronic instruments, either.

SYNTHESIZERS

Although dozens of companies manufacture different synthesizers models, there are only three basic varieties, determined by how the synthesizer generates sound: analog synthesizers, digital synthesizers, and samplers.

Analog Synthesizers

Analog instruments are the old variety (an early analog synthesizer was

used to record Switched-On Bach). Virtually all of them use a process called subtractive synthesis, in which oscillators generate simple-sounding waveforms that gain complexityand therefore become more interesting to the ear-when various voltagecontrolled electronic filters chop and edit the waveforms. They generate tones using analog electronics; the only software is for connecting and directing the various components, stabilizing tuning, and so on. The "analog sound" is generally characterized as warm, rich, and thick; recording engineers say it fills a track solidly. (They also say that too much of it makes for sonic mud.)

Prices for stand-alone analog synthesizers run the gamut from inexpensive to moderate. Small units such as the Korg Poly-800 are available in some stores for less than \$500; instruments offering more punch and

power, such as Octave Plateau's Voyetra 8, Moog Electronics' Memorymoog, or Roland's Jupiter 6 or JX8P, check in at prices ranging from \$1500 to \$2700. Price is a fairly good indicator of the power and flexibility of analog synthesizers: the number of oscillators, how many notes you can play simultaneously, the amount of built-in program memory, the array of real-time performance controls, and extras such as chorusing circuits and automatic arpeggiators. The more you pay, the more you get.

Digital Synthesizers

Digital synthesizers are relative newcomers, much too expensive for the average musician until recently. The change came when Yamaha used FM (frequency modulation) synthesis algorithms, created by Stanford Professor John Chowning, as the heart of a price and sales miracle called the DX7. With its fast and responsive keyboard, clarity, rich range of sounds, and price tag below \$2000, the DX7 has become the most successful synthesizer ever.

ot to be outdone, the folks at Casio quickly launched their CZ series of instruments. These use a different kind of digital synthesis called PD (for phase distortion), sound great, and have even lower prices; you can find the CZ-101 in some stores for as low as \$260! If you've thought of Casio products as toys, think again. You'll find the fruits of the CZ line on a lot of hit records.

Digital synthesis is very clear-

sounding, just like digital audio, but each approach has its own character. Yamaha's FM synthesis has a slight tendency to sound metallic, especially in higher octaves, and Casio's PD synthesis sounds somewhat warmer but with a trifle less body. Both are absolute whizzes at bell and brass sounds, but because they have many more controllable parameters than the majority of analog synthesizers, they are tougher and less intuitive to program. Thus, a whole subindustry has arisen: companies that create RAM-cartridge or floppy-disk collections of preset sounds (referred to simply as presets) for folks who are more interested in playing the instruments than designing sounds.

word to the wise on buying digital synthesizers: Price is not necessarily a good guideline, although newness may be. Each generation of these instruments has increased greatly in power and lowered drastically in price, so buy strictly on features and sound, and don't be surprised if cheaper is sometimes better.

Samplers

Samplers don't really synthesize anything at all, strictly speaking. Instead, they record and play samples (digitally recorded sounds). Samplers can give you everything from true oboes and clarinets to dogs barking Beethoven's Fifth, to—well, anything at all that can be recorded. More important, samplers usually provide you with ways to edit the digital sounds they play, letting you make sounds shorter or longer, faster or slower, sustained or stuttered, even backwards or blended.

Price is a major factor here, and the choice is still limited. In the last year, samplers for less than \$2000, such as the Ensoniq Mirage, have finally appeared, but they can't match instruments such as the Emulator II from E-Mu Systems (\$8000) or the Kurzweil 250 from Kurzweil Music Systems (around \$17,000 with sampling option and the Macintosh computer required for storing sounds). If you have the financial resources, you might consider going all out for a

Fairlight CMI (\$30,000-plus) or a Synclavier (\$100,000-\$200,000!), but most of us will just deal with the trade-offs, which are usually in available memory and sound quality. For example, a Mirage stores only a couple of seconds of high-quality sound; the Emulator II, on the other hand, has room for up to 17 seconds, which you can cut up and arrange on the keyboard in almost any conceivable way. You have to decide for yourself if these differences make you want to leap the price gap.

POLY VS. MONO

In the "old" days of five to ten years ago, synthesizers were either polyphonic or monophonic. Polyphonic synthesizers could play more than one note at a time, but monophonic synthesizers couldn't. Polyphonic instruments were clearly more useful, because they could play chords, so monophonic synthesizers have largely died out.

MIDI stirs the stew a little by introducing a new meaning for the poly prefix: polytimbral, i.e., able to play more than one type of sound at a time. MIDI has 16 channels, and some of the latest synthesizers let you divide their available sounds up among these. With the Casio CZ-5000, for example, you can hear up to eight notes of one sound at once or up to eight notes of different sounds. This flexibility is ideal for computer owners with sequencer software, because it lets them orchestrate without having to own a lot of synthesizers. Just put the brass, woodwind, and drum parts on different MIDI channels, assign the right sounds to those channels in the synthesizer, and let things rip. The only limit is the maximum number of notes the instrument can play at one time.

Most synthesizers today are still

monotimbral (some notable exceptions are the CZ series and Sequential's MAX and SixTraks). Expect that situation to change.

MIDI IN OTHER KEYBOARDS

If your keyboard interests are more traditional, don't despair. Yamaha, Korg, Roland, Fender, and other manufacturers are putting MIDI into all sorts of keyboards: electric pianos, electronic pianos, organs (even the "home entertainment center" type), and portables—many of which are priced with consumers and hobbyists in mind.

piano, with an interface from Forte Music of San Jose, California that involves installation of a strip of microswitches that fits undetectably beneath the keys. You'll never even know it's there—until you play a chord and hear your synthesizer ring out in unison, that is!

MODULES AND CONTROLLERS

When MIDI first made two synthesizers play from one keyboard, some bright musicians out to save their backs and a few bucks started asking why they had to bother with the second (now redundant) keyboard. Design engineers got the point, and the result was a radically new approach to musical instruments. For the first time in history, the sound-generating and sound-controlling parts could be separate.

It was an explosive idea, and judging by the cloud of products hitting the market, the fallout is still settling.

Sound Modules

Keyboard synthesizers are as big as they are because of the keyboards, not the electronics. Throw out the ivories and you can pack a lot of punch into a very small package, at a considerably reduced cost.

That's the design concept behind MIDI modules, which are just boxes, usually designed to fit into an industry-standard 19-inch rack mount, with controls on the front and MIDI and audio jacks on the back. Just about anything you can buy as a stand-alone unit has a module equivalent, and there are some things you really can't get any other way.

Korg offers the most cost-effective analog synthesizer on the market in module form, the EX-800. Yamaha makes a rack-mounted synthesizer called the TX816, which is eight DX7s in a space not much larger than the Manhattan Yellow Pages. The undisputed king of the modules is Roland, which has just capped an already extensive line with a unit called Digital Piano: 16 piano, harpsichord, and electric-piano presets of astonishing fidelity and realism, for only \$1695. The instrument's scope and attention to detail are evident in that it lives up to the names of its presets, which include such classics as Steinway Piano, Steinway Piano with Lacquered Hammers (for that harder rock 'n' roll sound), and Bösendorfer.

Controllers

In the 70s, a keyboard player buried behind a mountain of synthesizers was a familiar sight, but these days you can't judge what's being played by what you see. Separate controllers are a boom industry and not just for keyboard players. MIDI sound modules don't care where they get their MIDI data from, as long as they get it, which means that guitarists, drummers, wind players, and even singers are joining in.

he new controller scene starts with two new developments in keyboards: high-quality master keyboards such as the Roland MKB-1000 and Yamaha KX88, with weighted, pianolike actions and the microprocessing power to control extensive MIDI networks, and remote keyboards that strap on like guitars do. The latter are good for more than just moving up to the front of the stage; the differences in hand position and body movement can open up whole new styles of playing.

Look beyond keyboards, and you'll find even more, including electronic drum kits with MIDI; acoustic drum kits with MIDI triggers; Roland's GR-series MIDI guitars and basses; prototype guitar controllers from several other manufacturers (the Voyetra guitar from Octave Plateau looks especially promising); pitch-to-MIDI converters such as Fairlight's

Voicetracker and Cherry Lane's Pitchrider 2000, which let woodwind players and singers control synthesizers (albeit monophonically and not without glitches); organ-style MIDI foot pedals from Korg; and even a biofeedback controller, available by mail, that lets you trigger MIDI instruments with your alpha waves.

DRUM MACHINES

Drum machines have been around for a while, and their initial impact on popular music has passed. We're even experiencing something of a backlash, with more and more interest in drumming with a human "feel."

Don't let that stop you, though. MIDI drum machines are only as inhuman as their programmers are.

Prices, features, offered sounds, and sound quality vary greatly. Korg, Yamaha, and Roland dominate the low end, and E-Mu System's SP-12 (arguably the best available, period) and the Linn 9000 own the high end. You can spend as little as \$200 or as much as \$4000—it's up to you—but by all means, take advantage of what MIDI has to offer! It's often easiest to get subtleties of feel out of a drum machine by ignoring its front panel and controlling it straight from your computer or another MIDI source. Case in point: From their own controls, Roland TR-707 and TR-727 drum machines have a limited dynamic range, but when you trigger them via MIDI, that range expands until every note has 127 possible volume levels.

SIGNAL PROCESSING

A lot of modern music has less to do with notes than it has to do with effects, most of which comes from pieces of equipment generically called signal processors. Once upon a time, these were found only in studios, but falling prices and rising expectations have put them into the mass market.

The two most common signal processors are digital delay lines, which create echoes, pitch transpositions, and other effects; and digital reverbs, which give raw sounds a sense of ambient space. A few of these units, mostly from Japanese manufacturers such as Korg, Roland, and Yamaha, now have a limited MIDI capacity that enables them to change programs under the control of whatever synthesizer or MIDI source is connected to them.

ore complex—and more interesting—are processors such as the new Lexicon PCM 70 digital reverb, which lets you actually control reverb parameters via MIDI. You can, for example, set it up so that changes in playing volume increase or reduce the reverb time.

SEQUENCERS

Sequencers are to MIDI instruments what piano rolls are to player pianos, a way of recording what notes are played and making them play back. In addition, most sequencers can record more than one track and have editing features that let you clean up weak performances and add notes never played by hand.

Don't underestimate the power of sequencers. Some of them are capable of recording, with tremendous subtlety and precision, an entire symphony of multitrack music.

Sequencers come in three types: dedicated, software, and hybrid. The dedicated types are basically little boxes of portable memory, with MIDI jacks, LCD readouts, and whatever editing capacity has been burned into their ROMs. Software sequencers are computer programs designed to record and edit MIDI data. Hybrids are a little of both—dedicated hardware units that have only RAM, rather than ROM, and get their operating instructions from a disk.

Each has advantages and disadvantages. The dedicated types of sequencers are portable, but the LCD

interface is inherently limited when you're dealing with lots of complex MIDI data. They also are not easily expandable; with each new generation, older models will become obsolete. By contrast, software sequenc-

ers are easy and cheap to upgrade and offer a lot more power, thanks to the monitors, (relatively) massive memories, and computing powers of the machines they run on—you just have to own the computer and the right interface first. Also, they aren't terribly portable (even the Mac). Hybrids, being a mixture of the other two approaches, get a mixed grade. They are portable and easy to upgrade—for a while, anyway—but offer limited memory, controls, and readouts.

More than one musician has compromised by owning two systems: a software sequencer for home or principal studio use and a dedicated or hybrid sequencer for session work or the road. The strategy is possible because the data format of MIDI is standardized, so dumping sequences from one system to another is easy.

Prices of the hardware-based models are dropping fast, as the Japanese companies battle it out. Software prices remain stable, but what the programs do for the money is going through the roof.

MIDI NETWORKING

This is a capitalist society, and MIDI is less than perfect. Put these two facts together, and what have you got?

Accessories!

Meet the people at J.L. Cooper Electronics, in Los Angeles. J.L. Cooper isn't the only company supplying little extras to help smooth the MIDI trail, but it's certainly the widestranging and fastest to market, so it deserves a look. In its catalog of products, you'll find a wide variety of channelizers, filters, switch boxes, expression expanders, control-voltage interfaces, drum drivers, lighting controllers . . .

What? You say you don't know what all these accessories do? Well, to discuss them properly (without writing a whole article about the limitations of MIDI) would be kind of tough. Suffice it to say that J.L. Cooper of spreading oil on

is in the business of spreading oil on your occasionally troubled waters. If you've got two synthesizers that won't talk MIDI to one another properly because of design choices their manufacturers have made, J.L. Cooper probably makes a box that you can plug between them that will solve the problem. If you have an older synthesizer that you don't want to give up just because it doesn't have MIDI, J.L. Cooper probably has a retrofit kit or a MIDI-to-Control-Voltage interface that will do the trick. And if you're just overwhelmed with plugging in and unplugging MIDI cables every time you want to reconfigure your network, they're definitely the folks to talk to (my favorite is a switch box with 16 MIDI IN jacks, 20 MIDI OUT jacks, and 64 programmable settings that determine which is connected to which).

All very practical, very useful, and now and again fun. Especially this one: For professionals (and the repressed rock star in the rest of us), J.L. Cooper makes the MIDI Lighting Controller 1. It does exactly what its name implies—it triggers your stage lights from the MIDI data your instruments put out. Remember that the next time you sit down to play; you could be running through spectra as well as octaves, or playing some blues along with your blues.

MIDI makes all that and more possible, right now. Happy exploring. +







"I like to think of MIDI as being the great equalizer," says Stephen Webb, a Long Beach, California, public-relations writer, amateur keyboardist, and Apple IIe owner. "Because MIDI is such a widely accepted international standard, my Apple can receive musical data through 16 MIDI channels just as quickly as Phil Collins' drum machine can. And the technology available to Michael Jackson is fundamentally the same as that being sold every day to Apple II owners, whether they're studio pros or rank amateurs. In terms of composition editing and tape synchronization, I'm doing things in my home the Beatles would have killed for in 1967!"

like hobbyist hyperbole, but a quick scan of the professional-music business substantiates his claims.

