FileMaker Pro 2.0

FileMaker Pro also comes with a host of predesigned business templates that can be

used "as is" or customized further for client or customer contact information, invoicing, mailing lists, lead tracking, inventory, memos, and much more. All of which adds up to powerful advantages for businesses and corporate work groups. FileMaker Pro 2.0 has a suggested retail price of \$399.

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New Mid-Range Macintosh Line The Mac Centris 610 and 650

February 10, 1993—Apple Computer, Inc. introduced the Apple Macintosh CentrisTM, a line of mid-range personal computers providing fast performance, flexibility, and expandability to mainstream business and professional users at an affordable price. The new line includes the Macintosh Centris 610 and Macintosh Centris 650, which deliver the power of the high-performance Motorola 68040 microprocessor at significantly lower price points.

This product announcement also marks the debut of a new identity for the mid-range offerings in the Apple Macintosh family—as the Macintosh Centris replaces the Macintosh II. The Apple Macintosh IIvx and Apple Macintosh IIvi computers will remain as part of the mid-range line at reduced prices, although they will retain their current names. The Macintosh IIvx and IIvi now represent Apple's entry-level, multi-slot Macintosh, and can be upgraded to the Macintosh Centris 650.

FileMaker Pro 2.0v2 Update

Note that Claris is now shipping FileMaker Pro 2.0v2. Several areas of improvement and squished bugs include Apple events, Browse Mode. Define Fields, Find Mode. Import/Export. Printing, ScriptMaker, and network operation. Specifics can be found in Claris support areas on major online services, and the details also ship with the update. This maintenance release is free to all registered owners of FileMaker Pro 2.0v1, but it is not automatic. You can order the update by calling Claris at the number below.

Reviews have mentioned FileMaker Pro's inability to dial phone numbers from within the application. The expected flood of little applications that would use Apple events to remedy this situation has yet to appear. What has appeared, however, is InTouch 2.0, a great little DA address book that does a multitude of things very well. It comes with a Control Panel called Snap*, which interacts with the DA from within other applications, even when InTouch is not open. Snap* can also dial a phone number from within any application by pressing a user-defined hot key. I've tested it with FileMaker Pro 2.0v2 on my extension-laden Mac and it worked like the proverbial charm. No hacks, macros, or Apple events required. You could even highlight the Claris number below and dial it from within this file. InTouch 2.0 is from Advanced Software, who seem to be taking their name seriously.

Apple's New CD-ROM Drive

At the European Multimedia and CD-ROM Conference last October in Wiesbaden, Germany, Apple announced the higher performance, feature-rich AppleCD 300 CD-ROM drive. This drive offers twice the transfer rate (300KB/sec) of the AppleCD 150 and of most existing CD-ROM drives now on the market. This higher transfer rate provides users with quicker access to data and makes QuickTime movies, animation, and video appear smoother.

The AppleCD 300 is expected to spur developers to create new and more compelling CD-ROM titles that take advantage of the drive's faster performance. Working with QuickTime. this CD-ROM drive can read multi-session Kodak Photo CD discs, giving users EASY access to high-quality images on Photo CDs which they can import to Macintosh applications. The AppleCD 300 supports additional CD-ROM formats, such as CD+G and CD+MIDI, so users can take advantage of a wider range of CD-ROM titles. How We Top the Competition The drive has a unique speed select switch that provides users with the flexibility of choosing between double- or single-speed operation, in order to optimize compatibility with existing CD-ROM titles. In addition, it has a data buffer of 256 KB. which is four times the size of any other double-speed drive currently being sold. The AppleCD 300 also allows CD audio data to be transferred across the SCSI bus, providing editing and recording capabilities. The AppleCD 300 will ship with a collection of 8 to 10 CD-ROM discs that will include titles such as Alice to Ocean by Rick Smolan. Mozart String Quartet in C Major by the Voyager Company. Cinderella by Discis Knowledge Research, Kodak Photo CD Sampler, Nautilus CD, and the Apple CD-ROM Titles Sampler. Finally, Apple's quality standards, reliability testing, and integration process ensure that the players are compatible with all Macintosh computers from the Apple Macintosh SE on up and with Apple's System Software version 6.0.7 and greater, as well as with software enhancements such as QuickTime.

The AppleCD 300 began shipping in December 1992. Beginning in January 1993, it became available as a dealer-installable internal upgrade option (the AppleCD 300i) for the Macintosh Quadra 900 and 950, and the Macintosh Ilvx. A separate installation kit for the AppleCD 150, which can read single-session photo CD discs, will continue to be available to users who want a more cost-effective solution.

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PowerBook Receives New Award

PC LapTop magazine has awarded the Apple Macintosh PowerBook 170 its 92-93 Editors' Choice Award for "Notebook of the Year." This award results from several others that PC Laptop has given the PowerBook line throughout 1992. It is the publication's highest award—chosen by the magazine's staff—the result of a review done within the last 12 months in competition with 42 other notebook computers.

