FAXplosion GS



Newsletter News:



- Nick Shestople is reviewing Hypercard 2.2.


(At a future meeting we will ask for a volunteer to review ClarisDraw.)

• POPCHAR V.2.7.1 now available
Russ Wagenfeld passes on the word
that Version 2.7.1 of PopChar is now
available. The new version now
works with System 7, Adobe Type
Reunion, TrueType fonts, MS Works
3.0, and MacWrite Pro. PopChar can
also now be configured to use an
iconic menu instead of a "hot spot" in
the menu bar; the PopChar menu then
appears next to System 7's HELP
menu.

Up to 255 characters can now be entered in "More..." dialog, and big font sizes are automatically reduced so that the character table always fits on the screen.

BEWARE OF SPEED DISK

Speed Disk could be a fast route to dead data for Mac users. Symantec Corp. has warned purchasers of the new Norton Utilities for Macintosh Version 3.0 not to use the Speed Disk hard-drive optimization module. It can cause data loss under some conditions, the company said.

A company spokesman said Symantec has suspended 3.0 shipments and will replace or update cont'd on vg. 4 MacSIG, cont'd from pg. 3 outstanding copies with Version 3.1. The update will be shipped automatically to registered users and will also be available on-line from CompuServe, AppleLink and AOL.

Upcoming Programs/Disk of the Month

The next two items will give you some idea of future programs. We hope to have the UGTV tape available for December, and something from Adobe in January.

For the November meeting we will have demos (in German) of several Microsoft programs, including Word 6.0, Excel 5.0, Works 4.0, PowerPoint 4.0 and Office 4.2 (integrates Word, Excel and PowerPoint).

The November Disk of the Month contains several data bases from various CD-ROM disks, such as the BMUG PD-ROM (owned by Nick Shestople), EasyWare CD v2 and the MacActivity CD-ROM Sampler (owned by Clif Sayer), as well as the complete directory from the Sumex-Mac archives at Stanford University. With this information other members can select programs or items of interest to them, and with a little coordination the items can be made available.

The catalogs were made with the shareware program CatFinder v1.33, which is also on the disk. A later version is now available, but I haven't downloaded it yet.

Also included is the paper Networking on the Network, by Phil Agre of UC San Diego. This document comes highly recommended as the complete guide of Internet etiquette.

Finally, as room allows, I'll add the most recent issues of Adam Engst's weekly electronic Macintosh newsletter TidBITS.

A Guide to Excruciatingly Correct Behavior on the Internet

Houser's 12 Rules for Using Mail on the Internet, or How to Avoid Becoming Roadkill on the Information Superhighway

1. Master basic driving skills before getting on the information superhighway or—like raccoons, skunks and opossums—you'll soon become roadkill. If others violate the rules, kindly inform them privately; don't clutter the entire mail list. Most scofflaws repent in the face of an inbox full of admonitions. But if not, complain to the postmaster at the culprit's host.

2. Keep your cool. Wait a while. Draft a response to share with a close



friend, but don't fire off a stinging rebuttal. Be factual, friendly and polite. You never know who may read the message later.

3. Respect the privacy of others. Don't read other people's mail.

Ask permission before forwarding other people's messages.

- 4. Be brief. The broader the audience the more carefully you need to distill your words. Summarize you points and post the gory details on an ftp server for retrieval by those who are truly interested, especially for contributions to mail lists or news groups. If your message exceeds a couple pages, apologize and provide a summary up front.
- 5. Be discreet. E-mail messages can live forever; the more indiscreet, the longer they live. Just ask Ollie North (not that it seems to have hurt his political career.)
- 6. Be prompt. Given the ease of responding, failure to do so is inconsiderate. Also mail list participants

may not understand (or care) when you respond to an old message.

- 7. Stick to the point. Avoid rambling essays and digressions from the established topic for a mail list or news group. Read the mail for a while (called "lurking") before contributing. Read the list's background documents or Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ). If you must indulge in detail, do so in one-on-one messages.
- 8. Write subject lines like newspaper headlines. Complete but terse subjects help you and your recipients to file and retrieve your messages.
- 9. Don't oversubscribe. There are thousands of mail lists and news groups; you could become an Internet junkie if you aren't careful. To stay productive, pick your interests and keep your focus. Budget a set amount of time for reading your e-mail. Drop subscriptions if you chronically exceed your budgeted time.
- 10. Read, reply, file or discard your messages. Read your mail frequently. Set up file folders when a new topic of interest arrives. Delete unwanted messages promptly to save on disk space.
- 11. Advertise with care. As the Internet moves from government to private sponsorship, many users are sensitive to commercialism. When in doubt, educate and inform rather than advertise of job hunt via mail lists or news groups.
- 12. Obey the law, and protect yourself from those who don't. Sending chain letters, spreading viruses and stealing other people's computer resources are illegal and/or unethical. Scan foreign files for viruses. Report problems to the appropriate authorities.

Editor's Note: This was the only response that I got to my article and question about whether others have hopped on the Information Superhighway or not — obviously, this person has!