 Michael Boddicker, the acclaimed studio musician who programmed the synthesizers for Michael Jackson's megasuccessful album *Thrill*er, frequently takes to the road to tout Roland Corporation's family of digital music products (including MUSE—MIDI User's Sequencer/ Editor—a versatile music-software tool for the Apple II).

• Reclusive keyboardist Jan Hammer, formerly with the seminal jazz/fusion group Weather Report, uses his phalanx of personal computers and MIDI-equipped instruments to singlehandedly compose the soundtrack for TV's hit series "Miami

Vice." Hammer needs only his hardware and software, rather than dozens of symphonic sidemen, to get the job done—and he composes not in sweltering Dade County, Florida, or in Hollywood, but in the privacy of his farmhouse in rural Holmes, New York.

There's no denying the synergy that arises from the marriage of MIDI and personal computers.

• Lest you think that only trendy chart-toppers such as Duran Duran and Tears for Fears use computers to make music, get a load of these MIDI converts: Grammy-winning jazz keyboard player Oscar Peterson; avant-garde composer Philip Glass (Einstein on the Beach; Mishima soundtrack); and Joe Ely, one of the Young Turks of country-andwestern music, who composed the tunes for his most recent album, Hi-Res, on an Apple II and even used it to create snazzy graphics for the album's lyrics sheet!

There's no denying the synergy that arises from the marriage of MIDI and personal computers, yet the excitement really doesn't span the spectrum of Apple II applications. The drama derives primarily from Apple II software packages that provide professional-caliber sequencing/editing and voice libraries. Meanwhile, the innovations have slowed to a trickle in other Apple II applications such as score printing and music education. (I'll explain why in just a moment, but suffice it to say that the Apple II drought in these areas has a lot to do with the Macintosh's superior graphics and with a school-age baby boomlet that hasn't quite materialized.)

erhaps these other Apple II market segments are bound to pale in comparison to the fullthrottle creativity and price slashing in the sequencer/editor and voice-library markets. "What I've seen in Apple II sequencers and voice libraries recently has been incredible," says Doug Cohn, a New York City recording engineer and longtime Apple II Plus owner. "As recently as 1982, you needed a \$50,000 digital synthesizer such as a Fairlight or a Synclavier to accomplish what you can do today with an Apple II and about \$500 worth of software and interface hardware. That means that prices have dropped hundredfold in some cases. So I ask you: Have the prices of database-management programs or word-processing programs dropped that much in the same period? Apple II music software still delivers what Jobs and Wozniak envisioned from the start: genuine innovation at a price that's within reach of the average consumer."

Dozens of Apple II music-molding products enable today's semipros to create better music than the semiretired 70s stars and producers who luxuriated in 24-track studios. Before you charge into this musical arena, here's a tip: You're going to have to master three sets of overlapping jargon—the argot of synthesizer programming, audio buzzwords, and some brand-new MIDI expressions.

or example, if you walk cold into a MIDI Mavens' Convention, you're liable to overhear exchanges like "Let's change the default to the OMNI OFF, POLY Mode . . . " Similarly, synthesizer programmers (who almost invariably scrunch the word into a single syllable, synth) have amassed a huge body of buzzwords. A patch, for instance, is a synthesizer-created tone color, not a Br'er Rabbit hangout. And then there's the underpinning of audio terms, most of which have slightly sinister, Stephen King-like connotations: attack, decay, pink noise, and so forth.

Here's my last caveat to Apple II/ MIDI newcomers: Don't purchase music software until you find out what type of MIDI interface it requires. There are basically two types of gizmos to choose from: The onecard-does-all interface (a card with built-in MIDI jacks that plugs directly into an Apple II expansion slot, first popularized by Passport Designs) and a combination black-box/Appleexpansion card (such as Roland's MPU-401 freestanding interface unit and the accompanying MIF-APL plug-in card, plus a cable to connect the two).

Passport and Roland are, in fact, the premier vendors in the interface business. Some Apple II music programs work solely with a Passport interface; others require a two-piece Roland hookup. Several other companies are trying to dethrone both the de facto interface kings, so be careful. Most of these second-wave interfaces are of the one-card-does-all variety and feature numerous "on-board"

conveniences such as tape sync and drum sync. Everything, in short, except the kitchen sync!

Sequencer/Editor Software

In MIDI lingo, a sequencer is a software program capable of holding long strings—or sequences—of digitized "performance data" transmitted (according to MIDI standards) from a MIDI-equipped instrument to your computer. MIDI doesn't concern itself with such things as timbre, so you can enter your performance data on a guitar controller and play it back on a MIDI-equipped keyboard synthesizer (or "sound module," a slave synthesizer used only for playback, not as a MIDI controller).

The performance data that MIDI relays includes key-press/release information (how long did you hold the key down?), changes in synthesizer patches and presets, the movement of synthesizer switches and controllers (to achieve things like vibrato on/off and damp-pedal sounds), and pitchbend data (those eerie alterations in pitch that create sinking/soaring sounds).

MIDI Moves!

A ton of MIDI information must be transmitted for every sonic glide and slide a synthesizer player produces—not to mention such aspects as note duration, tempo, vibrato, and so on. So, in order to help shuttle all this performance data from MIDI controller to computer, the founding fathers of MIDI agreed on a very fast transmission rate: roughly 31,250 bits per second. Therefore, comparing the transmission rates of modem data (300 bps or 1200 bps for most Apple IIs) to MIDI data is like comparing the speed of a stagecoach to that of the

Starship Enterprise. So whatever your MIDI gripes may be, transmission speed won't be one of them. MIDI moves!

Like those Hollywood "hyphenates" who lay claim to titles such as producer/director, most MIDI sequencers for the Apple II family are actually sequencer/editor programs. Here are some of the once-exotic music-editing features that are now fairly standard on these programs:

- 4000-to-6000-note capacity
- Easily alterable tempo and time signatures
- Ability to layer 4 to 16 tracks (The sequencer/editor becomes, in effect, the digital equivalent of a multitrack audiotape recorder.)
- Ability to loop or chain previously recorded musical passages (Users can auto-repeat certain measures to sidestep the recording of repetitious sections.)
- Software support for most varieties of synchronization, internal sync, MIDI sync, tape sync (for matching up to audio tracks recorded at a studio or on a portable multitrack recorder), and drum sync (for both digital and conventional drums)
- Auto-correct features that let users smooth away (or "quantize," in MIDI jargon) any timing errors—e.g., a sixteenth note held a hair too long. Most programs that offer this feature let you auto-correct in resolutions ranging from a quarter note to a 1/32 note.
- An audible metronome that you can switch on or off. Many programs let you hear the metronome for one or two measures before the actual recording of a track begins.

Voice Libraries, Voicing Software

When computer-music aficionados get together, the term *voice* doesn't refer to Andy Rooney's distinctive whine or George C. Scott's trademark growl. In this context, a voice is the output of a single audio-signal path and its digital equivalent. MIDI doesn't carry information about timbre or warmth of a tone, only the numbers corresponding to voice



groupings. Eventually those numbers are converted back to audible output, and the voice groupings that produce rich tonal colors are usually called patches (as in violin patch or brass patch).

ow that the art of synthesizer programming has become such a time-consuming, software-intensive pursuit, many synthesizer players prefer to buy their patches rather than create them from scratch. Ironically, there's a booming demand for custom-crafted Apple II software patches and sound libraries in an era when many cottage-industry hackers are going broke. In some cases, this thriving commerce in patch and library software is a cottage industry for mansion dwellers. Some of the finest patch makers in business today are music-industry luminaries such as Carmine Appice (former drummer for The Jeff Beck Band) and session "synthman" Bo Tomlyn (whose clients have included Bruce Springsteen and Toto).

Although many patches and voice libraries are written for your Apple II, the software's ultimate purpose is to elicit great sounds from a MIDIequipped digital synthesizer. Yamaha's DX-7 is clearly the MIDI synthesizer the pros prefer-it's the synthesizer that got there fastest with the mostest and won industry allegiance. The vast majority of custom patches and voice libraries that run on the Apple II are written specifically for the DX-7.

Notation/Printing Software

Passport Designs, one of the pioneers in Apple music systems, has forged ahead with new Apple II notation/printing software, rather than follow the steady stream of developers who are moving such applications to the Macintosh. Passport's most recent releases are definitely worth the effort. Polywriter Utilities augments the power of the Polywriter Music Printing System by converting graphic files into sequencer files on Passport's MIDI/4, MIDI/4-Plus, and MIDI/8 sequencing/editing prod-

') be venerable Apple II is still the company's musical workhorse, despite its printing liabilities.

ucts. Moreover, Polywriter Utilities prints MIDI/4 sequences in standard music notation.

Leadsheeter is Passport's inexpensive alternative to Polywriter. For just \$99, Leadsheeter takes care of things such as note division, ties, and flags while converting your Apple compositions into dot-matrix sheet music. Leadsheeter handles all time and key signatures and can put lyrics beneath the staff.

The Great Mac Defection in musicnotation/music-printing software is likely to continue. The Mac obviously eclipses the Apple II in both speed and graphics elegance. (Those "notehanging" programs such as Music Construction Set are just too bloody slow on the Apple II). Nonetheless, software developers cannot totally ditch the Apple II as a notation and printing machine. The venerable II is still Apple's musical workhorse, despite its printing liabilities.

Surveying Music Education

The Apple II music-education genre has tapered off somewhat since Freff's report ("Opening Musical Vistas") in the November 1984 issue of A+, but Passport Designs is still hanging tough in a software niche that may not heat up again for a few years (until grade schools start enrolling some of the "Yuppie Puppies" being born right now). Meanwhile, Passport's latest baker's dozen of music-instruction diskettes aims for the upper end, those high-school and college students who somehow slipped through the lower grades without studying chord inversions and jazz harmonies. Each of the 13 new software titles was developed by Electronic Courseware Systems for distribution by Passport, and the product names do sound quite edifying: Keyboard Blues, Keyboard Note Drill, and so on.

But MIDI Age ingenuity really reaches new heights with Xanadu International's Musicom music-theory and ear-training software series for the Apple II. In addition to giving youngsters the de rigueur dose of diminished-ninth chords and funny looking rests, this software series actually lets kids croon into a microphone attached to an Apple expansion card. If the kid can't cut it in the Caruso department, the software gives an on-screen message indicating too sharp or too flat. (Teachers, take note: It doesn't have any on-screen prompts for "Too excruciating" or "Too late to take that sabbatical that you have been contemplating.")

inally, the MIDI momentum has created a real need for more adult-education books and videocassettes that demystify MIDI and "Synth-Speak" by providing glossaries, pictorials of sample hookups, and some simple how-to's. If you prefer the print medium, the quarterly Roland User Group Magazine is both technically lucid and aesthetically pleasing. Ferro Productions/ SynthArts sells two videocassetteseach listing for \$129.95, in both VHS and Beta formats-entitled Secrets of Analog and Digital Synthesis and Making the Most of MIDI. Rock legend Frank Zappa has hailed "Secrets" as a taped tutorial that explains musical hardware and software "in a way that even guitar players and record producers can understand."

Or maybe even we Apple II dilettantes, Frank. You know, the more these MIDI matters dominate the marketplace, the more we're forced to acknowledge that—MIDI matters. + (For a guide to music software and a vendor directory, see the sidebar immediately following this article.)

AppleWords

For use with the four MIDI music articles in this issue

ADSR

A term used both for the most common way of shaping synthesized sounds and for the circuit that carries out the process. ADSR stands for four stages in the production of a sound: attack, decay, sustain, and release. Changing the ADSR settings changes the tonal quality of a note but not its basic pitch.

ANALOG

As applied to synthesizers, ones that produce their basic tones using circuits that operate with a continuous series of values instead of the discrete steps used with digital methods. Even analog instruments, though, can have digital controls and interfaces.

ARPEGGIATOR

A circuit that continues a note pattern or chord, often with a selectable rhythm or progression.

BEND

To change the pitch (frequency) of a note, either to produce special effects or to tune up with notes from another instrument. Pitch-bending facilities vary widely, ranging from the ability to smoothly ramp the pitch up and down by more than an octave to settings that merely move the pitch up and down a stated fraction of a tone.

CHORUS

A feature that lets a synthesizer produce several related voices (notes) at a time, with the added notes following the main melody or chords but slightly shifted in tone or phase. The effect is somewhat as if a chorus, rather than a soloist, were producing each note.

DIN CONNECTOR

A round connector such as that used on the IIc, as well as on many tape recorders and home video cameras. It is a common European-style connector, made according to German industry (DIN) standards. MIDI uses DIN connectors for its cabling.

ENVELOPE

The shape of the waveform that makes up a sound. Two notes of the same basic pitch sound very different if they have different envelopes. You can generally modify envelopes with filters, mixers, and modulators. It takes some skill to get the desired sound.

LIBRARIAN

A program or feature that lets you store patches (groups of settings) or digitized sounds in a larger memory and recall them. One advantage of using Apple II or Mac as a MIDI controller is that the computer is already engineered to store up and recall blocks of data and that its more visual interface makes it easy to identify what you've stored.

MIDI

An industry-standard connection for computer and digital control of musical instruments and devices. MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) provides a way to digitally record, play back, and synchronize the settings that are needed in order to control sound-producing devices. You can buy MIDI boards for both the Apple II and the Macintosh computers.

PATCH

A group of settings for a synthesizer or similar instrument saved as a unit, or the memory area where these settings can be stored. Synthesizer players sometimes refer to these as programs, but they don't necessarily have any sequence of steps. An Apple or other personal computer with a

MIDI connection can be used to store and edit large numbers of patches, and you can buy prewritten patches for popular synthesizers on Apple disks.

POLYPHONIC

Involving more than one voice (note) at a time. Most synthesizers and keyboards are polyphonic, but the maximum number of voices varies with the brand and model.

PUNCH IN AND PUNCH OUT

A feature of some MIDI systems that allows you to switch from a previously recorded or automatic sequence to your own playing and back. When provided in the software for a computer running as a recorder and sequencer, this feature lets you edit your stored renditions.