Minutes of May Meeting

Mac IIvi with CD-ROM Special Highlights Meeting

Mark Twain Village, Heidelberg-13 May 1993

Vice-President Ingo Richarz, standing in for President Jim Clark who could not attend, opened the May meeting by directly introducing members Mike Vargo and André Létourneau. Mike and André, also employees of AMEXTRA, Apple's authorized distributor in Germany to the U.S. Forces, brought along one of the Macintosh Ilvi now on sale at many audio-photo clubs. The S1999 package includes the Apple 14" color monitor, keyboard, 5MB RAM, 80MB hard drive, and a built in CD-ROM player. On the funny side of the offer, the initial ads run by AMEXTRA in the European Stars & Stripes tailed to state just what model Mac was on sale. This obviously generated a lot of calls from curious people to the folks at AMEXTRA and to the audio-photo clubs.

As Mike and André then prepared for their next demo. Secretary Hank Lavagnini provided a variety of Apple information gleaned from the electronic mail magazine, TidBITS. Among the most interesting items covered were:

- At least three new viruses have been discovered in the last couple of months—the T4-C, a CDEF variant, and INIT 17. The freeware packages Disinfectant 3.2 and Gatekeeper 1.2.7, as well as the leading commercial anti-virus packages, are all out and able to protect your systems. Several of them will be available at the June meeting.
- Apple's new Macs now use 72 pin SIMMs which are also being used by the newer PCs. The older, and better known 30-pin SIMMs can't be used in these new Macs. On the other hand the new SIMMs can be added in one at a time, instead of in pairs like the older SIMMs.
- There is rumor already of System 7.2. Its hot feature will be folders that pop open automatically for easier navigating through lower level folders.
- And there is talk of Mac III's (Cyclones?) that may have digital signal processors (DSP) for better sound, and built in voice mail and modem capabilities

More TidBITS items will be appearing in the newsletter.

Mike Vargo then used the Mac IIvi to give an impressive demonstration of CD technology starting with a sample of Kodak's PhotoCD. Now you can have your family pictures put onto a CD-ROM disc for an instant electronic photo album. Photos stored on the discs come in various sizes and can be made into prints. Using QuickTime, you can run through the photos in a slide show though picture quality loses a little. The photos can also be brought into applications. Mike demonstrated this capability using TeachText (a very underrated program from Apple.)

The Mac IIvi package includes a bundle of 9 CD-ROM discs including Mozart, Grolier's Multimedia Encyclopedia, World Atlas, and Grandma & Me



The Macintosh Secret Trick List

A "trick" (aka "cookie" or "easter egg") is something amusing or otherwise nonproductive that won't appear unless vou do some action vou wouldn't normally do. I've also included a few interesting tips about such things as the Map control panel that are useful but (as far as I know) undocumented (or put in the manuals where nobody'll read about them).

Multifinder 1.0 (distributed with System Software prior to 6.0) Hold down Command and Option while selecting "About Multifinder" from the bottom of the Apple menu. A scrolling list of credits appears. (Contributed by Seth Theriault)

Multifinder 6.0 Select "About Multifinder" and leave the dialog up for about an hour or more. (Yes. this means you can't use your machine meanwhile...)

A message will appear:

"I want my"

"I want my"

"I want my 1--k and f--l"

You can also see this message if you snoop around in the 'STR#' resources of Multifinder for a while with ResEdit (Contributed by Tony Cooper and James Boswell)

System 6.0.7 or 7.0 Take a look through the data fork of the System File (with MacSnoop or MacTools, or open it with MS Word-It's short.) The string "Help! Help! We're being held prisoner in a system software factory!" is at the end of the data fork. (Contributed by Kevin Bolduan)

System 6.0.7J (Kanjitalk) Set the clock to January 1, 1992, and restart. The startup screen says "Happy new year" in Japanese. (Contributed by Junio Hamano)

Finder 7.0 Hold down Option while choosing "About This Macintosh". (The menu option changes to "About the Finder". and if balloon help is turned on, the balloon now reads "Displays a dialog with the original Finder picture.") The original picture of the mountains from System 1.0 appears. If the creation date of the invisible "Desktop Folder" is May 13. 1991, or later, the names of all the Finder developers through Mac and Lisa history also scroll by. Hold down Command-Option while choosing "About" to get a goofy-face cursor.

Finder 7.0 and MacsBug Turn on Balloon Help and point to the MacsBug file. The balloon reads: "This file provides programmers with information proving that it really was a hardware problem...'

