SUBJECT: Style

When I joined Apple four and a half years ago, I did so to learn and to have fun. The most important thing I've learned has been that the things most important to me, no amount of money can buy:

1. Good health

- 2. Time we all get exactly twenty four hours to spend each day. It's one's most important investment.
- 3. Good friends as opposed to just "friends", acquaintances, or associates. I count my wealth by the number of my good friends.
- 4. Good memories Sometimes they can be given like a single white rose, a birthday wreath, or a premier movie.
- 5. Loyalty This experience has been the most important thing to me.

I believe that a company is a business, not a social institution. It must demand competence and contribution from its employees in exchange for fair compensation. A company is an interactive system and must have proper controls and teamwork. Hypocracy, Yes-men, foolhardy plans, a "cover your ass" attitude and empire builders can kill it. I don't believe in an "executive social club". It might consider going to a Raiders matinee movie. To me there is excessive emphasis on titles and high salaries and not enough frugality, like small company cars and business (vs. first class) travel.

A company's quality of life is not and cannot be set by a committee (committees design camels, not horses.) - it is set by the personal care of each manager for each and every employee. Priority must be first here and the time later spent on campus-monuments.

I thought I could stay for awhile, handle the Communications and Info Systems assignment and do an outstanding job at it. I thought I could keep my opinions to myself unless asked, but I know too many people. They keep asking how a decision gets made. I am no longer proud or having fun.

So I am having a new learning experience, something I've never done before. \underline{I} quit, not resign to join a new company or retire for personal reasons (including as an elected member of the Board of Directors). This is <u>not</u> done for those who fear my opinions and style, but for the loyal ones who may be given false hope.