SAMPLING

A technique for creating sounds by first capturing a digital recording of an existing sound and then manipulating it.

Adherents claim that it allows the production of sounds that can't be created by synthesizers, especially high-quality renditions of the human voice and acoustic music. Several sampling boards are available for the Apple II family.

SEQUENCER

A computer or controller that issues instructions to programmable musical instruments. An Apple II or Mac can act as a

sequencer if it has the right software and a MIDI interface.

SMPTE

Short for Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers, a group that, among other efforts, defined a time-coding system used on almost all professional videotape and film. Some digital music systems can also recognize SMPTE coding and synchronize their outputs to the SMPTE time signal.

STEP TIME

Taking one step of a digital music sequence at a time for recording, editing, or playback. It's the digital equivalent of slow or stop motion. One advantage of using a computer as a MIDI controller is that most programs allow step-time editing.

SYNTHESIZER

A musical instrument that electronically creates and shapes sounds according to changeable settings. Along with allowing you to control such basic sound qualities as pitch, loudness, and duration, most synthesizers allow you to alter the tonal qualities of each note. Most synthesizers are now made with MIDI connections, which means that they can be controlled through an Apple II or Macintosh with a MIDI board.

TRACK

A stored channel of information, particularly one that can capture a single musical voice. The term is used both for the channels on traditional (analog) tape recorders and for sections of memory in digitally based systems.

TRANSCRIPTION

Putting music into written form, particularly into standard musical notation. Some programs for the Apple II and Mac can do a creditable job of transcription as parts of MIDI systems, but so far their capabilities are far short of those of a professional musician.

VOICE

1. A succession of notes played by the same device or the collection of circuits that produces those notes. It's equivalent to a track in a multitrack tape recorder or a single part in a multipart musical score. 2. A particular tonal quality or timbre. Also, as a verb, to enter the settings that will cause an audible note, particularly a note with a chosen tonal quality. Voicing, on synthesizers, is also called patching.



since SSI came out with its IBM PC version of WordPerfect in 1983, the program has become one of the top-selling word-processing programs in the IBM world. SSI hopes to duplicate this success with WordPerfect for the Apple by incorporating nearly every feature that has made the original program so popular. The result is a powerful word-processing package.

Its wealth of features prevents WordPerfect from being the fastest program on the block to operate or the simplest to learn, but the trade-off between power and ease of use will be worth it for those who require an ad-

vanced word processor.

THE BIG PLUSES

WordPerfect combines many of the desirable features its competition offers and goes beyond them all in some ways. It uses a virtual-memory system, so you can create files as large as your available disk space (up to 16 megabytes on a hard disk). It features keystroke macros that let you automate any WordPerfect operation or set of operations. A merge capability lets you create form letters. You can inte-

Documents can be up to 250 characters wide, and the program scrolls text horizontally so the proper material is always in view. You can print a file from disk while editing another file in memory. And, finally, WordPerfect isn't copy-protected, so you can run the program from a hard disk or UniDisk 3.5.

Beyond these highlights, the program offers several advanced formatting and file-utility features, and it works with any printer you can name. My copy of WordPerfect came with built-in configurations for 31 printers and more than a dozen interface cards, and SSI says its goal is to add configurations for every printer in existence. At the time of this writing, SSI's list of printers that work with the Apple version is up to 42, and the IBM version of WordPerfect now works with more than 100 printers.

SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

WordPerfect is an assembly-language program that runs under Pro-DOS on either an Apple IIe or IIc. It



can run on a 64K system, but it uses program-overlay files that move into and out of memory as necessary on a 64K machine, so the system will run relatively slowly. On a 128K machine, the overlays are loaded into the extra RAM, and you don't notice the over-

lay swapping.

The program can also run on a single-drive system, although two drives are recommended. The package includes four disks: a program disk, a utility disk (which contains extra printer- and interface-configuration files, among other things), a disk filled with tutorial files, and a formatted data disk. The data disk contains the program's Help file and some printertest files, but you can use any standard ProDOS data disk.

he program's manual begins with step-by-step instructions for copying the four disks onto single-drive, two-drive, and hard-disk systems. The manual contains no mention of Apple's new Uni-Disk 3.5 drive—it assumes you're working with 5¼-inch floppy drives or a hard disk. SSI did take into account the growing popularity of RAM-

expansion cards, however, and the program comes with utility software that lets you set up a RAMdisk for storing data files if you have an Applied Engineering RAMWorks card.

STRUCTURED LEARNING

The WordPerfect manual is organized to accommodate first-time users. The "Getting Started" section shows you how to copy the program and other disks and how to define a macro that selects the printer and interface card you want to use. The program can store up to three printer and interface-card configurations at a time, and you can choose among them when you print a document. The initial printer-selection macro, called Startmac, selects a printer and interface card automatically when you load the program.

Once you've made copies of disks and set up the printer-selection macro, you can move into the "Learning" section of the manual, 11 lessons that walk you through many of the program's features, including most editing and formatting features and an overview of the merge function. This step-by-step approach gets you using

program functions quickly, but it doesn't provide an overall understanding of how the program works or how it is organized—you have to refer to the manual's reference section for explanations of individual program features.

reference section follows the tutorial and explains every program feature and command in alphabetical order. The separate sections that follow give detailed explanations of the spelling program, the macro capability, and the merge function. Merging and macros are particularly powerful features in Word-Perfect. A merge file can contain up to 64,000 different fields of information, so this function goes way beyond simple form letters. The merge section offers some suggestions for different uses of this feature.

The macro function gives you programming abilities without a programming language such as Apple Writer's WPL. You define macros by turning on the Macro Definition function and naming the macro. (Macros can have names up to 15 characters long, or you can choose to store them

under open-apple/letter-key combinations.) To enter a macro, you simply type the operation you want to save as a macro. When you've completed the operation, you turn the Macro Definition feature off.

You can chain macros to one another, and the chaining can be conditional so that linked macros begin working only if certain conditions exist. The "Special Features" section of the manual describes advanced macro uses and offers examples of chained and conditional macros. A chained macro can retrieve a file and then print it, for example, and a conditional chained macro can retrieve a file, search for a phrase, and then print the file (if the phrase is present) or add the phrase to the file and then print the file (if the phrase is not present). Because macros can be conditional, you can construct menus within the program that perform certain program functions. Input from a menu can trigger a macro. If you type Option A, for example, Macro A activates, and so on. The "Special Features" section also includes an example of a menu system.

USING WORDPERFECT

WordPerfect is an example of a "modeless" word-processing program. Most word-processing programs begin from a menu that lets you load or save files, format disks, list files, or create new documents, but WordPerfect begins with an editing screen that shows only the line and column position of the cursor. The bottom line of the screen shows the current program status—one-letter symbols indicate whether features such as boldface or underlining are turned on, and a list of available program options appears when you type a command. You control every program feature from this screen.




Figure 1: A file on the screen showing formats. Format enhancements such as boldface and underlining don't appear as printed, but show up in reverse video so you know they're there.

To create a document, you simply begin typing. The program formats text on the screen dynamically, so margins, centering, line spacing, and page breaks appear as they will when the document is printed. Other format enhancements such as boldface, underlining, different pitch settings, or proportional spacing don't appear as printed, but they show up in reverse video so you know

they're there (see figure 1).

One thing about the appearance of text on the screen that you have to get used to is the dynamic formatting. Unlike AppleWorks or PFS:Write (which update the formatting of the entire screen whenever you make a change), WordPerfect updates the format of text only above and to the left of the cursor's position, not below

and to the right of it. If you insert words in a line, therefore, the line changes (to the right of the cursor) won't reformat until you use the Rewrite command to reformat the whole screen. You may find this method disconcerting at first, because inserted words don't wrap around to the next line—they march off the screen to the right out of view, and they don't reformat until you use the Rewrite command.

The advantage of this modeless control system is that you don't have to remove an active file from the screen when you want to print a file from disk, format a disk, create a subdirectory, or perform other utility functions. In some cases (listing files on the disk, for example), the active file temporarily disappears from the screen, but it always returns when you have completed the current activity.

The disadvantage of this system for newcomers is the lack of logic in the organization of sets of commands. Programs that begin from a menu or use separate file-management and formatting modes have a built-in organization that helps you remember where certain groups of functions are in the program. In WordPerfect, on the other hand, the commands are all bunched together and controlled by the open-apple and solid-apple keys, in combination with the keys in the top row of the keyboard. The program's developers made no attempt to place related functions together in the top row. The Cancel command is next to Search, which is next to List Files, which is next to Boldface, for example.


You'll therefore spend a lot of time referring to the command template that SSI supplies to help you remember where commands are, or displaying the on-line help list (see figure 2). The only organizing system is that you control all the editing/formatting/utility functions with open apple or solid apple and one of the top row keys and handle all the cursor movements with the solid-apple key and the letter keys on the right side of the keyboard below the top row.

Even when you use the template for the top-row keys, however, you don't easily become familiar with the options under each labeled key. After all, there are only 14 keys (28 functions, because each key works with both the open and solid apple) to control some 126 program features and commands. Pressing most key combina-

tions reveals a menu of options, and those menus often reveal submenus with more options.

The sheer number of necessary keystrokes sometimes gets in the way of quick editing. To move data by a sentence, paragraph, or page, for example, you must type the Move command, and then choose Sentence, Para-

graph, or Page from a menu.

If you want to work with a block of text other than one of these units, you must enter the program's Block mode. The total sequence of operations to move three words of text, for example, is open-apple-0 (enter the Block Selection mode); open-apple-9 (Move command), 1 (option to cut block), move cursor to new location, open-apple-9 (Move command), 4 (option to retrieve block), open-apple-0 (leave the Block mode). If you use some of the multiple-key operations frequently, of course, you can define macros to handle them much more quickly, but the going will be fairly slow until you've set up the macros you need most.

Another program feature that will slow users down somewhat is also related to the Move function. Whenever you cut text from a document, it is stored on disk in a temporary file, rather than in memory, which means that you have to wait for your Apple to save or load sections of text when you cut or paste them. Having a hard disk or a RAMdisk speeds this process up considerably.

One last area in which the program's power can be a drawback is in the formatting codes. You can enter 49 separate formatting codes into documents as you specify formats. These codes are normally hidden from view, but when you display them, the jungle of codes on the screen (in inverse video) can be mystifying. The manual does contain a listing of the codes and what they all mean. **FEATURES GALORE**

These operational complexities are functions of the program's power, however, and WordPerfect has power to spare. Here are a few of the feature highlights:

Formatting

The program automatically numbers footnotes in the text and adjusts page breaks to accommodate footnotes. You can format alternating pages for left and right binding margins for two-sided printing. You can align text flush-right with two keystrokes and change text from uppercase/lowercase to all caps with one command. You can automatically insert the date at the cursor position (WordPerfect can work with clock cards, or you can store the current date manually).

The program can be set to suggest hyphenation of long words that have wrapped from one line to the next. You can set the pitch (including proportional spacing) as well as use different fonts on most printers. You can define two headers and two footers for each document and alternate them throughout the file. You can also center text vertically on a page with a simple command. Although the printer-control system is elaborate, you can enter your own printer-control codes for special printer




Figure 3: Disk catalog—with /Learn in drive 2, you use the List Files command to produce a catalog of the disk that shows each file's name, size, and date of creation and last modification.

features (such as shadow printing) that the program doesn't automatically offer.

Editing

A full range of cursor-movement commands take you to the beginning or end of a line, page, or document. The program searches forward or backward for text or format elements. You can also jump directly to individual page numbers in a document, whether you have specified page numbering or not.

Utilities

You can print one file from disk while editing another. You can also append a block of text from the current file to a file on disk or insert a file from disk anywhere in the current file. The Look feature lets you view the first page of every file on the disk without loading each one—a fast way to browse through files in a catalog if you've forgotten what they contain. The list of files shows the name and size of each file as well as the date and time of its creation and last modification. You can select a file to retrieve or insert by highlighting it in the list (see figure 3). THE PRICE OF POWER

With WordPerfect, you get almost every conceivable feature you could want in a word-processing program, without any real limits on what you can do with them. The price you pay is somewhat slower operation. Once you've worked with the program for a while, you should remember your way around fairly well, but you'll still have to use two or three sets of keystrokes (or macros you've set up) to do many typical operations. Nevertheless, WordPerfect packs more punch than any other Apple word-processing program, at a reasonable price.







them. From fiery network logos rocketing across the television screen to astounding film fantasies à la George Lucas, computer-animated graphics and special effects are one of the most visible and exciting developments of the electronic age. Never before have our eyes been treated to such a stunning variety of illusive, artful, and entertaining visual effects.

Now, thanks to Brøderbund Software, Apple II owners can create a bit of their own electronic wizardry, without spending millions of dollars on fancy equipment to do it.

FantaVision takes the Apple II to new graphic heights, giving users a machine that is geared for exploring the fascinating fantasy world of computer-animated graphics. Using the program, you'll be able to create and save your own colorful, high-resolution, animated movies, up to three hours long, complete with special effects. You can even create special movie disks to send to friends—they'll need an Apple, of course, to enjoy the show.

I like to think of FantaVision as

word-processing program—at least until the next deadline looms threateningly.

How It Works

One word of caution: FantaVision is fun and amazing, but it's no snap to learn, especially if you've never worked with computer graphics before. If instant gratification is what you look for in a program, pass this one by. FantaVision is in a whole different league from a Print Shop, for example. You can't toss the manual into a corner and whip a movie together in the first hour. At the risk of sounding like a junior-high shop teacher, I'll say that a thorough understanding of the manual is really

A program that brings the fascinating world of computeranimated graphics to your Apple II intermediate frames you want visible. You simply press a number key, 1–7; 1 runs the fewest intermediate frames (giving you the fastest animation), and 7 shows the most intermediate frames (slowest animation).

"Transformation" is another technique that adds to FantaVision's magic. Draw a bird in frame 3, after your two stick figures. When you run the sequence at high speed, your dancer jumps and turns magically into—you guessed it—a feathered fowl. What you do with the poor creature after that is up to you, but if he gives you any trouble, you can always threaten to turn him into a frog the next time.