Caps Lock 7.0.1 (on a PowerBook) Turn on balloon help and point to the Caps Lock file icon. The balloon help reads: "This file allows your Macintosh TIM or Derringer to display an icon..." (These were the working names of the PowerBooks: Apple forgot to change the extension before System 7.0.1 was released!) (Contributed by Seth Theriault and Fabian Hahn)

Color Control Panel 7.0 Click on the Sample Text a few

times. The strings "by Dean Yu" "& Vincent Lo" alternate.

Labels Control Panel 7.0 Delete all the label names in the Labels control panel, and reboot. The labels are now "None." "a". "1". "a". "n". "f". "e". "f"

Map Control Panel 1x (released with System 6) and 7.0 Type MID as the city name, and click Find. Also try: clicking on the version number, option-clicking on Find, opening the control panel while you hold down shift and/or option, clicking somewhere in the Map and dragging off the edge of it, or copying the map from the Scrapbook and pasting it while the Map control panel is open. The stored point MID is actually "Middle of Nowhere", an insignificant location in the middle of the South Atlantic. (This one was added in version 7.0.)

Clicking on the "7.0" puts "v7.0, by Mark Davis" into the city name field until you release the mouse button.

Option-clicking on Find repeatedly will take you alphabetically to every city the Map knows.

Opening the control panel while you hold down the shift key will display a magnified map (the resolution is the same, so it's very jagged)

Opening it with option held down magnifies it more, and shift-option magnifies it even more to the point of being really

Dragging off the edge of the map will scroll around the

You can paste a new picture into the control panel; the Scrapbook that comes with System 7 includes a particularly good color map.

Memory Control Panel 7.0 (on a machine capable of virtual memory) Turn on virtual memory and hold down Option while clicking on the pop-up menu used to choose a hard drive for your swapfile. This brings up a hierarchical popup menu with the names of the programmers; each name points to a submenu with a few comments. (Contributed by P. Hessellund Pedersen)

Monitors Control Panel 7.0 Click the version number (7.0) in the control panel window. While you hold down the mouse button, tap Option several times. When you click, a box pops up with the names of the people who wrote Monitors. Pressing Option makes the smiley face stick out its tongue. After tapping Option several times, the names begin to get rearranged and some first and last names get replaced with "Blue" or "Meanies".

Puzzle Desk Accessory 7.0 You can copy the picture of two linked squares from the Scrapbook and paste it into the Puzzle. In fact, you can paste any picture into the Puzzle, and it will be sized to fit. You can also copy the picture from the Puzzle and look at the clipboard to see what it will look like solved. (Contributed by Povl H. Pedersen)

QuickTime 1.0 Turn on Balloon Help and point to the QuickTime file. The balloon reads: "time n. A nonspatial continuum in which events occur in apparently irreversible succession from the past to the present to the future." (Contributed by Kristopher Nasadowski)

Disinfectant 3.2 is a new release of our free Macintosh antiviral utility. Version 3.2 detects the new INIT-M virus.

The INIT-M virus was discovered at Dartmouth College in April, 1993. INIT-M is a malicious virus. It is designed to trigger on any Friday the 13th. The virus severely damages a large number of folders and files. File names are changed torandom 8 character strings. Folder names are changed to random 1-8 character strings. File creators and types are changed to random 4 character strings. This changes the icons assoiated with the files and destroys the relationship between programs and their documents. File creation and modification dates are changed to Jan. 1, 1904. In some cases, one file or folder on a disk may be renamed "Virus MindCrime". In some very rare circumstances, the virus may also delete a file or files. Note that the next three Friday the 13ths are in August 1993. May 1994, and January 1995. The virus can also sometimes cause problems with the proper display of windows.

The virus only spreads and attacks under System 7.0 or later. It does not spread or attack under System 6. The Disinfectant protection INIT, however, will detect an infected application

under any system.

The virus infects all kinds of files, including extensions, applications, preference files, and document files.

The virus creates a file named "FSV Prets" in the Preterences folder. If you use Disinfectant to repair an infected system, it will delete this file.

The damage caused by the INIT-M-virus is very similar to that caused by the INIT 1984 virus. Despute this similarity, the two viruses are very different in other respects, and should not be confused.

Version 3.2 also contains two other changes:

There was an error in version 3.1 in the changes made to the damaged file detection code. This error affected only a very few people with very rare kinds of damaged files. Version 3.2 fixes the problem. Thanks to Stephen Lardieri of Princeton University for helping to find and fix this error.

Disinfectant's preferred memory partition has been increased from 700K to 1000K. This fixes a problem scanning some specific applications with very large CODE resources, including PSpice and Intellidraw. Thanks to the many users who reported this problem.

Disinfectant 3.2 is available now via anonymous FTP from site ftp.acns.nwu.edu [129.105.113.52], file pub/disinfectant/disinfectant32.sea.hqx. It will also be available soon from most of the other popular sources of free and shareware software.
