

The Discerning Byte Visits Yu Shan

N.T.A.T. Restaurant Review

This month, the Not the Apple Times's panel of discerning food critics descended on Yu Shan, a Szechwan and Hunan restaurant in Sunnyvale. Unlike the better-known Cantonese cuisine, Szechwan and Hunan food is characterized by copious use of red peppers, garlic, ginger, and other exotic spices.

Though this explanation might lead you to expect otherwise, we found Yu Shan to be a very average restaurant. The decor was described as "mellow Chinese" by one member of our party—that is, no vibrant red walls or silk lanterns. The service was a little too mellow, although it was prompt.

But these are the sort of details that can be overlooked if the food is good. Unfortunately, we were a bit disappointed there, too.

Rather than order the \$3.95 lunch special—a sure sign of unadventurous or uninitiated diners dealing with exotic fare—we sampled a cross-section of the menu by ordering à la carte.

We started with Sizzling Rice Soup and Spring Rolls. At its best, Sizzling Rice Soup is one of the delights of Szechwan cuisine. Yu Shan's version (\$2.50 for two) did indeed sizzle, but was otherwise unspectacular (fizzled?). The sizzling rice itself was tough and the broth somewhat bland, albeit salty. The Spring Rolls (2 for \$1) were doughy and contained too much meat.

After the Spring Rolls, the entrees arrived fast and furiously. Mo-Shu Chicken (\$4.25)—the Szechwan answer to the burrito—was a flavorful combination of shredded chicken, vegetables, and eggs. The dish is served with thin pancakes, which are

spread with hoisin sauce, filled with the chicken mixture, and folded up.

The Shrimp with Lobster Sauce (\$4.50) was also good, though a little bland. The sauce—a mixture of ground pork, scallions, chicken stock, and spices—doesn't actually contain lobster; it was originally used in a classic Cantonese lobster dish. (Hence the name.)

The Sweet-and-Sour Fish (\$4.95) was a good rendition of the Cartonese classic. Tender pieces of Rock Cod were enveloped in a crispy batter and drenched in a light, clear, sweet-and-sour sauce.

The Kung-Pao Scallops (\$4.95) were undoubtedly the best dish of the meal, and would have been outstanding if


they'd been spicier. The scallops and vegetables were perfectly cooked and flavorful, and the sauce—like all the sauces at Yu Shan—was well executed. But the pepper pods were red instead of black, indicating that the cooking time was insufficient to impart the fieriness associated with Kung Pao dishes.

In summary, all of the ingredients used by Yu Shan were obviously first-rate, but the results were unremarkable. For a restaurant that labels its fare Szechwan and Hunan, the flavors were too bland and the textures not very interesting. If you really want to savor the flavors of Szechwan cooking, it's always a good idea to tell the chef that you like spicy food. (We didn't--and wish we had.) For the \$8.50 (including tip) that each of us paid for the above meal, we could have asked for better. This is not a restaurant that we'd avoid, but we wouldn't go out of our way to eat there either.

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


Speakers' Bureau Speaker of the Month: John Scott