FantaVision gives you all the tools you need to create your own original animated sequences, complete with backgrounds and special effects. If you're feeling a bit lazy or just plain uninspired, you can have lots of fun just altering one of the many demo movies that come with the program.

Nuts and Bolts

To begin your animation efforts with FantaVision, you'll need an Apple II with at least 64K RAM; a disk drive; a color or monochrome TV or monitor; and a mouse, Apple Graphics Tablet, KoalaPad, or joystick. The best rendering I've seen of FantaVision's color and high resolution was produced by an Amdek RGB monitor. The RGB monitor I used was adequate but did not give the clarity of line and color the Amdek produces.

Cursor control for FantaVision is best with a mouse. The speed and efficiency of the program are quite impressive with the mouse, allowing you to get on with your production quickly and easily (once you know what you're doing). The Tablet and KoalaPad are next in line of performance, with the joystick a poor third. When you're in the heat of creativity, cursor control with a joystick is frustrating at best.

hen you boot the Fanta-Vision disk, you get an empty screen surrounded by the various drawing and animation tools you'll need to make your movies. File, the first of the three pull-down menus at the top of the screen, allows you to choose from a list of demo movies. The demo



Computer-Animated Graphics 101. It's a course that will appeal to the uninitiated as well as the experienced in a learning process that's fun every step of the way. You don't have to be an artist or a programming wizard to learn and enjoy FantaVision.

Take me, for instance. I'm a writer, so I spend 90% of my computer time using a word-processing program. Not very exciting, when you consider the capabilities of the machine. I'm not much when it comes to drawing and painting either, but I have always been intrigued by the likes of MacDraw and MacPaint. (Somehow pictorial endeavors are different when you're using a cursor and a screen.) Tell me I can animate my creations, then, and I'm ready to trade in my

essential to learning how to make good animations.

"Tweening" is the animation technique that breathes life into your FantaVision drawings. For example, if you draw a standing stick figure by plotting a series of points on the screen and then draw the same figure with both legs kicked straight out in the next screen, FantaVision will run the sequence of the two screens like two frames in a movie. If you run the sequence at a high speed, your stick figure will become a dancer kicking up his heels. By slowing the speed, you'll be able to see the intermediate (or be-tween) positions of the figure as the program runs through the sequence. You set the speed of your movies by controlling the number of

movies are a good initiation into the powers of the program and should inspire you to turn to the manual and begin experimenting. The trick is not to get discouraged when your first attempts at movie making fall far short of the demos. Persevere—you'll be well rewarded with the results. File

also gives you several ready-made backgrounds that you can use as "sets" for your movies.

The Drawing Tools

The left side of FantaVision's screen displays icons that represent the program's various drawing tools: a pencil for plotting and joining points, a circle maker, a square/rectangle maker, a hand for grabbing and extending lines, a knife for deleting, a letter icon for writing text, and an interesting feature called a capture box. The capture box enables you to

select and change one or several objects from your screen without changing the entire picture.

Moving to the bottom left of the screen, you'll see a choice of four different color palettes, each palette containing 14 different colors. Unfortunately, you must confine yourself to using one palette at a time. If you don't, hardware limitations cause jagged lines to appear between the colors, creating the kind of special effect you definitely want to avoid.

Next is the Go command box, which you activate by pointing and clicking the mouse. Go instructs the computer to begin running frames together, animating your movie. Located beneath Go is a useful feature called Global. Global allows you to make a change and then continue that change throughout the movie, without having to alter every frame individually. Under Global is Overlay, a command that displays all the objects from every frame at once, allowing you to see exactly what paths they will move along during the animation and letting you fine-tune the animations.


To the right of Go is an object counter. You can create any number of animated objects in your movies, but FantaVision can animate only eight objects at a time. Using the object counter, you can delete objects from any given frame and then add others quickly and easily. This feature is also key to creating foreground and background objects, since the higher the object number is, the further forward the object appears. In other words, object 1 will appear to be behind object 2 if their paths cross in the animation.

Using the Animation Box

By using the "animation box," you can choose among FantaVision's four different modes: the Normal mode is what caused our dancer to jump up and turn into a bird; the Background mode drops an object into the background, letting you create a set or backdrop for your movie. By dropping an object into the background during an animated sequence, you gain the ability to replace it with another animated object at that point in your movie. The Lightning and Trace modes create unusual effects that you have to see to appreciate, but they add to the program's possibilities.

The last feature at the bottom of the screen is a "dimension box," which gives you three different ways of creating objects: using solid shapes, using lines, or using dots.

On the right side of the screen, you'll see the film strip, which has 16 squares, each representing 8 frames. A number at the top of the strip tells you which frame you're working on. Simply by pointing and clicking the mouse on the up or down arrow on



the strip, you can move from frame to frame as you create your movie or jump backward or forward several frames at a time for editing.

Arriving back at the top of the screen, you find two other pull-down menus besides the File menu. The Edit menu gives you a Clipboard to work with off-screen, allowing you to copy and paste an object from one frame to another in your movie. Or you can even copy a favorite object from a demo movie and paste it into your movie. The Cut command takes a whole frame to the Clipboard, and

you can then paste that frame in, anywhere in the movie. Clone, Zap, and Undo complete the Edit menu.

Last, but far from least, comes the Goodies menu. Using Goodies, you can manipulate the objects you've created in all kinds of amazing ways. With Zoom, you can make your objects grow until they fill the screen or shrink to near oblivion as a tiny point. Using Turn, you can rotate a circle until all that's visible is the rim. Lean does just what the name says. You can create some exciting effects by using Lean to form shadows for your objects, giving the screen an added dimension. Flip and Squash round out the Goodies section; their names are descriptive enough to allow you to envision their results.

In addition to providing hours of amusement, FantaVision can serve several purposes in a business setting and in the classroom. Imagine, for instance, that you're attending yet another staff meeting, this one on sales projections for the next five years. Just as you've successfully suppressed your third yawn, the VP of marketing flips on a monitor, and six brightly colored bar graphs begin growing and shrinking. Got your attention,

didn't it? Sure beats flip charts.

As a learning tool in the classroom, FantaVision could be downright inspiring. Picture animated spelling words and multiplication tables, or colorful and animated diagrams, complete with labeled parts.

If you're a lover of hard copy, you should be aware that FantaVision is not set up as a printing program. Obviously, since animation is the software's star feature, your creations would lose their "life" if they were confined to a piece of printout paper. If the graphics you create are so special that you simply must get them on paper, however, you can print out individual screens by saving them as

backdrops and then using a screendump program.

Imagination Is the Limit

After a week of experimenting with FantaVision, I feel that I've only just scratched the surface of the program's capabilities. FantaVision is the kind of software I like to call openended. The creative possibilities are limited only by the imagination. FantaVision users are likely to come up with ways of using the program that even its developers have never dreamed of.



WITH FRIENDS LIKE BASIC, WHO NEEDS ENEMIES?

Its violations of accepted programming principles are a disservice to students.

In an upcoming issue of A +, you will find an article by me on Logo, in which I make it clear that I am fond of Logo as a programming language. Although some other languages-AL-GOL-like languages such as Pascal, descriptive languages including LISP and PROLOG, and some of the newer object-oriented languages such as NEON—are worth knowing, BA-SIC, especially Applesoft BASIC, is not on my list.


In general, I am in favor of free choice. If you want to write programs in machine language or COBOL, that's fine with me. I don't even care if, as a matter of personal choice, you elect to write programs in Applesoft BASIC. What bothers me is that millions of school-age children are not being given a choice and are being forced to learn a language that violates generally accepted principles of what programming should be about.

Educational systems (such as ours) that persist in the belief that students should learn to program with languages such as Applesoft BASIC are not only wasting student's time, but they are also helping instill an inferior view of what it means to program a computer.

Why should a language that is in such common use, both in homes and in classrooms, engender such vitriolic comments? The answer requires an understanding of the function of high-level languages.

A high-level language exists to perform two tasks: First, it must allow its users to create programs that a computer can execute in an unambiguous fashion. Second, it must produce a listing that the programmer and anyone else who may need to read the program can decipher.

How does Applesoft BASIC stack up? Not well, not well at all.

When we were children, many of us read the nonsense poetry of Edward Lear. Little did we know that when we grew up, we could create nonsense of our own using BASIC!

All BASIC programmers taught that it is OK to enter statements such as

A = A + 1

equal sign indicates replacement. In other words, this instruction says, in effect, "Replace the present value of A with the present value plus 1." (Are you paying attention? There may be a quiz later on!) Now, what does the equal sign mean in this BASIC line?

IF A =6 THEN STOP

In this statement the equal sign has a completely different meaning than it did before. It stands for *equal* in the

mathematical sense. In other words, this line checks to see if the present value of A is equal to 6. Confused? We're not done yet.

Comparing Apples and Apricots

One of the tenets of good programming practice is to use meaningful variable names. Suppose you are a farmer who wants to create a program to keep track of your apples and apricots. Since Applesoft BASIC allows variable names that are quite long (more than 200 characters), you might choose to create variables named APRICOT and APPLE. When you do this, you will find that BASIC graciously accepts your names and repeats them faithfully whenever you list your program. The catch is that Applesoft pays attention only to the first two letters of a variable's name, making both of these variables the same internally.

Try this program on for size:

10 APRICOTS = 23000 20 APPLES = 12000 30 PRINT APRICOTS

When you run this program, the number 12000 will print, rather than the 23000 you were expecting.

To add insult to injury, an Applesoft BASIC programmer cannot embed any BASIC keywords in a variable name. Thus, you can't have variables named FOREIGN, DIFFERENCE, STATUS, or any other word that contains a BASIC keyword anywhere in its name.

"All right," you're saying, "this is a problem, but it is easy to get around it by teaching people to use variable

names with only one or two letters."

I wish it were that easy. For example, try this little gem on your II:

10 A = 10 20 B = 10 30 IF B = A THEN PRINT "HELLO"

Now run the program and see what happens. Not a pretty sight, is it? For the benefit of those of you for whom BASIC is only a bad memory, this program doesn't work because the Applesoft parser scans from left to right and doesn't pay any attention to spaces. When it gets to line 30, this is what the parser "thinks" you mean:

30 IF B = AT HEN PRINT "HELLO"

What a friend we have in BASIC! Up Variablescope!

Have you ever written a BASIC program like this one?

10000 for I = 1 to 1000 10010 GOSUB 20000 10020 NEXT I

(several pages later)

20000 REM SUBROUTINE
20010 for I = 1 to 50
20020 (statements of your choice)
20030 NEXT I
20040 RETURN

What happens? Total chaos! By the time you wrote the routine at line 20000, you forgot that variable I was in use. By using it again, you interfered with a loop several pages away. You can avoid this type of program by being extremely careful in your choice of variable names, but you shouldn't have to worry about such nonsense.


Because Applesoft's variables are global in scope, they are accessible to all parts of the program—whether you want them to be or not. Languages that include local variables (such as Logo and Pascal) avoid this problem, as well as the other problems mentioned above.


I could go on forever, but you see my point. From my perspective, it is one thing for a hobbyist to choose to use BASIC and another for our schools to use our tax dollars to perpetuate what amounts to a sick joke on our students.

As BASIC's coinventor suggests, you might want to try Turbo Pascal instead. As for me, I think I'll stick with Logo.





Editors' Note—Two Macintosh games from two different companies have appeared on the market at the same time, both with the name Deja Vu. To help sort out the confusion, we are running our reviews of these two products side by side.

PLAY IT AGAIN, SAM

"Well, sweetheart, there I am, see, sitting on the throne with a hangover the size of the East Side. Only I ain't got a hangover, see, 'cuz someone played the tom-toms on my head. I'm feeling dizzy, see, and I try to get up. Then I notice little marks on my arms-needle tracks, you know, like when the doc gives you shots. And I don't know who stabbed me with the needle. And I don't know what bum rolled me.

"Then I get to thinkin", and I feel kinda funny, see, like, like, when you first kissed a dame, or, or, after you slugged the school bully right in the mug. And I'm thinkin' and I'm thinkin' and I'm rifling this trench coat and I'm looking at this .38 and you know what? I can't remember my name. I stagger to the sink, look in the mirror, and I can't remember my face. Listen, babe, ain't nuthin' worse in the world than not knowing who you are."


Deja Vu, a graphics ad-

venture game for the Macintosh from Mindscape, places you in the shoes and trench coat of . . . Gee, I can't tell you that. Figuring out just who you are is a major part of the game. Suffice it to say that you start the game in a stall with a trench coat, a gun, a nasty bump on the back of your head, and an even nastier set of needle marks on your arm.

It doesn't take an ace gumshoe to figure out that you've got to find out what courses through your veins. As you wander around, you find someone—a corpse. It seems somebody plugged this guy with three slugs. A quick look into your gun

reveals three bullets and three spent cartridges. Nice touch, huh? They always said frames were for pictures and suckers. To make matters worse, the cops, the mob, and some other people are all looking for you.

The real innovation of the game comes when you interact with the computer. Four main windows appear on the screen. One shows a graphic image of what you see, another displays your inventory, the third shows you all possible exits from a room or area, and the fourth displays the text descriptions. You almost never type anything to move around and use objects. Instead,

you control the whole adventure by pointing to one of nine words—examine, open, close, speak, operate, go, hit, consume, and self—and clicking on an object appearing in the view and inventory windows.

The effect is fantastic! Who needs a parser structure when all you have to do is point and click? Want to start the car with the key? Point and click on the word operate, the key, and the ignition. Bang, there you go. Want to pick up an object? Just point to it, press and hold the mouse button, and then drag the object into your inventory window. The process is fast and neat and certainly helps you get involved in the game.

You are going to need some time and quick thinking to solve the mystery. Deja Vu can be lethal, but boy do you learn what works and what doesn't. The game moves along, and you always feel that you are accomplishing something. As with other adventure games, though, certain actions that seem logical aren't permitted. For example, although you can frisk the corpse in the bar, you can't frisk it in the

My big objection is the price, a wallet-splitting \$54.95. That hurts worse than the bump on your head. Yes, ICOM Simulations, which created the game for Mindscape, has presented a radically new and efficient way to play an adventure game. Yes, Deja Vu involves you and makes you want to go back and play it even after you've died for the 43rd time. Yes, I'm sure many man-years of work went into programming the



game. But \$54.95 is just plain too much. Take my advice, Mindscape: Cut the price in half, and Macintosh owners will be buying Deja Vu faster than parents bought Cabbage Patch dolls for their kids.

"And that, doll, is how I cracked the case. Yeah, the cops are happy, and I'm square with the mob. The only people who ain't pleased with me are the hacks. You know, the cabbies I stiffed for the fare. Oh, yeah, the butler too. Look babe, I had to hit him first, see, before he threw me outa the house.

"So whadya say we blow this joint, pick up a bottle of vino, head back to my apartment, and, uh, look over the files. No, I'm not givin' you a line. Us heros are like that, tough on the outside, soft on the inside. Sure, I mean it. I know how to treat a lady. Hey, be with ya in a minute. I wanna fix my tie.

MEMORY TEST

The getaway car screams around the corner as the alarm clangs and the bank guard shouts, "Halt!" Quick—what was the license number? Do you draw a blank in crises like



that? Does your brain simply flash "not enough memory?" Perhaps it's

time for Déjà Vu, a mindsharpener that runs on the Macintosh.

This educational game stresses pattern recognition, memorization, and reaction time more than it does reasoning power. The playing board is a grid of 30 squares. As you point and click on each square with the mouse, an image appears briefly and then disappears. You get two squares for each turn, and the goal is to match two of the same images on the board. When you make a match, the two squares blink and beep, they are erased from the board, and you score one point.

You can choose among five sets of images, each of which tests different kinds of memorization. The Pictures set features the cheery images of Apple's Cairo font, such as a dog, a frog, or a flower. The Shapes set contains sharp two-dimensional and three-dimensional geometric forms. The other sets are Letters, Numbers, and Words. Each time you play, the order of the set distributed behind the squares is rearranged.

Déjà Vu's menus allow you to use a timer clock, control the length of time the image appears on the board, and vary the sound. In the two-player game, you are invited to enter your names, which then appear in two plaques on the board. Each illuminates as you take turns trading the mouse back and forth, keeping score as you go. You can choose just to practice, or you can

pit your wits against the Mac. The Mac has three levels of power, and you'll need the memory of a herd



of elephants to beat it!

Because Déjà Vu is completely mouse-driven and accessible at so many levels, almost anyone can use it, although the grid has too many squares for most preschoolers to be able to cope with it comfortably. Many handicapped and special students may find it valuable not only as a game, but also as challenging therapy.

It was just a matter of time until someone wrote a program to do numerology. Well, computers are supposed to be good at numbers. The program is Numerology for the New Era, Your Guide to Life, and it was written by a 62-year-old former nurse who says, "Numbers bring people together."

I, however, remain skeptical.

The number 1040, for instance, does absolutely nothing for me.

According to the text on the package, Numerology was founded by Pythagoras around 600 B.C. Numerology is supposedly a mirror that reflects your life's journey in numbers, and the numerical significance of your name and date of birth "form a unique blueprint of the talents, abilities, and challenges that ask to be expressed. . . ."

The program begins by asking you for your name, date of birth, and today's date. and work in a drugstore.

On the other hand, you start out with \$35,000 in cash and the near-respect of your simulated peers. If you're able to increase your net worth (your net worth is the difference between your assets and liabilities) to \$50,000, you're rewarded with the title of investor and can thus take out 90% loan-to-value mortgages, instead of being stuck with your original novice credit rating of only 80%. (You calculate loan to value by dividing the principal amount of the loan by the appraised value of the property.)

With an \$80,000 net worth, you are considered a speculator and are able to sell options on property as well as exercise them (a right you had since you were a novice).

The big time is \$125,000. At that net worth, you're a broker. Your closing commission drops from 7% of the sale price of the property to



4%. After that, making money is no problem.

Baron befriends fallen capitalists, recognizing that even the most talented investor can fall on bad times. The game allows you to retain your title and privileges, even if your net worth falls below the

minimum.

Every simulation begins on January 1, 1984. The mortgage rates and property prices change each month, along with the economic news. a host of real-estate and economic statistics to help you make your decisions. The challenge is the market—you against the world!







AN EVEN BET: WAGERING WITH MARBLES

The odds of choosing one of two black marbles from a bag of white

All good projects come to an end sometime, and even the workaholics of I-O Industries in the heart of Silicon Valley get a little R&R as a reward for their R&D efforts. that is—lights Smith's cigarette with a large silver Zippo, smiles at Levin, and winks at the cute blonde.

Levin continues the introductions. "Sally McRae and Barton Dum-

bridge. Sally did a lot of the back end for the compiler. Bart's in support for technical languages. Grey Scrivener; he wrote the manual. And . . .?"

Scrivener is impeccable in a charcoal three-piece suit, Nicola Mancini white shirt, narrow tie, and Italian slip-ons. "This is my friend Charles LaFebvre. He services Apples for Compu-R-X."

LaFebvre has pewter pants that match his hair, a mauve silk harem shirt with three buttons undone, and two diamond stud earrings in his left ear. "Hi there. Sure is nice of your company to bring us to this fabulous restaurant."

Best Steak in the Valley

Now that everyone else is seated, Gilbert squeezes his six-five frame into the Balans chair. "Order yourself a drink, Charles. I-Q's paying for everything. And you'll be able to order the best steak in the Valley in about half an hour."

Smith looks in wonderment at McRae. "This is the first time I've seen you in a dress, Sally."

"I bought it this afternoon. I don't own any others. Well, Stephanie, are you a programmer, too?"

"No, I'm in public relations. I tell the press about Apple's new products and answer embarrassing questions from reporters about the company's internal affairs."

A waitress appears. LaFebvre re-

quests a champagne cocktail. "Oh, like when will the Mac have a color monitor?"

"The answer to that one is we feel that the high-resolution screen and its friendly interface are more important than displaying on screen what today's printers are not capable of putting on paper."

Scrivener asks the waitress if they have Watney's and is pleased to be told yes. "And what do the employees feel about Apple's suing one of its founders?"

"That's easy. The answer is 'no comment.' And then I change the subject. By the way, aren't you the group that likes to solve puzzles with your computers? I have one for you. I know someone who likes to make bets with his friends, but he doesn't want to take advantage of them, so he bets only when he has neither the best nor the worst of it.

"He has one proposition that, for even money, works out to exactly 50– 50. He has a bag full of marbles, two of which are black and the rest white. Levin sips his newly arrived Tequila Sunrise. "Right, and figuring the chances is just a matter of applying permutations and combinations."





HEROES, HACKERS, AND HELP


New on-line services, a chat with a hacker, and a list of teletips

As the Christmas holidays fade into memory and the new year beckons, the pace of telecommunications analysis seems to be slackening. This momentary breather bodes neither ill nor fair for the industry—most of the spectacular service starts and stops have already occurred. Rather, it is a time to gather information and conduct research.

Perhaps the most spectacular, and unexpected, service halt was the much ballyhooed Computer Industry Daily. The \$1500-per-year business service from publishing giant Ziff-Davis, delivered daily over the MCI Mail network, never attracted enough customers. It also never quite realized the full potential of telecommunications delivery.

Just as quickly as Ziff-Davis exited from the telecommunications realm, however, another giant stepped right in. General Electric Information Services announced a new service, Genie, aimed squarely at personal-computer owners and competing directly with CompuServe, The Source, Delphi, and other general telecommunications services.

Genie charges \$5 per hour for non-prime-time access (roughly 6 P.M. to 8 A.M. weekdays and all day weekends) at both 300 and 1200 bps. Prime-time access costs \$35 per hour. Genie can offer the bargain-basement price by tapping the unused capacity of the General Electric network. Three "round tables" (special-interest groups) are now active, each with electronic mail, real-time conference



ing, and other interactive aspects.

Finally, someone has figured out that users should be charged per connection, without surcharges for higher speed. At \$5 per hour, 1200-bps service is a real deal. Compare that to \$12.50 for CompuServe, and you see what I mean. The dearth of Genie's

offerings is a hindrance, though. Other new services, such as PlayNet and American People Link, have failed to make an impact because they couldn't provide the depth necessary to compete with the entrenched services. I'll take a closer look at Genie in an upcoming column.

Another Bargain

Viewtron, a general on-line service from Viewdata, a subsidiary of Knight-Ridder Newspapers, has opened its lines to Apple owners. Started in Florida as a videotex service (available only through a \$600 dedicated terminal), Viewdata quickly discovered that a personal computer acts like a terminal and started customizing software for the IBM PC, Commodore 64, and Apple II.

Viewtron boasts quite a selection of services: international and national news (to be bolstered by local news in the future), home banking, electronic mail, on-line conferences, a few games, and other information. The cost? Just \$9.95 to start and \$5.40 per non-prime-time hour at either 300 or 1200 bps. Again, a good deal and a smart move.

The September and October 1985 issues of Computer Living NY/NJ newspaper (5793 Tyndall Avenue, Riverdale, NY 10471) features an interview with Steve Wozniak. In and among the usual questions about Apple, Cloud 9, and Steve Jobs is the question "What do you use computers for at home?"

One answer is home banking. Wozniak has a IIc with an LCD screen set up in his bedroom dedicated to logging into his bank account. He says it saves him some time.

On the other hand, Wozniak used to book airline reservations through The Source but gave it up because it was easier to make one phone call to a travel agent. Win some, lose some.

The Hackers Strike Back

After I pointed out the dark side of hacking in my December column, I think hackers are entitled to replypreferably without breaking into my CompuServe account. So I contacted one, or, rather, one contacted me. The result of the on-line interview is an interesting look into the netherworld of telecommunications.

A hacker, so my hacker tells me, is someone who "illegally breaks into a computer system." To do so increases the prestige of the person. The motivation? Mostly fun, although some claim they want to stop corporations

from spying into our lives.

Bulletin-board systems (BBSs) are indeed a major conduit of information. According to the hacker, recent efforts to shut down BBSs that post major-credit-card numbers are having the desired effect-fewer majorcredit-card numbers are being posted-but hackers are more interested in calling-card numbers (to make free phone calls), telephone numbers of systems, and access codes. Do you remember any news stories about an unsuspecting homeowner getting a \$100,000 phone bill? Chances are it was hackers and "phone phreaks" at work.

The hacker contends that hackers generally just want to look around a system. The thrill lies more in breaking in than in exiting with something. But what about the horror stories of erased data? My contact responds that hackers "think it's cool, but usually nobody does it, only the occasional jerk.

For my hacker, the process started with the purchase of a modem and calling a BBS. One BBS leads to another, and you are soon into the fraternity. Hackers do "ask you to log off if you are a Fed." Determined hackers soon gain access into the netherworld, discovering codes, tips, and techniques. My contact "tried some. They worked. I loved it; it was like WarGames." The initial learning processing took only three months.

It seems the only way to stop hackers, short of cutting outside lines, is a massive effort to trace calls-but the really top-notch hackers route their signals through pay phones.

So that is one hacker's story, an interesting blend of curiosity, determination, and admission of guilt.

MIDI FOR

The first generation of products

CINTOSH

hen MIDI first showed up, it brought with it the notion of controlling your musical instruments with a personal computer. Your synthesizers, drum machines, and samplers would be able to play and sing in ways hitherto undreamt of.

True enough, these abilities are now possible, but you need software to realize the potential of the hardware. As always, whenever a new technology or system hits the scene, we've seen a bad case of software lag as a small number of programmers and companies tackle a large number of complex new problems, from conceptual design, coding, and bug removal, on up to the real-world hassles of manufacturing and finance. The Macintosh has been a particular victim of this syndrome. Months after the music-industry magazines were blooming with MIDI-software ads for Atari, Commodore, Apple II, and IBM PC computers, all the Mac could claim were rumors, promises, and rumors of promises.

That situation, thankfully, is changing. MIDI interfaces and software packages for the Mac are being shipped at last.

Because we're in the very first generation of Mac MIDI software, things are changing fast. Some of the products covered here were altered radically just during the review period; others seem to hover in a state of eternally receding beta-test, with no firm release date in sight. All bets are off about what shape any of these software packages will take after a few months in the marketplace.

So gather around your MIDI de-

vices, plug in your cables, slip in your disks, and double-click on the icon of your choice. There's plenty of musical pleasure (and profit?) to pursue. But keep a healthy eye open while you're at it and let the software writers know what you like and dislike—above all, let them know what you need. There's room for improvement in the

land of Mac and MIDI, and you can have a hand in it.

That consumer notice behind us, let's dig in.

THE HARDWARE

Before your Mac can talk to anything through MIDI, it needs a set of MIDI jacks of its own, which means you need a special MIDI interface that connects to the Mac's printer or modem port.

Luckily, there are four interfaces to choose from. Unluckily, all of them are in extremely short supply at the time of this writing. Even more unluckily, it isn't clear yet whether any of them will work with all MIDI programs for the Macintosh (a competitive design feature may force you to purchase more than one, depending on what software you deem critical).

The MacMIDI Star interface from Musicworks (a Boston-based company not related to the MusicWorks program created by Macromind, Inc., and distributed by Hayden Software) is a relatively plain white box. A footlong cable connects the box to the Mac. The connector has no screws-Musicworks judged tripping over a MIDI cable and unplugging the interface preferable to damaging the cable itself, and I tend to agree. On the sides of the box are two guitar-type jacks and six MIDI jacks, but the guitar jacks and one of the MIDI jacks are reserved for future interfaces that will deal with sync and SMPTE (Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers) time code, which the Mac-MIDI Star does not (unless you're doing serious multitrack recording, the lack of function in these jacks should not concern you). What you do get is one MIDI IN, four MIDI OUTs, and an icon-based label that makes it perfectly clear how to hook up a basic network consisting of a Mac, a master keyboard, and three "slave devices" (any other MIDI equipment will do).

he Opcode interface from Opcode Systems is simple and direct. It's a narrow, rectangular metal box that screws directly into one of the serial ports, so that it seems to be clinging to the back of your Mac. Nothing attaches it at the top, so don't bang it or pull hard on the cables you plug into its MIDI IN and OUT jacks; too much torque might do damage to the interface's connector or the Mac's port. Because of the unit's narrow profile, you can actually hook up two of them, one to each serial port, to increase flexibility in recording and playback.

The Assimilation Process MIDI Conductor interface, with its molded plastic case, its knobbed connector screws, and its Mac-matching color, looks like it rolled off the assembly line from Apple itself. On one side is a pleasant and practical surprise in the form of another serial port that lets you hook the interface to the Mac without orphaning whatever accessory was originally plugged in there. Of questionable practical value is the location of the MIDI IN and OUT jacks at the end of two six-foot cables that sprout from the base of the interface. For some setups, fine—but you'd be surprised how short six feet turns out to be when you're winding cables in and around a keyboard setup or from place to place in a studio. Be prepared to rearrange things or buy special adapters and/or MIDI THRU boxes in order to make the reach.

he makers of all of these interfaces claim they can run every available MIDI program for the Mac. Unfortunately, their assertion is not true, and the fourth available interface is the reason why.

The box in question was unavailable for review because of short supplies, but what it is (and why) is a lesson in practical economics, smallstart-up style. It's the Southworth Music Systems interface, designed to be the hardware key in the copy-protection scheme of Southworth's Total Music program. After examining all the available disk-protection schemes and concluding that they were worthless, the company opted to give up protecting its disks and instead rig the system so that each copy of the program would run with one (and only one) specific interface: the one you get when you buy Total Music from Southworth.

On the plus side, archival copies become a snap, and the interface itself has two MIDI INs, which Total Music takes advantage of, letting you record simultaneously on two separate MIDI channels. That's great stuff and very useful when you're composing through improvisation with a friend. The interface also has a functioning sync jack. On the minus side, you have to carry your own interface—instead of just software—with you if you want to travel with the system. It also means that you have wasted your money if you want to work with Total Music but have alEditing

ready invested in another interface.

Total Music is good enough to make many people shell out the bucks for a second piece of hardware, yet I wonder just how long it will be before some other company, with equally interesting software, tries a similar scheme in retaliation? And what happens to Southworth's market position if its product distribution gets held up by manufacturing problems or shortfalls?

THE SOFTWARE

After a couple of years of development, MIDI software is starting to fall into distinct categories, within which programs show marked similarities (just the same as with many spreadsheets or databases). The three basic types are librarians, editors, and sequencers. Sequencers can be further divided by whether or not they deal with music notation.

Librarians

Modern synthesizers are full of sounds—so many, in fact, that most of the time you can't keep track of them and the rest of the time you just stumble through the presets until something catches your ear's fancy. This method isn't terribly efficient, especially if you've collected or designed a lot of sounds. Furthermore, a big sound library can be an expensive proposition, what with RAM cartridges holding only 32 presets (if that) and costing upwards of \$90.

Enter the friendly librarian program. All it does is organize your sounds, but that's a godsend, involving as it does the capacity to collect them into related groups, give them reference names, zap them over to your synthesizer or back in a matter of seconds, and save money. Where do you save? Simple. Consider, on the one hand, the \$90 cartridge with its 32 presets. Then consider that the average \$4 floppy disk can store 800 presets or more. All by itself, a single

storage disk can save you the entire cost of a 512K Mac!

Librarian programs work by recording and sending a kind of MIDI information called system-exclusive data. These are codes that follow the MIDI format but that any manufacturer can use in any way it pleases, to represent the internal workings of a particular instrument. Sometimes these uses are rather quirky, and a good library program has to cope, which means the programmer has to know the instrument in question inside and out—not easy in a rapidly changing marketplace. Thus, we have good reason to applaud Opcode Systems for its series of MIDIMAC Librarian programs. Currently the series includes more than nine programs (more than any other company provides, for any computer), covering the gamut from extremely popular synthesizers such as the Yamaha DX7 and Casio CZ-101 to powerful but less ubiquitous instruments such as the Oberheim OB-8, Xpander, and Matrix; the Roland Juno-106 and JX-8P; and others from Korg and Sequential. At \$50 each, these programs are a steal.

nother solid and reliable program is Musicwork's DX/TX Librarian, which takes you half La step into editing by letting you make limited transfers of patch data from one voice to another in a process called merging. (Any DX7 owners in the audience should be aware that merging is possible only between voices that use the same algorithm.) DX/TX Librarian has another nifty option that lets you automatically load sounds into the DX7 and trigger a middle-C reference note, letting you search for the sound of your dreams without once having to get up from your Mac to play the DX7's keyboard.

Editors

Editing programs go one step further than librarians. Instead of just storing program information for you, they actually let you get in and manipulate it to your own tastes. Want a sound to fade longer, or be arpeggiated differently, or have a changing timbre over time? The Macintosh is ideal for the task, especially given the

power of the Mac's screen graphics.

Unfortunately, not a single Macintosh MIDI editor is on the market as of this writing. Well, not quite . . .

One of the most amazing Macintosh packages in existence—and likely, at \$1000, the most expensive—is a special program for the Emulator II called Sound Designer. It was created by Digidesign, Inc. (the folks behind the Assimilation MIDI interface), and although it doesn't use standard MIDI, it does use a MIDI variation, over a high-speed RS-422 serial line, to give you total control over both the Emulator II and any sound that it can play. Since the EII is a sampling keyboard, you get to play directly with digitally recorded sounds, cutting and shaping them to your will.

A full discussion of the power and implications of Sound Designer would fill a moderately thick book. The program takes an \$8000 Emulator II and gives it powers previously unavailable for less than \$40,000-\$50,000. Consider that with Sound Designer you can edit a recorded sound with such smoothness and precision that it is absolutely impossible for anyone, no matter how expert, to tell that an edit has been made.

he ramifications of this product will be interesting to watch. In the meantime, less dramatic and more commonly useful synthesizer editors should appear for sale within the year.

Sequencers

Sequencers are where the Mac/ MIDI software action heats up, in a battle (more often than not) of convenience vs. features.

Sequencer software turns your MIDI synthesizer into the equivalent of a recording player piano. To describe it simply: You play, the computer keeps track of what notes you press down and release, and then the computer returns that data to the synthesizer on playback. You won't see anything happening, but as far as the microprocessor in the synthesizer is concerned, the ivories are being tickled, and so it generates the same sounds you heard when you played it yourself.

That's the basic ticket. Simple sequencers, such as Assimilation's nothing like hearing the results of what you've just written.

MIDI Composer, add on a few tracks (four), a metronome, and a tempo control, and give you an easy handle on the process—in this case, a display not unlike the operating controls of a tape desk. There's even a tape counter and a picture of a cassette with reels that roll as the music plays.

Beyond muting or rerecording a track, it has no editing power, though. You can't remove a note or add one that was never played, or change pitch, note length, start time, aftertouch, or any of the many other kinds of MIDI data that synthesizers send

out as they are played.

If you want to edit a recording you've made, you'll need a more complex sequencer, such as Musicworks of Boston's MegaTrack, Opcode's MIDIMAC Sequencers, or Southworth Music System's Total Music. Each is a step up in recording and editing power, but at a price. The more power, the greater the complexity of operation and the higher the learning curve you'll have to climb.

It comes down to choice. Think about what you want to do and then pick a program based on how serious you want to get, how much you want to spend, and how important notation is to your music making.

The Mac's graphics have made notation—staffs, notes, measures, time signatures, and the rest of it—a much more serious part of sequencers than it is for other computers. For instance, Deluxe Music Construction Set from Electronic Arts lets you drive synthesizers from scores you write on the computer screen. Advance looks indicate that it will be complete in its attention to musical detail, and for people versed in notation, it may well be ideal. A similar (but less musically complete) MIDI version of the excellent Concertware + will be available by the time you read this. And Musicworks of Boston makes a program

called MIDIWorks that can take files from non-MIDI versions of Concertware+ and other score-generating Mac programs and convert them into files that can play synthesizers directly. If you are not conversant with music notation but want to learn, any of these programs are excellent choices. There's nothing like hearing the results of what you've written to let you know where your writing has gone astray.

Music played from scores is only one side of the coin. Of far greater interest to musicians is finding a miracle program that takes what they dash off at the keyboard and notates

it quickly and accurately.

at chance—for a while, anyway, because of the incredible complexity of the task and the still limited powers of modern microcomputers. Difficulty never did stop programmers from taking a crack at something, though, so you can find programs that give automatic notation a good try. Total Music is one. Another is an announced but unseen product called Performer from Mark of the Unicorn, which is a sequencer with files that can be converted into notation by a sister product, the well-respected Professional Composer.

MegaTrack, MIDIMAC Sequencer, and Total Music are for when you're really serious about multitrack composition. I don't recommend them to hobbyists (well, maybe very dedicated hobbyists) or people without at least three MIDI synthesizers. Short of that, you aren't really making the programs puff, let alone breathe hard.


But boy, are they fun.


Listing their features could take until next Sunday (the manual for Total Music is lean at 179 pages), so I'll restrict myself to saying that these programs are, in a very real sense, instruments in their own right, and each has its own personality.

MegaTrack is direct and pretty much follows the conceptual model of an open-reel tape deck (as with MIDI Composer, you do get to see the

wheel turn).

MIDIMac is drier. It makes no pretense of notation; your interface is a series of screens that, at first glance,








resemble a Mac spreadsheet. Just about anything of a MIDI or musical nature is quick and easy once you've learned your way around the program. In some ways, this is my favorite sequencer program, in terms of striking a solid compromise between power and a practical learning curve.

otal Music is both the killer and the question mark, trying very hard to be all things to all musicians. Total Music can notate from your recordings and play synthesizers from your notation, with an editing resolution of 128th-note triplets. It has several different graphic-display modes for music (some more useful than others) that have nothing to do with standard notation. It can sync to the most sophisticated professional time codes, such as SMPTE. It lets you record notes in real time (actual playing) or in step fashion (one note at a time, letting the computer take care of properly adjusting the rhythm). It lets you overdub as many times as you want on any or all 16 MIDI channels. It can serve as a DX7 or TX-rack librarian. It allows you to punch in and overdub anywhere in a track. It lets you "slide" tracks in minuscule time increments to create special effects such as MIDI echoes or choruses or to correct timing problems that result when you pump too much MIDI data through the serial port at once.

Power, sheer power-but also difficult to absorb, and something of a mystery. Total Music went through major revisions in the course of this review. The version now being shipped has, according to the folks at Southworth, even more changes. They say that the power has been better tamed, the features made more accessible. I hope so. Because if they are, Total Music can make a strong claim to being the best sequencer software in the world, instead of only the best for the Mac.



hen you begin using a Macintosh for serious applications, its storage limitations soon get underfoot. Frustrating disk swaps and Disk full messages, compounded by long waits for data retrieval, make even a simple task seem complex.

Adding a mass-storage device to the Mac is the most effective way of increasing the machine's capabilities while retaining its ease of operation. Although mass-storage systemshard disks-have traditionally been costly, recent technological advances and price reductions have made highcapacity hard disks a viable alternative to floppy frustration.

Two major contenders in the Macintosh storage-system arena are Apple's new Macintosh Hard Disk 20 and the internally mounted Hyperdrive 20 from General Computer



The Hyperdrive 20 and the Macintosh Hard Disk 20 are two viable alternatives to drive 20 from General Computer Company. Each unit offers as much floppy frustration.

the floppy-disk port, the Hyperdrive connects directly to the Macintosh's central processing unit. An ingenious low-profile connector clamps over the CPU chip, giving the Hyperdrive 20 a high-speed data path directly into the Mac's circuitry. No external power switch is necessary, since the Hyperdrive connects directly to the Mac's internal power supply.

You have to go to an authorized Hyperdrive dealer for installation of the Hyperdrive disk, its controller board, power supply, and a small fan. It's definitely not a job for do-it-yourselfers, nor is the unit available uninstalled. Surprisingly, installation of a Hyperdrive does not void Apple's warranty on the Macintosh, which indicates that even Apple has a good deal of confidence in the quality of the Hyperdrive system. Once the disk is installed, a Hyperdrive-equipped Macintosh looks exactly like any oth-




storage capacity as 50 standard Mac disks do, along with much faster performance and easier operation. Adding either unit to a Macintosh 512K will give you the power to tackle the most complex operations and will make day-to-day activities a breeze.

The most obvious difference between the Hard Disk 20 and the Hyperdrive is physical layout. Apple's hard disk fits directly below the Macintosh, having the same length and width as the computer and standing just three inches high. The drive connects to the Mac through the external-disk-drive connector. A similar connector on the back of the hard disk lets you hook an external floppydisk drive to your system or even use two hard disks in tandem for 40 megabytes of storage.

A rear-mounted power switch is the Apple drive's only control, and a small light on the front panel lets you know when the unit is active. With its finish and external dimensions, the same as those of the Macintosh computer, the Hard Disk 20 looks attractive in place.

In contrast, the Hyperdrive 20 mounts within the Macintosh itself. Rather than communicating through er Mac, except for a sticker on the front panel and a 41/2 pound weight increase.

owering up the Hard Disk 20 is a two-step procedure. You must first activate the hard-disk unit and wait for it to stabilize-approximately 20 seconds—and then boot the Macintosh with a special start-up diskette in place. Once the hard disk has been activated, the start-up disk ejects, and you can do all of your work directly from the hard-disk drive. The only time that loading software onto the hard disk you need to use the floppy drive is for

drive when you first turn it on, but if it doesn't detect one, the Hyperdrive engages and loads the operating system directly. The Hyperdrive is the only self-starting Macintosh hard disk. This feature alone makes the Hyperdrive more convenient to operate than the Hard Disk 20. The machine is ready to use from a cold start in less than half the time the process takes with Apple's hard disk.

Doth systems dramatically increase the speed of almost every task. Applications jump onto the screen in a fraction of the time they take from a floppy-disk drive, and disk-oriented commands such as file sorting and copying are significantly swifter. After you use either system, going back to a floppy-drive-only system seems like a trip into the Dark Ages.





Figure 1: The basic Open box displays the directory name, which can be a disk or a folder; the disk name, which may sometimes also be the current directory name, as in this example; and all the items stored in the directory. Each item has an icon indicating its type: folder, application, or document. The document Memo here is not in any folder, so it appears in the disk directory.

Apple and General Computer take slightly different approaches to file organization, but both systems operate in a similar fashion overall. General chose to organize its disk into a series of "drawers," each of which acts much like a separate disk drive. A Drawers menu item lets you select which drawers you want to display on the desktop and which you want to hide (see figure 1).

The storage capacity of each drawer is dynamic; as you add more information, the drawer grows to the required size in 256K increments, with a maximum size of 16 megabytes per drawer. When you create a drawer, you can assign it a password. From that point on, no one can get access to the drawer and its contents without entering the password.

In Apple's system, the hard disk is treated as one large disk, with folders—or directories—dedicated to particular applications or users and smaller folders nested within these. Version 5 of the Finder, included with

the hard disk, provides an efficient way to work with this type of file organization (see "A Whole New Look" immediately following this article). The hierarchical system of grouping files into directories and subdirectories has been in use for years on other systems, but it was not until hard-disk storage became practical that it was needed in the Macintosh.

In addition to the new version of the Finder, the Macintosh Hard Disk 20 package also includes a font/desk-accessory mover for configuring System files and a hard-disk test routine. Apple recommends that you run the test routine once a month to ensure that the disk is operating properly.

The Hyperdrive's software selection is a bit more elaborate. In addition to the System software, General Computer includes a disk-backup routine that helps you make archival copies of your work on floppy disks for safekeeping (see figure 2). This routine lets you back up the entire contents of a specified drawer, specific files only, or just the files that have changed since the last backup.




Figure 3: When you want to move backwards in your series of folders ("along the path," in hierarchical terms), all you have to do is click on the directory name; it has a pull-down menu that lists all the folders you have opened to get to the current directory. The folders are listed in order, with the initial directory last on the list. Selecting an item from the list makes it the current directory.

Another software utility, the Hyperdrive Security program, adds sophisticated encryption and decryption and password protection to files, keeping them safe from prying eyes (see figure 3). A print spooler is also provided; it lets you print documents on the ImageWriter or other impact printer while performing other tasks. Since printing is often a time-consuming operation, the spooler can make quite a difference in your productivity. Apple's new finder and hierarchical file system work with the Hyperdrive, as well as with the Hard Disk 20.

Both the Hard Disk 20 and the Hyperdrive come with clearly written, well-illustrated manuals. The preliminary edition of Apple's documentation I received was good, and Hyperdrive's beautifully produced and in-depth manual is outstanding. How Durable?

General Computer claims that a Hyperdrive 20 can withstand any physical shock that a standard Macintosh can endure, and during the review I was able to put that claim to the test. Because of shipping problems, my review unit was lost in transit for a few days, left to the mercy of several different carriers. When it finally arrived, the styrofoam supports in the box were completely crushed,

and the Macintosh was bouncing around loosely within them.

The shock caused the loss of some data stored in the Hyperdrive, but there was no physical damage to either the Mac or the hard disk within. After I reformatted the hard disk and loaded the System software, it was as good as new. If the Hyperdrive can go through this kind of abuse and keep on ticking, it is certain to tolerate normal handling without a whimper.

Both the Hyperdrive 20 and the Macintosh Hard Disk 20 come with a 90-day warranty. Extended coverage is available for either unit, through the AppleCare program for the Hard Disk 20 and directly from General Computer for the Hyperdrive.

Apple's Hard Disk 20 has one very important advantage over General Computer's Hyperdrive: networking. The Hyperdrive makes no provision for sharing of its storage space. Apple's drive, on the other hand, was designed with multiuser operation in mind and is certain to be well supported by software developers. In addition, the Hard Disk 20's lower price, \$1495 retail vs. \$2195 for the Hyperdrive 20, makes it a far more affordable investment.

If you use the Mac only as a personal workstation, then the single-package, self-booting convenience of the Hyperdrive 20 makes a lot of sense. Traveling with the Hyperdrive is certainly easier than going with a two-piece system, and its durability means that you can check it as baggage on airplanes without worry if you pack it properly. Owners of a 10-megabyte Hyperdrive can upgrade to a 20-megabyte system for \$895. The system upgrade also entitles you to the new System software and utility programs.

Both the Macintosh Hard Disk 20 and the Hyperdrive 20 are high-quality products with merits of their own. The Apple's low price and multiuser

capabilities will make it the choice for many, and the Hyperdrive's one-piece, self-starting, high-performance design and sophisticated software utilities make it well worth your consideration. Choosing either device will greatly enhance the performance of your Macintosh and help you do much more work in far less time.




Figure 4: The new Save As box is similar to the Open box; the current directory is named above the scroll box. If you want the document saved in the named folder, just click on Save. If any folders are listed in the window. you can open one to store your document there.





Figure 5: The directory name in the Save box also pulls down to a path list. If you want to save your document somewhere else in the path, you can select the desired directory from the menu. You can even follow another path through a different set of folders or go to the main directory-the disk-and store the document "loose," without any folder at all.

Figure 6: The new Finder (Version 5-we tested Version 5.0-) makes some changes to your desktop: It adds a Small Icon view option and gives you a Put Away option similar to the original Finder's Put Back—documents on the gray desktop or in the trash can are returned to their windows. The dialog box for file copies has been altered.



Business Filevision

Business Filevision from Telos Software Products is a unique databasemanagement application for the Macintosh. Choosing among database packages usually involves looking at the amount of information they can handle (the number of records per file and fields per record), how easily you can enter and manipulate your data, and what kinds of summary and printing capabilities are available. (For a detailed discussion on choosing a database program, see "The Electronic File Folder," A +, June and October 1985.) Business Filevision adds a new consideration, the graphic capabilities of the database program.

Why File by Picture?

Business Filevision is a substantially improved version of its predecessor, Filevision. It allows you to get information by opening a drawing and clicking on it to access a particular record. Imagine a map of the United States; you can click on a state or city and obtain a record of sales for that area. As Bob Foster, vice president of marketing at Telos, says, "We wanted to do something different that could really take advantage of the Macintosh and what it could do." And something different they have done. In addition to designing a unique application program, Telos encourages customers to use the product in unique ways.

Databases can be notoriously boring. Most of us are not excited by lists in any form. What we want is to be able to get at information as quickly and easily as possible. With the use of pictures, data becomes easier to access, more interesting, and easier to comprehend. Tom McDonald of Western Technologies, Inc., of Phoenix, Arizona, has rewritten a pavement-management program that used to run on an IBM, to work in a 512K Mac with Business Filevision. Drawings include areas of pavement (highways, parking lots, and the like). Records behind the pictures give information about existing pavement, amount of traffic, remedial work needed, and so on. McDonald estimates that having this information on a Mac costs about 10% of what it would cost on a mainframe.

Near Seattle, John Murphy, who is a consultant for the Hazardous Materials Response Group of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, is using Business Filevision to map spills of oil and hazardous materials in marine waters. When an oil spill occurs, samples from the surrounding area are mapped according to location, with information behind the map.

Technicians can click on the graphic representation and see the support-

ing information. They can see where samples were taken and highlight the ones that were positive or those that were taken on a given day, for example. These kinds of reports help in planning remedial action.

Murphy is also working on visual databases of ships, harbors, and hazardous-material dump sites. A graphic of a harbor shows what chemicals regularly pass through, local chemical facilities, and chemical storage sites. Data sheets for each chemical are in records linked to the graphics. Murphy has been demonstrating Business Filevision's capabilities to the Environmental Protection Agency and the Coast Guard.

Murphy is pleased not only with the capabilities of Business Filevision, but also with the Macintosh itself. "We sat people down in front of both IBM PCs and Macintoshes. With the

Mac, we notice an almost immediate productivity increase; with an IBM, there's an almost immediate decrease." Having begun with the original Filevision, Murphy is pleased with the improved report capabilities and excellent file management of Business Filevision. Murphy owns Murphy Information Services in Edmonds, Washington.

If pavement management or emergency marine response is a bit beyond your business needs, consider Tony Stephen, who works at Bruto-




Figure 1: Blocks in the Brutocao vineyards. Clicking on a particular block provides information about that block. The list on the right shows related files you can open by clicking.

cao Vineyard near Mendocino, California. What used to be a sheaf of file folders and 3 × 5 cards has turned into Business Filevision records. Stephen has these records for virtually every aspect of his business, including payroll, personnel, a future winery floorplan, and extensive vineyard files. A map of the vineyard shows areas broken down into blocks of 5-33 acres (see figure 1). Different files show fertilizer, pesticide, weather, and harvest information. With Business Filevision's computational capabilities, Stephen can calculate figures such as quantity per ton of grapes or pounds per vine under the different conditions of each block. By highlighting fertilizing history, he can hand his truck driver a map showing which blocks need to be fertilized next. Stephen estimates it took him 50 hours to create his files.

Working with Business Filevision

Business Filevision comes on two disks, a program disk and a system start-up disk; a 512K Mac is required, and you'll need a second disk drive. The program itself takes up 274K, and the Finder has been eliminated from that disk. The system start-up disk includes a complete system folder, a tour of Business Filevision, and a conversion program that allows you to upgrade Filevision files to Business Filevision. Disk space is at a premium, but the program instructions help you make the most of what you have. Although a hard-disk drive is not required, you may need one if you have a lot of data. The program disk is copy-protected, but you can transfer a limited number of copies to a hard disk in a way that does not require inserting the original floppy when you boot the program.

To create a file, you begin by giving that file a type, which is simply a category of information such as Clients or Inventory. You then design the layout of the information for the records in that type in a 30×30 -inch area. To create a field, you click on the Add Field button, and a new field appears on the screen. You name the field, position it where you want it, and stretch it to be any size you want (see figure 2). Although the field name is limited to 31 characters, the field itself can contain up to 2000 characters. As many as 99 fields are permissible in each layout. The process is extremely easy, and you can change the layout any time you wish, even after you've entered the data into the fields. Once the design is complete, you can add the actual data.

Information in a field can consist of text, pictures, or numbers. Several options are available for automatic data entry, in addition to simply typing it in. You can set up an initial text field with a part of its information that remains the same for every record you type in—Terms or the current date, for example.

You can also have a field's contents copied from the previous record. Formula fields compute values based on the contents of one or more other fields. You can use other field names, arithmetic operators $(+,-,\times)$, and \div), numbers, parentheses, and the like to create your formula. Telos is working on an import/export feature that will let you enter data created with other programs (DIF, SYLK, and ASCII files) into Business Filevision. This feature will be available in the future for a nominal fee.

Although you can create files that do not use pictures, the ability to include visual representations as part of your database is what makes Business Filevision unusual. A major criticism of the original Filevision was that most of us are not artists, so creating unusual graphic displays was beyond our capabilities. Business Filevision has addressed this problem by allowing you to import graphics by using the Clipboard and Scrapbook. You can copy graphics from MacPaint or use images created with a digitizer.

In addition, Business Filevision provides a palette of drawing tools similar to those of MacPaint, as well as menus of shades and symbols, both of which you can easily edit for customized designs.




Figure 3: The pop-up is an unusual graphic feature that helps avoid an overly cluttered screen. Clicking on one of the townhouse models here reveals a pop-up of its floorplan.

An unusual graphic feature is the pop-up (see figure 3). Clicking on a model townhouse instantly presents a floor plan of that model. You can create pop-ups by first drawing your graphics and then grouping them so that only one part is normally visible. Using pop-ups helps avoid an overly cluttered Macintosh screen.

Data Manipulation

When working with a database, you generally want to find specific information that you have stored. The Access menu contains commands to perform these functions. You can sort (put your records in order), find, rank, and highlight information according to criteria you specify.

Highlighting allows you to create a temporary subset of the selected type. The result is that the visual representations of the selected records are highlighted on the drawing display. A dialog box makes specifying your criteria relatively easy (see figure 4). You scroll through the fields; click on IS or IS NOT and the comparison operators; specify a certain value, a

rank, or another field; and you're done. You can specify as many as four conditions for a single highlighting procedure.

Business Filevision allows you to print reports, forms, and labels. Reports are columnar and can contain summary information: counts, totals, averages, and standard deviations. Before printing, you must design a print format, which you store in the print library. Designing print formats is a process similar to creating data fields for records. You click on the

Add Field button and scroll through to the field of your choice. You can print the field's name alone or only the information contained in the field. Different typestyles, sizes, and formats are available for each field. To create form letters, you add an "annotation field" that contains the same information for each record. The letter can contain up to 4000 characters (about two double-spaced pages). Once you've designed the print format, selected the records you wish to print, and set up the page size, you're ready to print. Unlike many other database programs, Business Filevision gives you the option of printing to the screen, so you can preview the results before they print out.

Although Business Filevision is designed to perform a variety of functions (drawing, filing, and reporting), it is extremely easy to use. The steps in any given operation are intuitive and straightforward, and the dialog boxes and buttons provide a lot of help. Unfortunately, the documentation is not as well designed as the

software. The manual contains three major sections: "The Tour" provides explanations of the on-disk example that comes with the package, "Using Business Filevision" tells how to use each of the functions, and "Reference" contains reference information as well as directions for creating two sample files.

Going through "The Tour" provides a good introduction to how the program works, but you don't learn all of the basics, since the file has already been created. The author recommends that you read through the "Using Business Filevision" section, which is more than 130 pages long. I read for 15 minutes and gave up. I tried creating the sample files in the "Reference" section, but the information there did not contain step-bystep directions, so I was constantly flipping back to the second chapter. Compared to the Others . . .

Given the quality of the software, the manual was extremely disappointing. The software contains help screens, which should alleviate some of the problem, though. I also called the toll-free customer-support number, and the support staff was quite helpful and patient in explaining how

to do some things I later unearthed in the manual.

Business Filevision is not a relational database. You can't use information in one file in another file. If you have a name-and-address file, you won't be able to integrate, say, income-tax information from another file with that information. Although many users require the extra power of a relational database, you may not find it necessary. The Link feature allows you easily to open related files, but the information within each file remains separate.

How much information a database can deal with is an important criterion. Business Filevision files can be as large as four megabytes, each file can hold up to 32,000 records, and each record can contain up to 99 different fields. The ability to create graphics is unique to this program.

Telos is actively facilitating the exchange of templates and designs among Business Filevision users. More than a hundred public-domain programs were available at the time of this writing, pertaining to archaeological digs, astrology, maps, genealogy, and much more. These programs are available from Telos for \$1.50 each plus a \$3 charge per diskette. More-complex packages are available from individual vendors. Information about templates, tips on using Business Filevision, and a subscription to Filevision magazine go to all registered purchasers. Given Telos' responsiveness to customers, I'd expect future upgrades and changes to be quite exciting. If you're looking for new and interesting ways to organize and present data, Business Filevision is for you.

SCUZZY IS SEXY FOR THE MACINTOSH

Rumor has it that the Mac may get a new bard-disk interface.


Suppose Apple came to you and said, "We want you to improve the performance of the Macintosh, make it more accessible to third-party hardware, keep open the possibility of more compatibility with both the Apple II and the IBM PC, and provide for future expansion—and, by the way, you have to have it done real soon and without a major retooling of

the physical design."

That's a pretty tough set of requirements, but then Apple needs wizard-class solutions to keep in the forefront of an increasingly competitive market. If you look in your engineer's bag of magic tricks under performance, standards, and minimal physical disruption, you might find that one of the choices is SCSI.

SCSI, which stands for Small Computer Systems Interface, is a way of connecting computers to peripheral controllers, which doesn't sound very exciting at all. Based primarily on its spelling and not its characteristics, it's even commonly pronounced scuzzy. But if you'll stick with me for a few minutes, I'll tell you why I think SCSI is good news for us, Apple, and the future of personal computing.

SCSI interfaces have been available for the Apple II and IBM PC for a while, and one third-party developer in the San Francisco Bay Area installs a SCSI interface for a hard disk on Macintoshes as a custom modification. Rumors have been going around recently that Apple is planning to provide a SCSI-interface option for the Macintosh sometime soon, but for the record, let me first note that when



I wrote this column, Apple had made no announcement of any particular Macintosh improvements. A lot of Macintosh ideas and even prototypes go no further than the conjecture stage. I'm betting, however, that Apple will go with SCSI sometime soon because, as I hope you'll soon agree,

SCSI could turn the smart but tortoise-like Mac into a highperformance jackrabbit.

SCSI has what it takes to bring the promise of the Macintosh a big step further along.

SCSI's Fast and Flexible

SCSI isn't an Apple invention, although an Apple adoption could play an important role in popularizing it in the personal-computer market. SCSI started its life as the more euphoni-

cally named SASI, or Shugart Associates System Interface, a way the thenpremier maker of disk drives devised for connecting up some of the first hard disks intended for use with microcomputers.

After some tweaks and clarifications and a change in name to make it more acceptable to competitors, SASI was taken on and adopted as SCSI by ANSI (one of the industry's standardsetting bodies). In ANSI's numbering system, SCSI became X3T9.2.

In interface parlance, SCSI is a "system level" interface, rather than a "device level" standard. As such, it defines a set of signals and signal lines running between a "host" (a computer) and a controller.

The controller then talks to its attached peripheral over a bus or direct connection, such as over the ST 506/ ST 512 interface used for most desktop-class hard disks. A single controller can link up with multiple disk drives, usually two or four.

SCSI is a true bus, rather than just

a computer-to-controller connection. Up to eight devices can share a single SCSI connection, including any combination of hosts and controllers. In other words, using SCSI, one computer can command seven controllers, seven computers can share one controller, four computers can share four controllers, and so on.

SCSI is also fast. It uses an eightbit parallel data connection, which potentially gives it a factor-of-8 head start over serial-only connections such as the serial ports on the Mac. SCSI doesn't waste that lead either—the eight bits can transfer at up to 1.5 megabytes (12 megabits) per second in the current implementations, with talk of extensions to at least double that speed in the future.

It's What the Mac Needs

In the first go-round on the Mac, Apple designers tried to make up for the Mac's tortoise-like interface speed by making the interface smart. SCSI's a relative jackrabbit, and it's also brighter than its Mac-interface predecessor. SCSI has a parity line for dataerror checking, control lines to enable bus sharing, and direction-control lines to let messages pass both ways over the data bus without colliding.

Last, SCSI is flexible. Although originally designed only for Winchesterstyle hard-disk drives, SCSI has been extended to other disk drives, and even printers. The success of the efforts is also a good indication that SCSI will probably be able to handle future so-far-undefined devices.

More relevant than the abstract cleverness and wonder of the SCSI standard is how good a fit it is to the Mac.

More relevant than the abstract cleverness and wonder of the SCSI standard, though, is how good a fit it is to the Mac. Let's take a closer look at how they might work together.

First, the Mac could definitely use some help in the data-storage department. Although its original floppy drives are really quite decent performers, they seem to fall short because they're just not up to the demands the Mac's operating system and user interface place on them. Macintosh programs need a lot of program code for their graphic interfaces, and the Macintosh operating system keeps track of much more data than do the operating systems of some of its competitors.

Hard disks are a great help, but they haven't been easy on the Mac. The Mac's designers didn't make explicit provision for hard disks, leaving designers to choose between several suboptimal solutions.

Early Macintosh drives connected to the serial port, but the port is too underpowered for fast data transfers, and these drives had only limited success. Furthermore, in most cases, connecting a hard disk either uses up one of the two Mac ports or at least places restrictions on serial operation.

General Computer Company's Hyperdrive avoids the serial bottleneck because it mounts inside the Mac, and it's a gem of a performer (see "Thoughtware," March 1985, pages 15–20, and "20/20" on pages 124–131 of this issue), but it's pricey and difficult to upgrade or replace.

Quark's QC-10 and Apple's original Macintosh Hard Disk 20 took a middle path, using the floppy-disk-drive port instead of the serial connection, but data-transfer speed is still limited by this method.

If you're willing to put up with some of these limitations and go ahead with a hard disk, you'll find one more important restriction: Because the original Mac didn't support a hard disk, it also failed to supply a way to back up hard-disk information. If you're serious about using a hard disk, particularly for business or serious programming, you know that it is necessary to make a copy of your data on some removable medium in case of a mistake by you, the software, or the hardware.

If you back up a 20-megabyte hard disk to floppies, you'll need about 50 of the single-sided variety. The elapsed time for the operation is close to an hour, and you have to sit there and feed in disks. Most people I know with Mac hard disks consequently

don't back them up as often as they should to protect their data.

SCSI Gives You Options

Now, if you had a SCSI interface, you'd have some other attractive options. You could buy SCSI controllers off the shelf that use various popular industry-standard interfaces on the disk end of the connection, meaning that you could hook up a Mac to a disk that was just as fast as the one on IBM's PC AT and get your Macintosh really cruising.

You wouldn't even have to stop at AT speed. Because SCSI can transfer data so quickly, you could even move up to some of the faster minicomputer drives and those of a few supermicros that run at a ten-megabit-persecond rate, which is double the speed of the current personal-com-

puter standard.

SCSI controllers and drives should also be economical. Because several SCSI-controller chip sets have been developed, the price for a basic SCSI controller is already below \$200 and still falling. Since SCSI is a generic solution rather than an Apple-specific one, the cost of development is spread out over many more customers, so the price of the controller can be lower.

SCSI controllers use industry-standard disk drives, so the cost on the disk-drive end should also be low. Hard-disk drives are now becoming commodity items, which will drive the cost of popular models far below the price for more unusual and spe-

cialized adaptations.

A SCSI interface would also loosen the ties between the Macintosh and a disk drive, making upgrades easier. Right now, Apple is in a bit of a bind when it comes to making Mac hardware upgrades in general, because the cost of enhancements is often punitive for owners of the original versions. That's not good for us, and it's not good for Apple either.

Getting the disk drive and controller out of the Mac box would, of course, make it easier to make upgrades on the mechanical and electrical level. In addition, the more standardized a peripheral, the more likely it can be used on another machine if you upgrade yours, which makes upgrades easier to accept.


A looser coupling also allows more room for change and improvement. If, as appears likely, we'll have affordable solid-state external RAMdisks in the next few years, they will be Apple is rumored to be working on several optical-disk and video-interface projects.

fairly easy to hook up with a SCSI controller.

You can also hook up a tape drive with an SCSI interface, either for on-

line data storage or for backup. You may be interested in the first use only if you're performing some kind of data-collection and logging application, but facilitating hard-disk backup is usually a worthwhile investment. Furthermore, if you have to send 60 megabytes of data across town or across the country, you're better off with a tape than with a large box of floppy disks.

An even more important implication for Apple's plans is that you can hook optical disks to a SCSI bus. Ap-



ple is widely rumored to be working on several optical-disk and video-interface projects, none of which have been announced as of this writing. Given the Mac's voracious appetite for code and data, an optical disk would make very good sense indeed.

Apple's competitors, furthermore, seem to have optical disks in the works. Atari has promised a CD-ROM-style optical-disk player for its ST ("Jackintosh") computer, and several independents already have developed interfaces for CD-ROM next month.

I believe an optical-disk connection will soon be a market necessity.

players for the IBM PC. I believe an optical-disk connection will soon be a market necessity, a position that I will explain at more length in this column next month.

A SCSI connection needn't be seen exclusively as a more efficient path to storage for the same applications we're currently running on Macs. Because SCSI is a multiported bus, it opens up some interesting Mac possibilities.

The demise of the Lisa last year left Apple Computer with no entry in the multiprocessing segment of the market and no rapid way of sharing data among machines. SCSI could help out here as well.

Along with having speed, errorchecking abilities, and flexibility, SCSI interfaces are deliberately polite and cooperative. The SCSI standard includes Disconnect and Reconnect features that tell controllers or hosts to release the use of the SCSI bus while the controller is waiting for an electromechanical disk operation. Because a drive typically spends most of its time on mechanical movements and a smaller proportion on actual data transfer, one SCSI bus can keep up with several controllers, particularly ones handling different tasks.


If you stretch your imagination a bit, you can see that these multiple controllers don't all have to be storage devices. Perhaps you'd like to put a specialized string-searcher coprocessor on the Mac, or a color-video card, or a robot arm. With the SCSI interface, we'd have the kind of "virtual slot" that Apple hoped to provide for the IIc and the Mac. Only, in this case, with the higher data rate, more standardized interface, and parallel path, the concept would have a better chance of attaining popularity.

The SCSI structure allows up to seven machines to share one peripheral, in effect creating the hardware basis for a high-speed multiprocessor machine. If someone writes the software, we'll have another alternative for work-group data sharing that will be lightning fast and easy to connect.

The possibilities, it seems to me, are exciting. A SCSI interface would do a lot to strengthen the Mac, both in performance and in depth and breadth of applications. It would, in that case, deserve the pronunciation that seems to have lost out in the engineering world—they call it scuzzy, but for the Macintosh, it is a sexy interface indeed.

Contributing Editor Steve Rosenthal, for his part, certainly wouldn't want to be known as scuzzy, regardless of whether he deserved the alternative.

EIGHTY COLUMNS ON SCREEN AND PAPER

Q. My AppleWorks word-processing screen is only 80 columns wide, and I own a 15-inch ImageWriter printer, which means that I do not have "what you see on the screen is what you get on the paper." What can I do about this? A. Currently, you cannot display the same text format on the screen with an 80-column card as you can print on a 15-inch-wide printer. Videx is modifying its UltraTerm product to work with AppleWorks, however. By using an AppleWorks modifier program with UltraTerm, you will be able to view up to 160 columns by 24 lines or 128 columns by 32 lines. This product is still under development, and a Videx spokesperson tells me that AppleWorks is now working in the 128 × 32 mode. The Videx modifier will operate on AppleWorks Versions 1.1., 1.2, and the soon-to-be released 1.3. The ability to preview more than 80 columns will depend on the type of monitor you are using. Videx recommends a high-persistence phosphor monitor, such as the Apple Monitor III.

CHARACTER PITCH WITH APPLE WRITER

Q. I have an Apple IIc computer with an ImageWriter printer and Apple Writer II, Version 2. With the margins set to Apple's defaults, my document prints both left and right margins correctly. When I change my character pitch to 12 or 17 characters per inch, though, the right margin is never correct. The problem does not exist when I use the AppleWorks word-processing program. What am I doing wrong?

A. There is nothing wrong with either program, and you are not doing anything wrong. You're just leaving out one step. Apple Writer interprets margins by characters per inch. At 10 characters per inch (cpi) you can print 80 (8 inches \times 10 cpi = 80) charac-



ters across eight inches of paper and 136 (8 inches \times 17 cpi = 136) characters at 17 characters per inch. To leave a one-inch right-hand margin at 10 cpi, you set the right margin to 70 (80–10 = 70), but at 17 cpi you need to change the right margin to 119 (136–17 = 119). You need to readjust your right-hand margin whenever you change character pitch.

The word-processing program in AppleWorks works differently than Apple Writer does. Apple Writer uses character measurements, whereas AppleWorks uses inch measurements to determine margin adjustments. Therefore, when you change the character pitch in AppleWorks, your margins are unaffected.

THE CONVERT UTILITY ON A SINGLEDRIVE IIE

Q. After using ProDOS for four months on my single-drive IIe system, I still can't use the Convert utility to transfer programs and files from my DOS 3.3 disks to my ProDOS disks. Every time I try, I get the message Error: No room on volume. What am I doing wrong?

A. You're really not doing anything wrong; it's just that Convert was writ-

ten for a two-drive system. (This problem isn't a first for Apple: When DOS 3.2 first came out, the standard disk-copying program worked only if you had two drives!) After you insert your DOS 3.3 disk and specify the name of the file to be converted, Convert dutifully loads it into memory and then tries to save it to the Pro-DOS destination disk, which, of course, is not in the drive. Instead of asking you to insert the ProDOS disk when it doesn't find it, Convert displays its misleading error message.

You can avoid this problem if you are using a 128K IIe or IIc. In this case, use Convert's P command to set the prefix of the destination disk to /RAM. This is the name of the RAMdisk volume that ProDOS sets up in the auxiliary-memory area of the extended 80-column text card. Now when you convert a DOS 3.3 file, it will be saved in /RAM. You can then exit from Convert and use the ProDOS Filer program to transfer the file from /RAM to a real ProDOS disk.
